Those of you who have visited the famed Carlsbad caverns and have been awed by the immensity these underground spaces, probably will feel very apprehensive for the people who live in the southeastern portion of New Mexico when reading of the discovery of another cave, believed to be even vaster than the original in the same vicinity as the Carlsbad caverns and probably even connected with them by some as yet undiscovered pas-

According to a new article in today's press the discovering party walked for six hours without reaching the end of the huge new chamber. The ceiling of the vault was so high it could not be seen while the width of the subterranean void was 700 feet.

Such a great open space under the earth, it seems to me, invites disaster for all who live above it in that it may some day cause an earthquake. Discovery of the new cave, therefore, should create a feeling of constant uneasiness for those who live above it. Ignorance should be bliss and wisdom folly in this case.

However, none of us knows exactly what each is living over or under, and if the truth were known we all probably would feel considerably unhappy.

With reference to the caverns, it is difficult to see how such a vast expanse of roof, such as covers the 100-acre room of the Carlsbad series, can remain supported under the doubtless terrific pressure of the earth that lies above it.
