MAIDEN DEARBORN TAKES AIR

Carrying One Thousand Pounds of Freight "Maiden Dearborn" Off on Initial Trip to Southern Points

DETROIT, April 13.—(Copyrighted.) Henry Ford is going to employ all his vast resources in making commercial aviation a success, he declared this morning as he defied the traditional hoodoo "13," when the "Maiden Dearborn" took the air from Dearborn flying field with one thousand pounds of freight for Oklahoma, Texas and other southern points. A fleet of planes will soon be placed in operation, with all of Ford's money backing the venture. Henry Ford and his son, Edsall, will have charge of the corporation. Texas freight will be taken part of the way by plane, and the remainder by train.

Z. M. CHURCHILL FATALLY HURT IN AUTO CRASH

Z. M. Churchill, district superintendent of the Mahstead-Mook Oil Co., with his home at Eastland, died at the Eastland hospital at 11 o'clock Sunday night from injuries received when his car skidded on the Bankhead highway about three miles east of Cisco Sunday afternoon. Mrs. Churchill and her 3-year-old niece were in the car at the time, and escaped without injury. Mr. Churchill was pinned beneath the car and his chest crushed. He was rushed to the Eastland hospital, where he was given attention, but never rallied from the shock and died as above stated. It is said in trying to avoid a collision with another car that had signaled a stop, his automobile went into the ditch as it skidded on the wet paved highway.

CISCO DOCTORS REMOVE SAFETY PIN FROM CHILD

"Ten complaints were filed today in the corporation court," said Dr. Gregory, city health officer, against as many residents. "The charges embrace several counts under the sanitary regulations, such as failure to have standard sized garbage cans, failure to clean out cow and horse lots, etc.," stated Dr. Gregory. "The sanitary department, headed by Commissioner McCrea, announced that complaints will be filed constantly until these ordinances are complied with," the health officer stated. "Several prominent citizens are included among those against whom complaints were filed today. This department is pledged to do all things in its power to protect the health of the people, especially the infants of the city, whose lives are jeopardized by the house fly. If the strong arm of the law should lay its clean hands on the people because they are not obeying the city laws, they have no one to blame but themselves," the health officer concluded.

MARKETING PLAN GOING OVER BIG SAYS SALES MGR.

W. S. Jarrett, sales manager of the Bankhead Poultry Marketing association, was seen before his departure on the first trip of his second week of the business of collecting eggs from the members of the association this morning. "Last week was the first week the association has been functioning," said Mr. Jarrett, "and I am greatly pleased with the showing made for that time. I collected sixty cases of eggs from the members, and two hundred fryers. All eggs were sold at an average of \$7.26 per case, and the fryers brought a premium over that offered the owners. More interest is being manifested every day I have been out, but the first week much of my time has been taken up in explaining the plans of the association. As the plan is new to this section, many want information. But when the people realize what the association is doing, they are eager to get in. I predict the Bankhead Marketing association will be one of the real enterprises of the oil belt in a short while. It is certainly going over good now."

BANK OF FRANCE MAY CLOSE DOWN INDEFINITELY

PARIS, April 13.—The bank of France today threatened to suspend business and close its doors indefinitely, at least until the government legalizes two billions of francs now floating on the market without gold security. This ultimatum was addressed to the government in a letter from President Robineau of the bank. Such action would cause a crash of the money market in France.

T. P. WANTS TO ABANDON ROAD TO SEMINOLE

AUSTIN, April 13.—Oral argument before the interstate commerce commission will be held Tuesday, April 21, on the application of the Texas & Pacific railway company to abandon the Midland & Northwestern railroad. The M. & N. is a short line road extending from Midland, in Midland county, to Seminole, in Gaines county. The state—which is opposing vigorously the proposed abandonment of the line—will probably be represented by Assistant Attorney General Ernest May. The arguments will be before a special division of the interstate commerce commission.

More Trouble

His latest episode came when he passed through Zanesville, O., in his touring car. There he met Lillian Vogel, fifteen, who is said to have ridden to Columbus with him. The girl was found in a boarding house there and returned to her home. She declared his conduct throughout had been that of a gentleman who had done her a favor.

The distressing news shocked shocked many of his former friends when it was reported Sunday afternoon that Bruce Carroll was dead. Judge J. H. McDonald was called to the Carroll home at 501 West Second street and held an inquest, and pronounced his death due to carbolic acid self administered.

Arising as usual Sunday morning, he spent the day at home, ate his dinner and took his usual Sunday nap, though stating that he was not feeling very well. Mrs. Carroll and two children were across the street at the home of her sister, Mrs. W. P. Pulley, while he remained on the porch at the home across the street. Being called by Mrs. Carroll to come over, he replied he would come in a few minutes. He was seen to leave the porch swing and go into the house, but when he did not join the rest at the Pulley home, Willie Mae Lang, daughter of Mrs. Carrolls, went to tell him to come over. Willie Mae found him lying down, seemingly in great pain. She returned and informed Mrs. Carroll, who found her husband dying. Dr. Clark was summoned but death arrived ahead of the physician, who pronounced death due to carbolic acid poison, as the glass from which the acid was taken was nearby, and Judge McDonald found an empty acid bottle.

Mrs. Carroll stated that they had only recently moved to their present home, and so far as she knew there was no poison in the house, and knew of no reason why he should take poison and believed he evidently took a fatal dose through error. She stated that only financial matters could have caused him to take his life. However, recently he has worried considerably regarding the possibility of tuberculosis developing, with which he was affected previous to his coming to Texas. The shock was severe to Mrs. Carroll, as nothing had occurred to cause her to anticipate anything was unusual with him.

The body was conveyed to the undertaking establishment of Green & Gray, where it remains pending the arrival of relatives, when funeral arrangements will be announced. At present the hour has not been set for the funeral, as his brothers are expected here this evening. The funeral will be held some time Tuesday, and burial will be in Oakwood cemetery. L. V. Carroll, a brother, lives at El Paso, and a sister lives in North Carolina. Perry Carroll is another brother. He is survived by one son, grown.

Deceased was about 55 years of age, and came to Texas from Georgia. With the exception of a short time he has made Cisco his home, and was in business for many years at D avenue and Fourteenth street, where he operated a driverless Ford garage. Mrs. Carroll stated that he was negotiating with the Blanken Auto Supply Co. to again enter the driverless car business, and Saturday night spoke of the proposed business, and seemed encouraged at the prospects. Also, he took out accident insurance Friday, and for these reasons is loath to believe that he drank fatal draught intentionally.

His life has been one of a true christian during his residence in Cisco, and by his upright dealings made friends with all with whom he came in contact.

BANKHEAD ROAD I. & G. N. SHOPS PAVED BETWEEN LOST TO TEXAS T. P. AND STRAWN BY COURT ORDER

STRAWN, April 13.—The General Construction company Friday finished laying brick on the Bankhead highway between the T. & P. railroad track in Strawn and the Eastland county line. They will now move to the north part of town where they have about 2,000 feet of paving to put down before they get to the city paving.

The Bankhead highway is now open from Strawn west through Ranger, Olden, Eastland, Cisco, Dothan and travelers have 43 miles of paved roads to ride over. The work of paving the Bankhead highway east of Strawn, between Strawn and Palo Pinto, is progressing at the rate about one mile per week, with about five miles finished in the vicinity of Lover's Retreat. This leaves about 17 miles yet to be paved before reaching Palo Pinto. There are 12 miles of incomplete work between Palo Pinto and Mineral Wells, making 28 to 30 miles in all. Unless more crews are put on and the work otherwise rushed, it will require some seven or eight months to complete this paving.

ASK AUTHORITY TO CONSTRUCT 2 TEXAS ROADS

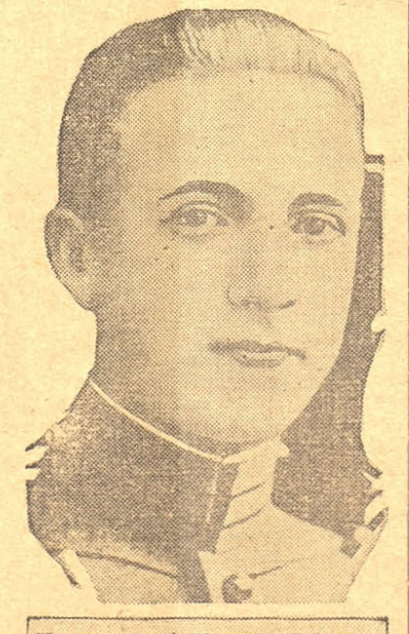

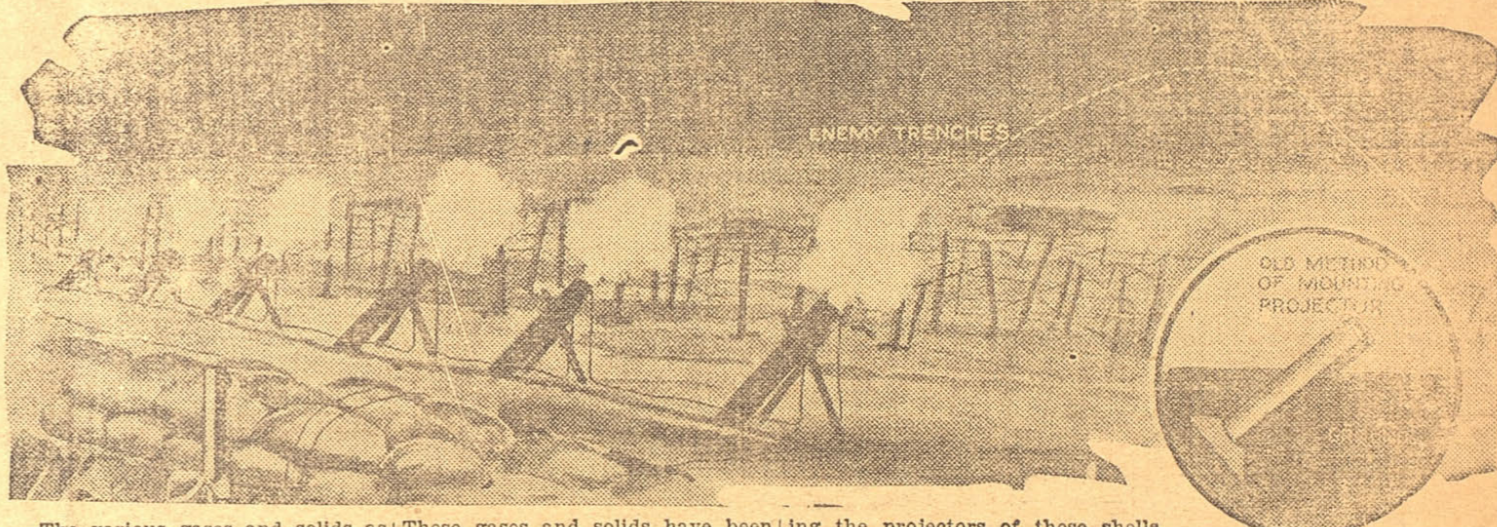

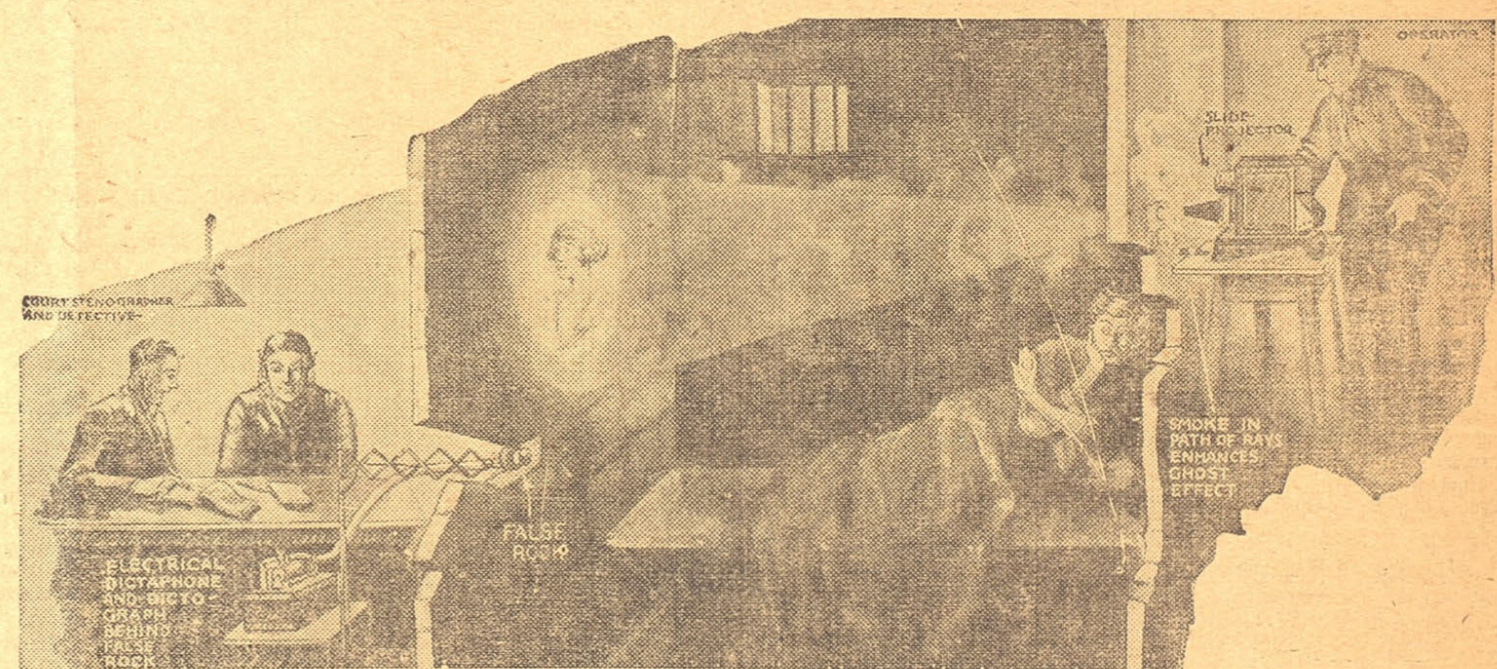
Poison Gas Shells

The various gases and solids as well as incendiary materials have been studied and experimented with by the United States and other world powers to such an extent that they are very effective. These gases and solids have been incorporated in shells so that they can be made deadly, even at long distances from the trenches of the users. The illustration directly above shows one method of mounting the projectors of these shells known as the 8-inch Livens type, after the inventor. They are mounted so that the mouth projects at an angle of 45 degrees. —Science & Invention

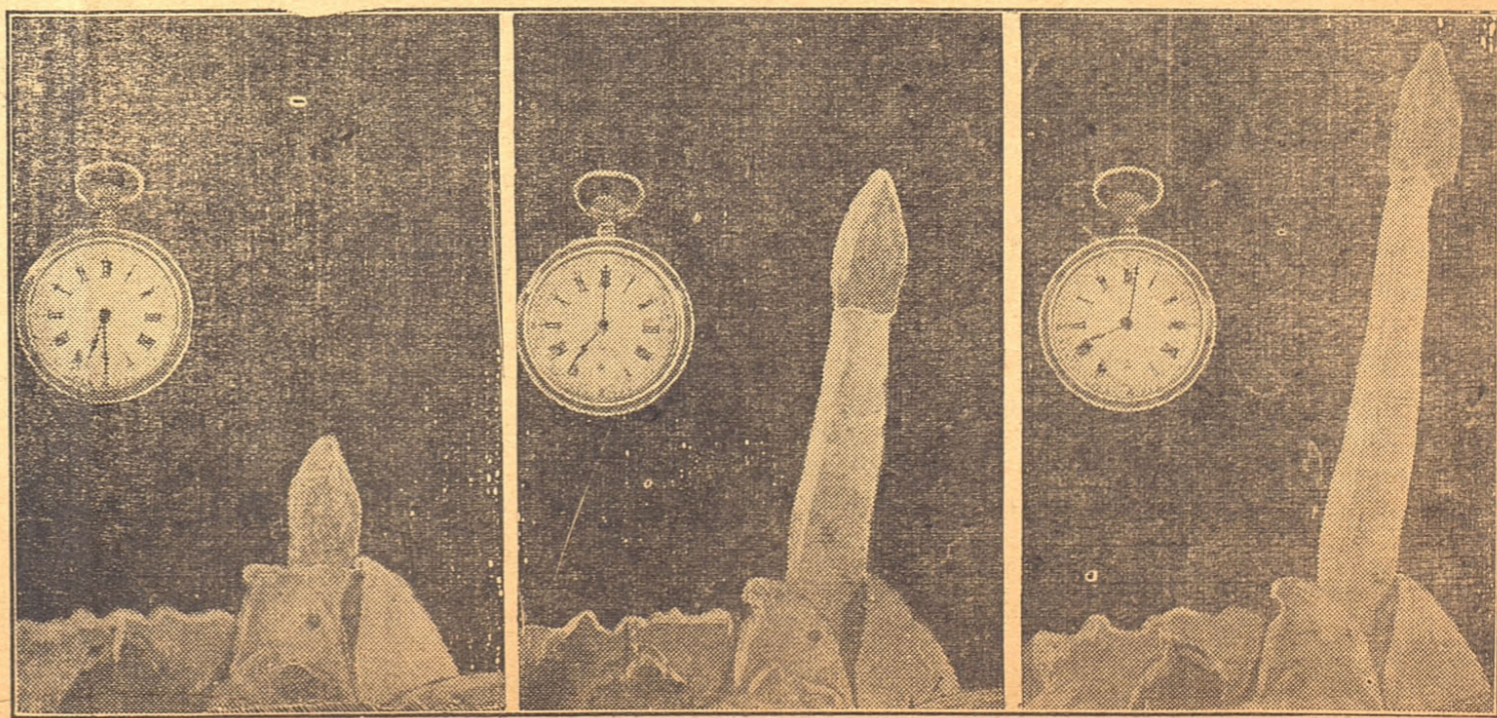
A Novel Third Degree Method
