Lack Of Qualifications For Instrument Flying May Have Contributed To Crash

Lack of qualifications to fly by instruments could have been a contributing factor to the crash of an airplane and the death of the pilot and his son in an accident here last Monday afternoon, according to a federal investigator in Cisco Tuesday.

Killed in the crash of the Cessna 180 airplane were Clarence Edward Weaver, 42, and his son, Robert, 15, of Sandia, near Corpus Christi, when the plane fell into a tree and burned in the yard of Mr. and Mrs. Manning Davis at 700 East 21st Street.

Almond Edwards of the Fort Worth office of the National Transportation Safety Board headed an investigation team here Tuesday. The pilot's license was located in the wreckage. It had been issued last April and it was a private pilot's license with no instrument rating listed, the official said.

Chief Billy Rains of the Cisco Police Department reported that the airplane wreckage was taken to a storage area at the city landfill. They recovered a battered travel bag with personal items, including a number of school books, a photo album, clothing and a Bible. It had not been determined where the plane came from or its destination. Mr. Rains said they had not heard of any radio contact efforts by the pilot.

Officers said that a wheel from the airplane apparently flew over the Davis house and broke a window on the west side of the Bob Conner home at 702 East 21st Street -- next door. The airplane did not hit the Davis house but fell into a tree a few feet in front of the building.

Mr. and Mrs. Manning Davis, who both are employees of the Cisco Public Schools, planned to move to an apartment at Royal Oaks until their home can be restored. They reported Thursday that they have engaged Contractor Tim Barton to do the work. Damage to their house was extensive.

Accompanying Mr. Edwards here for the investigation were Juan A. Garcia of Lubbock, an employee of the Federal Aviation Administration; James Moran of Dallas, Continental Motors Co.; and Brian Hancock of Wichita, Kan., an employee of Cessna Aircraft Corp.

The engine and propeller were taken to Dallas to determine its condition. Mr. Edwards said there were conflicting reports as to whether the engine was running at the time of the crash.

He said that it would be several months before an official report will be released regarding the crash.

'Harvey' Will Open Here Monday

"Where theatre is concerned, I have no willpower. I can't say no. I just love it." Lou Jane Qualls gives credit for her love of theatre to her junior high school drama teacher, her mother and her father.

"My mom made the old favorite fairy tales come alive. My dad told stories very dramatically in Irish dialect. So naturally when it came time to cast the part of an older Irish woman in a Colorado City Junior High play, I walked right into it."

That involvement, plus plays in high school, church plays, and plays with the Jayceettes further added to her desire to perform. All served to prepare her for her performance as Veta Louise Simmons in Cisco Junior College's production of "Harvey" which opens Monday night.

Isolated on her family farm as a child, she and her brother entertained themselves by enacting stories. "Even when I wasn't active, the love was there. We acted out everything that came on the radio."

Working and raising a family occupied the years from high school until 1980 when she finished her college degrees. She was convinced to go back onstage by Janis Myer in "The Effect of Gamma Rays on Man In The Moon Marigolds." It was a taxing experience both emotionally and physically but "Bob Lindsey, my principal, was so supportive. Beatrice (her role) paralleled my own story so closely."

Claiming there's a part of herself in every role she plays, Lou Jane laughingly stated that she identifies with certain idiosyncrasies

in each character. "I find myself asking 'Do I do that?' 'Do I really sound like that?' I get involved so deeply with all my roles."

Lou Jane's awareness of what an actor brings of himself to a role brought out an appreciation for the fellow "Harvey" cast members with whom she works. She has an easy, natural rapport with the students both off and on stage. "I've seen Joan (Fariello) onstage several times and was excited to be able to work with her."

But her greatest pleasure was getting to share the stage with Fred Mullinax, who plays Elwood P. Dowd. "Harvey" marks the second production in which Qualls and Mullinax appear together and the rapport they developed is apparent. "Our first appearance together was as Barbara Allen's parents in "Dark of the Moon", and I've always wanted to work again with Fred."

Directing is also something Lou Jane finds exciting. "Even though my

experience is very limited, I enjoy directing. Perhaps because as a director I get to play all the parts!"

And playing a part is what it all comes back to for Lou Jane. "If I could satisfy my 'magic if' I would probably act as a profession."

Lou Jane feels that theatre gives everyone a greater understanding of life. "You're constantly putting yourself in different times, places and social strata. There is no limit to who or what you can be."

Theatre then becomes a

universal equalizer for her, a place where everyone works together in mutual understanding. "It's a shy person's haven. You can do all the things you never could in real life. I love it. I simply love it."

"Harvey" runs nightly from October 21-23 in preview, and October 24-26 as a dinner theatre production. Tickets can be reserved by calling 442-2567 between 8 a.m.-4 p.m., or 442-2589 after hours.

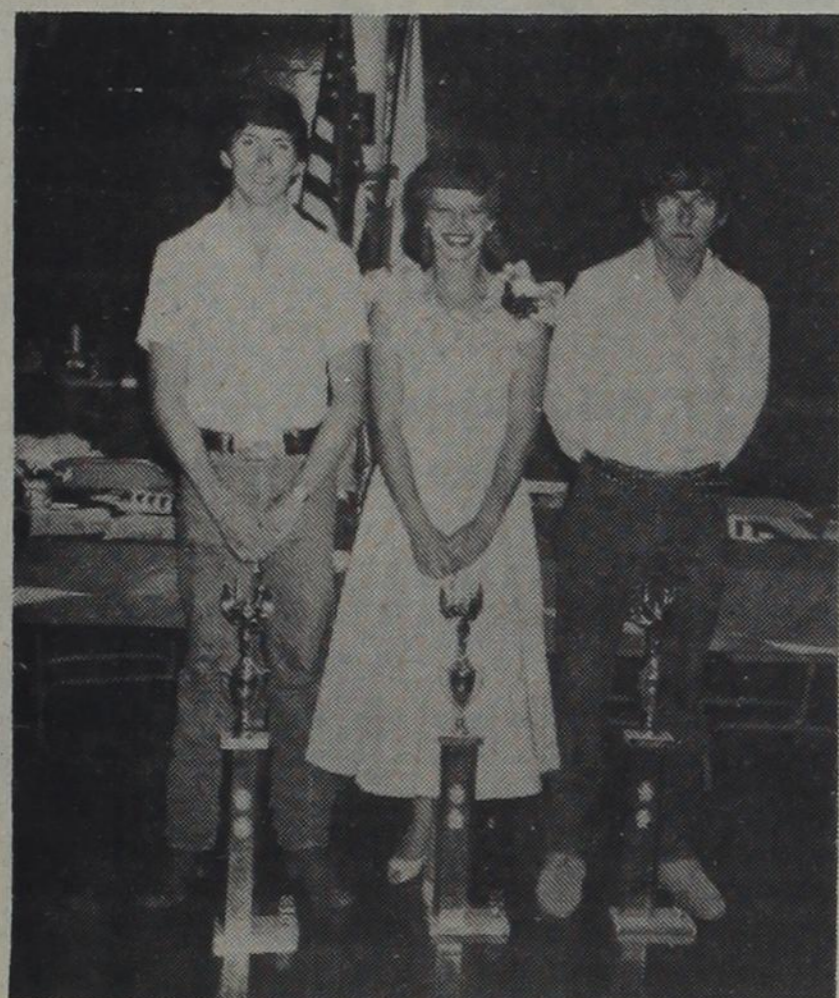
Jerry Long is an achiever. Last year he was one of three Gold Star winners. Jerry held the two top offices in the

Homemaking Hints

How did you sleep last night? This common question takes on a new significance for older persons whose sleep patterns change significantly as they age.

Sleep studies show that night time wakefulness and the number of awakenings increase as we grow older. Recent studies also show that daytime fatigue and sleepiness also increase with age. This research makes it appear that the ability - rather than the need - to sleep decreases over time.

Why does our ability to sleep decrease? According to the Association of Sleep Disorders Centers, there are more than 100 specific problems of sleep disturbance. The most prevalent cause of sleep problems in the elderly appears to involve the way the sleeping brain controls the respiratory apparatus. According to several different studies, more than 80 percent of all people over the age of 55 stop breathing many times while asleep at night, awaken briefly during the periods of stalled breathing and resume normal respiration without ever being aware of the problem. An "apnea" is the pause in breathing longer than 10 seconds, but usually lasts about one minute. Two out of five older persons experience up to hundreds of apneas each night, making the problem clinically serious.

One area where more study is needed is the effectiveness of drugs prescribed for sleep disorders. People over 60 who constitute 15 percent of this country's population, consume 40 percent of the sleeping pills. A recent study of nursing homes showed that 95 percent of the residents were receiving medications to help them sleep.

Most experts agree that sleeping pills are not very helpful in the long run. Instead, they recommend some common sense ideas: Go to bed when you are sleepy, lie on a comfortable bed in a dark, quiet room. Stay away from heavy meals, cigarettes, coffee, alcohol, strenuous activity or worrisome thoughts before bedtime. A warm bath can have a soothing and sedating effect, as can a light snack, a massage, or

any number of relaxation techniques. A natural substance called tryptophan - which is found in dairy products, meat and fish - tends to promote sleep because it triggers a chemical which increased in the brain in the early stages of sleep.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK
Pumpkins are one of this seasons, inexpensive and nutritious vegetables - pumpkin is packed with vitamin A, potassium, and niacin! So whip up a batch of pumpkin cookies and create a nutrient - rich sweet that will delight your Halloween trick-or-treaters!

PUMPKIN COOKIES
1/2 c. shortening
1 1/4 brown sugar, firmly packed
2 eggs
1 tsp. vanilla
1 1/2 c. mashed cooked or canned pumpkin
2 1/2 c. sifted flour
4 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon
1/2 tsp ground nutmeg
1 c. raisins
1 c. chopped nuts
Cream together shortening and brown sugar. Add eggs; beat thoroughly. Mix in vanilla and pumpkin. Sift together dry ingredients. Blend into creamed mixture. Stir in raisins and chopped

nuts. Drop dough by heaping teaspoons about 2 inches apart onto greased baking sheet. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees) about 15 minutes until lightly browned. Remove cookies and cool on racks. Makes 5 dozen.

Many tribal elders, also known as "parents," took active parts in the Pow Wow to conclude an interesting project from teachers, Joyce Schaefer, Janice Hobbs and Suzette Bassham.

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Good News-A Report From Project Tejas

On Saturday, May 18 the Popovers Gymnastic Team met at Wal-Marts parking lot in Eastland to gather contributions from the public for Project Tejas. This was a famine-relief plan for Africa sponsored by the Texas Department of Agriculture, and locally organized by Kathy Vernon of Eastland President of the Popovers Mother's Club.

About 100 girls from various towns in the area are members of the Popovers, with Polly Crowell as Coach. A number of these helped at Wal Mart, and after three hours the group had \$541.23. These contributions grew during the next week, when a number of schools joined the Popovers in the drive.

The school contribution brought the Eastland County total up to \$1379.85, with the largest single amount coming from Siebert Elementary School. The local funds were added to about \$1 million gathered throughout the state, and the money was used to buy Texas-produced grain and powdered milk.

Project Tejas was first inspired by an international non-profit relief organization called "Save The Children". Earlier in the year Jim Hightower, State Agriculture Commissioner, was considering what the state could do to help starvation in Ethiopia.

He and the Texas Department of Agriculture thought of the surplus grain and milk produced in the state. Why not try to move some of the Texas food where it was needed the most?

On March 1 Project Tejas was launched by 23 sponsoring Texas farm and ranch organizations. "We had ambitions of raising \$50,000 to \$100,000," says Hightower.

The response was overwhelming, however. Schools and Churches, as well as other organizations and individuals, all pitched in to help and contribute. This wasn't just another mass relief effort. This was something personal - a gift directly from the people of Texas.

On September 13 the cargo ship Iris left the Port of Corpus Christi with 120,000 bushels of Texas wheat and 120,000 lbs. of powdered milk for starving people. The shipment included enough wheat to feed 25,000 people for a year and enough powder to make 2.4 million cups of liquid milk. It is expected to reach the Port of Assab, Ethiopia on Oct. 28.

Volunteer longshoremen from Texas and Louisiana loaded the shipment, saving the project thousands of dollars. Jim Hightower, Bob Birch, Vice President of the Save the Children Foundation, and other officials were on hand for a bon voyage celebration.

After the speeches, Hightower climbed to the top of the monkey island on the ship and raised a Texas flag on the signal mast opposite the American flag.

"On behalf of the people of Texas we sent this help to the people of Ethiopia," The Commissioner of Agriculture said as the flag

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was raised. This week Cathy Vernon of the Popovers Mother's Club received a note from Commissioner of Agriculture Jim Hightower, together with newspaper clippings about the launching of the ship. "I thought you might be interested in seeing this," Hightower said.

On Wednesday, Oct. 9 Mike Walton of the Texas Department of Agriculture at Stephenville spoke on Project Tejas to the Eastland Civic League in the Women's Clubhouse. He confirmed the arrival date of the ship Iris

in Ethiopia as Oct. 28. The Save The Children group will then transport the food to relief centers inland.

"It is good to have a follow-up on Project Tejas - to know that our contributions are going where they were intended," Mrs. Vernon says. "The funds from Eastland County are really appreciated."

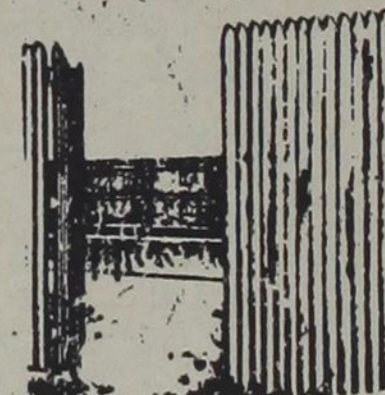

Antlerless Deer Permits To Be Issued For County

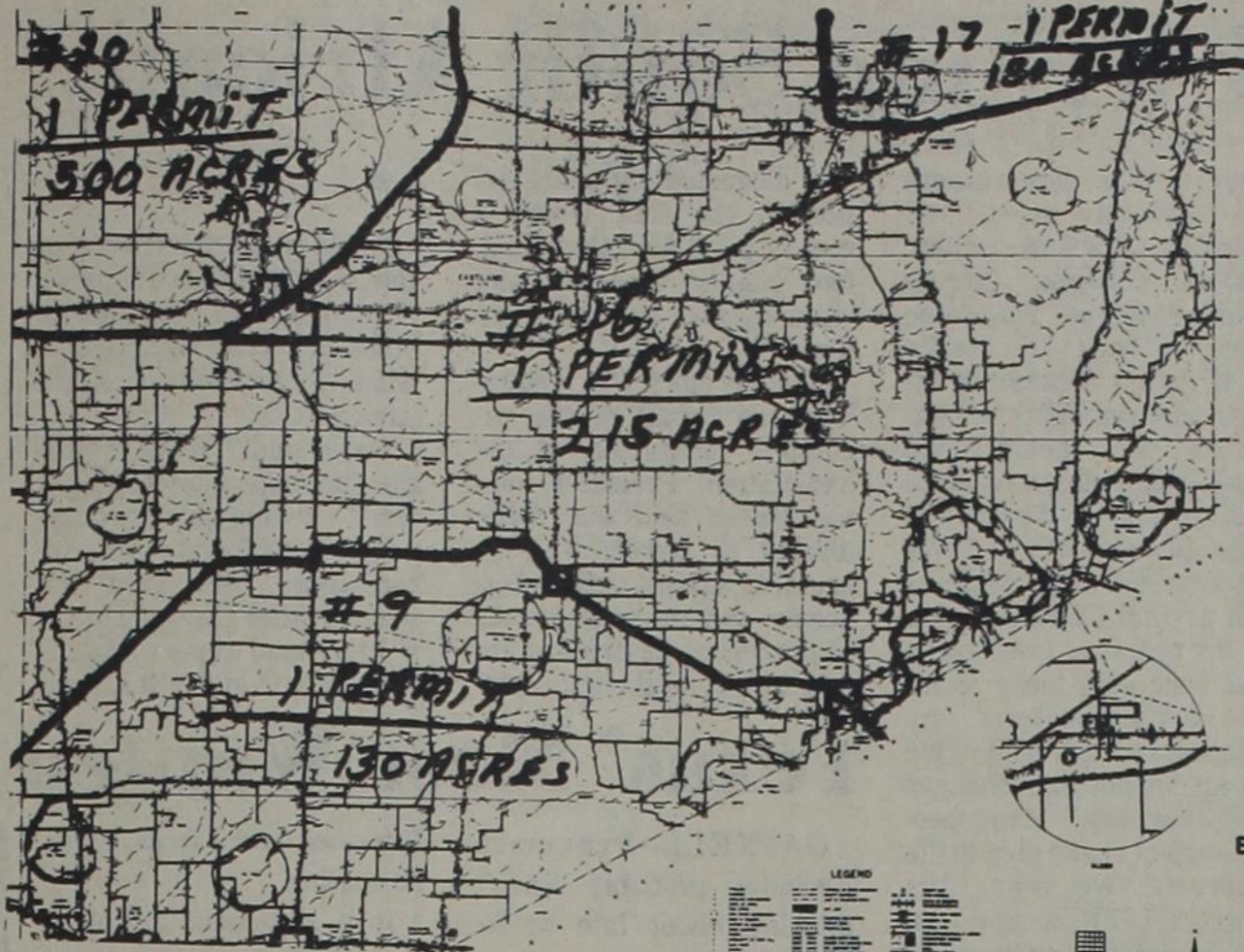

A map with the antlerless deer permit issuance compartments and issuance rates will be posted in the county courthouse prior to the issuance date. To qualify for permits, a landowner must own or control acreage equal to at least one-half of

the permits issuance rate of the compartment where the tract is located.

After the opening of the hunting season, permits will only be available through Regional Offices located in Waco. Permits will not be issued by local department personnel.

Landowners or their agents are urged to pick up permits on the scheduled issuance dates.

Picture Slide Presentation Made To Local AARP

A picture slide presentation on a three-day visit last year to Antarctica and the United States research laboratories there was shown by Ms. Nancy Robinson, Abilene newspaper columnist, as the program feature at the monthly meeting of the Cisco chapter of the AARP at the Laguna Corral Room last Thursday night.

The antarctic, an ice continent of more than 5,000,000 square miles, is occupied of some 31 nations under a 1961 treaty. Each of the nations has groups there for scientific study, and some are planning to claim part of the continent after the 1961 treaty expires in 1991, Ms. Robinson said.

The temperature at the South Pole region often drops to around 200 degrees below zero, the speaker said. All foods and supplies are flown in once a year when the U.S. Air Force sends 20 loads there, she said. Winds usually blow at a minimum of 100 miles per hour, adding to other problems.

Local Girl Writing South African

Darla Harris, a senior at Cisco High School is a pen pal to Zaida Amardien, who lives in the city of Cape Town, South Africa.

Zaida sent Darla some newspaper clippings of the trouble in South Africa and in two of her letters she tries to explain what is happening in her country.

In one letter she writes, "I don't know if you heard about the 'state of emergency,' made by the president of South Africa. You must probably be wondering what the state of emergency is. Well, it is as simple as this. The police can arrest anyone if he looks suspicious of attending illegal political gatherings, may search their house without any warrant, may keep these people as long as they please and they can be in the roads between 6 a.m. to 6 o'clock in the evening. If they are out after that period they get arrested. So far, 1381 people have been detained. But since the boycott 731 people have been released. But we are not going back till everything is back to normal."

In a different letter she

wrote: "The government has closed down all 'Colonized, Black & Indian' schools, colleges, for an unlimited period. This came as quite a shock to us. We did not write our September exams, our most important exam and that included the above mentioned schools in Western Cape... We hope to return to school on Oct. 3. We will not however, continue with normal classes as yet. We the people of Lansdowne have been very lucky as we have not encountered any violence with the police. We are all hoping that changes can occur soon. Many people, students have died in the boycott... We want the police, S.A.D.F. to stop with all the unnecessary brutality towards us... I hope that this have given you another view of what is happening here in S.A. I believe that American people do not realize how serious the situation is."

Some of the newspaper clippings tell of the violence that seem to be an everyday occurrence there. One story reads, "Teachers at Kasselsvie Secondary School in Bellville say they

are 'disgusted' by police action in the area where a matric pupil was shot dead, two pupils arrested and children and a teacher injured."

Another story, "In a statement on behalf of the executive committee of the association, Professor Janie Malan said the 'futile display of power, with its brutality against defenceless people and its consequences of numerous deaths and injuries must be abruptly stopped'."

Texas' Most Wanted

HASKELL--Francisco Enriquez probably wasn't thinking about fate as he rode home from a dance with a carload of friends on the evening of March 13, 1983.

But fate was a passenger in their car that night.

Enriquez, 20, had been dancing at the American Legion Hall in the west central Texas town of Haskell.

At about midnight, he and two other men and two women piled into a car owned by Joe Baez of nearby Stamford.

As he drove back to Stamford, Baez said he saw a car come up behind him. The driver of the vehicle started blinking the headlights, then passed them. Baez said he noticed that the driver of the other vehicle was his brother-in-law, Alberto Flores.

Flores' wife Flora was in the Baez car and so they pulled over to the shoulder of the roadway.

Flora Flores got out of the car and became involved in a heated argument with her husband, witnesses say. Baez and Enriquez tried to act as peacemakers. They grabbed Flora Flores and took her back to the Baez vehicle.

But Enriquez lingered behind. Witnesses told investigators that suddenly

Anyone who might have information about Flores' possible location is asked to call Texas Crime Stoppers toll-free at 1-800-252-8477 or their local Crime Stoppers program. In all cases, callers do not have to reveal their identities.

Texas Most Wanted is a cooperative effort between the Department of Public Safety and Texas Crime Stoppers.

We have been discussing the problems of high blood pressure. This week we would like to continue in knowing more about the facts.

High blood pressure can be inherited. If someone in your immediate family has high blood pressure, you are more likely to develop it than is someone with no family history of high blood pressure.

High blood pressure affects blacks more than whites. And in blacks it seems to be more severe. Between ages 25 and 64, 2½ times as many blacks as white die from stroke, a major complication of uncontrolled high blood pressure.

A so-called "mild" case of high blood pressure should not be ignored. If you have "mild" high blood pressure,

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you run twice the risk of getting heart disease as someone with normal blood pressure.

Next week we would like for you to know what to do about the problem of high blood pressure. Diet has a lot to do with it so to be within the range of a good diet why not come to the senior center, call 442-1557 and make reservations for luncheons.
