The Cisco Lobos will host county rival, the Eastland Mavericks, this Friday night in Chesley Field. Kick-off will be at 7:30 p.m.

Cisco Head Coach Doyle Walker stated Tuesday morning that there will be no Junior Varsity game this week, since the entire squad of players will suit up Friday night with the Varsity. There will be only one game played Thursday night.

It will be a combination game of seventh and eighth grade players, since Eastland does not have enough for two teams. It will begin at 6 p.m. in Eastland.

The Mavericks are leading District 11-AA so far this season with no losses in district play. They have only lost one game this season. Cisco is 2-5 for the season and 1-3 in district play following their loss last Friday in Winters to the Blazers. Cisco's Robert Rains sustained a dislocated shoulder which makes his playing this week questionable.

In the Winters' game, Cisco scored two touchdowns in the first quarter and one in the final quarter. Winters scored one touchdown in the first quarter, three in the second quarter, and one in the third quarter.

Cisco gained only 155 total yards in the game, 121 on the ground and 34 in the air; while Winters ran up 168 on the ground and 171 in the air for a total of 339 yards.

Winters scored on the opening possession of the ball. Cisco kicked off to Winters and they moved the ball from their own 40-yard line to Cisco's 30 in seven plays. On fourth down, quarterback Doug Wheat completed a pass to Sam Smith in the end zone for the first score. The extra point kick by Eric Belk failed giving Winters a 6-to-0 lead with 9:04 left in the first quarter.

Cisco's first score of the game occurred on Winters' second possession of the ball when Lobo James Berry intercepted a Wheat pass and returned it 25 yards for a touchdown. The extra point kick by James Deadman gave Cisco a 7-to-6 lead with 5:52 remaining in the first quarter.

On Winters' next possession of the ball, Cisco's defense recovered a fumble to set up the Lobos next scoring drive from their own 17-yard line. Five plays later, and one first down, Roy Boykin took the handoff from quarterback Jarrod Jeffcoat for a one-yard touchdown run. Boykin also scored two extra points on the conversion attempt, making the score 15-to-6 with 1:05 left in the first quarter.

But, Winters came back in the second quarter and scored on a 69-yard pass play from back Steve Delacruz to Sam Smith. The extra point kick by Belk was good, narrowing the gap to 15-to-13

with 7:20 left in the first quarter.

Winters recovered a Cisco fumble on their first play from scrimmage at the Lobos 16-yard line and two plays later scored again on a pass, this time for 21 yards from QB Wheat to Eric Belk in the end zone. The extra point kick by Belk was good, giving Winters back a 20-to-15 lead with 7:00 left in the second quarter.

Not finished, Winters scored again before half-time following a recovered Lobo fumble on Cisco's 13-yard line. On their first play, QB Wheat handed off to Delacruz who covered 13 yards for the touchdown. The extra point kick by Belk was good for a halftime lead by Winters of 27-to-15 with 1:36 left in the first half.

In the second half, Winters came out and put their final points on the scoreboard with a 32-yard run by Robert Baker. The extra point kick by Belk was good for a third quarter score of 34-to-15 with 5:06 left in the quarter.

Cisco seemed to get fired on up on their next possession of the ball and marched downfield 81 yards in 18 plays gaining five first downs. Roy Boykin scored on another one-yard run, but Steve Abbott failed to gain two extra points on the conversion play after the

touchdown. With 8:44 left in the game, the final score was 34-to-21.

Roy Boykin was Cisco's leading rusher with 27 carries for 100 yards. He was followed by Steve Abbott with 6 carries for 9 yards; Brian Wagon, 4 carries for 9 yards; Ronnie Scheuren, 2 carries for 8 yards; and Jarrod Jeffcoat, 3 carries for (-5) yards.

Winters' rushers were led by Steve Delacruz with 22 carries for 81 yards. He was followed by Robert Baker with 13 carries for 64 yards; Doug Wheat, 5 carries for 6 yards; Dale Gray, 2 carries for 5 yards; and John Delacruz, 2 carries for 12 yards.

Cisco quarterback Jarrod Jeffcoat completed 3 of 19 pass attempts for 34 yards. Winters quarterback Doug Wheat completed 4 of 7 attempts for 102 yards. Eric Foster had one attempt and no completions while Steve Delacruz had one completion of one attempt for 69 yards.

Receiving leaders for Cisco were James Berry with 1 reception for 19 yards; Ronnie Scheuren, 1 reception for 2 yards; and Ricky Chambers, 1 reception for 13 yards.

Winters receivers were Sam Smith, with 3 receptions for 81 yards; Dale Roberts, 1 reception for 69 yards; and

Eric Belk, 1 reception for 21 yards.

Defensive standouts for Cisco included Steve Abbott, Lonnie Pevey, Jeff Dennis, James Deadman, and James Berry.

Standouts on Winters' defense were Kyle Kraatz, Archie Austin, Kevin Halfmann, Eddie Trevino, and Eric Belk.

## 'Harvey' Starts Off Fall Season Of Local Theatre

The 1985 fall season of Cisco Junior College's Roof Garden Theatre got off to a good start here Monday night with the premiere performance of "Harvey", written by Mary Chase.

Playing before a house full of Clyde High School students, the cast of eleven performed quite well and managed to keep the attention of the students throughout the night. The facial antics and speech of the actors and actresses kept the audience laughing.

The person receiving the most applause was Fred Mullinax who does an excellent job of portraying Elwood P. Dowd, an apparent alcoholic who likes to be "pleasant" rather than smart. He also has an unseen friend, a "6 foot, 1 1/2 inch" white rabbit.

One performer who also seemed to be a big hit with the crowd, although she only had a small part, was Pam Welch who portrays Mrs. Betty Chumley. Her facial expressions seem to say more than her words.

Also turning in excellent performances were Joan Fariello and Lou Jane Qualls who play Myrtle Mae Simmons and Veta Louise Simmons, respectively. The two do a believable job of acting as daughter and mother.

Others in the play include Jana Meyer as Mrs. Chauvenet; Kelly Armstrong as Ruth Kelly, R.N.; David Kanady as Duane Wilson; Tony Cox as Dr. Lyman Sanderson; Jim Means as Dr. William Chumley; Paul Means as Judge Omar Gaffney; and Craig Warren as E.J. Lofgren.

The three act play lasts approximately two hours, but it does not seem near that long due to the quick scene changes and easy involvement with the play. The audience becomes caught up in the play and loses track of time.

Those behind the scenes include Carol Price-Brown as director; Chase Payne as stage manager; Tom Brown, set design; Mr. Brown with

Tony Cox and Jim Means, set construction; Paul Means, lighting design; Tony Cox, sound design; Charles Fisher, light and sound technician; Jim Means and Paul Means, make up design.

Buelah Cummings is in charge of properties; Yvonne Burson is wardrobe mistress; Doug Duncan, Frank Troub, Jim Heidenheimer, and Wayne McMillan are the running crew; Blue Jackets Service

# Nancy Masters Enraptures AARP Audience Oct. 19

"People like you make me the dishes set and the housekeeping wait," Nancy Masters, Abilene Reporter News aviation columnist, told members of Cisco's AARP October 19 at a dinner at the Laguna Hotel Senior Center.

"I like older people. I married a man twenty years my senior. He understands when I fly all over the world with servicemen aboard Air Force planes. Let me tell you that you, the tax payers, do not pay my way. I fly free, that's true, but only when there's a vacancy on a plane. My food and hotel bills are my own expenses."

The speaker continued with, "I have flown all over the world, 'Down under' and 'Up over.' Tonight I want to take you with me to the continent with the fewest people, the least improvements, and the richest source of protein known. I refer to a

worm, an aquatic wiggler, that is found only in Antarctica."

Mrs. Masters told her listeners that when she arrived in Antarctica, that she was placed under quarantine immediately for hepatitis testing. Her only food for 3 days was works -krill- and water. She was given frozen worms and worms cooked in every way known to make the krill (worms) a bit more appetizing. In three days her quarantine was lifted and she was free to explore the four remaining days of her stay.

"As soon as the scientists find a way to market those worms in a feasible manner, all of us will be eating krill," she assured her listeners.

"Before I went on this trip, I was warned that we might be weathered in for a year; that the temperature would be minus-100 in mid-summer; that living would

be primitive, and that our food would all be frozen or dried. I lived with a lady who did deep sea diving. As she surfaced, I helped her disrobe before her wet clothes froze on her body.

"Antarctica is populated with scientists from 31 different nations. Until 1991 when the present treaty ends, there will be peace. Watch out for the world scramble that will begin six years from now when every nation will want that continent for its krill and its fresh frozen water. Already Brazil is towing icebergs to its homeland for water."

Mrs. Masters who was born in Stamford and finished high school there, illustrated her lecture with pictures she had taken at a stop-over in New Zealand en route, and with slides made at the South Pole. She concluded with, "From your committee reports, I see that you are participators, not

spectators. Your organization has impressed me. I always take away some memento from wherever I speak. I plan to use one of the apples you have used here in your Halloween table decorations."

As Mrs. Masters resumed her seat, Jonnie Jeffcoat, rushed forward with a personal gift. "Take this ceramic snow owl. I made it in our Senior Citizen ceramic shop."

Routine business brought these reports: Walt Knowlden pointed out that Cisco AARP Chapter sponsored the founding of the Albany one. After 15 months of working they now have a most active club with more than 200 members, their charter and a new slate of officers which the Knowldens and the Cartees helped to install the previous evening.

Knowlden, tax advisor for the county, also cited that there would be a tax guidance school in the DFW Metroplex and the Cisco chapter would be sending 3 or 4 more from the local chapter for training.

Louise Allison, legislative chairman, said that each AARP member would soon receive a listing of 12 bits of legislation from the state department and she urged that each member rank four of the 12 he or she deemed should have priority in the next session of the Texas legislature.

Mrs. Fay Davis was appointed by President Gilbert Copeland as the new community service chairman.

Thelma Bosworth, chairman of the nominating committee, explained the rules of the AARP concerning election of officers: "In October the committee presents a slate of officers. Tonight other nominations may be made from the floor provided the one you name has been previously contacted and agreed to serve in

case of election. In November we vote on the nominees. In December, they are installed."

No additional nominations were made and the report of the committee was received unanimously. Nominees are: President, Gilbert Copeland; President Elect, Louise Allison; Vice-President, Maurine Thompson; Secretary, Beryl Estes; Treasurer, Lois Holder; Chairman of nominating committee, Sue Taylor. (New members of that committee are Grace Garrelson and Willie Wheatley. Unexpired term members are Ima Thompson and Patti Mertl.) Board of Directors new nominees are John White, Vernon Hagar, and Bob Bevers. (With unex-

pired terms are Scott Bailey and Buck Estes.)

All committee chairmen, save the nominating one, are presidential appointees. No

officer or chairman may serve more than two years in the same office. He may resign at the end of one-year service if necessary. The

board of directors are elected annually for a two-year term but they rotate so that five new members are never elected at one time.





Halloween can be a fun time for the entire family, but the real trick is to get everyone involved. Visiting in homes, hospitals and community centers can be arranged for a worthwhile family Halloween. This can be a real joy to shut-ins and senior citizens if it is properly planned in advance.

For a community or neighborhood activity, try a progressive party. The children can have a special trick-or-treat at each home along the way. Each stop should be different. The final stop could be "special treats" with several neighbors working together to provide the refreshments.

A ghost-story time can take place almost anywhere - in a large room, a grove of trees or in a yard. People attending this activity should come prepared to tell stories, and a prize should be given for the best Halloween tale.

2 cups all-purpose flour  
½ cup sugar  
1 tablespoon baking powder  
½ teaspoon salt  
½ teaspoon ground cin-

namon  
½ teaspoon ground nutmet  
1½ cups peeled, chopped cooking apple, divided  
1 cup milk  
¼ cup vegetable oil  
1 egg, beaten  
¼ cup sugar  
½ teaspoon ground cinnamon  
Combine first 6 ingredients, stir in 1 cup apples,

and make a well in center of mixture. Combine milk, oil and egg, add to dry ingredients, stirring just until moistened. Spoon in greased muffin pans, filling two-third full. Combine remaining ¼ cup apples, ¼ cups sugar, and ½ teaspoon cinnamon; sprinkle over muffin batter. Bake at 350° for 20 to 25 minutes. Yield: 1 dozen.

## Drilling Bits

Pumping 43 barrels of oil per day, along with 51 barrels of water, the No. 1 City of Eastland was completed in the Reb Field, Eastland County.

Drillsite is one mile northeast of Eastland.

The well was drilled to a 3,790-ft. total depth and will produce from a perforated interval in the Marble Falls Formation, 3,336 to 3,364 feet into the wellbore. Location of the well is in the H&TC Survey, A-487.

At a location four miles north-northeast of Eastland, Sun Exploration & Production has finaled a new oil producer in the Ranger Field.

The well is designated as the No. 1 P.L. Peoples, pumping 30 barrels of oil per day.

Location is in a lease in Eastland County's H&TC Survey, A-296. Bottomed at 3,730 feet, the well will produce from perforations in the Marble Falls Formation, 3,440 to 3,460 feet into the hole.

The No. 1 Brown-R.L. West, a 4,200-ft. developmental well, is scheduled to be drilled in Eastland County's Lee Ray Field. Expanding Energy of Midland is the operator. The well will be spudded in an 80-acre lease eight miles north-northwest of Cisco in the SPRR Survey, A-154.



### CPSC Issues Halloween Safety Tips



The U.S. Consumer Safety Product Commission has some Halloween safety tips for parents and guardians of children who plan to go trick-or-treating this Halloween:

- Warn children not to eat any of their treats before they get home. Examine all treats carefully before allowing children to eat them.
- Look for costumes, masks, beards and wigs labeled "Flame Resistant." Although this does not mean these items won't catch fire, such labeling indicates that they will resist burning and should extinguish quickly once removed from the ignition source. Flimsy materials and outfits with big, baggy sleeves or billowing skirts should be avoided to minimize the risk of contact with candles or other sources of ignition.
- Make or buy costumes light and bright enough to be clear-

ly visible to motorists. For greater visibility in dusk or darkness, costumes can be decorated or trimmed with reflective tape which will "glow" in the beam of a car's headlights. Bags or sacks should also be light colored or decorated with reflective tape. Reflective tape is usually available in hardware, bicycle, and sporting goods stores. Children should also carry flashlights to see—and be seen—more easily.

- Costumes should be short enough to prevent children from tripping and falling. Children should wear well-fitting, sturdy shoes: Mother's high heels are not a good idea for safe walking.
- Hats and scarfs should be tied securely to prevent them from slipping over children's eyes.
- Apply a natural mask of cosmetics rather than have a child wear a loose fitting

mask which might restrict breathing or obscure vision. If a mask is used, however, make sure it fits securely and has eyeholes large enough to allow full vision.

- Swords, knives, and similar costume accessories should be of soft or flexible material.
- Smaller children should always be accompanied by an older responsible child or an adult. All children should use the sidewalk rather than walk in the street, and they should WALK not run from house to house. Children should be cautioned against running out from between parked cars, or across lawns and yards where ornaments, furniture, or clotheslines present dangers.
- Children should only go to homes where residents have outside lights on as a sign of

welcome. Children should not enter homes or apartments unless they are accompanied by an adult.

- Those receiving trick-or-treaters should remove anything that could be an obstacle from steps, lawns, and porches. Candlelit jack-o'-lanterns should be kept away from landings and doorsteps where costumes could brush against the flame. Indoor jack-o'-lanterns should be kept away from curtains, decorations, or other furnishings that could be ignited.

Reported to burn about two hours, the logs sell for 95 cents each and may be bought in bulk.

# CAPITOL UPDATE

Today I will discuss Propositions 11 and 12.

**Proposition 11:** The Texas Constitution guarantees anyone accused of a crime the right to know the nature and cause of the accusation and to have a copy of the accusation. It also states that no one can be tried for a felony offense unless indicated by a grand jury. If this proposal is passed, the Legislature would be allowed to set practices and procedures concerning the contents, amendments, requirements, etc., of the documents, i.e., indictments and informations, charging a person with an offense.

Supporters say the Legislature should set the standards governing the process of charging people with crimes. They feel Proposition 11 would still protect the defendants but could prevent the reversing of convictions based on technicalities that no prosecutor or grand jury could anticipate. Supporters agree that defendants deserve notice of the charges against them, but feel it is not necessary for all details to be included in the indictment itself. They say if there is a defect in the indictment, the defense should object before trial. If they fail to do so, then they should be deemed to have waived the right to base an appeal on the defect. Objections should be made early enough for the state to make needed corrections.

Opponents say if the proposal is passed, the guarantee that prosecutors give people accused of crime sufficient notice of the charge to defend themselves would be wiped out. It would give the prosecution unfair advantage and would go against the principle that defendants are innocent until proven guilty. Opponents feel if the Legislature allowed vague, general charges to be filed, the prosecution could hold back key allegations until the case came to trial. If the prosecution were allowed to correct a "mistake" in an indictment at the last minute, and make significant changes, the basis for the defense could be destroyed.

**Proposition 12:** Presently, in a federal law suit, if the outcome of a case hinges on the interpretation of state law for which the state courts have not yet ruled, the federal judge in the case has to guess as to how he feels the state courts would rule. There have been cases where the interpretation of the same federal court was contradicted by the state court when the same issue finally did come up on appeal from a lower court. If Proposition 12 passed, Texas' highest appellate courts would have the same power to answer state-law questions certified by federal courts as they do to rule on questions which come up on appeal from lower state courts.

Supporters say this will ensure that Texas controls the

development of its own law, instead of letting federal courts decide what Texas law should be. It would help litigants in the cases that give rise to certified questions since a federal court's interpretation of Texas law is binding even if the state's highest appellate courts later interpret Texas law differently. They do not feel answering any questions certified by federal courts would over burden the state courts because the state courts would choose not to answer any question they felt was not determinative of the outcome in the case or for which there is no clear precedent.

Opponents feel this would increase the work load of the two highest state appellate courts which are already overburdened. They feel Texas courts should not issue advisory opinions for federal judges. There are no restrictions on answering certified questions only to cases where the state court's answer will decide the outcome. Opponents say while it is too bad federal judges may sometimes anticipate how Texas courts will rule incorrectly, it is better than






White polishing compounds should be used to remove stains from tree sap or bird droppings.

"The squeaking wheel gets the grease."

The sewing machine's clatter, whether nervous cacaphony or plain noise, drive me in search of the 3-in-1 oil. My mother and both grandmothers used

3-in-1 oil on their sewing machines. What else could I use?

In fact, I had used it on those snarly clippers. They promptly threw off the guard, but I didn't stop quite as promptly. That's what it looks like Kojack is working The Pizza House these days.

But oil does calm things down. My Singer subsided to a pleasant hum, although the clippers had a smirky sound. They were quiet, and they didn't pull any hair after oiling. They just cut off at the roots.

No matter what you call it, a little "oil" on the squeaking "wheel" does wonders.

If the boss has really been pushing you on a rush job, doesn't a, "Hey, you've done well to get this in such great shape!" soothe your ruffled feathers? It doesn't have a thing to do with the fact that the job was what you hired out to do in the first place!

If Junior Miss and Mister's pup has torn up the flower bed, won't everyone feel better if the Chief Gardener says, "Help me get these new plants in before dinner, and we'll figure out a place for the pup." ("A soft answer turneth away wrath." Anyway, is pumping up your blood pressure going to teach the dog anything?)

The oil, physical or verbal, does need control.

Oil to keep a boat afloat in

stormy weather is one thing. Oil that entraps birds and sickens marine life is another thing.

Soothing words have an effect and a place, but meanings not too pleasing have attached to "oily voice", and "snake oil" is not for the prudent householder's medicine cabinet.

Yep. The squeaking wheel gets the grease. That may be all that is ever needed, but it may not. Aspirin often will reduce a fever, but it's only sensible to find out what caused that fever.

Prudence indicates finding out why that wheel is squeaking.





# Remains Of Putnam Man Returned By Vietnamese

The remains of Navy Commander William P. (W.P.) Yarbrough, Jr. a native of Putnam were among those returned by the North Vietnamese this past August, the Defense Department announced Tuesday.

Commander Yarbrough was reared in Putnam, graduated from Putnam High School and joined the Navy during World War II. He was the bomber navigator in a Navy A-6 "Intruder" that went down over Thank Hoa in North Vietnam on January 19, 1967.

Mrs. John McIntyre of Moran, his cousin says, "that's where the mystery began, for almost twenty years we've known nothing of his whereabouts. It's sad, yet sort of a relief just knowing."

Yarbrough's plane was based on the aircraft carrier Kitty Hawk.

The Defense Department says it has identified nine from among 26 sets of servicemen's remains that were returned to the U.S. on August 14. Identification was made at the Army's identification laboratory in Honolulu.

Yarbrough who was 43 when he was shot down had a second wife and three brothers, one who was also career military. All four

have died while he was missing.

He had three sons Butch of Arlington, Pat of Phoenix, Ariz. and Michael who lives in Weatherford.

His former wife Topsy Yarbrough lived in Abilene for several years, but now resides in Austin.

Yarbrough's parents, Mr. and Mrs. W.P. (Ped) Yarbrough, Sr. moved in later years, to Cross Plains and both are buried there.

Mike, Yarbrough's youngest son says the navy was his father's life. He liked to fly and enjoyed electronics.

Mike said that the three boys went to school in Abilene.

He was 23 when his father's plane went down, Mike is now an engineer with Bell Helicopter in Fort Worth area.

He didn't expect his father to be shot down because he already had completed one tour of Vietnam without injury, Mike said.

Mike said he has been in frequent contact with the Navy since his father was listed missing.

The downed plane's pilot survived, and Mike said he talked to the pilot after he was released as a POW.

The pilot said he did not see William Yarbrough leave the plane after the crash. But later, while in

prison, the pilot said he heard that Yarbrough was alive, Mike said.

In 1969, a group of released POWs included his father's name on a list of more than 300 Americans believed to be POWs, Mike said, but nobody had actually seen his

father.

Mike said that, after 1969, news about his father was sketchy at best - until about two months ago when the Defense Department informed him his father's remains might be among those turned over by Hanoi.

Monday night, Mike said, the Navy called and confirmed that his father's remains were among those turned over to the Vietnamese.

Mike said he is proud of his father, who was decorated several times. He and his two brothers served in the Armed Forces.

He is glad the wait is over for his family, Mike said, but he added that for "2,400 other families of MIAs, it continues."

## CJC Campuses Enrolling 1,591

The head count of students enrolled for the fall semester at all Cisco Junior College campuses totals 1,591, according to the final enrollment report that was given to the board of regents by Presi-

dent Henry E. McCullough at their October meeting. The 1985 figure compares favorably with that of last year, the report showed.

The board opened six bids of manufacturers to provide the college with a new copying machine. The low bid was for a Cannon copier and it was accepted in the amount of \$6,690.

Attorney Billy Wright gave board members a briefing on their liability coverage under an insurance policy that has been in force for several years.

A vacation and sick leave policy that will be included in the college's new manual concerning faculty members and employees was amended to give those with more than 10 years of service an annual vacation of three weeks instead of two. Sick leave was placed at 20 days but will be allowed to accumulate up to 60 days.

Board members were given copies of the president's annual report on the college.

A Dallas company's option to purchase the Laguna Hotel was extended for another 60 days.

## Board Of Trustees Studying Past Tax

The board of trustees had under consideration this week the proposition of launching a program to collect some \$485,096.00 in delinquent tax money owed the Cisco Independent School District.

The board voted to add the maximum penalty allowed by law - 15 per cent - in addition to interest due on tax bills when a contract is finally approved with a law firm to handle collections, according to action at the October meeting of the board.

A proposition submitted by a law firm to handle the collections was studied at the meeting but action was delayed pending further study.

It was decided that in cases where the county tax appraisal office might make mistakes the penalty and interest on delinquent taxes will be waived if the tax bill is paid within 21 days after the mistake has been recognized.

In an executive session, the board approved the employment of Linda Kay Clark and Betty Burton as elementary school teachers. Routine reports were given to the board by Supt. Ray Saunders.

### Winter Bird Feeding: Do It With Suet

One of the best cold-weather bird foods is suet, and a winter suet feeder in your yard invites birds you might never play host to—if it were not for the suet.

Many birds love suet, and so it's a valuable addition to your bird feeding program. Suet is dense beef fat and it can provide birds with the extra energy they need to stay warm in winter.

From late fall through early spring I like to buy two or three pounds of suet at a time and freeze it in half-pound chunks. That way, my suet feeder never runs low. You can usually find suet at a supermarket or (if you want to be sure you're getting real beef suet) at a butcher shop.

Your whole yard once they've lined up your suet feeder. If you live in starting country, there are two ways to starting-proof a suet cage, thereby discouraging an invasion:

- (1) Suspend a baffle or dome over the feeder (a pie tin may do). Unlike nuthatches, chickadees and such, starlings are not very good at hanging vertically or upside-down to feed: they prefer to perch on the top.
- (2) Buy or make a double-mesh cage. The wire mesh basket that holds suet fits inside a larger-mesh (1 to 1 1/2-inch) cage. The small birds can hop in and reach the inner basket but the larger birds (including starlings) cannot.



Most suet feeders are wire mesh cages. The mesh needs to be just large enough for a bird's bill to reach through, but not so large that a crow or raccoon could make off with large pieces of suet.

A suet cage (bought or hand-made) should be constructed of plastic-coated wire rather than uncoated metal, even though it's highly unlikely that any part of a bird or other animal would freeze to the uncoated surface. The cage needs a back door for inserting the suet.

On the coldest of days your suet feeder may draw birds that rarely visit any kind of feeder. During such weather, we receive reports of red-shouldered hawks, pileated woodpeckers, American kestrels, Carolina wrens, juncos, thrashers, and yellow-rumped warblers visiting suet feeders.

Hang your feeder from the trunk or branch of a tree. A suet cage 6 or 8 feet off the ground will regularly attract woodpeckers, titmice, chickadees, nuthatches, perhaps brown creepers, and other birds that find suet a good substitute for their natural high-energy foods (insect eggs, larvae, etc.). The good height will keep the feeder out of reach of dogs, foxes, skunks and other poor climbers, though it won't guarantee that a raccoon or an opossum won't raid the cage.

So, don't let frigid weather get you down. Put out the suet and watch the ensuing spectacle of birds vigorously energizing themselves.



# Lake Cisco Is Expected To Gain One To Two Feet Of New Water

Lake Cisco was expected to gain between one and two feet of new water as the result of rainfall last weekend in this region, City Manager Mike Moore reported Tuesday. Area rain gauges registered up to four inches for last Friday night and Saturday morning.

Battle Creek was running bank full when checked by city water department on it Monday morning, and it was expected to run for several days without more rainfall. Lake Bernie was full and spilling into the creek that connects it to Lake Cisco.

The heavy rains, general throughout the county, were not expected to damage the county's peanut crop, which is now being harvested, County Agent Dee Gordon reported. He estimated that between 15 and 20 per cent of the approximately 24,000 acres planted in the county have already been harvested.

Some of the early peanuts have had problems with mold that has hurt their grade, Mr. Gordon reported. The rain should help in fields with mold as the bad nuts will fall off in harvesting he said.

Late peanuts will benefit, particularly if warm and sunny weather returns for a few weeks, the county agent believed. He said the 1985 crop is considered "low average" in the county.

Grading of harvested peanuts has been "pretty good," he added.

The winter grain crop situation is "real good," Mr. Gordon said. Most grain fields had been seeded and

were ready for the good rains. Stock tanks are full and running over everywhere, the county agent said.

The outlook for the pecan

crop was described as "way above average and we expect the price to be close to what it was last year," Mr. Gordon said. Orchard men are hopeful for a few weeks of dry weather as pecans are

ready to fall, he added.

Forecasters Tuesday called for possible rainy weather to accompany a new cold wave during the next two days.

# Wranglers Lose Saturday; Ready For Navarro J.C.

The Wranglers of Cisco Junior College, who lost their first game of the season to Tyler JC by a score of 24-to-10 at Tyler last Saturday night, began preparations Monday for a conference game at Corsicana this week against Navarro County JC.

This week's contest will be played at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, and the Wranglers are expected to be at full strength for the game.

At Tyler, the conference contest was played in a quagmire of water and mud as some eight inches of rain fell there Friday night and Saturday morning. The sloppy field made running dif-

ficult and passing almost impossible.

The Wranglers had a 3-0 half-time lead when Raymon Hernandez, sophomore kicker from Wichita Falls, booted a 37-yard field goal.

In the third period, Tyler kicked a field goal and scored a touchdown to lead, 10-3, at the end of the quarter. Early in the fourth, James Dixon, freshman from Vernon, broke loose and raced 70 yards for a Cisco touchdown and Hernandez converted to tie the score.

Late in the game, Tyler completed a long pass for a touchdown when the CJC defender went for an in-

terception instead of batting the ball. Near the end of the contest, Tyler intercepted a Cisco pass deep in Cisco territory and ran for a TD and the final score.

David Smith, fleetly running back from Dallas, had 117 yards for the night. Dixon carried four times for 78 yards. Cisco had 13 first downs to Tyler's 10. Cisco gained 193 yards on the ground to Tyler's 210.

Passing was not one of Cisco's better nights. The Wranglers threw 22 times for seven completions and a net of 34 yards. Four Cisco passes were picked off. Tyler completed two passes and had two interceptions.

Coach Rick Frazier reported that the Wrangler defense was outstanding.

Wayne Hutchinson, sophomore defensive back from Knox City, had the best night of his CJC career, the coach said. He was credited with 20 tackles, a personal high that tied him for the all-time mark set by a Wrangler defender.

The Wranglers expected to continue stressing the passing game in workouts this week, the coach said.

There were no disabling injuries in the game.

A large delegation of fans accompanied the Wranglers to Tyler.


