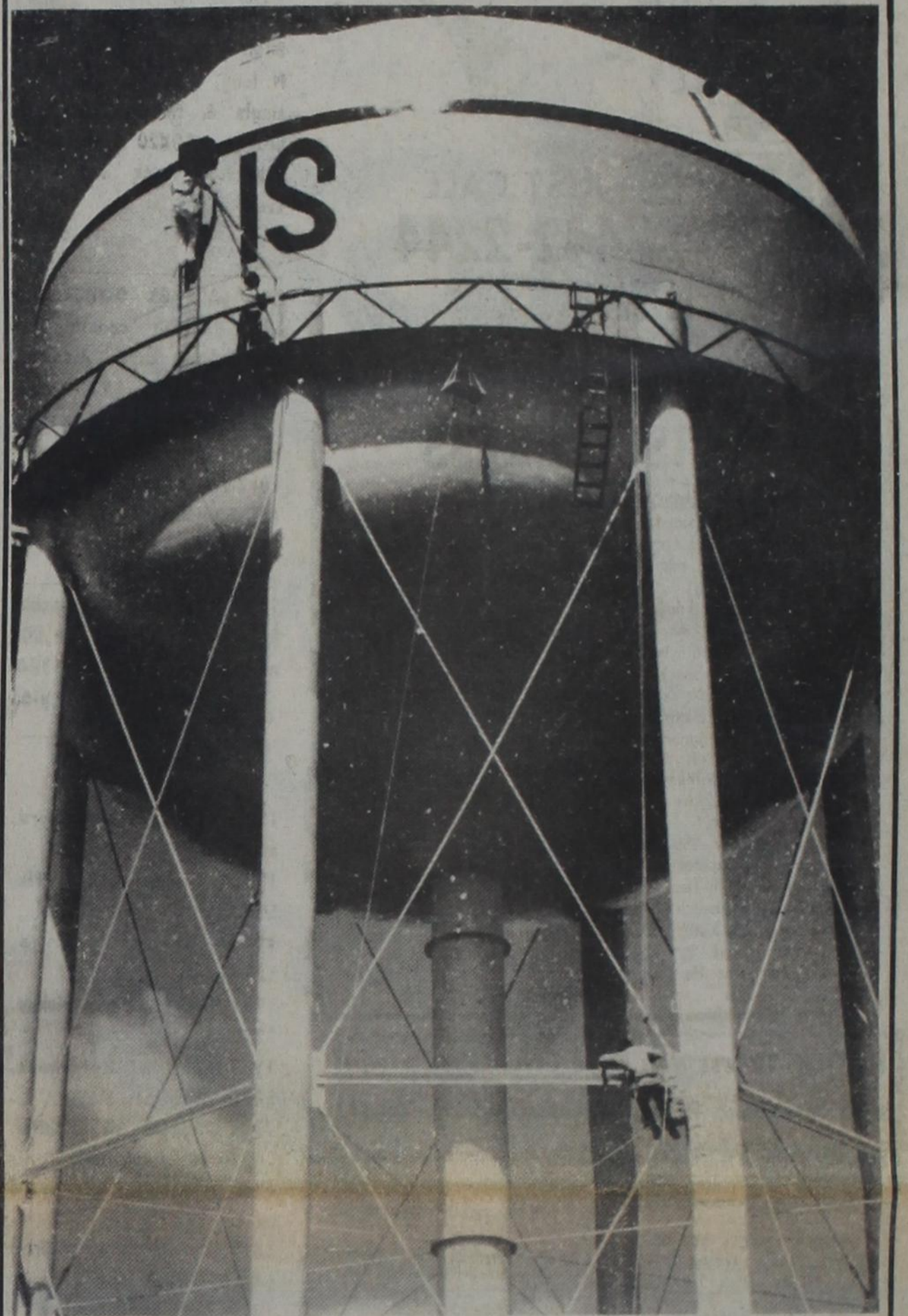

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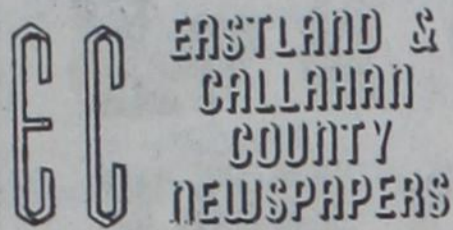

CHILD ABUSE ...AS WE WERE SAYING...

This matter of child abuse needs all the light that it can get thrown on it.

Yet where there is light, there usually is shadow. Where there is accuracy, there can be error, and unfortunately, mankind is all too apt when it comes to making mistakes.

Child abuse comes in many guises; no one approves of it—not even those guilty of it. The stigma of such an accusation, proved or not, lingers like that of the man asked, "Have you stopped beating your wife?"

How does one arrive at a decision on whether a child needs intervention in his life from outside the family?

There are guidelines to help recognize a problem as well as instruct what to do after recognition of such.

Eastland County has a Child Welfare Board, organized in July of 1981, and operating within the framework of the Texas Department of Human Resources. Presently serving on this board are Christine Reich, chairperson, Cisco; Kenn Norris, Carbon; Connie Watson, Gorman; Durel Reid, Eastland; Downs Seaberry, Eastland; Bruce Goleman, Ranger; and Danny Hughes, Rising Star.

Child Welfare Boards were authorized in 1932 by state

legislation, and state responsibility for child welfare was included in the functions of the Department of Public Welfare when it was created in 1939.

The Department of Public Welfare became the Texas Department of Human Resources in 1977, and it contained the responsibilities of the DPW.

The county Child Welfare Board represents the community in developing child welfare and protective services. Eastland County's Commissioners' Court is comprised of Judge Scott Bailey, Richard Robinson (1), Jack Blackwell (2), L.T. Owen (3), and Clarence B. Dill (4).

The court appoints members to the Child Welfare Board, basing choices on leadership qualities and concern for children. The Board is first established by the Commissioners' Court through a contract with the Texas Department of Human Resources. Federal, state and local funds are available for use by the board, and its legal base is spelled out in the contract with the TDHR.

There is a specific structure, a framework, for this board's work. It must use this format for useful function. There is a local DHR child welfare unit which the board works as well as with the Commissioners' Court.

Their viability is increased in direct proportion to the positive activity of the child welfare board.

A functional and productive board, working within its limitations, not only maintains good established relationships, it promotes to the public a wider understanding and acceptance of its purposes.

As people may not recognize child abuse when they see it nor know what to do if they are aware of it, one of the Child Welfare Board's responsibilities is to provide such knowledge and offer the means for public cooperation through many activities involving individuals and other groups such as school and hospital boards.

Policies board members help develop include how expenditures are to be made for the foster care program, the implementation of the DHR programs, the use of local funds and the means of raising local funds.

In the materials from the TDHR there are six typed

pages (two of them single-spaced) of information about Child Welfare Boards: what they are, what they can, should and might do. This, remember, is a volunteer matter, but the "job description" probably would scare away a paid worker.

Every activity mentioned has merit. There is not one I should say to leave out, though there are some I feel more gung-ho about than I do about others.

From your County Child Welfare Board you can find out how and where to report suspected child abuse if you don't want to call the local DHR offices at 629-1772. Board members are pledged to observe the strictest confidence about such information, are DHR workers. But if the time isn't right to call the local office and you don't want to contact one of the Board members, there is a toll-free, 24-hour hotline number: 1-800-252-5400.

Use that number if you need to.

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

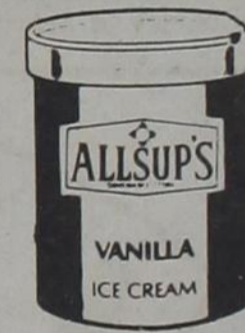
