ESTIMATE OF COUNTY POLL **TAXES 6,000**

Number Does Not Include Exemptions; **Check Not Complete**

Poll tax payments were estimated by C. H. O'Brien, tax assessor-collector, Tuesday at approximately \$6,000, exclusive of the exemptions of those not required to pay a poll tax by reason of becoming of age since January 1, But this does not include those over 60 years of age who are exempt from poll tax payments, in computing the voting strength of the county. No exemptions are required in Eastland county for those over age.

Mr. O'Brien said the estimate of 6,000 is based on those accounted for and the probable reciepts of other collectors and through the mails, as payments were made a sub-offices in several other towns of the county, all of which have not yet been accounted for. Then some will mail in their money for payments, which if post marked Jan. 31 will be accepted as payment on that date.



The Same Picture

THE little business man will tell his troubles and his wants to the president now. So far White House conferences between Mr. Roosevelt and business interests have involved only major figures in industrial and commercial enterprise. But in spite of their prominence in the picture, such figures represent a minority of the countrywide economic set-up, the greater part of which is made up of the interests of the thousands of small merchants, manufacturers and security holders whose individual dealings are confined principally to the communities in which they operate.

THE task of analyzing their problems and deducing from the mass of testimony they will present is a stupendous one, but the composite picture which they will leave in the administration mind as they filter through the series of conferences will probably be no different fundamentally than that delineated by the big boys.

Ilsley Boone, managing editor of "The Nudist," has published a official told us they had knocked blast against the department for classifying certain issues of his magazine among the lewd, obscene ascivious and indecent publications which cannot go through the nails.

We called up the postal depart ment to learn whether the officials had taken a new slant on the subject. It seems they have not. Mr. Boone looks on the whole hing as a sort of war between nudes and prudes. Nudists, he says, have a legitimate health and sociological purpose far removed from anything lewd or indecent Yet because the magazine carrie photographs of unclad colonist

Like the rest of the government he post office department seems to be on a sort of "24-hour basis" with regard to what is good and what is naughty. They haven't issued a broadside ban against nudist magazines—at least not officially. Each new issue is judged by itself alone; and if it contains nudes, it can't go through the mails: and that is that.

Mr. Boone evidently found the same adamant attitude on the part of the department. He reports that j a delegation of nudist leaders called on the department when their magazine failed to get through the mail, and evidently a sort of third degree. These things came out:

***Jefferson County Holds Elections** In Its Own Way

JEFFERSON, Feb. 2 -- Marion county, which has shown its contempt for conventions on several occasions, has started another political campaign that ignores the laws of the state of Texas.

The rules or conducting elec-tions are leadown by the state legislature, but only 253 of the 254 counties in Texas obey them; Marion county makes its own rules. It has followed its own private system since 1898, and 'The Citizens' County Executive committee" recently announced it would do so again.

In the other 253 counties, the first primary will be held on July 23. But "The Citizens' County Executive committee," blandly ignored this legal date and announced that Marion county would cast its ballots in April.

This defiance or prescribed rules started 40 years ago, when the citizens reached the end of their patience with politicians who got themselves elected by throwing drinking parties for negro voters. On April 29, 1898, the "Citizens County Executive committe" held its first meeting in the Jefferson Commercial club rooms. The members revolted against the "disgraceful influences, disgusting and grossly immoral practices surrounding the candidacy, campaigns and elections of county and pre cinct officers of Marion county which have been so shameful and shocking to the moral sense of all respectable citizens."
