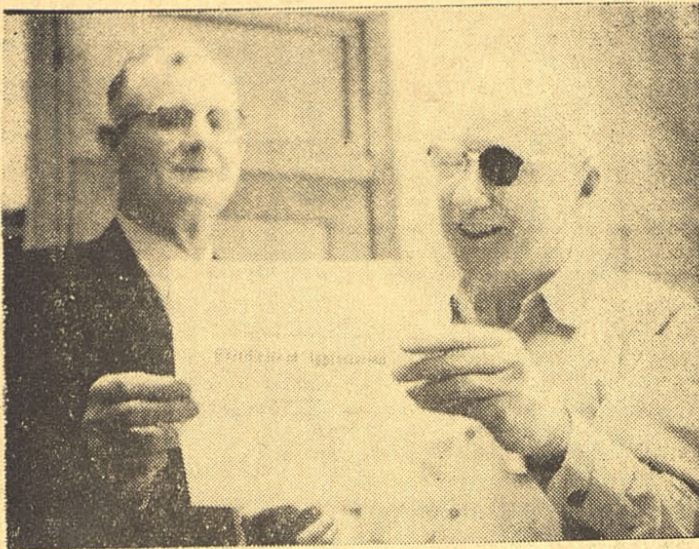

## County Agent J. M. Cooper Cited for Leadership, Service In Screwworm Eradication Job

A certificate of appreciation has been presented to County Agent J. M. Cooper for his active support of the screwworm eradication program. The presentation was made Friday afternoon by Oscar Schaefer of the Nimrod community, chairman of the county eradication committee.

Schaefer commended Cooper and Assistant Agent Bill McCutchen for devoting many hours to the popular eradication project. He noted that the agent has been the key man in the county concerned with screwworm eradication activities, serving as an important link between program officials and local farmers and ranchers.

Total funds contributed by the county toward the program amounted to \$8,000. All five banks in Eastland County accepted the voluntary contributions.

## Drowning Victim Will Be Buried Here Friday

Kathleen McCannies, eight-year-old daughter of Major and Mrs. John McCannies of Dayton, Ohio, was drowned last Friday in a pond near her home. She was a granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. H. McCannies of Cisco and Mrs. Clara Twedell of Houston.

The McCannies girl and a classmate, both third grade students, had stopped to skate on the ice on the way home from school. Both girls were drowned when they fell through the ice, and the bodies were not found until 9 p.m. after an exhaustive search.

Born Dec. 7, 1956, in Philadelphia, Pa., Kathleen had lived in Dayton three years.

Requiem was held Monday morning in Dayton, and the body will arrive in Cisco Wednesday. Funeral service will be held at 10 a.m. Friday at Rust Funeral Chapel with the Rev. Morris Bailey, pastor of First Methodist Church, officiating. Graveside rites at Oakwood Cemetery will be conducted by Rev. C. Gerard, pastor of Holy Rosary Catholic Church.

Survivors are her parents and grandparents; two brothers, Timothy Bryant and Daniel, and one sister, Tellyann.

Cisco's corner was worked by Coach Wayman Johnson, R. N. Sanders, and Teddy Anderson.

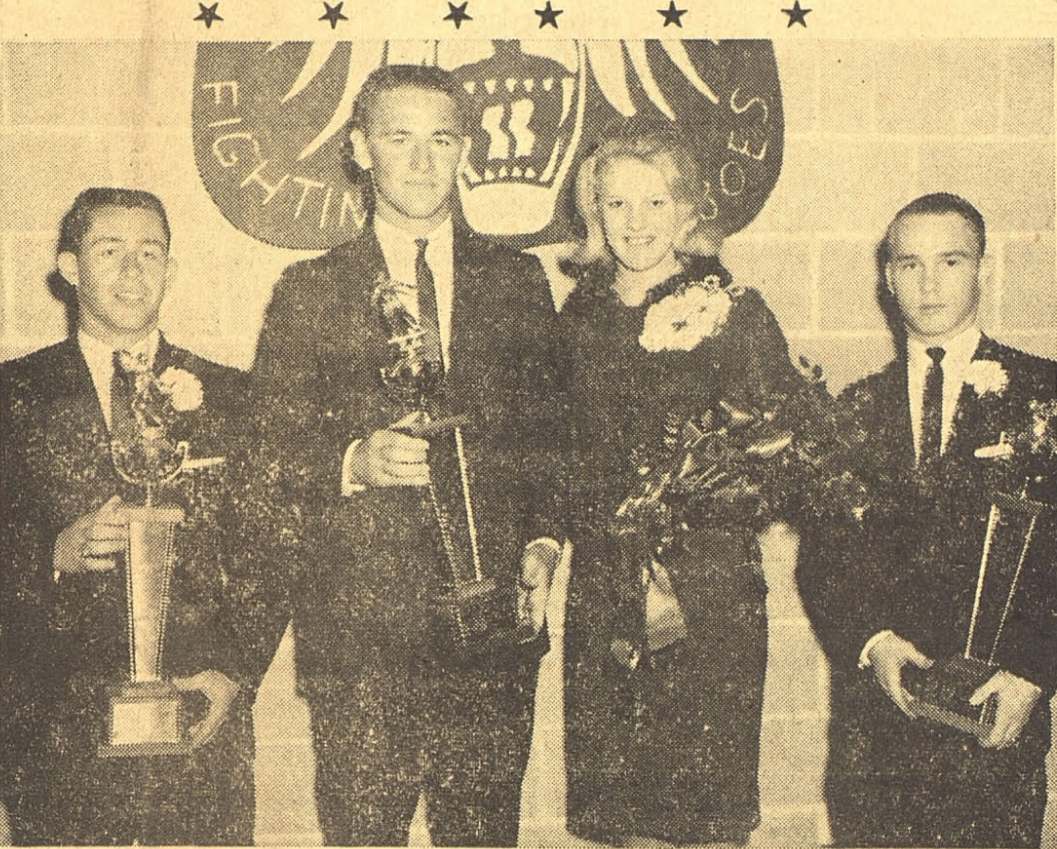

Hayden Fry, Southern Methodist University athletic director and head football coach, was speaker for the event. He was introduced by Leland Willis, athletic director and basketball coach at Cisco Junior College.

Varsity and B-team awards were presented by Coaches Billy Bates and Duane Hale. C. B. Rust and Jimmy Brown were recognized as the 1964 team co-captains, and Miss Sheri Heysler was given a bouquet of roses and introduced as the 1964 football sweetheart.

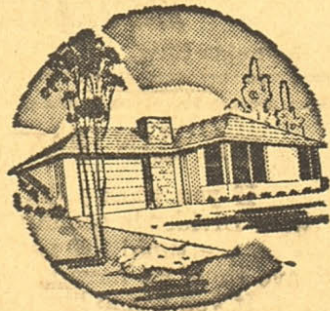

She reportedly sustained some fractured ribs and broken finger in the accident. The 1959 Chevrolet driven by Mrs. Jackson was reported a total loss.

Other vehicles involved were a 1965 Valiant being driven by Larry Eugene Hoover of Fort Worth, a 1958 Ford driven by Shirley Isbell of Cisco, and a 1958 Mack truck and trailer driven by John P. Husband of Eliasville, Miss. The Valiant and truck were extensively damaged, and the Ford was estimated as a total loss.

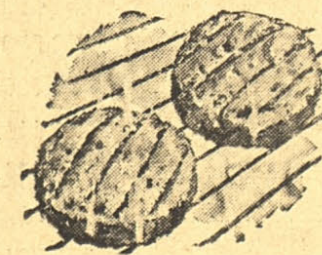
