

American Federation of Labor **Opposes Alignment With a New Party and Soviet Recognition**

EL PASO, Nov. 17 .- What promises to be one of the most harmonious conventions in a decade of the American Federation of Labor got under way here today. There are four hundred delegates in attendance from Samuel Gompers down, the labor chiefs anticipate little trouble during the ten days session. With the foremost problem-that of the future national elections-settled, indications pointed that the convention would adopt a non-partisan policy, and not tie itself up with any new party.

Three major plans in the congressical program were "the enactment of the Howell-Barkley bill, abolishing railroad labor board, the repeal of the Esch-Cummins transporta tion act, and the enactment of a constitutional amendment by which congress, by a two-thirds vote, may over ride decisions of the supreme court." The convention is also expected to denounce the Ku Klux Klan, and to oppose recognition of
