Through the Editor's Spectacles By GEORGE

The decision of the supreme court of the United States in the case of the Edison Consolidated company of New York against the national labor relations board passed practically unnoticed by the great majority of readers, but this decision is one of the most far-reaching in its influence upon American life. It was just such a "liberal" decision as the president demanded when he sought to "purge" the supreme

court of its "conservative" ele-

ments and force it out of its

"horse and buggy" rut. It simply not since that the federal gov-

ernmet's control over the pri-

vate lives and businesses of the

people has been vastly extended.

The term "liberal" as used by the New Deal is puzzling. It is difficult to understand how a word which envisages freedom of individual mind and action can be used to designate a policy which operates to strip away local independence and vest broad powers of control in a central thinking liberalism denotes the greatest possible freedom of individual action. It is, therefore, a political anomaly of the cruelest sort to use the term as an excuse for removing control of law-making and law-enforcement farther and farther from the individual, rendering his county and state governments impotent and placing in the hands of distant bureaucrats authority over those political factors which involve the dearest

The Edison company decision leaves the way open to use coercion where persuasion is now employed. Although the Edison company transmits no power across state lines and operates entirely within the confines of the state of New York, the supreme court held in a remarkable decision that, because the product it produces "affects" interstate commerce, the company is subject to the authority of the national labor relations board This decision is diametrically opposed to many decisions of the court in the past which held that intrastate business is not subject to federal control, among which were the NRA decision, the Guffey coal act decision, etc.

"The cotton, or corn, or peanuts which you grow eventually go across state lines or into foreign commerce in some form or other, therefore your work affects interstate commerce and comes under the authority of the federal bureaus. It has been decided that you are growing too and at you are not paying your laborers a fair wage. Therefore

cotton, or corn or peanuts you may grow only so much of these products, work your hands only so many hours a week and pay them not less than a certain

If you think that is far-reaching, consider the fact that it is exactly what the federal government and its current reigning bureaucrats are telling the business man right now, and consider also the fact that "studies" are under way to devise a method for advancing the benefits of "social security" to the farmer.

If that principle is allowed to stand and the "forces of human progress," to use the glib egotisms of the administration, are allowed to cross new "social frontiers" in suppression of those individual rights and liberties without which no freedom is freedom and no democracy democracy, then-and I say it

DALADIER WINS

PARIS, Dec. 10. (P)-Premier Daladier carved out a new but fragile majority in the chamber of deputies Saturday, enabling him to carry on his strike smashing and his fight against Italy's colonial ambitions.

The "strong man" of France, nevertheless, appeared to be the political prisoner of his own divided radical-socialist party.

In a riotous session of the chamber which lasted until 2:25 a. m. the best Daladier could wring from the quarreling, shouting deputies was a majority of 74 votes out of the chamber's 618. The vote of confidence was 315

His new majority was based on conservative support, ranging all the way from his own moderately conservative party to the extreme right French social party-Col. Francois de la Rocque's group of semi-fascists.

The socialists and communists, who formerly joined with the radical socialists to form the people's front, voted solidly against

#### LUBBOCK-BRECK GAME IS SENSATION



## **Sweeping Social Security Changes** Are Prepared

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10. (P)-The Social Security Advisory council drafted Saturday sweeping recommendations for broadening the government's old age in-

While the council's official report will not be made public untill sometime next week, informed persons said, its principal recommendations would include:

1. Provision for monthly payments to the widows and dependent children of workers covered by the Social Security act and for \$200 funeral expenses to the families of "covered" workers who die before reaching the age of 65.

2. Some provision for the wives and dependent children of those over 65 receiving monthly payments. This would be designed to aid the families of retired workers whose incomes under the system may be only \$30 or \$40 a month-too small to provide the necessities of life for more than one person.


3. Move the date for beginning old age payments up from January 1, 1942, to January 1, 1940.

4. Broaden the act to include immediately 2,600,000 seamen and workers in banks, charitable and religious organizations.

5. Broaden the act later to include, probably in 1941, an estimated 6,000,000 farm and domestic workers.







#### Mexican Oil Deal Report Is Sought by U.S.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10. (AP)tate department officials, conerned by reports that Mexico has arranged to barter oil to Germany for machinery and chemicals, asked Ambassador Josephus Daniels Saturday for a full report.

This government's interest arises om the fact that the oil was produced by wells seized from American-owned companies and no compensation has been given.

While there was no official comment, officials here were understood to take the attitude that the disposition of the oil was of extreme interest to this government so long as claims of the former American owners were un-

The reported German-Mexican oil deal marked a further economic tie between those countries at a time when the administration has been making every effort to rally the nations of this hemisphere to

reached on payments. The United States in each case has recognized Mexico's right to take over the properties, but has insisted that this must be accompanied by prompt and adequate compensation.

#### How Columbus Inspired The Panama Canal

THE idea of a canal linking the Atlantic and the Pacific was really born the moment that Co-lumber failed to find a westward passage from Europe to Cathay But for a generation after this explorers continued to seek an out-let. At length they gave up, con-vinced that the coast of America was continuous and therefore permanent barrier.

So the next thought was a canal to penetrate this barrier. In 1550 the Portuguese navigator, Antonio Galvao, summarizing the talk of the day, published a book to demonstrate that a canal could be cut at Tehuantepec, Nicaragua, Pana-ma or Darien. The next year the Spanish historian, F. L. de Gomara, urged upon Philip II that the work

be undertaken immediately.


The Spanish government was by now absorbed with other tasks in the New World and for two centuries the canal project lay idle. Finally in 1771 the Spanish government did order a survey of the Tehuantepec route. This was found impracticable. A survey at Nicaragua was next. But political troubles interfered.

In 1808 Alexander von Hum-boldt examined the isthmus and made recommendations. In 1823 a new interest was taken when the Central American republics ac-quired their independence. Sub-sequently concessions were granted to citizens of United States, France and Belgium. But not un-til 1904 did the great project at last get under way under American direction and ownership. The intervening years had seen no end of intrigue and false starts and de-
