DIRECTOR SCRIPPS HAS A PLAN.

Two basic reforms were put forward by Robert P. Scripps, president and editorial director of the Scripps-Howard newspapers, in an address at the Senatorial Progressives conference in the city of Washington. "First, shorter hours of labor than have ever been dreamed of. Second, a much more wide distribution of wealth—through wages or otherwise—to permit increased luxury consumption and increased luxury employment." Director Scripps passed this on to the senatorial progressives: "As I see it, gentlemen, the alternative is the goosestep one way or another and Lenin or Mussolini makes mighty little difference. The employment problem goes directly to the heart of a vital question—'Can the institution of democracy survive the age of science and the machine?' Science and machines are here to stay and must be exploited somehow. Under our present loose and anarstrial system they are not being exploited efficiently from the standpoint of most of our people." He suggested that the progressive senatorial legislators supply the leadership which industry, itself, has so far been unable to supply. Director Scripps is correct from one viewpoint at least. Science and machines are here to stay. It is also conceded people are here to stay.

TRUE OBJECTIVE OF IMPRISONMENT.
