

SCHOOL PLAN Fights 'Murder FOR STUDENTS APPROVED

Representatives of Service, civic, and business organizations of Cisco this morning gave a vote of confidence to Superintendent R. N. Cluck and the school board for their work in seeking to bring additional high school students to Cisco during the next school year. The meeting was called by the superintendent and the board pre-ceding their meeting tonight, in order to get the public reaction to the movement being advanced to bring more pupils here for high

school purposes only, from outlying districts. The vote of confidence was on motion of Dr. Hubert Seale. It was pointed out that by purchasing two buses the school could bring in pupils from eight outlying districts. This, it was pointed out, would mean about 50 more pupils than would attend school here otherwise

President R. L. Ponsler of the school board pointed out that the \$2 a month transportation for each pupil per month, plus the \$70 per capita tuition would probably enable the schools to 'break even' or perhaps gain a little financially. **Increase** Trade

The real reason for the move however, it was pointed out, is to secure the good will of people of the outlying districts, and by so doing bring their trade to Cisco.

Growers, Ginners Back Bankhead Act

C. K. Bullard of Dallas is not the attorney for the Texas Cotton Growers Gin company. He has made the announcement that all cooperative gins would be exempted from government "threats to withhold" cotton ginning tags. "We want the government to understand," said Bullard, "that the Texas Cotton Growers Gin association do not represent us and we are willing to cooperate with the Bankhead act. I believe if the government will issue tags to our gins and allow us to move our cotton the other gins will have their order relieved or rescinded."

There is said to be 200 cooperative gins in Texas and Bullard has asked them all to take a part in the recent move in defense of the Bankhead act.



Protest of Athletes







June Bad Month For Cement and Poultry

AUSTIN, Aug. 5 - June was an infavorable month for cement producers and poultry and egg shippers, the bureau of business research at the University of Texas reported today. Better times in the poultry busi-ness were in prospect "in the not far distant future" the bureau added. Seventy carloads of poultry and eggs were shipped to interstate points, 17 less than in June, 1934. Twenty carloads of eggs and poultry entered from other states, compared to 28 cars last year.

Cement production totaled 275,000 arrels, down 22.5 per cent since May and 27.1 per cent over the corresponding period in 1934. Shipments and stocks on hand were reported more favorably but still remained under the levels set in May and for June, 1934.

Texas compared unfavorably with other states producing cement. The nation's production was increased : shipments were better ; and stocks on hand greater.
