Three Oil Relief Bills Are Offered in Legislature

Another Would Limit Proration Authority Over Small Wells

AUSTIN, Feb. 11. - Three bills mprising the legislative program of independent oil men were offered in the Texas legislature today The first divorces the retail oil and gas business from production, pipe line carriage and refining, the second limits the proration authority over small wells and the third provides that the state railroad commission shall fix rates for pipe transportation on a basis of 10 per

cent earning.

The proration limits proposed would prevent prorating wells 2,000 feet producing less than 10 barrels of oil per day, those between 2,000 and 2,500 feet depth that produce under 20 barrels a day and those above 3,000 that produce



500 HEAD OF STOCK WILL BE USED IN RODEO

FORT WORTH, Feb. 11.—More than 500 head of livestock will be used in the Rodeo of the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show which will be formally opened Friday night, March 6.

This includes the 112 putlaw

This includes the 112 outlaw horses which have been shipped here from Chugwater, Wyoming, for bareback riding and brone riding contests in which the championships

of the world will be at stake.

Sixty Brahmas have been rounded up from ranches of Texas, New Mexico and Mexico for the steer riding contests. Sixty steers also have been obtained for the bulldogging events and 65 sturdy calves have been bought for the calf roping. The number of cow ponies that will be used by cowbeys and cowgirls in grand entries and the regular events will be in excess of 150.

Manager John B. Davis has declared that the Rodeo livestock will surpass any animals ever rounded up for a Rodeo. A scout was sent to ranches in many parts of the coutry before a sufficient number of

cattle and calves was found.

The bucking brones are headed by Midnight, the big black horse that never has been ridden and which has spoiled many cowboys' honors. Other horses among the 112 outlaws are Five Minutes to Midnight Broken Bex, Satan, Shamrock, Invalid, WBAP, School Girl, Go Getter, Jack Dempsey, Ace High, Buttermilk, Chili Bean, Cross Old Lady and many others.

CORES NEEDED FOR STUDY OF FORMATIONS

AUSTIN, Feb. 11.—Need for cores of geologic formations in order that these formations may be adequately studied is becoming more and more apparent, according to Dr. E. H. Sellards, associate director of the Bureau of Economic Geology at the University of Texas.

'At the present time, Texas ge ologists have before them the very difficult problem of determining what formations are present in North Central Texas between the Barnet shale, which is Carboniferous, and the Ellenburger, which is Lower Ordovician," Dr. Sellards pointed out. "In Reagan county it has been determined from the cores obtained from the deep wells of the Big Lake oil field that the middle Ordovician comes into the section at that place. However, throughout the great areas of North Central Texas this problem is unsettled. That a Mississippian formation, older than the Barnet, occurs within this region is shown by the surface exposures in the vicinity of San Saba in the central mineral region, but to what extent the Mississippian is de veloped throughout the region as whole is a problem on which additional information is greatly to be desired and which can be determined satisfactorily only by coring. We hope that geologists directing developments in this region will recommend coring within this area until these problems can be determined.

"Southern Val Verde county is another region where coring is very much needed, since we are in doubt as to the age of the formations under the Cretaceous."

670,025 BARRELS TEXAS DAILY OIL AVERAGE

AUSTIN, Feb. 11.—Daily average production of petroleum in Texas amounted to 670,025 barrels during January 4.7 per cent less than during the preceding month and 18.9 per cent less than during the corresponding period of 1930, according to I. B. Williamson, editor of the Texas Business Review of the University of Texas.

"The sharpest reduction was in the Panhandle section of the state, where the production of 60,362 barrels daily was 14.7 per cent below the figure for December and 34.9 per cent below that for January of the preceding year" Williamson said. "East central Texas, under the stimulus of new development, increased its production by 4 per cent from the 40,625 barrels in December to 42,250 barrels in January and practically doubled the January, 1930, figure of 21,450 barrels.

"Permits for new wells granted during the month increased sharply from 258 in December to 306 in January, but remained less than half the total of 652 permits during January, 1930. Completions also exceeded those of the previous month, the total number of January being 312 compared to 249 in December and 504 during the corresponding month of the previous year. Production was obtained from 131 of the wells completed in January of this year, compared to 136 in December and '274 in January, 1930."

By RAYMOND BROOKS AUSTIN, Feb. 11.—An emergency ed and feed bill that will help farmers of any county to start this year's crops, is being sponsored by Senator Oliver C. Cunningham of Abilene. It does not call for any state money.

Senator Cunningham proposes to authorize counties to issue up to Jack Winston. Phone 112 or 106. \$50,000 in warrants, lending the money in small amounts to farmers to buy seed and feed, and to lend them any other money the county may have on hand, as its commissioners may see fit, for the same purpose.

Rep. Coke Stevenson of Junction proposes to fix as the fair basis for repaying counties for the stahighways taken over, the outstanding amount of county or district bonds issued for the purpose of aiding state construction, less the accumulated sinking fund of such bond issues.

"The use of such highway by the county or district is equivalent to that portion of the cost of construction that has heretofore been paid in cash" his bill said.






