## Public Hearing Held On HUD Development Grant

The first public on application for Phase II of the HUD Community Development Block Grant was held Tuesday night, December 9. Phase I and II of the grant are concerned with improvements of Cisco's water treatment facilities. A \$100,000 grant was awarded to Cisco for Phase I of the project.

Phase II of the grant, if awarded, would supply for Cisco's water treatment facilities, filters, a filter building, pumps, pipings and valves, sludge handling facilities, chemical filters, flow meter, turbidimeter and engineering. These improvements are needed to help Cisco meet requirements of the State Health Department.

Estimated costs of Phase II is \$150,000. The grant under discussion would provide to Cisco \$100,000 if applied for and awarded. The city itself would have to budget \$30,000 for the 1976-77 fiscal year.

The second public hearing on the HUD Community Development Block Grant is scheduled for Tuesday, December 23.

The Cisco City Council voted to repair the present billing machine for an estimated cost of \$1,300.

City Manager Denton Miller was instructed by the council to let bids on city property located on the corner of 14th Street and Front Street, across the street from the Cisco Nursing Center.

It has been announced today that East 10th Street, between Avenue A and Beech Street, is now one-way going west.



## EDITORIALS

"...SWARMS OF officers to harass our people, and eat out their substance."

On July 4 of next year, we will observe the 200th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence.

In that document, the distinguished representatives of the colonies listed a series of grievances against King George III. Among those grievances: "He has erected a Multitude of new Offices, and sent hither Swarms of Officers to harass our People, and eat out their Substance."

Those words are being echoed today by America's middle-income taxpayers, who contribute the bulk of the money to finance government, as spending continues to rise at an alarming rate.

The federal budget for fiscal 1977, which begins Oct. 1, 1976, is likely to send federal spending beyond \$400 billion for the first time in the nation's history.

It wasn't until fiscal 1961, ei 185 years after the Declaration of Independence, that federal spending reached \$100 billion. But it took only nine more years to reach \$200 billion, and then only five years to hit \$300 billion.

The jump to \$400 billion is taking only two years. Projections by the Office of Management and Budget show the possibility of a \$1 trillion annual federal budget by the end of this century.

Budget forecasts, however, overlook a vital factor that cannot be measured precisely.

That factor is how long middle-income taxpayers will put up with the triple impact they suffer under present fiscal policies.

The triple impact is felt this way:

1. The government takes from middle-income workers a substantial amount of the money they earn. A recent congressional report points out the family outlay going up the fastest is not for food or energy, but for taxes.

2. The government then use that tax money to pursue programs that feed inflation, causing further erosion of personal incomes. The average American lost purchasing power last year for the first time in 15 year.

3. Finally, most middle-income families are shut out of many programs they pay for, such as tax-financed college scholarships.

And so, after 200 years, the basic grievance is the same -- "Swarms of Officers to harass our People, and eat out their Substance." - Nation's Business, December 1975

## U.S.D.A. Urges Heifer Vaccination

According to Dr. E.S. Cox, area veterinarian in charge for APHIS, *Brucella abortus* Strain 19 vaccine increases a heifer's resistance to brucellosis. Vaccinated heifers are more likely to withstand average exposure to brucellosis in an infected herd than are non-vaccinates.

Strain 19 vaccine is safe and effective when used properly. It is the only brucellosis vaccine available or officially recognized in this country. Heifers, when vaccinated at the proper age, will normally experience a transient low grade infection, which results in development of immunity. During this period of low grade infection, Strain 19 organisms are not transmitted from vaccinated to non-vaccinated animals.

Cattlemen should carry out a vigorous calfhood vaccination program if they are located in areas of relatively heavy infection or if they ship cattle to highly infected areas. Some states do not permit cattle to be imported for breeding if they are not "officially vaccinated" and are beyond the age limit for vaccination.

With about 30% of all the known brucellosis infected herds of the country located in Texas, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is strongly

urging Texas cattlemen to vaccinate their heifer calves against brucellosis.

Officials of the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) recommend vaccinating beef and dairy heifers with *Brucella abortus* Strain 19 vaccine. Beef heifers should be vaccinated after two months of age but before ten months of age. Dairy heifers should be vaccinated after two months of age but before six months of age. Bull calves should not be vaccinated because it may result in permanent sterility.

Strain 19 vaccine is a live bacterial product and should be administered by a veterinarian or by employees of state-federal animal health agencies. A tattoo applied in the right ear at the time of vaccination identifies heifers as "officially vaccinated" and shows the approximate time of vaccination.

### EDITORIALS

"...SWARMS OF officers to harass our people, and eat out their substance."

On July 4 of next year, we will observe the 200th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence.

In that document, the distinguished representatives of the colonies listed a series of grievances against King George III. Among those grievances: "He has erected a Multitude of new Offices, and sent hither Swarms of Officers to harass our People, and eat out their Substance."

Those words are being echoed today by America's middle-income taxpayers, who contribute the bulk of the money to finance government, as spending continues to rise at an alarming rate.

The federal budget for fiscal 1977, which begins Oct. 1, 1976, is likely to send federal spending beyond \$400 billion for the first time in the nation's history.

It wasn't until fiscal 1961, 185 years after the Declaration of Independence, that federal spending reached \$100 billion. But it took only nine more years to reach \$200 billion; and then only five years to hit \$300 billion.

The jump to \$400 billion is taking only two years.

Projections by the Office of Management and Budget show the possibility of a \$1 trillion annual federal budget by the end of this century.

Budget forecasts, however, overlook a vital factor that cannot be measured precisely.

That factor is how long middle-income taxpayers will put up with the triple impact they suffer under present fiscal policies.

The triple impact is felt this way:

1. The government takes from middle-income workers a substantial amount of the money they earn. A recent congressional report points out the family outlay going up the fastest is not for food or energy, but for taxes.

2. The government then use that tax money to pursue programs that feed inflation, causing further erosion of personal incomes. The average American lost purchasing power last year for the first time in 15 year.

3. Finally, most middle-income families are shut out of many programs they pay for, such as tax-financed college scholarships.

And so, after 200 years, the basic grievance is the same - "Swarms of Officers to harass our People, and eat out their Substance." - Nation's Business, December 1975

## U.S.D.A. Urges Heifer Vaccination

According to Dr. E.S. Cox, area veterinarian in charge for APHIS, *Brucella abortus* Strain 19 vaccine increases a heifer's resistance to brucellosis. Vaccinated heifers are more likely to withstand average exposure to brucellosis in an infected herd than are non-vaccinates.

Strain 19 vaccine is safe and effective when used properly. It is the only brucellosis vaccine available or officially recognized in this country. Heifers, when vaccinated at the proper age, will normally experience a transient low grade infection, which results in development of immunity. During this period of low grade infection, Strain 19 organisms are not transmitted from vaccinated to non-vaccinated animals.

Cattlemen should carry out a vigorous calfhood vaccination program if they are located in areas of relatively heavy infection or if they ship cattle to highly infected areas. Some states do not permit cattle to be imported for breeding if they are not "officially vaccinated" and are beyond the age limit for vaccination.

With about 30% of all the known brucellosis infected herds of the country located in Texas, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is strongly

urging Texas cattlemen to vaccinate their heifer calves against brucellosis.

Officials of the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) recommend vaccinating beef and dairy heifers with *Brucella abortus* Strain 19 vaccine. Beef heifers should be vaccinated after two months of age but before ten months of age. Dairy heifers should be vaccinated after two months of age but before six months of age. Bull calves should not be vaccinated because it may result in permanent sterility.

Strain 19 vaccine is a live bacterial product and should be administered by a veterinarian or by employees of state-federal animal health agencies. A tattoo applied in the right ear at the time of vaccination identifies heifers as "officially vaccinated" and shows the approximate time of vaccination.

## Local Hunter

### Shoots Bird With

### Minnesota Leg Band

Truly Clark, local electrical contractor, shot a dove last Sept. 20, at the Charlie Pence Ranch northeast of Cisco that had a leg band placed on the bird in Minnesota more than a year before that date.

The leg band was sent by Mr. Clark to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and that agency notified him that the band had been forwarded to the Bird Banding Laboratory, Migratory Bird Population Station, Laurel, Maryland.

This week, Mr. Clark received a Certificate of Appreciation from the Federal, State and Provincial (Canada) Conservation Agencies "in expressing sincere appreciation for the interest and cooperation shown by reporting the bird band number and recovery data."

The bird, a female mourning dove, was at least one year old when banded on June 15, 1973, near Redwood, Minn., the notice said.

Mr. Clark was hunting with Jerry Pruitt, local banker, and Mr. Pence at the ranch when the banded bird was shot.

State and federal agencies use the leg bands to study the migratory activities of birds.
