EVERYBODY IS invited to tonight's joint meeting of the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce and the city commission at 7 p.m. at the CoC offices.

Mayor John Webb reports that Bruce Clark of Abilene, a city planning expert, has been invited to attend the meeting and speak on a service he offers cities such as ours. The mayor is anxious for the public to hear this man.

MAYOR WEBB reports that he spent a couple of hours at Lake Cisco's north side last Sunday and counted 37 cabins either finished or under construction. You would be surprised at the activity there, he added. Not many lots are left for lease.

Plans are now being made for the lake front area on your left as you turn into the north shore road off the Moran Highway just above the dam to be turned into a public fishing area, Mr. Webb says. Machines will be sent there in the near future to fix roads and places for people to get into the shore area.

Mayor Webb said this was to insure the lake of being kept free of pollution. All sanitary ordinances and recommendations of the state highway department will be strictly enforced, the mayor added.

Funeral services for Arthur Bishop, 58, a resident of Eastland County all of his life, will be conducted at 10 a.m. Wednesday at the Rust Funeral Home chapel in Cisco. He died shortly after suffering a heart attack Sunday night at a Wichita Falls hospital.

The Rev. Mart Agnew, Baptist minister, will be in charge of the services, assisted by the Rev. Luther Pryor, Nazarene minister. Burial will be in the Oakwood Cemetery beside his late parents.

Mr. Bishop, who was born Nov. 18, 1907 in Gorman, came to Cisco at age six. He was the last surviving member of his family and no near relatives were listed as survivors. He was well known here.

Young Cisco Soldier Dies In Auto Mishap

Funeral services for William Wallace Cherry, 25, who was fatally injured in a car-truck collision late Saturday will be held at 2 p.m. Tuesday at Rust Funeral Home Chapel with the Rev. Lee Fields of Carbon officiating. Burial will be in Gungahntz Cemetery with Rust Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Pfc. Cherry, a clerk-typist at the Army Recruiting Main Station in Abilene, and another soldier, M-Sgt. Robert A. Criswell of Sapulpa, Okla., were both killed when their car was in collision with two trucks about two miles east of Ranger Saturday night. Cherry was dead on arrival at Ranger General Hospital, and Criswell died a few minutes after reaching the hospital.

Gene Gourley, Ranger volunteer fireman, and Highway Patrolman E. M. Rogers of Eastland were both injured about 11:55 p.m., almost two hours after the accident, while directing traffic at the scene. Gourley was under treatment at Ranger General Hospital for leg injuries, and Patrolman Rogers suffered a compound fracture of his left leg and multiple bruises and lacerations over his body. He was later transferred to Hendrick Hospital in Abilene.

Rogers had just waved a Gravhound bus through the traffic snarl and failed to see an approaching car driven by Robert William Rosson, 20, of Ira. The Ranger fireman saw the car and yelled a warning but both were struck

before either could get out of the way, said Highway Patrolman Jack Therwanger.

The soldier's westbound 1957 Chevrolet had met a 1956 GMC truck head-on, spun around, and was smashed between it and a truck driven by Bobby Dale Johnston of Boaz, Ala., who was uninjured. Driver of the GMC, William Brewer of Grand Saline, was treated at Ranger General for a knee injury and was released.

Damage to the GMC was estimated at \$6,000 and to the other truck \$1,000. The car was demolished.

Pfc. Cherry was a 1959 graduate of Eastland High School and attended Cisco Junior College, Ranger Junior College and Tarleton State College. He had been with the recruiting station since March, 1964. His mother, Mrs. W. W. Cherry, was buried here Christmas Day, 1964.

Surviving are his father, W. W. Cherry of Cisco, and one brother, Vernon Cherry, of Fort Worth.

Others wishing to donate were invited to call Mrs. Emma Watts at the college business office.

Mr. Hogue said the band and drill team would put on special programs at each night of the tournament. Plans call for the bus to return to Cisco after the game Saturday night, provided the Wranglers are in the tournament that long, he added.

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The Wranglers of Cisco Junior College will leave Wednesday for Amarillo to participate this week in the Region Five basketball tournament. Eight teams will play in the meet, which will begin Thursday and run through Saturday night.

Cisco has reserved the Amarillo JC gym for a practice session at 8 p.m. Wednesday. The schedule for the tournament follows:

Thursday: Top bracket — 4 p.m., San Angelo vs Decatur; 7 p.m., Cisco vs. New Mexico Military Institute. Bottom bracket — 2 p.m., Howard County vs. South Plains; 9 p.m., Ranger vs. Amarillo.

Friday — 7 p.m., top bracket winners play; 9 p.m., lower bracket winners play.

Saturday — 7 p.m. losers of both brackets Friday game meet for 3rd play; 9 p.m., winners of both brackets Friday game play for championship. Winner will go to the national tournament at Hutchinson, Kan.

Coach Leland Willis' team lost to Wharton JC last Friday night in the finals of the Texas JC conference. The Wranglers became the conference runnerup after the 88-87 loss.

The Wranglers were the subject of a feature story in the Feb. 28 (Sunday) Fort Worth Star-Telegram by Frank Luksa. The story is re-printed as follows:

Leland Willis talks fast, coaches the same way and his Jet Age style basketball has catapulted Cisco Junior College into the national spotlight.

Willis' Wranglers were lodged in the No. 3 spot on the final ballot of junior college powers across the country.

And no wonder. They've whistled through a 30-game schedule with a 28-2 record, averaged better than 101 points per game and connected on 52 per cent of their floor shots as a team.

"The faster the pace, the better we like it," says Willis. "Run and shoot is our game."

The Wranglers have run opponents dizzy with a sizzling fast break and a man-for-man press on defense that has captured the fancy of Cisco's football-conscious fans.

"This was strictly a football town before we hit No. 7 in the nation," Willis said in a telephone interview. "Then the place went absolutely crazy. The booster club bought more uniforms and warmups, even though we already had practically new ones."

"People have been chartering buses to our cut-of-town games and we can't seat everyone for our home games."

Cisco squeezes 700 fans into its gymnasium seats and all the standing room trade the fire marshal will allow.

They jostle each other for prime spots to see Johnny Sellers, Carl Stepien, Frank Biggers, Preston Sheard and Harry Gunner line up for the opening tip. All five sport double figure averages that total 90 points, a discouraging reminder for the opposition.

Sellers and Gunner are headed for senior college stardom, predicts Willis.

"Sellers can play anywhere, for anybody," he says of the former Class B all-stater from Hawley. The six-foot guard, a freshman, sports an 18-point average.

Gunner's Reputation has spread to Arizona State, North Texas State and Hardin-Simmons. The 6-6 Port Arthur sophomore has scored at a 21-point clip and averaged more than 14 rebounds per game.

"Lots of coaches have talked to me about this boy," Willis says, understating the case.

There's no relief for the weary when Willis calls out three freshman reserves. Bill Marvin of Abilene, James Maedgen of Talpa and Carlos Mendoza of Houston Jeff Davis.

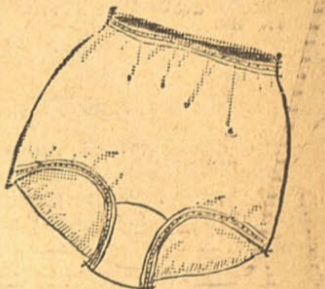

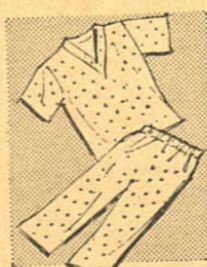

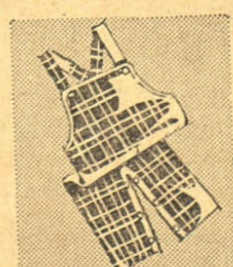

think we'll do well."

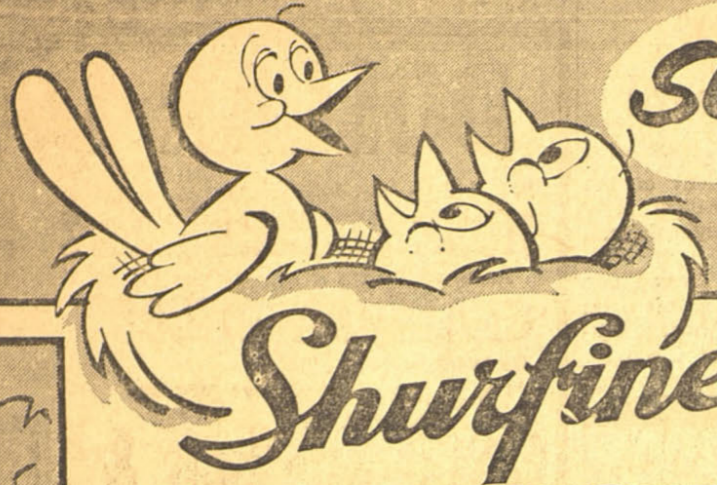

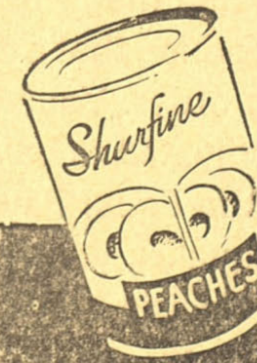

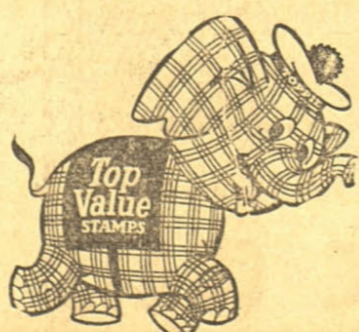

A Texas Legislature committee took up the study of SB 253, which would set up a Cisco Hospital District, after a hearing held Monday in Austin by the Committee on Counties, according to information here.

Rep. Wayne Gibbens of this district sponsored the bill, which passed the Senate recently, before the House committee. He said it was a standard hospital district bill, giving Precinct 4 of Eastland County (the Cisco area) authority to call an election for a hospital district.

The bill provides for an election to name a board of directors and limits the total assessment of taxes to 75 cents on the \$100 valuation.

Rep. Gibbens expected the bill to pass soon and to be sent to the governor for signing into law.

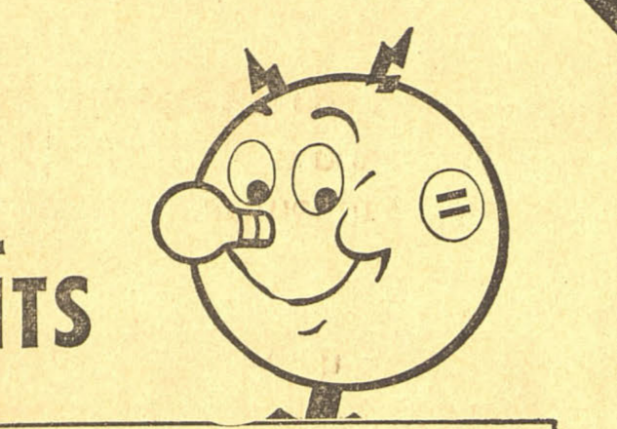
