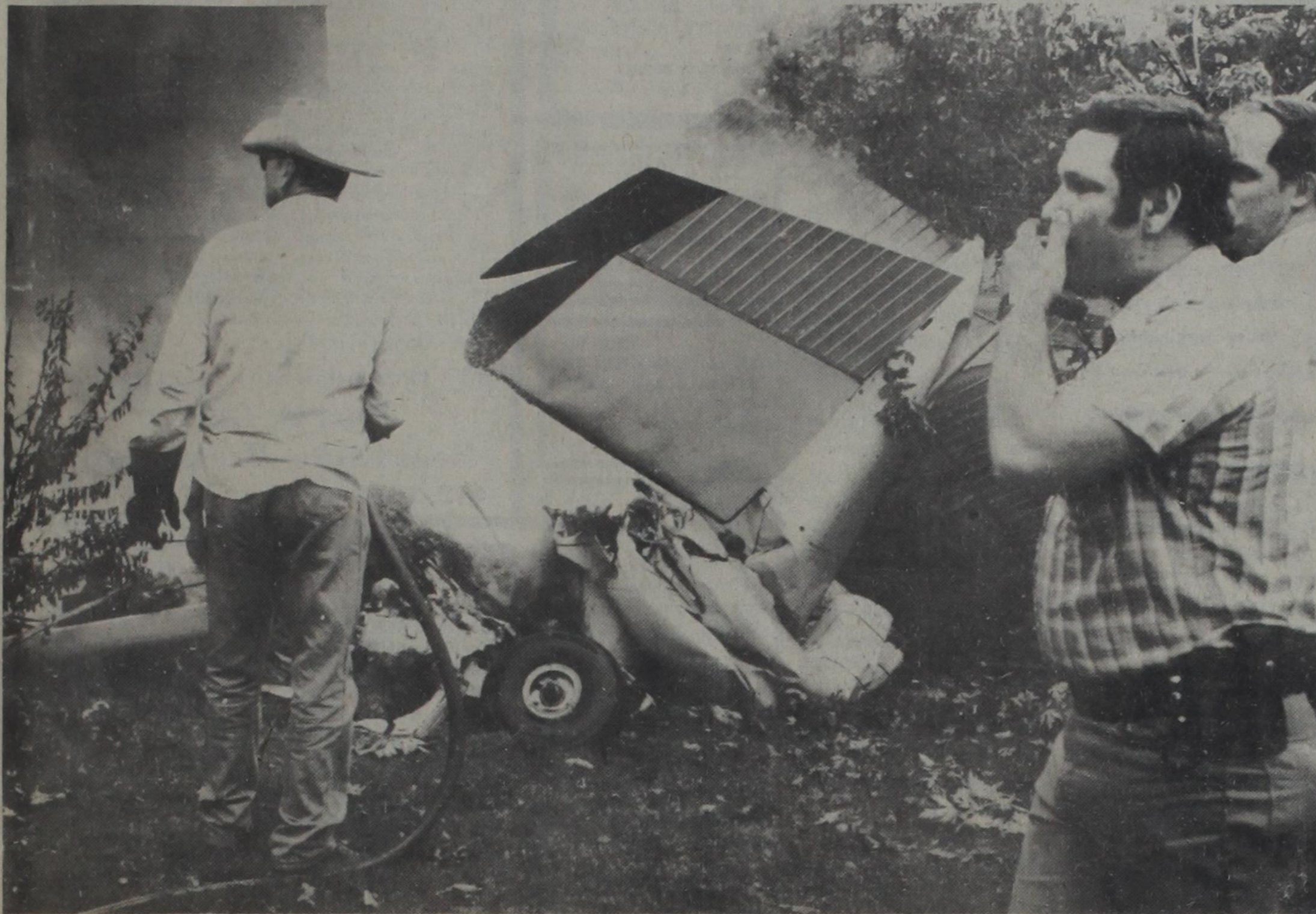

Two Killed As Airplane Crashes In Yard Of Home



A 42-year old pilot and his 15-year old son lost their lives and the home of Mr. and Mrs. Manning Davis was damaged extensively by fire Monday afternoon when a single-engine airplane crashed in the front yard of the 700 East 21st Street residence.

Dead were Clarence Edward Weaver, 42, of Sandia, near Corpus Christi, and his son, Robert. They were in a Cessna 180 4-passenger airplane that was virtually destroyed by fire that erupted when the plane hit a tree in the crash.

The airplane had flown over the Cisco area for 30 to 35 minutes, Cisco police reported, apparently trying to find an airport or a place to land. Weather conditions at the time were extremely hazardous for contact flying with fog and a cloud ceiling estimated at 100 to 200 feet.

Police were told that the plane apparently attempted a landing on Highway 206 just southwest of town and came down to about eight feet before pulling up again. It was seen flying 100 to 200 feet in the Lake Cisco and Country Club areas and Rancher Norman Boggs, who

was working at his Lake Road place, told interviewers that the plane circled over his area and was so low that he could see the pilot. He waved, he said, but the man gave no sign of seeing him.

Robert Ralls, Eastland DPS trooper who was off duty and who was asked by Police Chief Billy Rains to act as the official spokesman at the crash scene, reported that area residents agreed that the plane seemed to explode and ignite fire on the Davis porch on impact.

Eastland and Ranger sent fire departments and men here to help Cisco firemen fight the fire, which was brought under control in

some 45 minutes. Chief Rains and members of the Cisco Police Department, including Chris Key, Frank Thumsuden and R.D. Kirkland, stood guard at the crash scene all Monday night.

Arnold Edwards of Fort

Worth, representative of the National Transportation Safety Board, arrived in Cisco around 7:30 a.m. Tuesday to direct an investigation as to the cause of the crash. With him were Jim Moran of Dallas, representing Continental Aircraft

Engines; Bryan Hancock of Wichita, Kansas, representing Cessna Aircraft Co.; and Juan Garcia of Lubbock, representing the Federal Aviation Administration.

They were sitting through the wreckage during Tues-

day. After they complete their study, the remains of the airplane will be turned over to an insurance company or relatives of the pilot.

The bodies of the two victims were removed from the wreckage some two hours after the crash by Kimbrough Funeral Home. The delay was necessitated by the heat caused by the fire. Bed sheets were hung around the wreckage after the fire was extinguished and until the bodies could be removed. An inquest was held by R.G. Lyerla, Eastland justice of the peace.

Kimbrough Funeral Home took the two bodies to Dallas for an autopsy Monday night. It was understood that the bodies would be released to a funeral home chosen by their family after medical examiners finish their work. Both bodies were burned beyond recognition.

Policeman Chris Key telephoned Mr. Weaver's wife to tell her about the crash. She thought the call was a joke for a time but "took it real hard," the police said. Mr. Weaver had flown his wife to Kansas where she was visiting a new grandchild. He and their son were returning home, it was understood. He was a missionary, officers said.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Davis, who had lived in their home some 22 years and who had extensively remodeled it a year ago, were at work when they were notified of the tragic event. Mr. Davis teaches social studies to 7th and 8th grade students at junior high school and Mrs. Davis is the public school business manager.

Mr. Davis, who took Tuesday off to be at home while the wreckage and fire debris were being cleared away, said that they would probably rent an apartment until they could make repairs to their home. They spent Monday night with the Bob Conners, their next door neighbors.

Ike Watts of 709 E. 21st Street was at home and

reported that he heard the crash and looked out in time to see the plane burst into flames.

James Mayes, Lake Cisco patrolman who was about two blocks from the scene, told interviewers that he heard the plane's engine sputtering but that he could not see it in the fog and low clouds. He said the engine seemed to quit and backfire just before the crash.

People in the downtown area heard the low flying plane moments before the crash. One observer said it narrowly missed the Laguna Hotel and the Cisco Masonry buildings. The plane was reported to have flown "real low" over Cisco Junior College.

The runway lights at the Cisco Municipal Airport have electronic controls that cause them to be turned on when the sun isn't shining. Manager Archie Brixey of the airport was out of town.

Shortly before the crash, the Eastland County Police Dispatch office received a call that a helicopter had crashed near I-20 at mile marker 325 here. Investigation revealed that the helicopter had landed to wait for better weather.

Chief Richard Connell of

the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department, who was the first official on the scene, reported that the two front rooms of the Davis home were virtually destroyed. There was water and smoke damage elsewhere in the house. Mr. Davis said his home was covered by insurance.

The Cisco fire department took three vehicles to the crash scene, and 18 firemen were on duty to assist in fighting the blaze. A Patterson ambulance stood by. There were no injuries, Chief Connell reported.

Two hours after the crash and before the bodies were removed, newspaper and television crews arrived from out of town media to cover the tragedy.

The Davises, watching recovery efforts from the front yard, told interviewers that "We are thankful that we were not at home. Our hearts go out to the family of the pilot and his son. We appreciate the support and thoughtfulness of our neighbors and friends."

The Davises are long-time residents of Cisco and have been employed by the Cisco Public Schools for some 25 years. They are members of the First Baptist Church.

Four Men Arrested Here For Possession

Four young men from North Carolina were in the Eastland County jail Tuesday after their arrest at a local motel last Saturday morning on charges of first degree felony possession of marijuana with intent to sell and third degree felony possession of a controlled substance.

The men were John Lewis Hice, 19, Scott Douglas Mayes, 22, and Mark Kevin Mayes, 25, all of Logap, N.C., and Gary Franklin Miller, 21, of Dodson, N.C.

The men were arrested at 7:15 a.m. Saturday as they left Best Western Motel in

Cisco. Arresting officers were Cisco Policeman Chris Key and DPS Trooper Robert Ralls, and the men were taken to the county jail.

The officers recovered an estimated seven pounds of marijuana and other controlled substances. The motel had been under surveillance since Friday night by city, county and DPS officers.

Formal charges were filed Tuesday and bond was to be set after the completion of laboratory analysis of the controlled substances, the sheriff's office reported.

CHS Varsity Will Play Winters There

The Lobo Varsity of Cisco High School will be on the road this week as they travel to Winters for another District 11-AA battle. Kickoff will be at 7:30 p.m.

Junior High and Junior Varsity teams will be playing in Cisco Thursday night against teams from Winters. Cisco Head Coach Doyle Walker, said Monday afternoon, that there will probably be both a 7th and 8th grade game this week.

The 7th grade game will start at 5 p.m., followed by the 8th grade and the Junior Varsity.

In the Friday night game, Cisco will be playing with five less players than they started the season with due to injuries. Phillip Allen, junior split end and linebacker, and Dale Page, junior center and end, both missed last week's game due to knee surgery earlier in the week.

Also missing last week's

game was Curtis Taylor, sophomore tackle, who has high blood pressure. Coach Walker said he is not sure whether Taylor and Page will be back this season, but Allen is out for the remainder of the season.

Joining Allen on the sidelines will be Kevin Kirk, sophomore running back and linebacker, and Shelby Nixon, junior starting quarterback and safety. Both Kirk and Nixon were hurt in last Friday's game against Albany. Kirk has a dislocated elbow and Nixon has a broken collar bone.

Jerrod Jeffcoat, sophomore, will replace Nixon at quarterback this week. Coach Walker said Jeff Dennis played center last week against Albany but he is not sure who will play that position this week.

Joe Flores, sophomore tailback and defensive outside linebacker, has been moved up this week to the

Varsity from the Junior Varsity. Flores has been playing very well on the Junior Varsity this year and has scored several touchdowns this season.

Winters is 3-3 for the season and 2-1 in district play, having defeated Ranger (7-to-3) and Baird, while losing to Eastland. Cisco is 2-4 and 1-2, after losing to Albany last week by the score of 13-to-12.

Coach Walker said Winters has a big line which averages 205 pounds. They do not have a bunch of speed and they like to play a control game, according to Walker. They have a pretty good defense which runs a 27 and 5-3.

In last Friday night's game against Albany, the Lions managed to score touchdowns in the second and third quarters, while both of Cisco's scores came

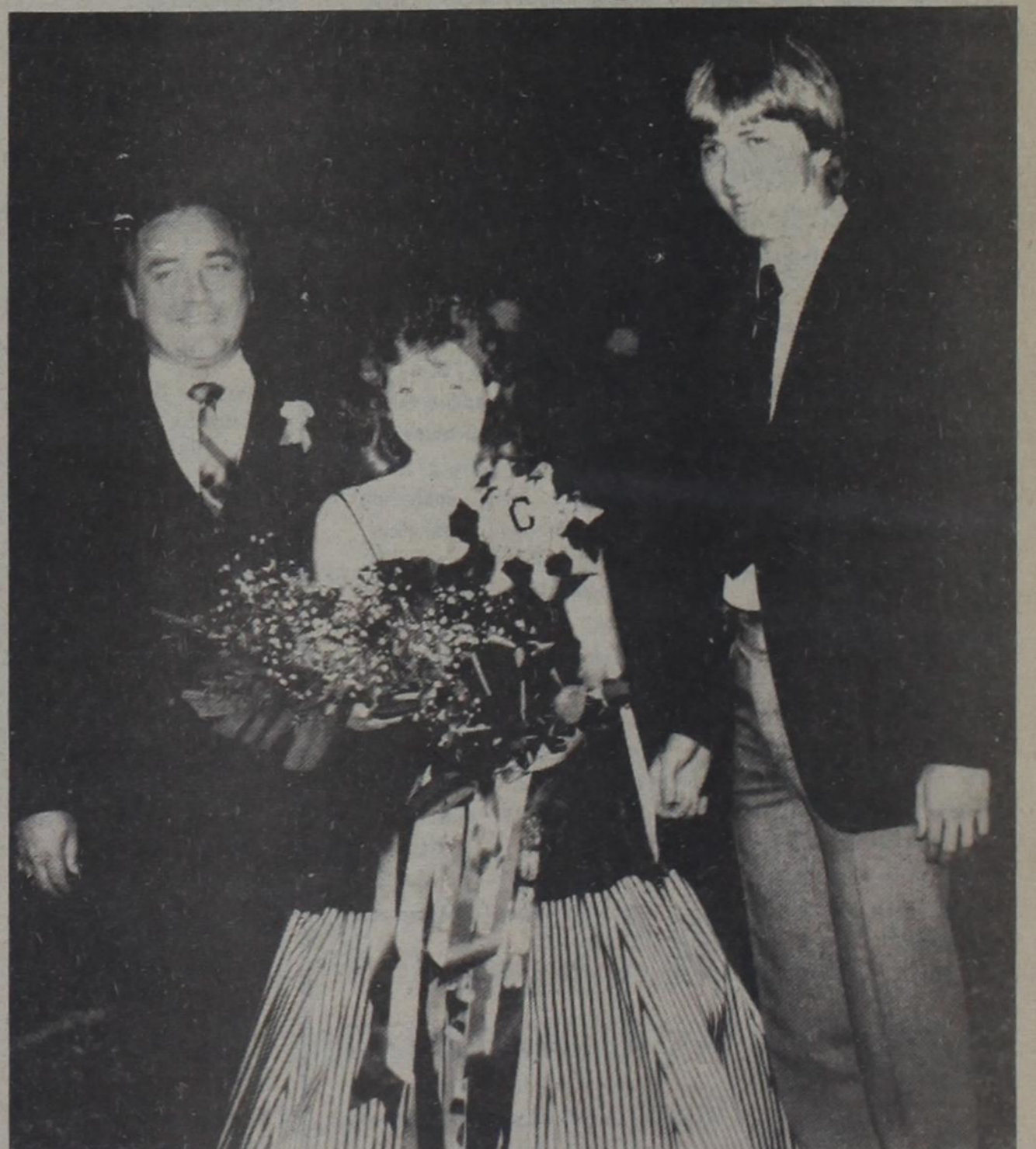
However, Cisco's Lobos should be proud of their performance and not be ashamed of the one-point loss. They did not stop trying and they almost succeeded in coming from behind to win.

Area Man Is Honored

A former resident of Eastland was honored at the Centennial Convention of the National Newspaper Association, held recently in Minneapolis.

Joe T. Cook, who began his newspaper career at age 12 as a carrier boy for the old Eastland Daily Oil Belt News, was recognized as one of a four-generation newspaper family and was presented a special commemorative certificate by Eugene Johnson, president of the association.

Cook was also cited during the convention as the second youngest president of the National Newspaper Association at age 39 and as the only living newspaperman who has been president

of the National Newspaper Association and two state associations: Texas and Mississippi.

Cook grew up in Eastland and graduated from Eastland High School in 1927. He took a journalism degree at the University of Eastland Daily Oil Belt News, was recognized as one of a four-generation newspaper family and was presented a special commemorative certificate by Eugene Johnson, president of the association.

He was editor and publisher of the Mission Times for 26 years before purchasing the Winston County Journal in Louisville, MS, in 1958. While he was publishing in Texas, Cook served as president of the Texas Press Association and

the National Newspaper Association. He was chosen for the Amos Award in 1953 for outstanding service to the newspaper profession and received the Herrick Editorial Award in 1958 excellence in editorial writing.

His great-grandfather, Thomas W. Cook, was the editor and publisher of the Democrat-Standard in Anderson, Ind., in the 1850's. His grandfather, Samuel Francis Cook, was founder of the Albany (Texas) News in the 1880's and was publisher of the Longview (Texas) Times-Clarion.

His father, Thomas Milton Cook, worked with his father in Longview and was later associated with the Dallas Morning News.

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Absentee Ballot Provides Necessary Voting Option

Barriers do exist that prevent some people from voting at their local polling place on election day. However, the voting process has changed to accommodate the varied needs of the public, so there are no longer barriers that prevent any registered voter from casting a ballot.

An inaccessible polling place may be a roadblock for some of the approximately 1.2 million disabled Texans of voting age, but state law mandates that polling places in elections at all levels be accessible by January 1988. Although that deadline is two years away, any eligible voter, who because of sickness or disability is unable to appear at the polling place, can vote absentee.

To encourage Texans to continue voicing their opinions as they grow older, state law permits any of the approximately 1.5 million residents age 65 or older, who are registered to vote, to cast an absentee ballot.

Absentee ballots are also available to registered voters who anticipate being out of town on election day, making it impossible for them to vote at their local polling places. Even those Texans who are unable to show up at the polls because of their religion can vote absentee.

The option to cast an absentee ballot provides everyone with the opportunity to vote in all elections. Voting absentee is a simple process and may be done by personal appearance or by mail.

Absentee voting by personal appearance for this Nov. 5 general election is conducted at the county clerk's office or any branch office during business hours beginning Oct. 16 through Nov. 1. If the

clerk's office is not accessible, you can ask the clerk to bring a ballot to the curb, where you can vote it. The clerk then takes the ballot and deposits it in the ballot box for you.

If you prefer to absentee vote by mail you must first mail in an application for an absentee ballot. The deadline for receiving applications, if you wish to vote in the Nov. 5 general election, is Nov. 1.

Application forms are available from the secretary of state's office and county clerks. However, it is not necessary to use the printed application form when applying for an absentee ballot. You can simply write to the county clerk or absentee voting clerk and request an absentee ballot. Along with the request you must include the following information:

- your name
- residence address
- address to which the ballot is to be mailed if you will be out of town
- that you wish to vote in the November general election
- your signature
- your voter registration number or a statement that you have lost or mislaid your voter registration certificate

The clerk will send you an absentee ballot as soon after Oct. 16 as your application is received. In order for your vote to be counted it must be mailed back to the clerk and received by Nov. 5.

More information about absentee voting can be obtained by calling your county clerk or elections administrator, or the secretary of state's elections division at 1-800-252-VOTE (Voice/TDD). Voting involves some tough decisions. Make a tough decision. Decide to vote.

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Spotlights and Sidelights

BACKTRACKING
Some of my readers think I rained a little heavily on newspapers in a recent column.

So, I read it again, trying for extra emphasis on the objectivity I said was sometimes hard to come by.

Perhaps I did not make it clear enough that my caviling and carping, petty though they may be, were directed chiefly toward the wire services which pick up the sensational items and tend to let other matters go.

How much national mention will Eastland get for the County Fair, an event with the potential of involving or influencing everyone in the county?

That's no big deal as all of us who want details about it know that it is covered by the local papers.

But Eastland makes headlines elsewhere only if some disaster occurs.

As it happens Eastland has three examples of wire-service news: murder trials, Old Rip's TV coverage, and the May truck-train crash.

Taken in reverse order, the crash could have resulted in catastrophic conditions to many instead of a few. That it didn't, was thanks to the work (heroic by any definition) of the men whose approach was matter-

of-fact: "This has to be done; let's do it."

My personal idea is that the story would have lasted longer if more people had been hurt.

No, I do not believe any reporter, editor nor publisher wished this to happen. I do think it is a "news attitude" that has developed slowly enough to get a secure footing, and I am not sure it's that good an attitude.

Old Rip is welcome to all the attention he can get. It is the kind of feature story to focus thought on our area whenever the story is run and re-run. There is no particular time tag on it and it doesn't hurt anyone.

The murder trials are hopped on by "the media". My idea is that the other two stories had points to merit interest beyond our borders, but affairs of the courtroom ilk should be attended locally. We do. They don't need wider publicity.

This does not constitute a coverup, any underhanded approach to news, nor is it any advocacy of hindering justice. But how much money, nationwide, has been spent on change-of-venue trials made necessary because of pre-trial publicity?

There is a fine line between the right to know and the need to know. Who is to

decide the difference between the two? Wher does editorizing stop and censoring begin?

Newspapers perform a service, an expensive one. There is a point in exploiting the exciting events that do happen because selling papers is what it is all about—to sell enough papers to pay to gather more news to sell more papers....

Maybe it is better to gush forth with, "The rapid condensation of moisture precipitated a steady downpour of one part hydrogen and two parts carbon dioxide lasting throughout the hours from a forbidding sunset to a lowering dawn" than it is to say, "It rained all night."

All I meant to do was to register a plea for greater exposure of the sensitive rather than the sensational.

I think it makes better news.

Two Cisco Nurses Relate Their Experiences Working In Israel

Teaching in a school of nursing for some two and a half months in the Gaza strip area of Israel was an interesting and rewarding experience for two Cisco registered nurses - Mrs. Fay Stephenson and Miss Betty Haight.

That was their report Sunday night to the congregation of the First Baptist Church as they spoke and displayed souvenirs of their trip as the evening worship service feature. They were

introduced by the Rev. Buddy Sipe, pastor.

The two Ciscoans left last July 10, paying their own way and expenses to fly to Gaza to provide vacation relief for regular staff instructors at the Baptist School of Nursing. They were recruited by the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The nursing school is located next to a 30-bed Anglican Hospital, Ahli Arab, and the student nurses work in the hospital to receive training. Most of the some 25 students are men. The Ciscoans were in charge of the freshman class of 14 and assisted with sophomores.

Gaza is a city of some 250,000 Arabs under Israel rule, the Ciscoans reported. A curfew is in effect at sundown each day. The city has no industry and shops stock farm produce and imported goods. There are no traffic lights. There are no movies or television and nobody goes out after dark.

Mrs. Stephenson reported that a siren sounds at 4:30 a.m. daily to call Moslems to

prayer. Sirens sound on the half hour until 8 a.m.

During their stay, the Ciscoans enjoyed a number of sight-seeing tours to points of interest in the Holy Land, visiting most countries except Syria and Jordan.

Both would like to return again next summer. They

were honored during a social hour following the service. They appeared in Arab costume for the program.

Both Mrs. Stephenson and Miss Haight are veteran nurses and work part-time at E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. Miss Haight is a retired U.S. Army nurse.
