"Theoretical, red and parlor bolshevists" are especial objects of the new campaign, it is pointed out by department of justice of-

Advocacy of sabotage or opposition to organized government by aliens is sufficient to bring them within the new law, authorities

Sabotage in this connection is construed by department of jus tice officials to mean "opposition to the administration of the gove

* Aliens who publish writings against organized government, even though the United States is excepted, are liable to deportation, un-

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 22.—Late this (Tuesday) afternoon the survey being made of last night's earthquake discloses an estimated damage of approximately \$100,000, with three-fourths of the damage at Inglewood.

LOS ANGELES, Calif., June 22.—A survey was made today of the damage done by the earthquake that shook this part of the Pacific coast country last night, which shows that at Inglewood, ten miles from here 21 business buildings were destroyed, the town is deprived of its lights and gas, and scores of dwellings were wrecked or seriously damaged.

Falling debris from damaged buildings injured many people at Inglewood, some of whom will die from injuries sustained.

The quake, so far is ascertainable at this hour, confined its fury to Los Angeles county.

Many people were injured here from various causes during the quake, and one person was killed by falling brick from a building that was demolished by the quake.


