Jarrod Jeffcoat completed a pass to Chambers for a first down, but the next pass was intercepted by Shelby Nixon who took it across on the next play for a TD. Hawks quarterback James Johnson passed to Nixon in the end zone to give them an 8-0 lead.

Dusty Petree took the kick-off and ran it back to the 45. A penalty brought it back to the 50 and the ball went over on downs and the Hawks took possession on their own 40.

Shelby Nixon completed a pass to Brent Evatt and a pack of Wolves reached for flags but could not hang on as Evatt romped 60 yards to make the score 14-0.

On the kick-off Abbott ran the ball to mid-field, but the Wolves could not get a drive going and the Hawks took possession.

Robert Mayberry took a pitch out from Johnson and carried the ball to the 10. Johnson passed to Nixon in the end zone for the TD and to Evatt for two points broadening their lead 22-0 at the half.

The Hawks were held to 12 points the second half. In four short plays from kickoff, the Hawks had moved to the five and Johnson on a quarterback keeper scored six more points to make the score 28-0.

The Wolves took the ball to the 30, but the Hawks got possession when the ball went over on downs. The Hawks carried back to the 15 and the Wolves held them. Wolf Abbott carried back to the 40 and Hawk Robert Mayberry intercepted. Johnson scampered to the two and Mayberry took it over for the last TD making the final score 34-0.

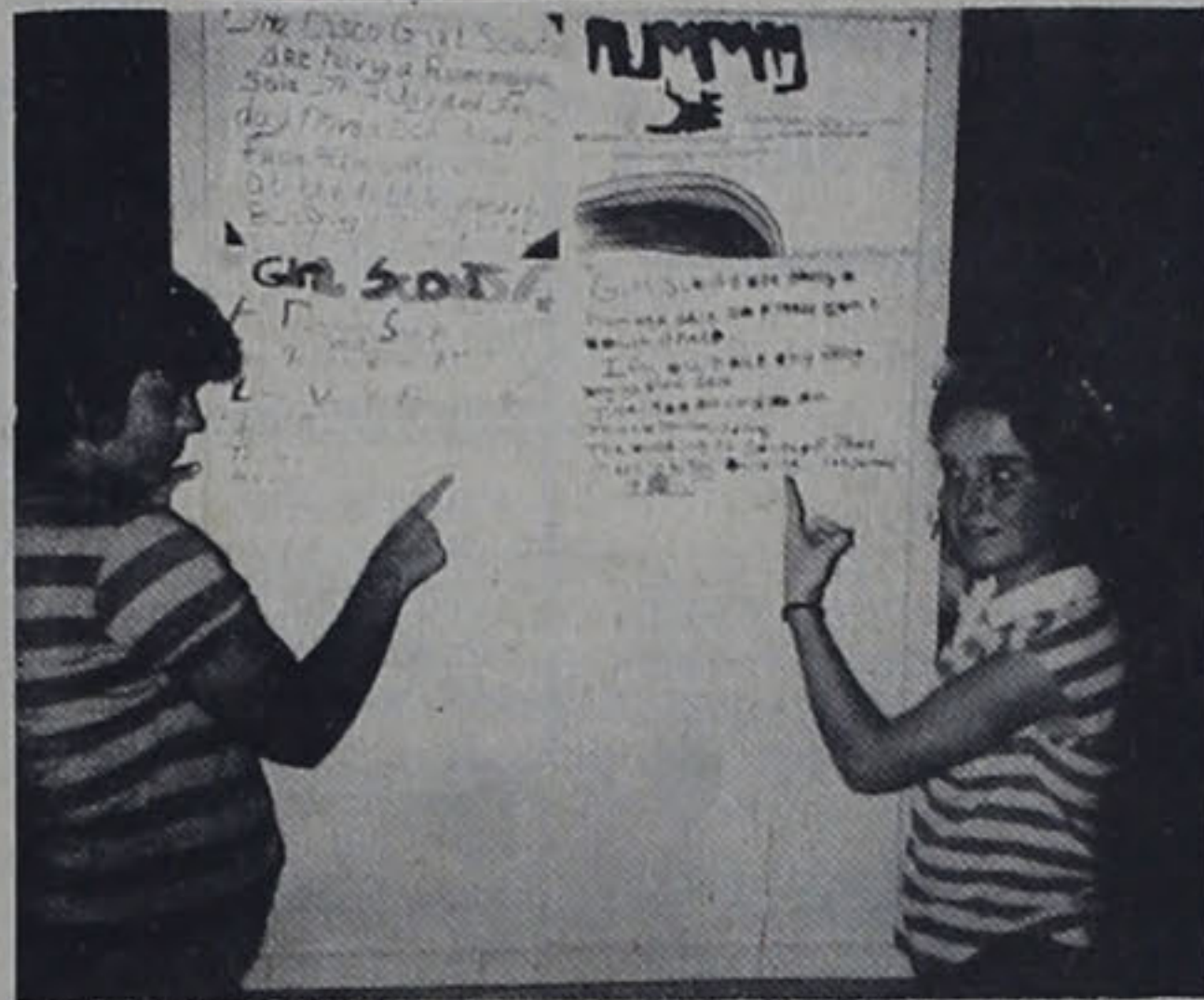

Turnovers Cost CJC Wranglers First Loss

Five interceptions and three fumbles, coupled with the running and passing of Quarterback Tod Weder, proved costly for the Cisco Junior College Wranglers Saturday at Chesley Field as they lost their first game of the season to No. 2 ranked Northeastern Oklahoma.

Led by free safety Scott Case's two interceptions and one fumble recovery, the NEO defense stymied the Wranglers in the first half and held them scoreless while the Golden Norsemen were rolling up 13 points.

The final margin was 35-20, but, despite the final score, the Wranglers did have their offensive moments. Coach Bill Anderson's squad went to the airways during the game and piled up 271 yards with Bill Bayless and John Farris each tossing one touchdown pass.

NEO, ranked most of the year in the National Junior College Athletic Association poll, will now face Kilgore Junior College, the No. 1 team, in the Garland Bowl in Garland, on Thanksgiving Day.

Weder completed four of nine passes for 149 yards against the Wrangler defense and aided the Norsemen's cause with 64 rushing yards. The 6-1, 170-pound freshman finishes the regular season with 283 yards rushing on 88 carries to go with his almost 800 yards passing.

NEO closes out the season 9-0 while the Wranglers finish 8-1, keeping them from having their first undefeated season in many years.

Farris and Bayless each worked well in the passing department, although Bayless suffered four of the interceptions. Bayless hit on nine of 19 attempts for 135 yards while Farris hit eight of 13 for 136 yards with only one interception.

The Wranglers used 11 receivers to work on the NEO defense, with Mike Harwerth and Wade Wilson each pulling in TD passes, one from Farris and one

from Bayless.

The Wranglers looked like they came to play in their opening series, taking the opening kickoff and marching from their own 32 to the NEO 19 before the first misque took place.

In the initial drive, CJC picked up four first downs, with the biggest gain coming on a 14-yard pass from Bayless to wide receiver Paul Chatman. Bayless was hit as the Wranglers faced a second and 12 and NEO defensive end Mike Reece found the handle on the loose ball.

CJC's defense denied the Norsemen a chance at the end zone until the 1:04 mark of the first quarter. This score came following Bayless' second interception, this one by strong safety Paul Smith at the Wrangler 49.

It took the Norsemen six plays to go the final 32 yards, with tailback Mike Cowart going the final four yards. Doug Furnas added the extra point for a 7-0 NEO lead.

The Wranglers again got rolling toward paydirt following the kickoff, but that drive again stalled and Ricky Nunn tried a 31-yard field goal, but it fell short.

The interception bug hit the Norsemen on their next series as they had marched all the way to the CJC 13 before Ronnie Hise picked off Weder's pass, only his second interception of the season.

However, four plays later, Farris completed a first down pass to Barrette Douglas, who was hit and coughed up the ball. Case was there and pulled in his first interception of the day. A three-yard gain by Cowart, followed by a delay of game penalty led to the next Norsemen score. It came on the third play of the series as Weder dropped back and hit Duane Gunn, who raced 52 yards for the TD. The PAT boot this time was wide and the Norsemen led 13-0 at the half.

Another fumble stopped the Wranglers on their first series of the second half as

Santa Claus - Friend or Foe

COLLEGE STATION -- Treat Santa Claus as the spirit of joy and giving, advises Diane Welch, a family life education specialist.

"Children will then probably place Santa beside their pleasant imaginary friends of childhood."

"Santa can help a child grasp abstract concepts, learn about fantasy and reality and develop a caring, sharing and giving nature," the specialist points out.

Mrs. Welch is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Parents greatly influence how their children react to Santa, she says.

"Some parents are concerned about honesty. They feel their child will see the Santa Claus myth as a form of deception."

"At the other end of the spectrum, some parents use Santa as a means of getting 'good' behavior from their children in exchange for promises of gifts."

"In between these two groups are parents that tolerate the myth but do not exploit it," Mrs. Welch explains.

These parents allow their children to exercise their fullest imaginations about Santa, participate in the excitement of preparing for Santa's arrival but encourage them to revise their understanding in terms of their age and maturity, she says.

For example, the preschool child is often fascinated by all the arrangements surrounding Christmas. They are anxious to take an active part in getting ready.

However, their sense of time is limited and they are continuously asking when Santa is to arrive.

Many parents are innovative in the way they use the "mark-off" techniques to give the child a sense of knowing how many days are yet to pass, the specialist suggests.

At five or six years of age, children are interested in the details and spirit of Christmas. This goes along with their interest in fantasy.

Although still involved with imagination about reindeer and a "fat man" that takes cookies, children ages five and six can better grasp an understanding of what Christmas is all about.

By ages seven and eight, a child probably knows about the reality of Santa but may want to continue the illusion of mystery and legend.

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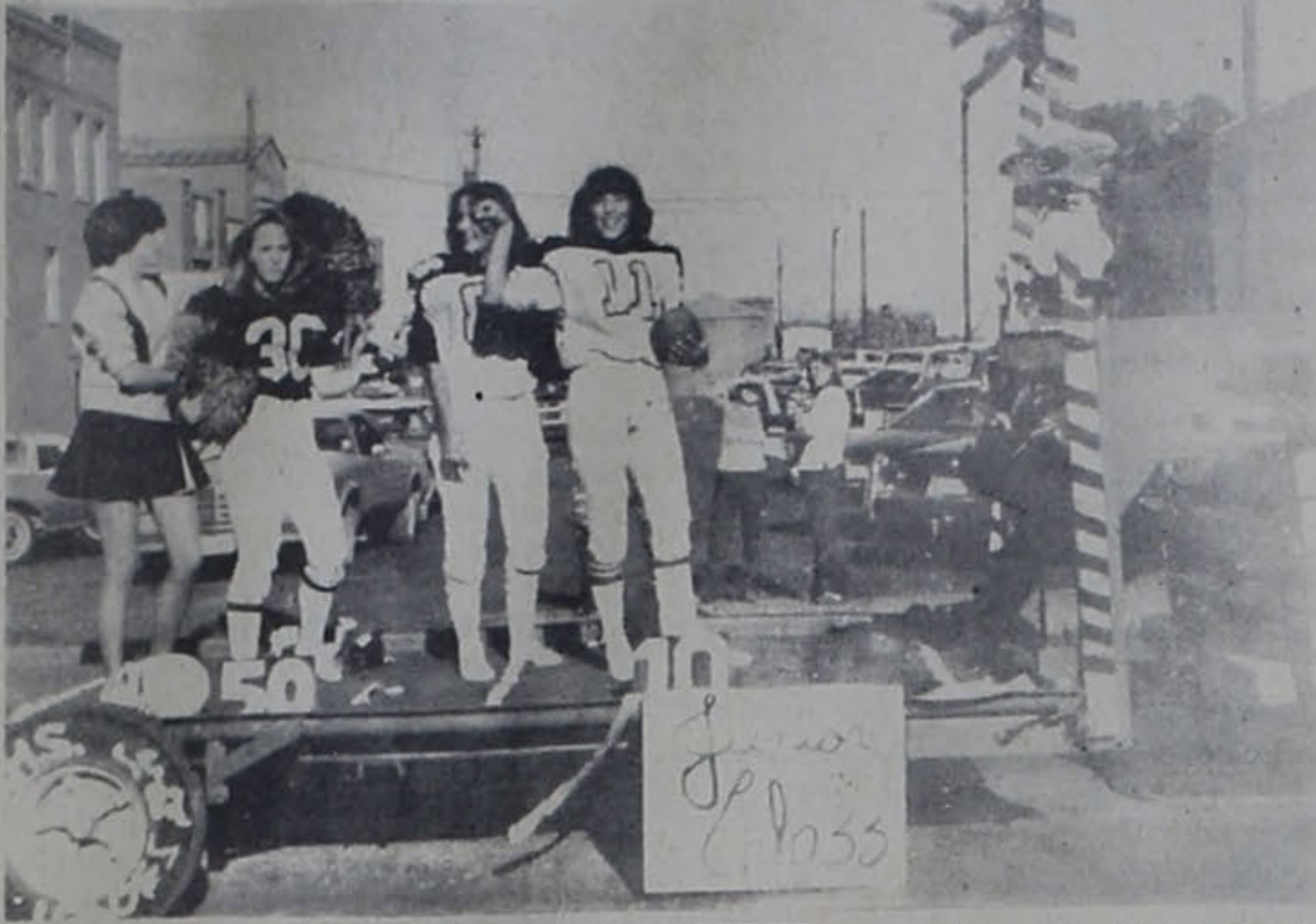

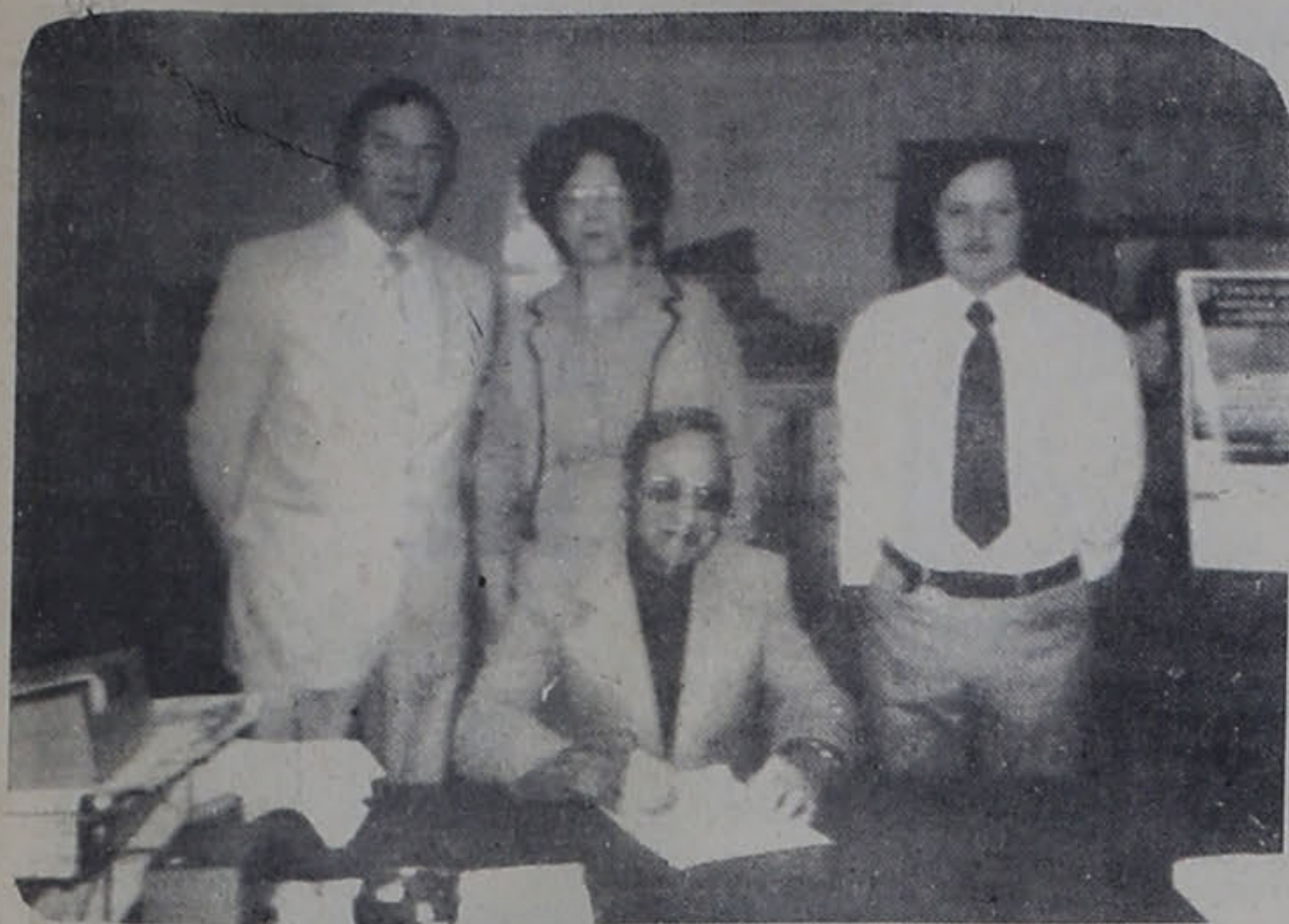

Man Short In Statue Large In Achievements

On a bright November afternoon O.C. (Stubby) Warden, Manager of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce since 1975, takes time in his office to discuss the town and his work. Warden, a small man with a big smile, glances at the sunlight beaming across Main Street. It is one of those Indian-summer days full of warm breezes and burnished oaks, and life seems good indeed.

Ranger people affectionately call their Chamber of Commerce Manager "Stubby", or "Coach", referring to his years as a football player and his work with the local teams. They realize he has a history of putting a lot of effort into a job, whether it concerns football, school administration, or keeping a town moving the right direction.

Anyone would be impressed at the good things which have happened to Ranger within the last few years. For the town, now governed under Mayor Jack Allen, has developed in a number of areas. Ranger Junior College has grown considerably, and an Elementary, Middle Grade, and a High School have been constructed. Parks have been improved, and the town has a new hospital. A Boy's Club building has been constructed, and a fine Senior Citizen's Program has been developed. The American Car Company and other businesses have expanded. Not bad at all for a town of 3,138 people.

"Friendly people," declares Warden. "You know our slogan - 'Never a Stranger in Ranger'."

"Now I praise the Chamber Board of Directors, and our concerned and dedicated members, for all the progress since I became Director. Fifteen citizens serve on this Board, and they really come up with some outstanding ideas. Jerry Edwards is President of the group, with Larry Stone as Vice President. Opal King is Secretary-Treasurer.

"The Chamber of Commerce was founded to promote the welfare of the Community, and we try to do that here. We work in several areas - community service, economic progress, and cultural growth. We work with all the Civic groups to make Ranger a better place to live.

"We support our FFA Chapter, especially at the Eastland County Livestock Show. We promote clean-up projects and 'Beautify Ranger' programs. Around Christmas time we have a Christmas Parade with Santa for the children. We furnish and put up the Christmas decorations, to make the town look festive.

"All during the year we try to find a place for newcomers to live, and give them any other help we can. We always support fundraising activities for organizations in our City, and promote trade for Ranger merchants.

"The Ranger Industrial Foundation promotes new business and industry for Ranger, and we work with them in every way. We also support various Educational and Athletic programs in the local schools and College. And I should mention our Public Relations work - we try to tell people the good things about Ranger every day.

"Right now one of our projects is to fix up the old Depot, which will house the Chamber of Commerce office and a Historical Museum. This will interest the whole area, and we are really looking forward to its completion."

As O.C. Warden discusses town projects his face lights up just as it does when he looks across the room at the picture of the Ranger Football team he coached to a State Championship in 1953. And no wonder, for Ranger has been a part of his life since he came here as a child, in 1927. He finished High School here, playing on the Football team, then went to Texas A. and M., where he received a Degree in Physical Education - and played on the Aggie Football team. Later he received a Master's Degree at Hardin Simmons.

During World War II he served in the Navy as an Officer, but more than 30 years of his life were spent as a Coach, Teacher, and Administrator in the Ranger School System. Upon retiring from the schools he became Manager of the Chamber of Commerce.

During these years O.C. Warden has received various honors, and they cover different facets of his life. First of all, he is a family man, Church-going, and a Deacon in the Baptist Church. He, his wife Juanita, and their two children were honored by the Abilene Reporter News as "Family of the Year" in 1954. He was chosen the FFA Honorary Chapter Farmer of the Year in 1978. He is currently serving as an officer on the Board of Directors for the Ranger Boy's Club of America, and is a member of the Lion's Club. He serves on the Board of the Industrial Foundation, and has served as a Counselor of the Boy Scouts of America. He has been a member of the American Legion for a number of years, and has helped this Organization in all ways possible.

So obviously there were plenty of reasons for the Ranger Chamber of Commerce to give O.C. Warden the treasured "Golden Deeds" Award, which he received in 1980.

When asked what Ranger has to offer prospective residents, Warden starts naming things like the friendliness of the people, the schools and college, and the interesting activities going on. Then he lists the good hunting, good fishing and other recreation nearby, and good golfing.

"I think we really have a

pretty location here, and we are near enough to Ft. Worth for all the shopping, without a person having to live in a City. With the Freeway nearby, we have easy access to almost anywhere.

"Our worst problem right now is the cost of housing and the lack of it. A number of people would like to come to Ranger immediately - if we could only find them a place to stay. Inflation and lack of materials has really slowed the construction of new housing.

"But we'll work together - try to find a solution. That's one thing I certainly like about this job - I enjoy meeting people." He pauses for a moment, looking back toward Main Street. "You can say that Ranger has really been good to me."

Dealing With Stress

Learn to deal with stress - it's a part of life that everyone encounters. No two people react to stress in the same way. One individual may break down and succumb to trauma and stress, while the same experience may leave another unaffected.

Learning to cope with stress helps cut down on the pressure it places on the mind and body. First, get enough sleep and rest. Lack of sleep can make you more irritable and lessen your ability to handle stressful situations. Next, schedule time for recreation to relax your mind. And try working off stress physically by walking, running, playing tennis, gardening or some other activity you enjoy.

Much Stress Can Be Avoided. Much of the stress we experience is self-imposed. Read on to see how families can reduce the tension created by unrealistic expectations.

Spend time and effort on goals that are worth fighting for and attainable, not on those impossible to reach. Realize that perfection does not exist. Strive for improvement, but attempts at real perfection can be frustrating and result in unnecessary stress. Learn to accept what you cannot change. If the problem is beyond your control at the time, try your best to accept it until you can change it. Although there are many chemicals including alcohol, that can mask stress symptoms, they do not help you adjust to the stress itself. The ability to handle stress comes from within, you, not from outside. When faced with a painful circumstance or change, do not put off action. Consider all of your alternatives and decide what action to take. The sooner dealt with, the sooner stress is overcome.

Dealing with Depression. One common reaction to a stressful situation is depression. Experts in the field tell us that depression can be normal. It is a natural reaction to stress, loss, the departure or the death of a loved one. In-law troubles, criticism of what you do, fear of losing your sex appeal, reactions to retire-

ment, plus many other situations also cause anxiety. Here are some suggestions for fighting depression:

1. Remember depression is normal.
2. Seek a friendly ear.
3. Try to isolate what bothers you.
4. Don't over-magnify the problem.
5. Don't knock yourself.
6. Don't use your age as an excuse for not fighting back.
7. Don't be afraid to turn to a trained counselor.

MID-WEST INDUSTRIES LOOK TO WEST TEXAS

Evaluation of an industrial prospecting tour to Detroit, Cleveland and Pittsburgh sponsored by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has indicated a strong interest by a number of midwest industrialists toward expansion to West Texas despite efforts of the Greater Cleveland Growth Association to thwart the effectiveness of the WTCC visit.

The main thrust of the West Texas visit was to impress upon industrial prospects in attendance the attributes of West Texas for future plant relocations and expansions.

West Texas representatives participating in the tour were met by members of the Greater Cleveland Growth Association, upon arrival in Cleveland, for the second of a series of three industrial briefing luncheons with area industrial representatives who responded to an invitation from the WTCC. Representatives of the Cleveland Organization were deeply concerned about the competition their area was receiving from West Texas and evidently

felt West Texas posed a threat to their future industrial growth.

WTCC tour officials were interviewed extensively by news media representing the Cleveland area as well as the Wall Street Journal. WTCC Executive Vice President, Ed Coltharp, was asked by one reporter if he was aware that the West Texas Chamber group had been labeled as "West Texas Raiders."

Bob Brummal of Lubbock, Chairman of the WTCC Private Enterprise Development Committee, which was responsible for organizing and conducting the promotional tour, reported that a total of 147 industry representatives attended the luncheons.

Brummal stated that of the six tours sponsored by West Texas beginning in 1975, more interest was shown by prospects than on any previous tour. "There is a very strong possibility for industrial moves to West Texas as a result of the 1980

tour," stated Brummal.

The WTCC has received word that a California-based industry has selected El Paso as location for a 300 employee operation directly as a result of the West Texas Industrial Tour to California last October. Several cities that participated on previous tours are working with additional industries that have

indicated definite interest in the West Texas area.

Towns represented on the recent tour included: Abilene, Amarillo, Austin, Bedford, Big Spring, Brownfield, El Paso, Euless, Fort Worth, Lubbock, Midland, Mineral Wells, Munday, Odessa, San Angelo, Waco, Weatherford and Wichita Falls.

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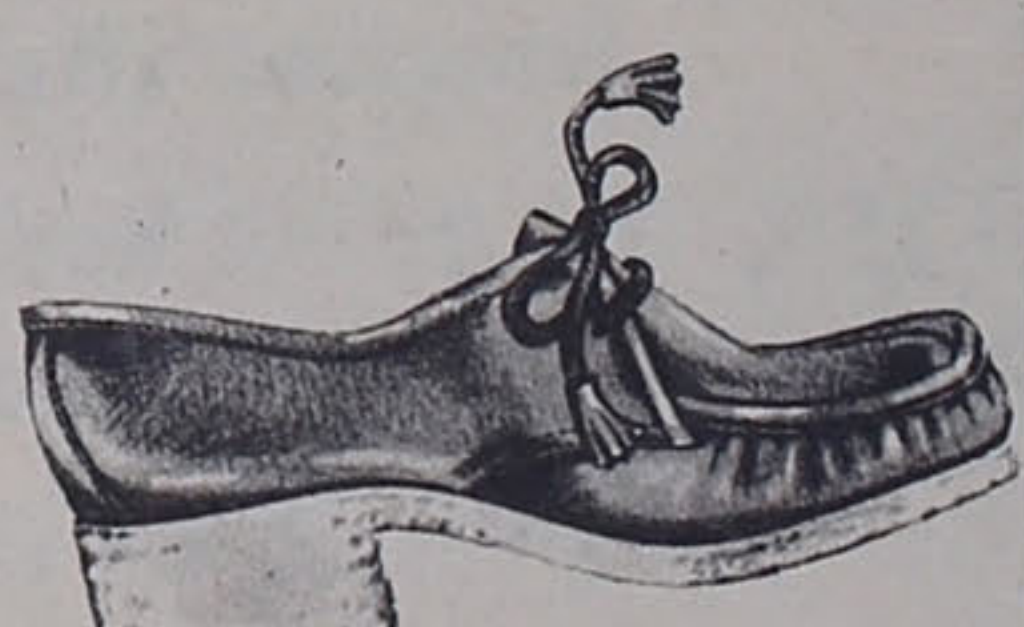
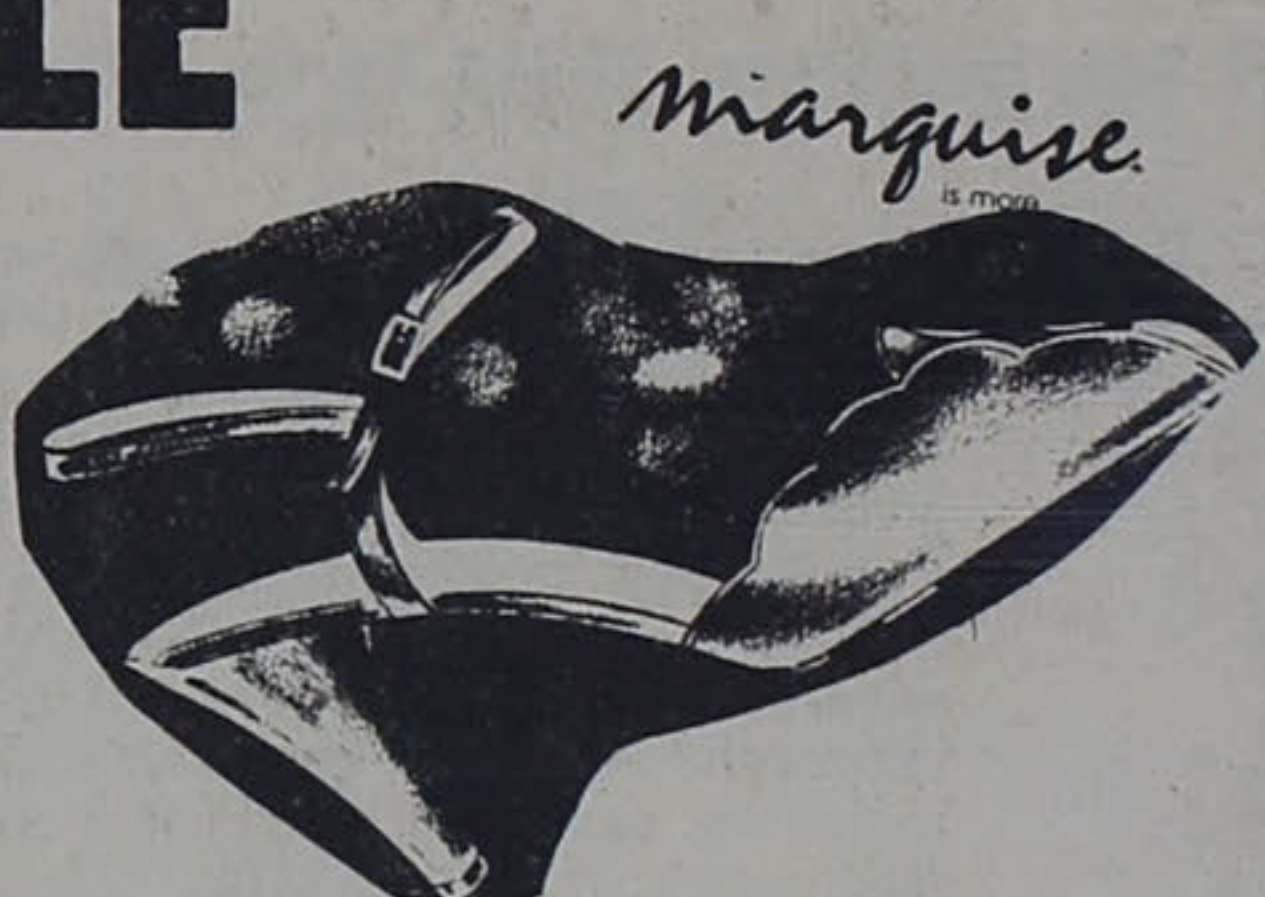
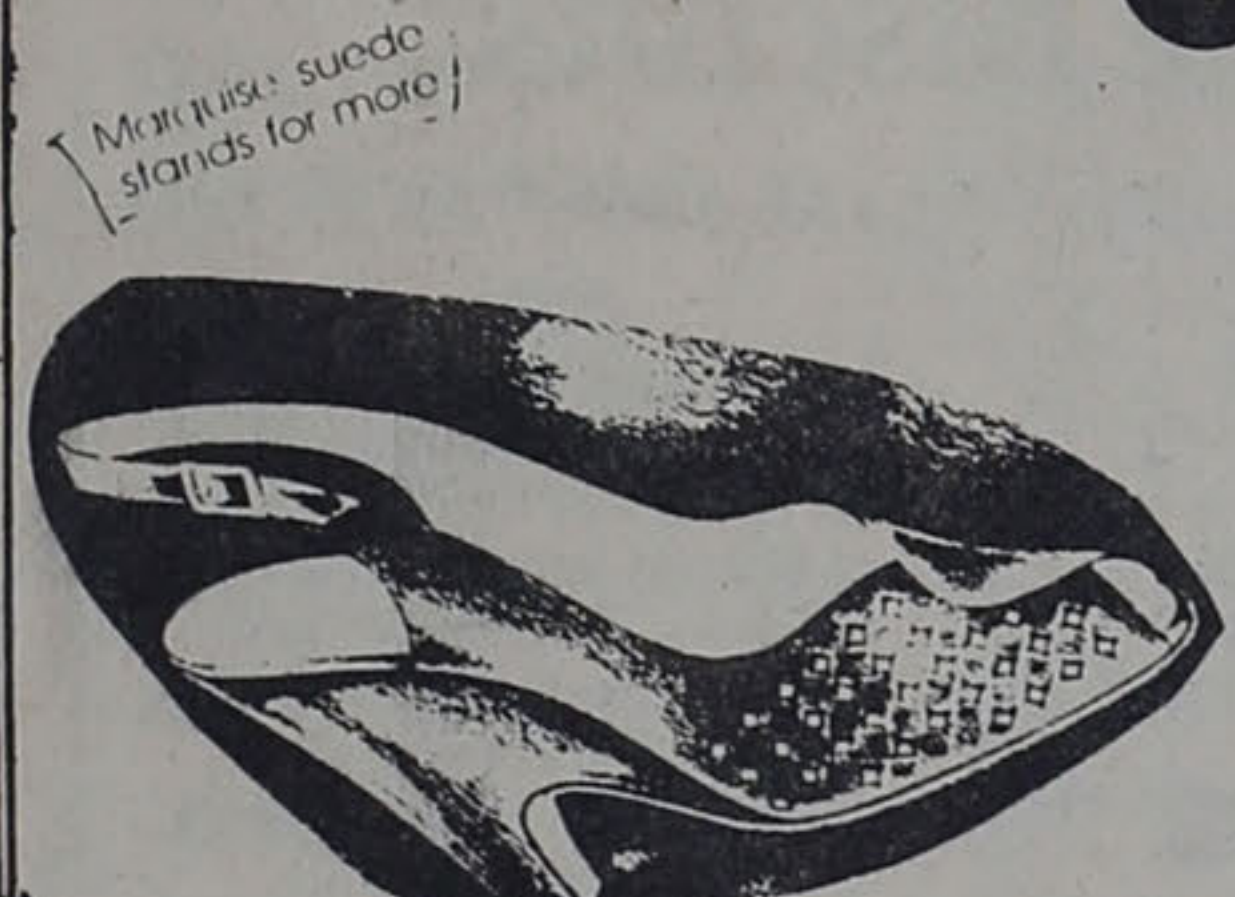
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IWU Reflections In Perspective

Now I am not a Francophile, nor even an authority on French history. I've studied it, though. And it would appear to me that the average Frenchman stopped his clock just prior to the Battle of Waterloo. He still lives under the impressions of France as 'The Empire of France'. That empire was never better than Number Two, even by the most charitable appraisals, but don't try to tell that to a Frenchman.

Perhaps being forced to accept the fact, even though not admitting it, that France is no longer an Empire of any big league significance lends to the air of belligerent arrogance one encounters now and then with the French. Don't get me wrong, now. I love and admire many of the French with whom I've associated, although I never fully trusted any of my best French friends in a business deal.

When the French language was generally replaced by English as the Diplomatic Language of the world, your man-on-the-street Frenchman got all out of joint. That meant accepting the uncontroversial fact that France was No. 2, at best. And the inbred hauteur of the French just will not allow him to public admit to being less than top banana in any league. Maybe it is a way of showing his resentment of the fact that except for a gross political miscalculation London would perhaps have been the capital of the Empire of the French, who knows?

There was a cable message on the desk one Thursday morning. 'Proceed Home soonest'. And that meant on the following day, as all U.S.-bound flights departed before the office was open. Frantic preparations for the morrow's departure went into full forward gear, and as I was boarding the flight next day I remembered that I was sorely in need of a haircut.

Not to worry. There is a very good barber shop in the transit lounge of the airport in Rome. Not to be. Although there were four chairs in that shop, its popularity must have been spread internationally. There was a long waiting line. Oh, well. Maybe Paris, which was the next stop where there would be something of a delay for re-fueling for the Atlantic crossing.

And there was indeed a barber shop in the transit lounge of the airport terminal in Paris. One chair, leaning against the back of which was about as supercilious a Frenchman as it has been my fate to meet. When asked if one could be served in his excellent establishment, Jean Pierre lifted his eyes from concentration on the polishing of his nails and questioned: "Does M'sieu have le appointment?"


Now it had been a short night prior to boarding the flight, and perhaps I was not just as bright as I should have been. But, somehow, that struck me as about the strangest response I'd ever had to a direct request for the services of a barber. In the transit lounge of an international airport terminal, accessible only to transit or departing passengers....."Does M'sieu have le appointment?" M'sieu was puzzled. Still is.

Landing at or around midnight in New York, after some ten hours' flight from Paris, and while awaiting the departure of a connecting flight I espied an all-night barber shop. Seven chairs, but only one red-haired barber who was far from as tall as the Frenchman. Explained the problem, and realised with considerable relief that I was on U.S. soil when he responded as he whipped out a fresh linen....."Mister, you can have anything this shop has to offer, so long as you have the money to pay for it". And he made with an infectious grin I remember to this day.

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

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Hints For The Aged & Handicapped

DEAR PAT—Can you tell me what the "Year of the Disabled" means? I occasionally come across an item that refers to it but the meaning has never been explained.—Y.M., Oklahoma

DEAR Y.—The United Nations has proclaimed 1981 as the International Year of the Disabled Persons, continuing its tradition of designating a year in which to focus world-wide attention on the needs and potential contribution of selected groups of people.

The U.S. Council for the International Year of the Disabled Persons was formed last year by individuals from the public and private sectors. It will promote participation by the 35 million Americans with disabilities, and will guide participating organizations in providing public understanding and support for reaching eight IYDP goals:

- * To expand access to education;
- * To provide greater opportunity for employment;
- * To improve access to housing, buildings, and transportation;
- * To provide broader recreation and social activities to integrate the disabled fully into community life;
- * To expand and strengthen rehabilitation programs and facilities;
- * To increase biomedical research aimed at conquering major disabling conditions;
- * To reduce the incidents of disability through accident and disease prevention;

* To increase the application of technology on behalf of persons with disabilities.

DEAR PAT—I know the weather has been hot; we are all in a hurry; we hate to walk any distance longer than we have to; and we all hate to look for parking places. BUT what if you had all this combined with the fact that when you did find a place, and park your car, you then found you couldn't open the door and get out.

I use a wheelchair and I have made it a point to seek out managers or owners of business' and tell them how much I appreciate the fact that they have provided special handicapped parking spaces.

I don't even get angry when there is not special parking places--what irritates me is when a business is nice enough to consider his disabled customers and adds special parking but all of the able-bodied fill them up as fast as they become vacant--by some other able-bodied who didn't want to park farther down an incline or by a curb, neither of which the disabled can negotiate. We need the extra width provided by the special parking places to open a car door as wide as it will go and then unload our equipment.

As a reminder to the able-bodied, the Architectural and Transportation Barriers Compliance Board, Washington, D.C. 20201 has reprinted (in 50 sheets to a pad) "You'll Do It Every Time" parking ticket. The cartoon ticket helps get the message across. The tickets are available free of charge from the ATBCB.--M.B. Missouri

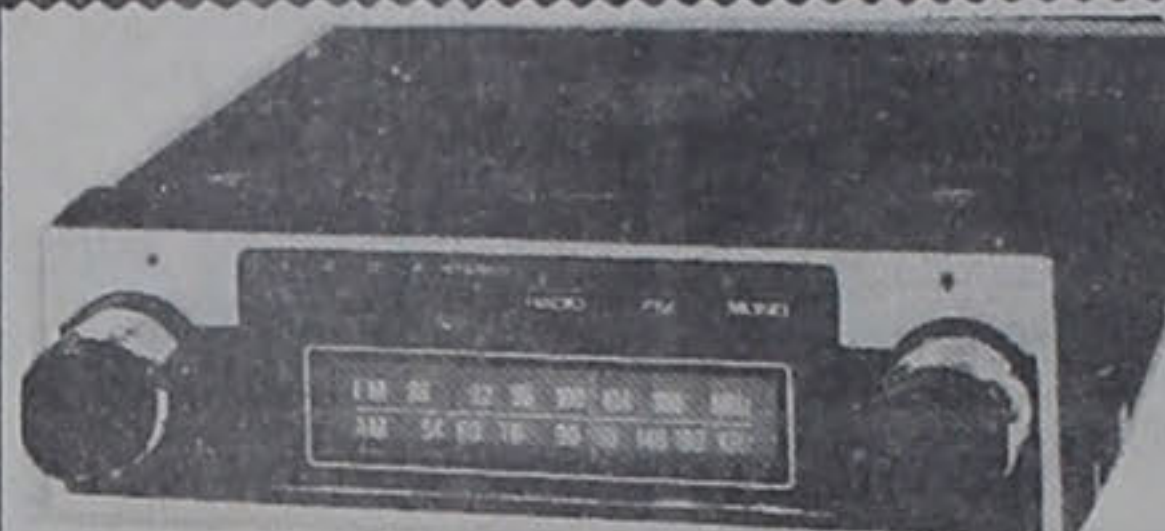

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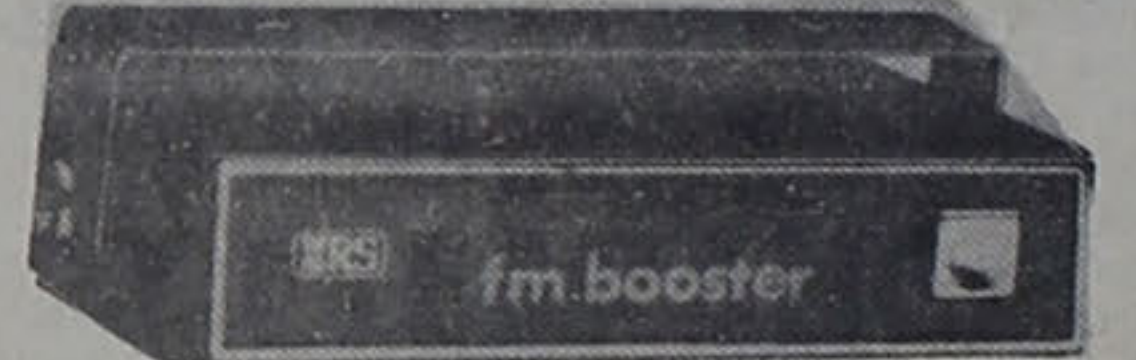
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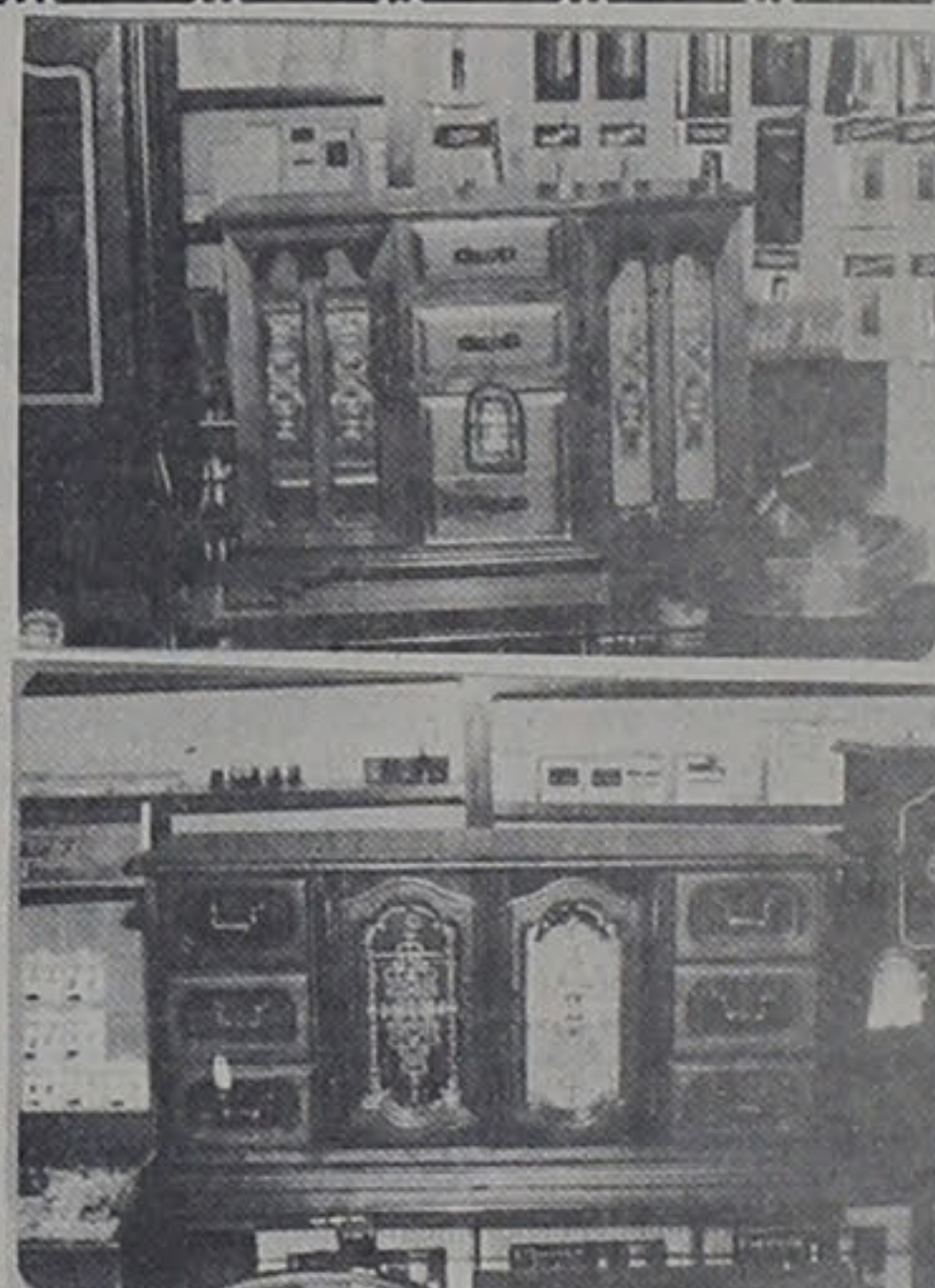


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Loboes Defeat Ranger 40-6 At C.H.S. Homecoming Game

The Loboes of Cisco High School delighted a homecoming crowd here Friday night as they defeated the Ranger Bulldogs 40-6 in a District 10-AA contest at Chesley Field.

With Friday night's win, the Loboes are now 4-2 in District play and 6-3 for the season. The Bulldogs of Ranger are 0-6 in District and 0-9 for the season.

In their final home game of the season, the Cisco Loboes scored once in the first quarter, three times in the second quarter, and once in each of the last two quarters. The Ranger Bulldogs scored once late in the third quarter.

Ranger Bulldog Joe Stewart took the opening kickoff from Cisco's Kenneth Preston at Ranger's 10-yard line and returned it to the 30 before being stopped by the Loboes. Ranger was unable to maintain a drive and Bulldog Barry Eddleman punted the ball to Lobo Chuck Cannistraci at Cisco's 42-yard line.

On Cisco's first possession of the ball, they moved it to Ranger's 11-yard line in seven plays with three first downs. Gary Speegle, Forrest Starr and Cannistraci were the ball carriers during the drive. Lobo quarterback Randall Rattan gave the next handoff to Starr who went around the left side of the line to score the touchdown. The extra point kick by Jimmy Elrod was good, giving the Loboes a 7-0 lead with 5:46 remaining in the first quarter.

Cisco scored again early in the second quarter, starting their drive just as the quarter began from Cisco's 38-yard line. Starr, Speegle, Brian Fleming and Robert Caraway all carried the ball for yardage during the drive and Lobo QB Rattan completed a short eight yard pass to Cannistraci. The Loboes moved the ball to the 32-yard line of Ranger in seven plays with two first downs. On third down with nine yards to go, QB Rattan gave a handoff to Starr who scampered 32 yards for the touchdown. Again the extra point kick by Elrod was good, making the score 14 to 0.

Ranger was forced to punt the ball on their next possession and Lobo Larry Adams received the kick from Bulldog Eddleman at Cisco's 42-yard line and ran it back to Ranger's 26 before being tackled by Eddleman and Jim Campbell.

Lobo QB Rattan gave two handoffs to Speegle, followed by a handoff to Starr who ran 27 yards for the touchdown. The extra point attempt was fouled by a bad snap from center, leaving the score 20-0.

The Bulldogs were again forced to punt on their next possession and Bulldog Eddleman's kick was fielded by Lobo Adams, this time at Cisco's 49-yard line and he returned it to the Ranger 27.

On Cisco's first play, the ball was fumbled on the snap

but Cisco recovered losing one yard on the play. A handoff from QB Rattan to Fleming got back five yards and a 22-yard pass to Cannistraci got the touchdown. The extra point kick by Elrod was good making the half-time score 27-0.

Cisco took the second half kickoff and began a drive from their own 35-yard line. Starr took the first handoff from QB Rattan and carried it 65 yards for a touchdown. The extra point kick by Elrod was good, making the score 34-0.

Ranger's only scoring drive started in the third quarter when Bulldog Eddleman recovered a Cisco fumble at Ranger's 47 yard line. Ranger quarterback Rickie Osborn utilized the running abilities of Hank Morgan, Powell Compton, Adam Lopez and himself to move the ball to Cisco's one-yard line in eleven plays with three first downs. A pass from QB Osborn to Lopez got the touchdown with 56 seconds left in the third quarter. The extra point kick attempt by Bulldog Darrel Fox was blocked by the Loboes, mak-

ing the score 34 to 6. Cisco's Preston recovered a Bulldog fumble on Ranger's next possession of the ball to set up their final scoring drive from the Loboes' 47-yard line. Starr, Fleming, Speegle and Caraway carried the ball during the drive's seven plays making two first downs. QB Rattan ran the ball into the end zone from 17 yards out for the touchdown. The extra point kick by Elrod was blocked by Ranger's Steve Herod to make the final score 40-6.

Albany Sponsors Art Exhibit

The works of Edward Kemeys, America's first animal sculptor and Joan Salvant, accomplished Texas artist will be on exhibit for the public Thursday November 13, 10:00 a.m.-4:00p.m. at the Albany Chamber of Commerce.

Kemeys is noted for his sculpture of the two lions which guard the entrance to Chicago's Art Institute and a larger cougar titled, 'The Still Hunt,' in New York's Central Park.

The majority of his life's work was left stored in and on loan to the Smithsonian Institution in Washington D.C. The collection consisted of examples of nearly all American wild animal species. With only a few minor adjustments made by Kemeys' descendants, the collection remained in the

Smithsonian for sixty-three years. Joan Salvant's watercolor series consists of paintings depicting the early buildings erected at the frontier posts in the latter half of the nineteenth century. In most instances her careful reconstructions are the only pictorial record of these sites.

Included in her frontier structures of Texas are: Fort McKavett, Fort Richardson, Fort McIntosh, Fort Brown, Fort Concho, Fort Lancaster, Fort Ringgold, Camp Mabry and Fort Griffin which is located near the present day town of Albany.

The art exhibit is being brought to Albany by McCloud Gallery of Eastland and The Galleries of San Angelo.

Farmers Are Eligible For Loans

Farmers in Eastland County are eligible to apply for emergency loans through the Farmers Home Administration for damage caused by drought and extreme temperatures.

Emergency loans are made to farmers to cover losses resulting from designated major disasters. In order to qualify, a farmer must have suffered production losses or physical losses to buildings or other structures. Crop production must be 20 percent or more below normal in order to qualify for loss loans.

Loan applicants must be unable to obtain sufficient credit from local commercial sources in order to qualify.

Farmers who sustained losses may apply for assistance at the local office which is located in the Eastland National Bank Building, Room 312, Eastland, Texas.

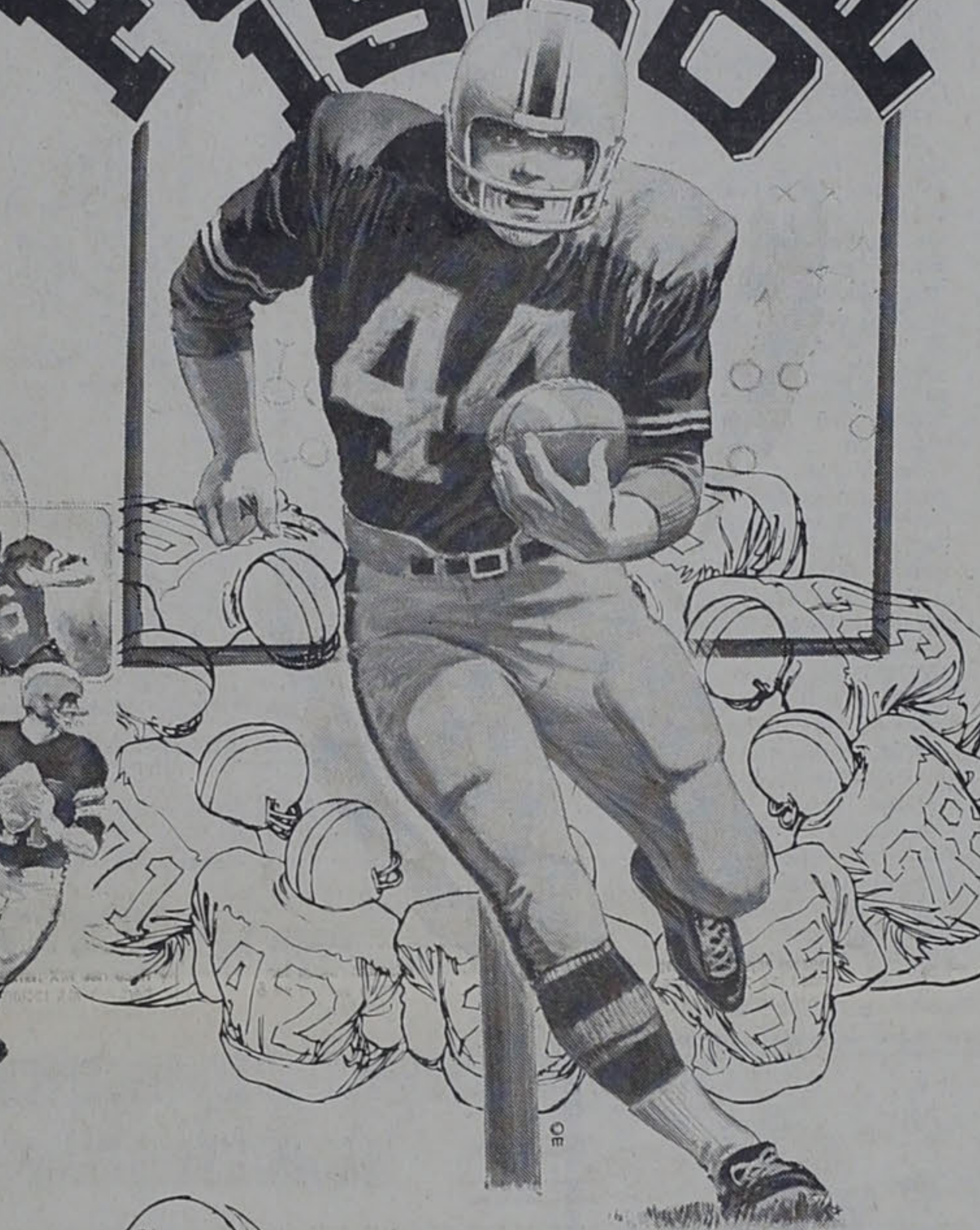

Dan enjoyed driving the Model T around town Sunday. Top speed is about 25 miles per hour, so it takes about an hour to make the trip between Cisco and Ranger.

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
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
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
