#### EASTLAND COUNTY SCHOOLS ALLOTTED \$30,000; REPORT

Reports from the county school superintendent, B. E. McGlamery, states that the state apportionment to Eastland county schools in the neat sum of \$30,000. Of this sum \$12,000 will be in transportation aid, and \$4,000 for high school student transfers.
