SANTA PARADE DRAWS THOUSANDS SAT. **Treasury Department Hunts "Leak" of Gold Price News**



WASHINGTON, D. C. Dec. 9 -Treasury offiicals have started an investigation, it was learned today, into alleged "leaks" of the government's daily domestic gold price which have given foreign exchange traders and speculators opportunity to gather large profits.

Although the treasury announces its domestic gold buying price at 9:45 a. m. daily to the press, complaints have been received by treasury officials that the price is available in London several minutes before its release to the press in Washington.

Last week, one news service reported the gold price was cabled back to New York from London eight minutes before its release in Washington.

Another service reported yesterday that the price was available in London four minutes before it was received by cable from Washington, although the cable transmission took less than one minute.

Treasury officials in continuing their investigation into the source of the alleged "leaks" said today that Washington is the only place at which the price is announced. Several tests are known to have been made by treasury officials in effort to discover the source of the alleged leak but so far no evidence has been uncovered

WITT TO MAKE **RACE IN 1934** FOR GOVERNOR

WACO, Dec. 10 - Edgar Witt, lieutenant governor of Texas, today announced himself a candidate for governor at the democratic primary elections next summer.

Witt in his announcement said he believed the question of repeal of state prohibition should be submitted to voters at the earliest possible moment.

"In the event of the repeal of state prohibition, I should advocate such regulation of liquor selling as will prevent a return of the saloon and bring about the extermination of the bootlegger and require that the sale of liquor be conducted under such regulations as will promote temperance and bring the traffic in its every phase into the open," Witt said

"I believe that my experience and ability have qualified me to discharge the duties and responsibilites of the office of governor of my native state," his announcement said, "and I announce my candidacy and pledge the people that, if elected, will discharge the duties of the office fairly to all persons and to all viewpoints with the sole purpose alvays to serve the best interests of the whole people.

EVENT CLOSES XMAS TRADES PROGRAM HERE


Cisco was full to the ears and running over yesterday as old Santa Claus came to town astride a snowy float drawn by an automobile en-veloped in the white of the Christmas season.

SOCIAL LEGISLATION

This year one or more states have inaugurated a system of old-age pensions. About 15 have, to now, ratified the national child labor amendment. A few are experimenting with forms of employment insurance through favoring cooperative efforts. Texas and many others maintain forms of workmen's compensation insurance, state supervised and required as a minimum protection.

Texas, in having extended its confederate pension to a broadening group of old widows, has made a start toward general old-age pensioning, through restricting it to a particular class. We are told now that legislation of the next few years will be predominantly of a social nature. Many phases await consideration-housing, state aid toward acquiring homes or farms, some of the various types of social insurance; health and sanitation, favorable laws towards various forms of group or co-oerative endeavor and enterprise. With very meagre exceptions, the whole field remains for Texas exploration and experiment.

INSURED FARM PLAN

The government, in subsistence homestead projects will require a form of insurance of success, in that homesteads will be established only for persons, and in places where parttime industrial employment is available. This will sharply limit the number of families returned to the farm by this program, but probably will do much to build prestige upon which the subsistence farm plan may be broadened.

WASTE IN DUPLICATION

Teacher convention speakers at Austin said schools could be run full terms in some communities, rather than parttime, on the tax money wasted in duplicate city and county machinery for assessment and collection of taxes, and similar identical functions. That waste has been so apparent that Texas voters authorized counties to proceed to stop it. Every county in the state-small ones by simple legislative permission; large ones without it-may now write home rule charters, one provision of which is to eliminate all duplication between city and county government units of essential services.

STUDY IN PSYCHOLOGY

Sen. Tom Connally of Texas and others who conducted the investigation of the Huey Long machinations in Louisiana have had an excellent chance to study psychology. Strange psychology at that. The mental processes by which a people are mesmerized; the mental attitudes toward freedom or demogoguery; reactions to blatant arrogance, all these should make a fascinating study in the presence of one of the most astounding freaks with which fantastic human nature has amused herself.

Lubbock Takes 26-12 Struggle With Cisco
