

Farm Organization Sees 15-Acre Cotton Allotments If Present Bills Are Approved

Texas cotton allotments may eventually slide to 15 acres, the farmer, warns Texas Farm Bureau, if either of two pending cotton bills is passed.

Accordingly, TFB has taken to the stamp to issue a grim warning, offering as an alternative its own cotton program.

Ed McKay of the state Bureau office, was in Muleshoe this past week, making speeches and explaining the Bureau views on cotton legislation. He spoke at both Rotary and Lions Clubs this week, outlining both his organization's views and those of two pending bills.

Said McKay: "Authors of both alternatives seem reconciled to the idea that domestically-produced cotton will continue to lose market at home and abroad to synthetics and foreign cotton."

"Farm Bureau believes that cotton can retain its present markets and, with aggressive salesmanship, increase its proportionate share of the world's expanding demand for fiber."

In general, the alternative plans have the backing of the Administration and the Secretary of Agriculture.

Briefly the programs which

McKay admits, "probably have a better chance of getting congressional approval than has the Farm Bureau plan," have only four or five points.

Plan A. has been analyzed as follows:

1. Continuation of the present cotton program must take into consideration the expressed and implied intention of the authors and administrators. Inherent in continuation of the present program are the following steps:

A. Continued reductions in price support with corresponding increases in direct pay-

ments until, at some level, all producers are forced to comply with their domestic allotment.

B. Reduction of domestic allotments to the point where total production is equal to the amount of cotton consumed domestically plus anticipated export needs, minus a reasonable reduction in surplus stocks. This goal could be reached with production from 10 million acre or less if cotton continues to lose domestic and export markets.

C. Gradual termination of release and reappointment provisions. D. Limitation of

payments to individual producers. E. Allotments based on bales or pounds."

The alternative program proposed in congress has been summarized by The Farm Bureau as possible: "This program has the same goals as the first alternative. However, the supporters of this program would skip all intermediate steps and go directly to a program which would: A. Reduce total production to the level necessary to supply domestic needs, plus anticipated export demand, minus a reduction in surplus stock.

"B. Base allotments on pounds or bales. C. Pay producers the difference between some computed world market price and some price decided on as fair to producers. This would be a direct payment out of the federal treasury. D. Eliminate release and reappointment.

"Supporters of this program say there would be no limitation on payments to producers. However, as producers of other commodities also receive payments, there will be a point where the total cost will be so great that congress will be forced to limit payments."

The program which Farm Bureau is offered for the cotton farmer is a 10 - point program which the Bureau claims would re-establish America's world trade movement, adding "qualified salesmen" to sell cotton abroad.

Here are the 10 main points, as pointed out by McKay:

1. Continuation of the present 16 - million - acre national allotment with increases as justified by market growth . . . with increases as justified by market growth is an absolute necessity

for cotton's future . . .

2. Termination of present provisions for the domestic allotment plan, direct payments to producers, and export acreage.
3. Continuation of export subsidies as necessary to maintain adequate export markets.
4. Tariffs to prevent unfair competition from imports of cotton textiles . . . the tariff commission should provide an avenue of relief for those industries which are injured . . . by expanded imports . . .
5. Intensified research to reduce the cost of producing cotton. (See COTTON Page 3)

Board Re-Elects 82 Classroom Teachers, Draws Ballot Order; Boost Due in Local Assessment

Muleshoe school board has re-elected 82 classroom teachers for next year, two others retiring because of age and another two resigning to take places elsewhere, Neal Dillman, superintendent of schools announced Saturday.

The board also drew the ballot order for the April 3 school board election, and approved a number of adoptions of state textbooks.

Order in which the four candidates' names will appear on the ballot is as follows: John Smith, Ralph Douglas, R. A. Bradley and V. L. "Vic" Benedict. Smith and Douglas are incumbents.

The board also spent considerable time studying the local fund assessment from the state minimum foundation program for the school year 1965 - 66 and came up with the decision that Muleshoe school district's "local fund assignment will increase by \$17,200 for the year 1965 - 66." 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Sanderlins On Eight-Day Trip

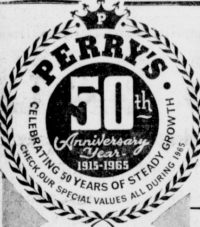
Dr. and Mrs. B. E. Sanderlin left Friday morning for an eight-day trip on which the doctor will attend medical courses at schools of medicine.

6. That Commodity Credit Corporation stocks not be released at less than 115 percent of the loan rate plus carrying charges.

7. That producers be provided an opportunity to release their entire allotment permanently in exchange for a retirement payment equal to eight cents per pound, times normal yield annually for a period of three years. (Farm Bureau claims this provision will do two things: Reduce production in three years and thereafter will continue to keep production at levels to prevent further accumulation. This provision coupled with recommended voluntary cropland retirement program, will allow market prices to operate over and above support prices.

8. Continuation of present acreage release and reapportionment provisions.

9. Elimination of domestic equalization payments by annual reductions of two cents per pound in the 1965 and 1966 marketing years and termination of such payments in 1967.

10. A national price support level of 29 cents (Basis M-1 inch) for 1967; 28 cents for 1966; 27 cents for 1967, and a level equal to 90 percent of the average market price received by farmers during the immediate preceding three years for 1968 and subsequent years. . . .

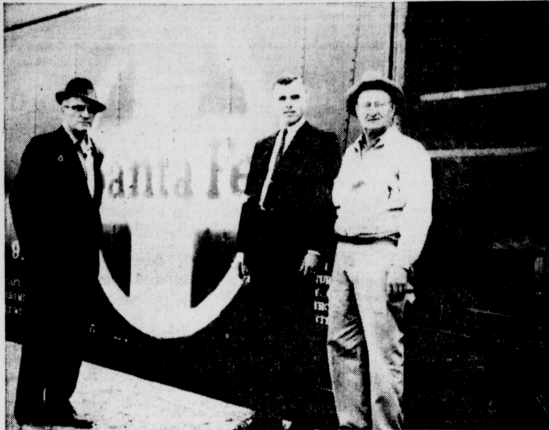
