HUGE "BUILD TEXAS" PROJECT ON THE WAY.

There is another huge "Build Texas project on the way. Contract for building the Hamilton power dam has been warded. It will cost \$3,500,000. It will be finished in 23 months. Five hundred men will be put to work immediately. More than \$1,500,000 has been spent acquiring site and land, building a railroad line and power lines to it. When completed, installation of machinery and equipment costs will make the project an investment of \$5,000,000. A staff of engineers and supervisors will move in. Workmen numbering up to 800 at peaktime will be employed during the working period. It said the rail line will open within 15 days. Power output is already under contract. An airport has been cleared at the dam site for use of officials.

This dam will be the first of a series of five power dams and one small reservoir dam. All the land for the overflow has been purchased. By the time the dam is half completed it will begin storing the water. The lake will be 137 feet deep in the stream bed, five to eight miles in average width and 30 miles long. It will cover 50 miles of the stream bed.

As for the Hamilton dam it will be 9000 feet or over 13/4 miles long. It will have a maximum height above the river bed of 137 feet. In its construction 14,000 cubic yards of concrete will be used. This will require 160,000 barrels of cement. A total of 3,727,000 pounds of reinforcing steel will

This is the sixth dam to be built in Texas by Emery, Peck and Rockwood development company. A separate contract will be awarded as the Hamilton dam and power houses are completed for the installation of turbines and generators with a capacity of producing 30,000 horse power of electric energy. Originally the building of two ships, the R. 101 and R. 100, was sanctioned largely to ensure that the failure of one ship should not end the experiment. What was not foreseen, of course, was a disaster of such magnitude, involving incalculable losses in personnel as well as material. The disaster to R. 101 has left many great gaps in Britain's airship men.

The R. 100 has flown successfully to Canada and back, enduring bad weather and making the quickest airship journey on record across the

At the present time R. 100 requires complete overhaul and refitting. This work will cost, according to competent estimates, nearly \$500,000, and would require about 12 months. 




