

Satisfaction Demanded For Slaying of Japanese

SHANGHAI, Nov. 10 (Sunday) (P)-Nearly 2,000 Japanese marines marched into demilitarized sections of Shanghai today after assassination of one of their comrades, and a "showdown" in the critical Sino-Japanese relations appeared at hand.

Bayonets fixed, the batallian was mobilized from three Japanese warships in the harbor and hurriedly sent into the native quarters where the slaying occurred. They appeared prepared to enforce a threat by the Japanese embassy of drastic action unless satisfaction is quickly forthcoming.

The marine, Hideo Nakayama, was shot through the back of the neck. The Chinese were panicstricken as the Japanese marched through the streets.

Several suspects were reported to have been arrested.

The Japanese embassy demanded the immediate apprehension of the killer, threatening drastic action.

The situation resembled the tense days of the 1933 hostilities. The Japanese asserted that the shooting was unprovoked, and said "it was hoped the Chinese authorities will make an effort to dispel the dark clouds that are seeming to hover Sino-Japanese relations.

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



DUT the overturning of the act will do serious harm to the principles of the New Deal through which it is hoped to bring about a new order of things in the country. In combination with other New Deal fatalities it will have a tendency to strengthen the position of the antagonists and to weaken confidence of the public in the rightness of the program and the ability of the administration to provide the remedies it promises.

MOLDING companies may be practical and economical in their proper relationship to operating companies for which they are designed to provide the financing. But the fact has been uncovered that these companies, in the hands of shrewd men, form the opportunity for a small, compact group to control the resources of thousands of investors, and by certain manipulations to make them a medium for drawing large tribute to themselves. Moreover, as a means for concealing rate inequities they are conveniently beyond the reach of state authority.

THE holding company idea is a good one; but practice as proved the necessity of effective federal regulation to eliminate the abuses to which the system has been put.

IF the present holding company law is stricken down and no effective substitute provided, the administration at Washington will have suffered a worse defeat than the mere outlawing of its bill. It will have sufand have established more firmly than ever the practices it seeks to eliminate.





New Policy for Fish Hatcheries Is Undertaken

AUSTIN, Nov. 9.—All nine state ment fish hatchery superintendents were called Thursday to the office of the Game, Fish and Oyster commission by Executive Secretary W. J. Tucker and formally placed under the direction of Dr. A. H. Wiebe, who outlined a program for stepping up production of fish.

The entire field of fish culture was gone over by Tucker and Dr Wiebe, who already had done some preliminary work at the hatcheries and was familiar with conditions Policies Changed

In line with a policy announced at a former meeting of the commission, a new method of fish distribution was explained. The policy of stocking and restocking private waters is to be abandoned on the theory that the fish once supplied by the hatcheries are intended as brood stock and not to meet all the demands of fishermen. It is believed that when a lake is once stocked, with occasional exceptions, it will be self-

The food supply varies with the body of water and it has been pointed out that the abundance of fish is in direct ratio to the value of the land of the surrounding country and the food elements that are washed in from the drain-

Vegetation Control

The problem of controlling an excess of vegetation in the hatchery ponds was discussed with the recommendation by Dr. Wiebe of certain remedies. One of the evils of too much vegetation is that in the later summer there is an excess of decomposition with the production of carbon dioxide and its twin sister, a depletion of dissolved oxygen in the water.
