Pirates, Indians, Spee - Lunkers Found In The Magic Of Six Flags

Hundreds of families flocked to the newly reopened tourist attraction in Texas last weekend, as members of the staffs of Texas' newspapers and their families were special guests of Six Flags Over Texas during Press Weekend.

In the group of visitors were many of the families of The Press in Cisco, the Eastland Telegram, and Ranger Times.

Pleasant weather prevailed Sunday, and the happy, holiday mood was apparent everywhere as parents leisurely pushed baby strollers, children in Easter finery thronged the streets and concession stands with expressions of awe and anticipation, while squeals of delight were heard on every hand as both parents and children took to the air in the variety of exciting rides offered throughout the 115-acre park.

With the emphasis centered on historical values and landscaping, more than half a million dollars has been expended on Six Flags Over Texas for the 1965 season.

Other attractions added this year include "El Sombro," a new ride in the Mexican Section, and an aviary containing approximately 100 of the most exotic birds found anywhere on the globe in the Animal Kingdom. A rare and interesting collection of branding irons from many of the most legendary ranches in Texas and the Southwest are displayed in the Texas Section.

For budding deputy sheriffs "J. Bean's Shootin' Irons," an indoor range, has been built just across from Judge Roy Bean's court.

The lighting at Six Flags after dark has always been a conversation piece, and the efforts of lighting engineers this year has produced added dramatic visual effects.

Guest surveys taken at Six Flags indicate that visitors are of the opinion that no other tourist attraction in Texas offers so much for so little, and for family entertainment the one price ticket policy is a boon, in that no more money can be spent, once in the park, except for food or souvenirs.

By-gone days have come to life for thousands of children where five years ago cattle grazed on a dairy farm and a dream was born in the mind of Angus G. Wynne, Jr. of Dallas for an amusement park at that site. Today that dream has come true in every respect.

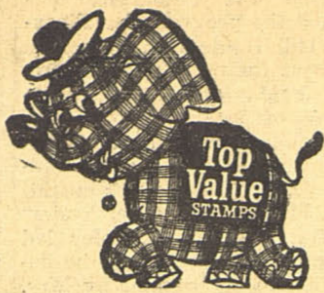

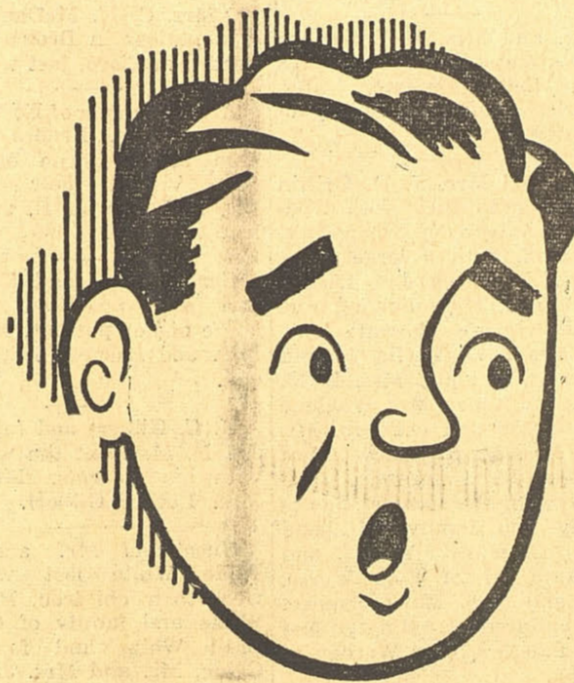

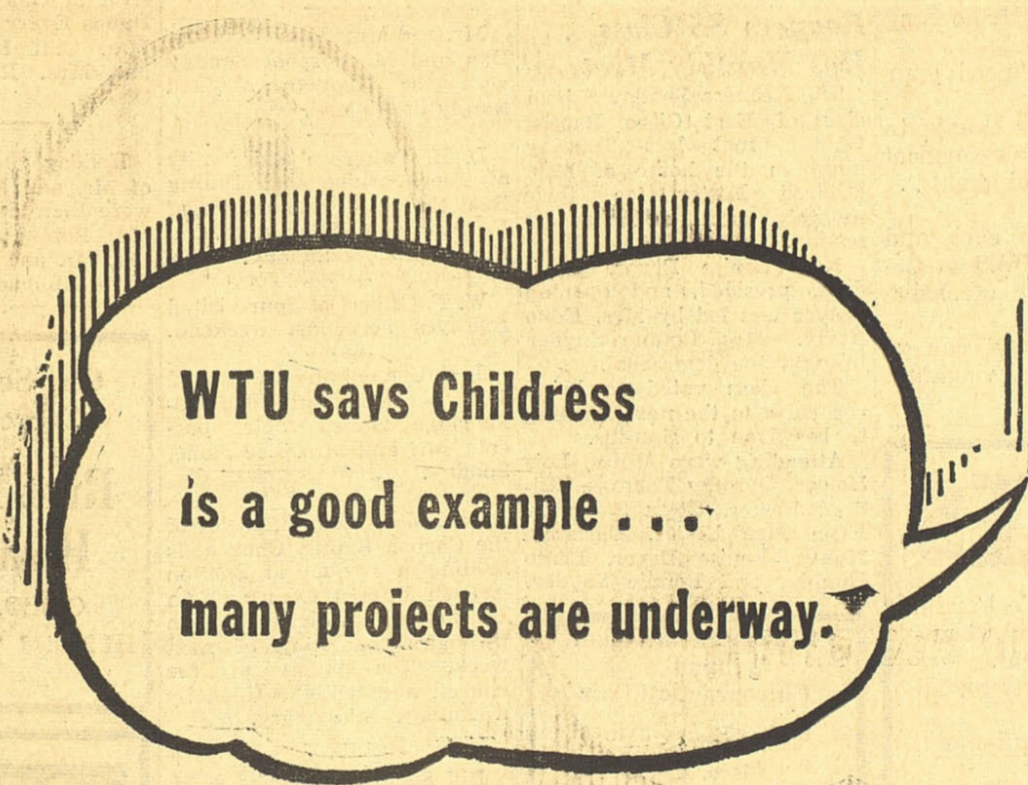

In connection with neighboring towns, there is a \$6 million dam and reservoir starting soon . . . under construction a \$4 million pipeline from the water supply to the city . . . and a pipeline system in the city. Add such things as a remodeled City Auditorium with convention facilities . . . vapor lamp street lighting downtown and on highways through town . . . remodeled Chamber of Commerce offices . . . over \$400,000 in Church construction . . . new lounge at the Airport . . . and modernizing of many business buildings. Scheduled for the immediate future are a school bond election . . . expansion of State buildings . . . and a new hospital.
