Ciscoans On Trial In Drug Sale Case

Three Ciscoans were on trial this week in U.S. District Judge Hal Woodward's federal court at Abilene on charges related to their arrest last October after a long investigation of alleged drug possession and sales.

The Ciscoans were Bobby E. Maynard, 35; Johnnie E. Hargrave, 28, and Dennis B. Cotten, 30, all under indictment for conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute methamphetamine. The Maynard indictment alleged three additional charges - manufacturing and two counts of possession of methamphetamine.

Attorney Ben Sudderth of Comanche, representing Maynard and Hargrave, filed a motion Monday as the trial opened to attack validity of a search warrant regarding evidence in the case. He said the search warrant described one place and that another was searched. Ed Paynter, Abilene attorney, was representing Cotten.

A jury of nine women and three men was impaneled Monday to try the case. Judge Woodward recessed the trial until Tuesday after the Sudderth motion was filed.

Two other men, Robert J. Brotherton, Jr., 22, of Putnam, and James C. Cosby, 29, Cisco, pleaded guilty on October 16 on charges filed against them in the same in-

vestigation. Brotherton was sentenced Monday to three years on probation.

District Attorney Emory Walton of the 91st District Court, Eastland County, reported Tuesday that pre-trial hearings have been set for Friday, December 5, before Judge Jim Wright on charges against Hargrave and Maynard filed in the state court.

Hargrave is free under \$5,000 on charges of marijuana possession and Maynard is free under \$25,000 bond on charges filed after officers raided his home and recovered stolen goods.

The 91st Court also has set a pre-trial hearing for December 5 for Roland Owens of Cisco who was indicted for failure to stop and render aid in a pickup-motorcycle accident here last October. He is free under \$5,000 bond.

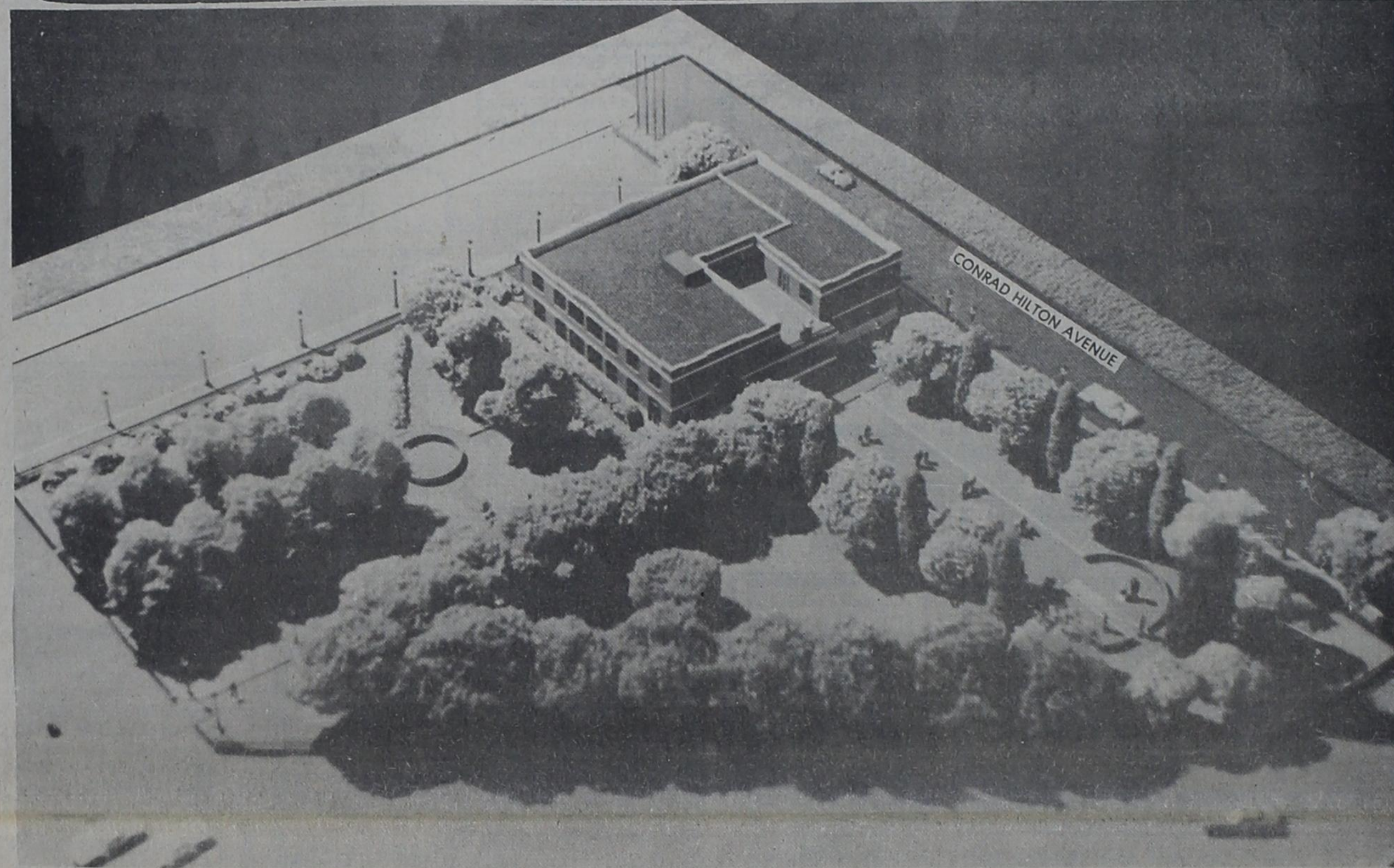

Historical Commission Nominates Hilton Hotel To National Register

On Saturday, November 8, the Texas Historical Commission in Austin unanimously nominated the First Hilton Hotel, Cisco, Texas, to the National Register of Historic Buildings, as a Place of Importance to the History of Commerce and Industry in America.

The hotel, which was built

in 1916 by Mr. Mobley, was purchased in June 1919 by the 32 year old banker, Mr. Conrad Nicholson Hilton, and was resold in 1929, after having been leased for four years. By that time the Hilton Hotel Company owned or managed 15 hotels.

In this First Hilton Hotel in Cisco, in July 1919, Mr.

The First Hilton Hotel "The Mobley" now belongs to the University of Houston Foundation and has been designated to be the

Memorial Museum to Mr. Conrad N. Hilton.

Dr. Rinaldo Petrini di Monforte of Petrini di Associates of Houston & Rome, which is the firm responsible for the restoration and total design of the project, made a presentation Tuesday night for the information of the citizens of Cisco and the Cisco

Historical Society, of the "finished product," showing perspectives and renderings of the interiors of the Museum, and the landscape design for the adjacent "Hospitality Park," a park dedicated to the hotel industry and Mr. C.N. Hilton.

With regards to times of construction, Dr. Petrini stated: "This project is being financed through a grant by the C.N. Hilton Foundation. At the present time the last will and testament of the late Mr. Hilton is in probate in the courts in Los Angeles, and, as you can all realize, a personage of Mr. Hilton's stature had interests and involvement in businesses beyond the Hotel Industry, from oil to transportation, from sport to agriculture; furthermore, he was a very generous philanthropist and many people and organizations have been remembered in his last will. Nevertheless, the project, as was presented here, has been approved by the Trustees of the University of Houston Foundation, by the Hilton Foundation and by the Hilton family.

Think back to last summer's heat and imagine what a difference a green canopy of shade would make around your home.

Trees provide more than landscape beauty. They provide climate control. They make important contributions to improving the environment. They add increased value and esteem to our property.

Trees are one of nature's best gifts; and a mighty fine investment for our homes and communities.

If you've been thinking of adding trees to your landscape, this fall - right now - would be an excellent time to do so.

Many folks think of spring as the best time to plant, but fall planting offers distinct advantages. During the winter months the root systems of the fall planted specimens develop and become well established. When spring arrives this well-developed root system makes it possible for the plant to take advantage of the full surge of spring growth.

The selection of trees is very important. Select trees that are adapted to our area and trees that have the characteristics you want.

If I were selecting a landscape tree I would first look for one that is resistant to diseases and insects. Trees that have to be sprayed several times a year can be very expensive. I would want a tree that has strong wood that will not be easily broken in high winds and ice storms. It should be a tree that can withstand our hot dry summer without having scorched or burned leaves.

Another characteristic to avoid is a tree that has shallow root. Some trees roots emerge above the soil surface and usually the roots sprout causing young trees to come up in the area. I would also avoid trees that produce messy flowers, cotton, or seed pods.

Another characteristic that many look for is fast growth. Unfortunately, the fast growing trees tend to have weak and brittle branches and shallow roots. Fast growing trees usually have shorter lives than the slower growing trees. Actually, the so called "slow growing" trees will grow rather rapidly if they are properly planted, watered and fertilized.

You may disagree with me, but the following are landscape trees that best meet these requirements for Eastland County: Texas Red Oak, Live Oak, Cedar Elm, Burk Oak, Shumard Oak, Chinese Pistachio, Bald Cypress, Bradford Flowering Pear, Mexican Plum and Caddo Sugar Maple. If you like pine trees, the best in our area are Japanese Black Pine, Austrian Pine and Mondale Pine.

Existing, native Post Oak and Mesquite are good landscape trees but are very sensitive to any change in soil conditions or treatment.

You notice I did not list Pecan. The Pecan tree is my favorite, but it does not meet the first requirement of a good landscape tree. Pecan trees are susceptible to insects and diseases. They have to be sprayed several times a year.

Now, here is a list of trees to avoid, and there may be a lot of disagreement. I would not plant Lombardy Poplar, Non-bearing Mulberry, Silver Maple, Magnolia, Cottonwood, Weeping Willow, Green Ash, Siberian Elm and Sycamore.

Everyone has their own preference and yours is probably different than mine. My preference is based on the trees I have observed in Eastland County.

Pecan Show Set For Dec. 12 & 13

The 28th Annual Eastland County Pecan Show has been scheduled for December 12 and 13 reports Dan Childress, President of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association. The Pecan Show, co-sponsored by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, will be in the County Courthouse Lobby.

Even though there is a shortage of pecans this year the local growers expect to have a good show. Most growers agree that the quality will be better than last year.

Anyone producing pecans in 1980 may enter the Pecan Show. An entry consist of 43 pecans of one variety and natives from one tree. All entries should be sacked and labeled with the grower's name, address and variety of pecans. These entries may be entered at the County Agent's office up until 5:00 p.m. on December 11.

On Friday, December 12, ten pecans from each entry will be weighed, shelled, and kernels weighed to determine the number of pecans in one pound and percent kernel. These two factors are important along with appearance, color, uniformity and texture.

Plaques will be given for the champion in-shell, champion shelling, and champion native pecans. Ribbons will be awarded to the first, second, and third place entries of each variety.

Childress hope to have 150 entries representing over 40 varieties in the show. Comanche County growers will also compete in this show since there will not be a Comanche County Pecan Show.

Members of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce will assist process of pecan entries.

Ticket Office Opens For 1981 Fort Worth Stock Show Rodeo

The ticket office for the 1981 Fort Worth Stock Show Rodeo will open at 9 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 6, in the west lobby of Will Rogers Coliseum, reports W.R. Watt, Jr., show president-manager. Hours will be from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m. daily, including Saturdays and Sundays.

The rodeo will be presented in 22 performances during the 85th annual Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, Jan. 28 through Feb. 8. "Rodeo fans are urged to get their tickets early," Watt said. Tickets are priced at \$6 for all night and weekend performances, and \$5 for 2 p.m. Monday through Friday, Feb. 2-6. Rodeo tickets include grounds admission.

Watt said mail orders are being accepted at the Stock Show office, P.O. Box 150, Fort Worth, Texas 76101. "Mail orders should state the performance desired and include \$1 extra for the entire order to cover return

postage and handling," he added.

Special entertainment for the rodeo has been tied to this country's western heritage and will be presented in authentic western style, Watt said. The program theme is "Flat-Out Rodeo," and will include a singing rodeo cowboy, a world-renowned trainer of Andalusian horses, and the world champion trick roper.

Wayne Vold, a past Canadian rodeo champion, successful rodeo producer, television and country music entertainer, will be appearing at each rodeo performance. Miss Dianne Olds will present her outstanding Andalusians in a "Ballet on Four Legs." Native Texan Gene McLaughlin, a former rodeo champion and movie cowboy, first appeared at the Stock Show in 1944 as a child trick roper.

Neal Gay of Mesquite, Texas, will again serve as general rodeo stock contractor. He will have several

other outstanding rodeo producers working with him to provide the best stock available for the contest here. This year's purse will exceed \$185,000.

"We are offering a western heritage package which will be enjoyed by the entire family, and should prove to be the best ever presented in Fort Worth," Watt said.

Livestock show exhibitors are reminded that Dec. 10 is the deadline for entering cattle, sheep, swine, horses, donkeys and mules. Poultry, rabbit and pigeon exhibitors

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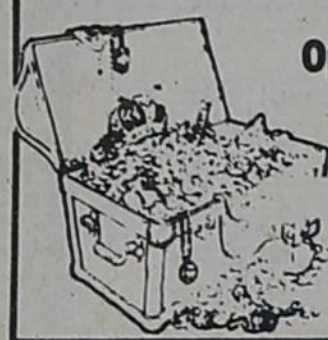

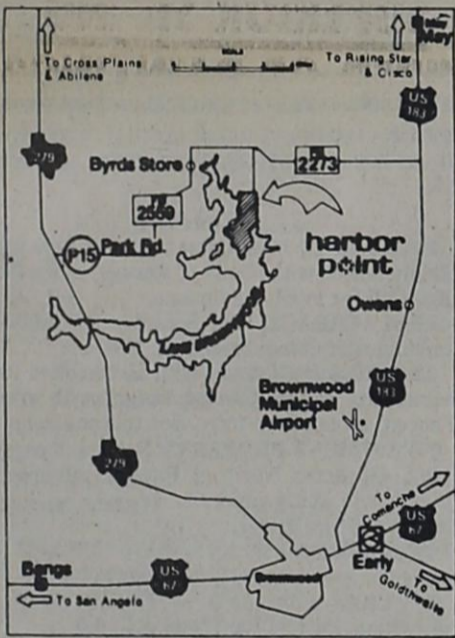

FRUIT LEATHER, JERKY FOR CHRISTMAS

Fruit leather or fruit jerky makes nutritious gifts for children at Christmas, says Rose Tindall Postel, a foods and nutrition specialist.

They are simple and easy to prepare and make very tasty snacks, she says.

Dr. Postel is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Prepare this natural-fruit product in the child's favorite flavor of apple, peach, pear, apricot or fig. **FRUIT LEATHER OR FRUIT JERKY**

Use: 8 ounces dried fruit (peaches, pears, apples, apricots or figs).

Cook fruit as directed on package, drain and cool. Puree in a blender or press through a sieve or colander.

Cover a 15 x 10 x 1 inch pan with foil. Spread fruit pulp in a thin layer. Bake 25 minutes to 300 degrees F.

Without opening the oven door, turn off the oven and let dry eight hours or overnight.

Peel off foil, roll the fruit leather into a loose cylinder and wrap in plastic wrap to store in refrigerator until it's time to slice for the children.

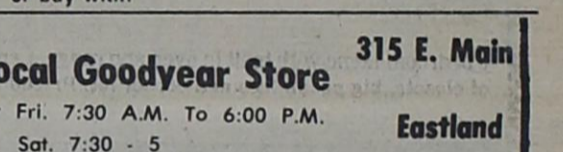

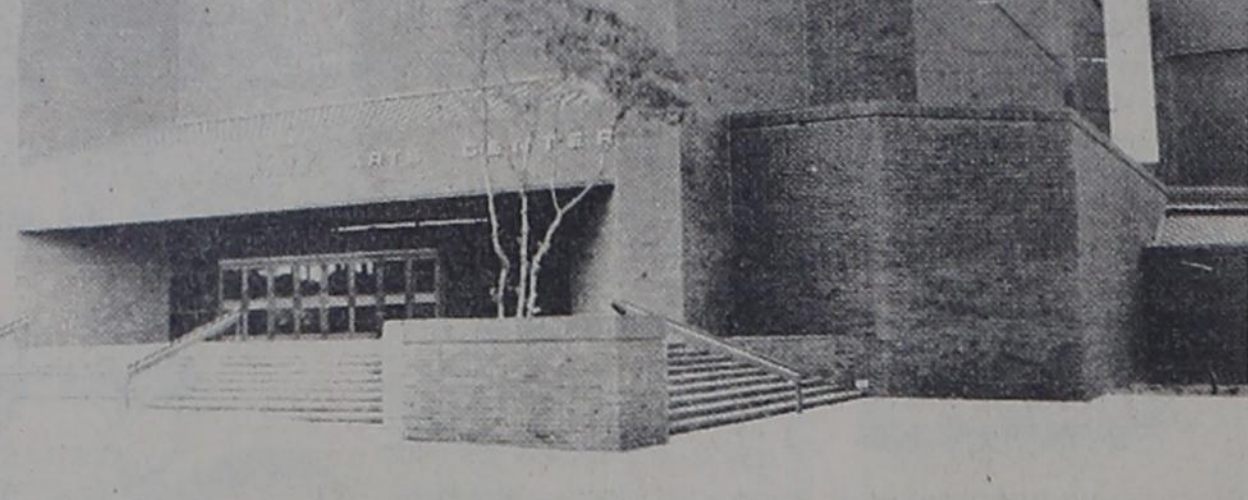

They All Want Your Checking Account Money!

Consumers soon will face new economic decisions - about banking.

Be prepared for an onslaught of aggressive advertising by financial institutions competing for your checking and savings-account business - and study the ads before making a move, Nancy Granovsky, a home economist cautions consumers.

Mrs. Granovsky is a family resource management specialist on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

There's a reason for all this: starting Jan. 1, 1981,

financial institutions will be able to offer interest-bearing NOW (negotiable orders of withdrawal) accounts.

In short, banks will be able to pay interest on checking accounts, AND savings-and-loan-associations and credit unions will be able to offer checking-account privileges on savings accounts, Mrs. Granovsky explains.

Credit unions will call theirs "share-draft" accounts.

A CLOSER LOOK
From all reports, institutions are gearing up for this major change in banking services by trying to determine the terms and conditions under which the new accounts will be offered - or,

indeed, if they will offer them at all.

Financial institutions are looking closely at the costs and benefits of offering the accounts - and so should consumers.

Consumers should read advertisements and literature from financial institutions carefully, Mrs. Granovsky advises.

But because this is a new type of account, don't expect that answers to all your questions will appear in the ads.

A telephone call or personal visit will probably be necessary to get the facts you need.

BATTLE FIRES KINDLING

Economic crystal-ball gazers say the battle fires will blaze as institutions fight for the consumer's checking and savings-account dollars.

Competition for business will be aggressive, especially in urban areas, they say.

Some experts predict a regular "price war" among

competing financial institutions in order to attract new customers and retain old ones.

CONSUMERS DON ARMOR

How can consumers decide what to do with their "checking-account money" as they don their sales-pitch-resistant armor?

Ask plenty of questions - and compare, compare, compare the terms and conditions offered by financial institutions in your area, Mrs. Granovsky suggests.

QUESTIONS WILL SAVE THE DOLLAR

If questions are the "answer" to saving the day's dollar against this battery of ads, then there ought to be specific questions to ask.

Indeed, Mrs. Granovsky says.

First, ask about costs.

HOW MUCH DOES IT COST?

Ask these questions about cost - and remember to compare, compare the answers:

1) What is the minimum amount required to open an account?

2) What is the amount of the monthly balance that must be maintained to keep the account open?

3) How is the MONTHLY BALANCE determined?

Is it the lowest balance in the account, or the highest balance, or the average of daily balances, or is it the closing balance in the account?

4) Is the service free under certain conditions?

Is it free if a certain monthly balance is maintained, or if other services are used, such as savings account, credit cards, personal loans, mortgage loans, automated teller or bill-paying services?

5) What service charges are assessed and what are the amounts?

There are several possibilities - ask about them. These include:

FLAT MONTHLY FEE - does the fee vary according to monthly balance or is it the same for all accounts?

TRANSACTION FEE - what is the charge for each check or draft processed?

CHECK (DRAFT) FEE - what is the price range for checks (drafts)?

OVERDRAFT FEE - is there one, and how much is it?

STOP-PAYMENT FEE - is there one, and how much is it?

ADDITIONAL FEES - what is the penalty for dropping below a certain monthly balance? Are there any other fees or charges?

6. Are cancelled checks (drafts) returned with the monthly statement?

If not, what is the charge for obtaining a copy of the cancelled checks?

7. Is postage-paid banking by mail available?

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS

Extension Officials Work For Community Development

"Dissemination of information related to community development requires Extension educators to keep abreast of what's going on," points out Dr. James I. Mallett, state community development leader with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"For example," Mallett explains, "Extension community development specialists are continually participating in conferences, workshops, seminars, formal classes and research in their efforts to help people help themselves."

Among recent events in which community development specialists participated were the Southern Regional Community Development Training Meeting, Texas Heritage Conference, National Extension Workshop on Rural

Crime Prevention, and the American Community Development Society Meeting.

Specialists attending these activities share information with other Extension staff members, adapt materials for Texas situations, and make them available to community leaders and officials throughout the state, explains Mallett.

"Extension community development programs are aimed at increasing the level and improving the quality of living, particularly in rural areas," points out Mallett.

Meeting changing needs for country facilities and services is a major problem for community leaders and officials, notes the leader. More rural communities have gained than lost in population since 1974. Some

communities have experienced "boom town" conditions due to energy development from lignite, oil, gas and uranium as well as industrial and economic growth and an influx of retired people.

"The Extension Service is charged with helping Texans and Texas communities," emphasizes Mallett. "The local county Extension agent is the first line of contact for community leaders and officials who seek assistance in solving various problems."



Department of Public Safety

For most Eastland County people the winter holidays mean shopping, Church affairs, family gatherings, and other pleasant experiences. But Sergeant Jerry Mathews of the Eastland-Callahan County Department of Public Safety and his Patrolmen often have to deal with a darker side of the season. This consists of icy highways, heavy traffic, speeding, too much consumption of alcohol, and tragic accidents. Mathews, a personable Director, took time recently to discuss the latest information from the State D.P.S., Eastland County, and the six Patrolmen who work and live in this area.

Mathews' interest in Law Enforcement work reaches back to his boyhood in Mosheim, Texas, where he graduated from High School in 1956. A Track Scholarship

led him to enroll at North Texas State University that fall. He attended the University until Dec., 1958, when he met the minimum age requirement for enrollment into the Texas Department of Public Safety Law Enforcement Academy at the headquarters in Austin. Upon graduation in March, 1959 he was stationed in the Highway Patrol Service at El Paso, Texas. In 1961 he was transferred to Callahan County, and opened a one-man sub-station in Cross Plains. After a move to San Angelo he transferred back to Callahan County, where he was promoted to the rank of Sergeant. Next came a move to Gilmer, Texas, where Mathews opened a new Sergeant area. Then came a transfer to Eastland, which the Sergeant feels was a fortunate one for him. In the twelve years since, he, his wife Ginny and their two children have become very

much a part of the community. They attend the First Baptist Church in Eastland, and enjoy sports as a hobby. And Sergeant Mathews probably knows every turn of every road in all this area.

The six Eastland County Patrolmen, whom Mathews refers to as "Exceptional men - all hard-working Patrolmen -" come from varied backgrounds. But they seem to have several things in common - a love of action and sports, and enough mental and physical alertness to pass the rigorous Dept. of Public Safety training.

Several of these troopers were star athletes, such as Leroy W. Polnick. Born in Abilene in 1950, he was a Three-Year Letterman in Football and Baseball at Cooper High School. In his Senior year he was "All District" in both sports.

At Abilene Christian University he was a Four Year Letterman - redshirted in his Freshman year. He was on the 1973 National Championship Team (NAIA), Division 1.

Polnick attended the DPS Academy in the fall of 1976, and came to Eastland as his first duty Station in Jan. 1977.

His wife, Alice Polnick, teaches school at Carbon. The couple attend the Redeemer Lutheran Church in Cisco, and Polnick lists hunting and fishing as favorite hobbies.

William H. Condry, another Patrolman, was born in Arkansas, but grew up in Odessa, Texas. He graduated from Odessa High School in May of 1970, and married Wanda Sharee Mosley in Dec. of that year. The couple then moved to Bethany, Oklahoma, where his wife attended college and Condry worked for Capitol Steel and Iron Co. in Oklahoma City.

In the spring of 1971 the Condrys returned to Odessa,

where William attended Odessa Jr. College until he obtained the number of College hours required to attend the D.P.S. Academy. After graduation from the Academy in October, 1973, Condry's first assignment was Van Horn. Since that time he has been stationed in Abilene, and then to Eastland County.

The Condry family has three children, the oldest being in the second grade at Siebert Elementary School. Condry still finds time for some favorite hobbies - playing the guitar and riding motorcycles.

The year 1974 turned out to be a very important one for Rose in another way - he was married to Pamela Collins in June of that same year. The couple has one child, and is expecting another.

Kenneth mentions "raising cattle" as a favorite hobby, and enjoys Eastland County as a place to live.

Trooper Steve Foster is a native Texan, being born in Houston, but his high school years were spent in Atlanta, Georgia. There he attended Lake Shore High School, and became an active part of the school's athletic program. His sophomore, junior and senior years found him at defensive end on the state's semi-final team. Lakeshore's basketball team was a state contender Steve's Junior and Senior year, taking third in

State his junior year. Steve was named All State in basketball and football his senior year.

Upon graduation in 1971, Steve was offered a number of athletic scholarships. He signed a letter of intent with the University of Houston Cougars, but a change in plans sent him to Tyler Junior College. There he again excelled in both sports. In 1972, his freshman year, the Apache's basketball team became 6th in the National Junior College finals.

meet a 40 percent compliance rate with the 55 M.P.H. speed limit during the Federal Fiscal year. Only about 36 percent, State wide, complied with the law. My own observations indicate that Eastland County is slightly above that in compliance, but that is certainly not good enough. It means that we must continue a vigorous enforcement program in the District, and the State will continue the same.

"Every one of my men, and myself, would like to spend a nice, quiet Christmas and

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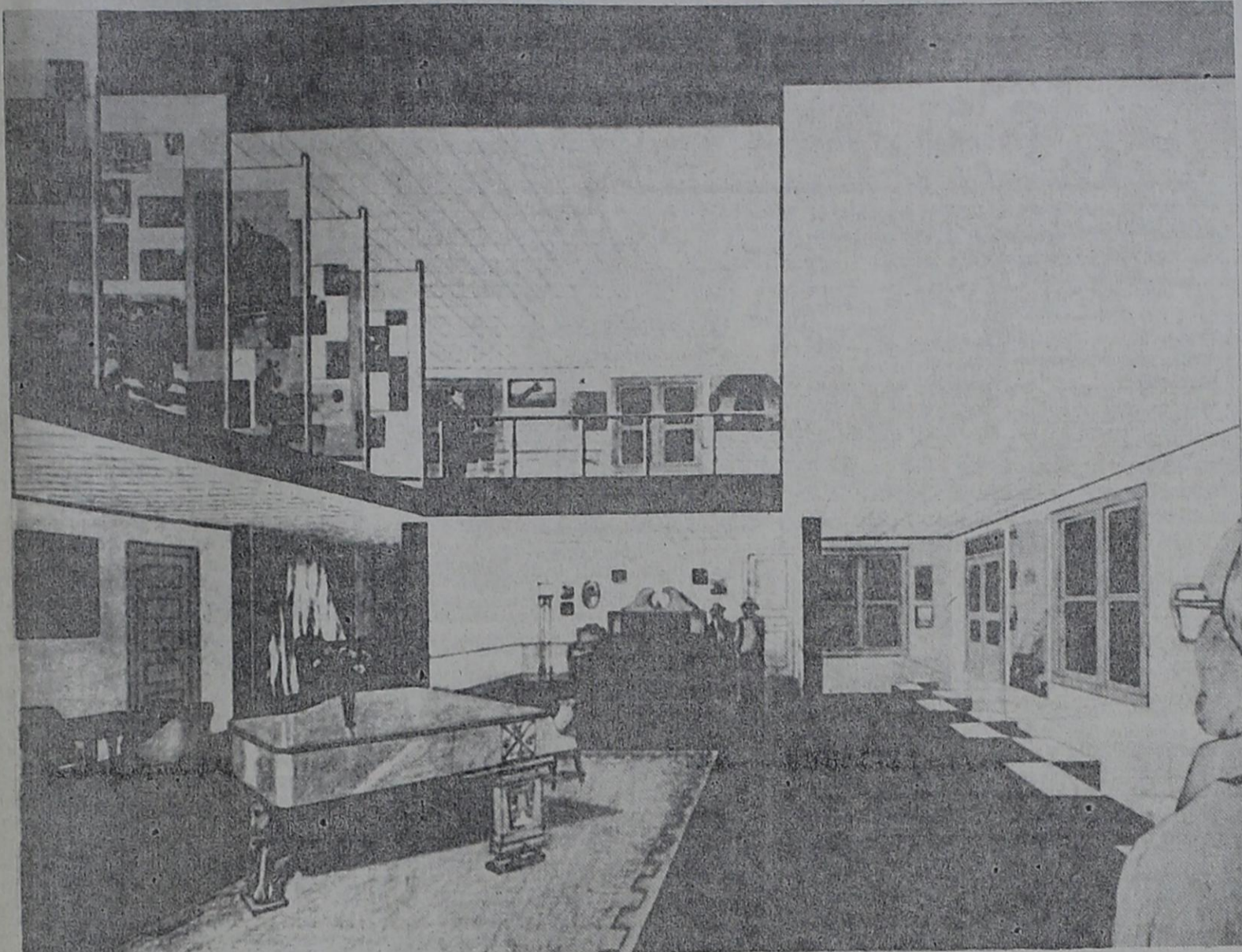

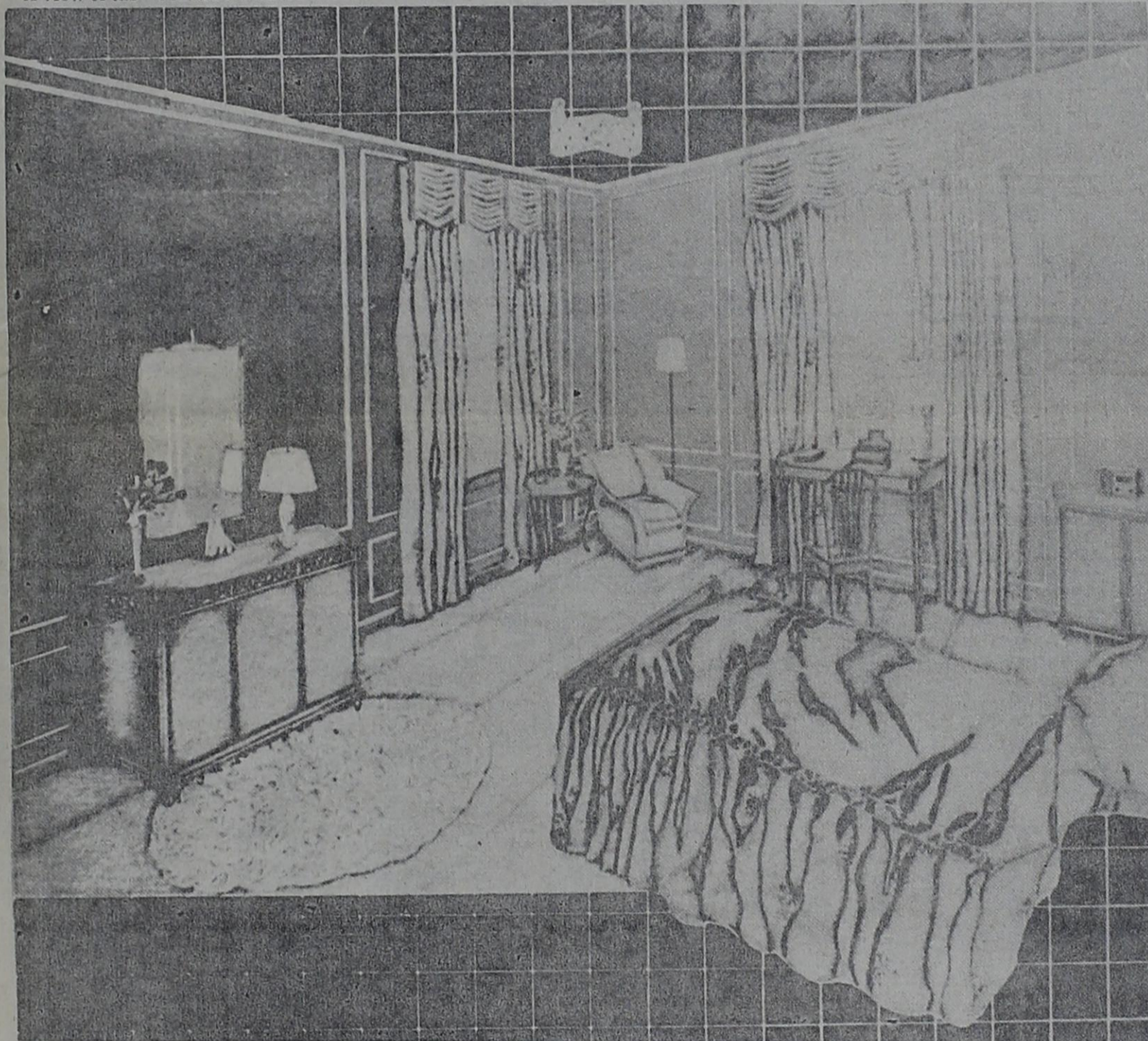

Father Dennis Smith officiated.

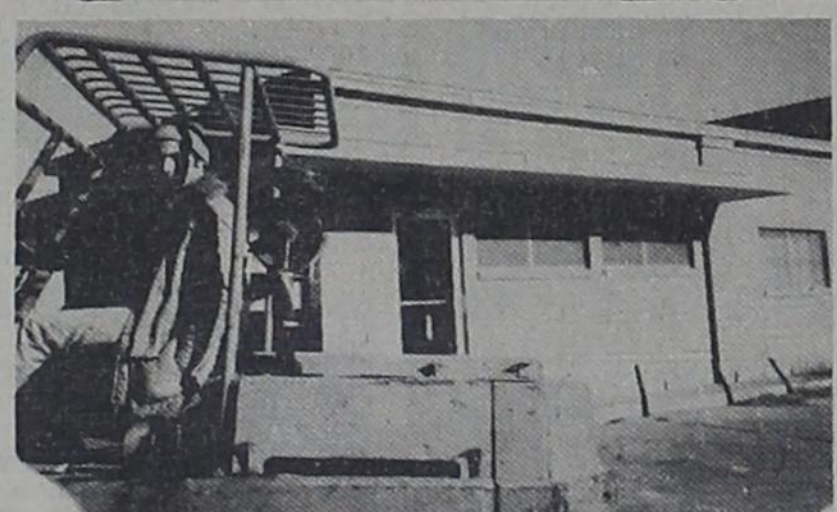
