One Killed, One Critically Injured In House Fire

One man was dead and another was in critical condition as the result of a farm house fire Wednesday night some 10 miles northwest of Cisco. The dead man had been tentatively identified as Richard Lee Brown, 37, who was living in the Canyon Road house.

In Parkland Hospital, Dallas, was Ricky Steven Nance, about 35, who had third degree burns over some 60 per cent of his body. He was in the hospital's surgical intensive care unit, and there were reports Friday that there had been

located the body of a man in the fire ruins around 5 a.m. A Cisco Funeral Home ambulance took the remains, including a skull and bones, to Dallas Forensic Laboratory for identification.

Around 10 a.m. Thursday, Mr. Fillinghim reported that firemen and others found additional bones in the ruins. These were also taken to the Dallas lab which reported later that they were the bones of an animal, probably a deer or a small cow.

Nance told authorities at the hospital that one or two people other than himself were in the house "and I know Lee did not get out." Mrs. R.L. Brown, of near Cisco, mother of Richard Lee Brown, reported Friday that the family believed that the burned remains were those of their son.

Mr. Fillingim was advised by the Dallas crime lab Friday that identifying the body was "a challenging case." Mr. Brown told the deputy that they lived in Massachusetts for a few years and that their son had had some dental work done. A request for dental records was forwarded there. Mr. Fillinghim said it would be at least mid-week before they expected to hear more from the crime lab. He was advised that the skull and bones were in bad condition after the fire.

Billy Rains, Cisco police chief and fire marshal and a certified arson investigator, told The Press that "we are 99 per cent sure the fire was caused by a hot plate left on." He said an extension cord was used to take power directly off a main electricity line outside the house and there were no fuses or cutoffs. The hot plate apparently melted and ignited the wooden house, which was

owned by the R.L. Browns. Mr. Fillingim said that he and seven or eight officers combed through the burned house for six hours Thursday



CJC Wrangler **B-Ball Season Opens Monday**

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers open the 1985-86 basketball season Monday night, November 4, when they travel to Snyder to play the Western Texas Westerners at Scurry County Coliseum. Game time is 8:00

The Wranglers lost four starters from a 21-12 season in 1984-85, Cedric Ellis, a 6'0" guard from Shreveport, LA, is the only returning starter. He averaged 11.5 points and 3.8 assists for the Wranglers last season. Other probable starters Monday are: Rodney Murray, a 6'2" sophomore from Victoria; Steve Martin, a 6'0" sophomore from Galveston; James Griffin, a 6'5" sophomore from Lindale; and Mike Knorr, a 6'5' freshman from Killeen.

In the Westerners, the Wranglers will be facing a team that has won the NJCAA national championship three times in the past ten years (1976, 1979, 1980), and a fifth place finish in 1983. After the opener in Snyder, the Wranglers play Western Oklahoma in Altus on Nov. 12, and will open at home against Howard on Nov. 19.

Ed Seegmiller of Abilene, manager of the West Central Texas Water District. presented an illustrated talk arranged by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. He was introduced by Allan Masters, program chairman for the meeting.

The first two proposed amendments on the ballot for the election pertain to the Texas Water Plan, Mr. Seegmiller said Amendment No. 1 would authorize the issuance of up to \$980 million in Texas Water Development Bonds.

The bond issue would finance water conservation, flood control, water quality, and water supply for Texas cities. The state has a AAA bond rating and could sell bonds at a much more attractive rate than most cities, the speaker pointed out. The various cities could borrow funds from the state bond program. The plan would not be tax supported as the bonds would be revenue bonds, he added. "The authorization of additional funding for water purposes is urgently needed to allow the state and local governments to continue to provide adequate, clean and controlled water supplies for the well being of our people and economy," Mr.

Seegmiller said. Amendment No. 2 would authorize bonds to finance agricultural water conservations programs similar to the bonds for supply projects. This program would authorize \$200 million for agricultural water projects "in the most economical and efficient funding manner," it

was pointed out. The state's water requirements are approaching 200,000,000 acre feet per year, Mr. Seegmiller pointed out. He said there was no organized opposition to the state water program.



I am deeply concerned that there may be widespread misunderstanding of Propositions 1 and 2 (State "water amendments") to be voted on at the November 5 general election. Based upon questions I have received, many voters are apparently under the mistaken impression that approval of these two proposed Constitutional amendments would authorize expenditure of more than a billion dollars of State funds for water projects. This emphatically not the case.

The programs that would be authorized by Propositions 1 and 2 are loan programs, to be financed through the issuance of bonds, not through the appropriation of tax dollars, and the loans made are to be repaid to the State with interest by the borrowers. This means that projects financed by the beneficiaries of those projects, which is as it should be. The benefits to the citizens of the State would be that funds will be available as needed to help communities throughout the State meet their needs for water supplies, wastewater treatment facilities, and drainage and flood control works, and those funds will be available at a lower interest cost than would be the case if the bonds were issued by individual subdivisions of the State.

This program is, in fact, an extension and expansion of a program that has been in place for 20 years. In 1957, the voters approved the sale of \$100,000,000 in State bonds to finance development of water supplies. In 1962, 1971, 1975 and 1981, the voters approved issuance of additional State bonds and expansion of the program to include water quality enhancement. In total, \$600,000,000 in State bonds have been authorized by the voters, and \$500,000,000 from the funds thus obtained have been loaned at interest to Texas cities and water districts for water supply and water quality enhancement projects. This has made it possible to accomplish water resource development to

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available to continue this program. With the State's population projected to increase from about 16,000,000 in 1985 to over 21,000,000 in

the year 2000, it is extremely important that the regional and local governments in Texas have access to low cost financing to help meet their water resource needs.

Propositions 1 and 2 offer the means for this to be accomplished without placing any additional tax burden on the State's taxpayers.

Bob Glasgow Announces Support For **Proposition 10**

State Senator Bob Glasgow announced his support for Proposition 10 which will be on the Constitutional Amendments ballot on November 5. Proposition 10, which is known as the Farm and Ranch Finance Program, will authorize the sale of bonds to make low interest loans to farmers and ranchers for the purchase of agricultural land.

Currently, agriculture producers in Texas are faced with high land prices and interest rates which have been slowly eating away at the tradition of individual land ownership which has helped shape this country into the breadbasket of the world. The Farm and Ranch Finance Program is designed to help revitalize the family farm and ranch in Texas. This program will be administered by the Veterans Land Board and like the Veterans Land Program will be entirely self supportive without costing the taxpayers a single penny. The property will be secured with the state having the only lien on the land.

Under the program, a person must purchase at least 50 acres, and may borrow up to \$100,000. To be eligible a person must be a United States citizen, a resident of Texas for five years, have been a member of a household in which at least 35 percent of the gross income was from farming or ranching for the previous three years, and have a net worth of less than \$250,000.

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

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
Esme Glenn Will Exhibit Portraits & Landscapes

To the Editor:

I am deeply concerned that there may be widespread misunderstanding of Propositions 1 and 2 (State "water amendments") to be voted on at the November 5 general election. Based upon questions I have received, many voters are apparently under the mistaken impression that approval of these two proposed Constitutional amendments would authorize expenditure of more than a billion dollars of State funds for water projects. This is emphatically not the case.

The programs that would be authorized by Propositions 1 and 2 are loan programs, to be financed through the issuance of bonds, not through the appropriation of tax dollars, and the loans made are to be repaid to the State with interest by the borrowers. This means that projects financed with State assistance under these programs will be paid for by the beneficiaries of those projects, which is as it should be. The benefits to the citizens of the State would be that funds will be available as needed to help communities throughout the State meet their needs for water supplies, wastewater treatment facilites, and drainage and flood control works, and those funds will be available at a lowere interest cost than would be the case if the bonds were issued by individual subdivisions of

the State. This program is, in fact, an extension and expansion of a program that has been in place for 20 years. In 1957, the voters approved the sale of \$100,000 one in State bonds to finance development of water supplies. In 1962, 1971. 1975 and 1981, the voters proved issuance of

tional State bonds and pansion of the program to include water quality enhancement. In total, \$600,000,000 in State bonds have been authorized by the voters, and \$500,000,000 from the funds thus obtained have been loaned at interest to Texas cities and water districts for water supply and water quality enhancement projects. This has made it possible to accomplish water resource development to meet the needs of the people of Texas that could not otherwise have been accomplished, and there has never been a default on any of these

Today, only \$90,000,000 is available to continue this program. With the State's population projected to increase from about 16,000,000 in 1985 to over 21,000,000 in the year 2000, it is extremely important that the regional and local governments in Texas have access to low cost financing to help meet their water resouce needs. Porpositions 1 and 2 offer the means for this to be accomplished without placing any additional tax burden on the state's taxpayers.

Propositions 1 and 2 have the very active support of the Governor, Lt. Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. They have been endorsed by every business organization, chamber of commerce and trade association in the State that has sutdied them and taken a stand But their final fate will be in the hands of the voters on November 5, and it is important that the voters go to the polls on that date with a clear understanding of the programs these propositions would authorize and their importance to the future of Texas.

methods. 
Choral Group From CHS Sings At Lions Club


