

## One Killed, One Critically Injured In House Fire

One man was dead and another was in critical condition as the result of a farm house fire Wednesday night some 10 miles northwest of Cisco. The dead man had been tentatively identified as Richard Lee Brown, 37, who was living in the Canyon Road house.

In Parkland Hospital, Dallas, was Ricky Steven Nance, about 35, who had third degree burns over some 60 per cent of his body. He was in the hospital's surgical intensive care unit, and there were reports Friday that there had been slight improvement in his condition.

The Cisco Volunteer Fire Department received a call

at 1:40 a.m. Thursday that the house was burning. Ricky Nance, who was in the house, had walked over a mile to the home of Ricky Hudson on the Canyon Home and Mr. Hudson telephoned firemen.

Mr. Hudson told H.T. Fillingim, Eastland County deputy sheriff who was investigating the blaze, that Nance collapsed after telling him that the house was on fire. "He was in pretty bad shape and he fell on the floor," Mr. Hudson said.

Mr. Hudson carried Nance to his pickup truck and rushed him to E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. After examining Nance, Dr. Tim Boersma called Parkland

Hospital and arranged for CareFlight of Fort Worth to take the burned man to the hospital.

The CareFlight helicopter could not land here due to high winds and a Patterson ambulance took Nance to Mineral Wells to meet the helicopter for the flight to Dallas.

Cisco firemen took three trucks and the rescue unit to the fire scene. The small two bedroom house, which was built in the early 1900s, was destroyed by the fire, which had started probably an hour before firemen arrived. A high wind was blowing, causing the fire to spread rapidly, firemen believed.

Fireman Dennis Stovall

located the body of a man in the fire ruins around 5 a.m. A Cisco Funeral Home ambulance took the remains, including a skull and bones, to Dallas Forensic Laboratory for identification.

Around 10 a.m. Thursday, Mr. Fillingim reported that firemen and others found additional bones in the ruins. These were also taken to the Dallas lab which reported later that they were the bones of an animal, probably a deer or a small cow.

Nance told authorities at the hospital that one or two people other than himself were in the house "and I know Lee did not get out." Mrs. R.L. Brown, of near Cisco, mother of Richard Lee Brown, reported Friday that the family believed that the burned remains were those of their son.

Mr. Fillingim was advised by the Dallas crime lab Friday that identifying the body was "a challenging case." Mr. Brown told the deputy that they lived in Massachusetts for a few years and that their son had had some dental work done. A request for dental records was forwarded there. Mr. Fillingim said it would be at least mid-week before they expected to hear more from the crime lab. He was advised that the skull and bones were in bad condition after the fire.

Mr. Hudson reported that Nance told him that "I woke up and heard burning and popping."

Billy Rains, Cisco police chief and fire marshal and a certified arson investigator, told The Press that "we are 99 per cent sure the fire was caused by a hot plate left on." He said an extension cord was used to take power directly off a main electricity line outside the house and there were no fuses or cutoffs. The hot plate apparently melted and ignited the wooden house, which was owned by the R.L. Browns.

Mr. Fillingim said that he and seven or eight officers combed through the burned house for six hours Thursday



and found no evidence that any drugs or drug paraphernalia had ever been there. He added that one marijuana plant was found 35 to 40 yards from the house.

Justice of the Peace J.V. Heyser held an inquest and ordered the remains of the dead man to be sent to the

Dallas lab. Cisco firemen at the scene included Chief Richard Connell, Royce Darr, David Gill, Joe Jarvis, Chris Johnson, Dennis Stovall, Larry Wiekell and C.W. Guthrie. Firemen took a unit to Graham hospital at 3 a.m. to standby when the helicopter attempt-

ed a landing but decided that it was too windy.

To fight rural fires, the Rural Department has facilities to carry some 2,000 gallons of water. Rural Chief Freddy Anderson was at the fire scene along with local firemen.

Mr. Fillingim said he

would continue an investigation of the blaze.

Little was known here about Mr. Nance, the critically burned man. Mr. Fillingim reported that they understood that he had lived in the area for sometime and that he was thought to be a Californian.

## Cisco Voters To Go To Polls Tuesday

Cisco voters will go to the polls at the Laguna Corral Room Tuesday, Nov. 5, and cast ballots on 14 proposed changes in the Texas Constitution in the annual General Election that will be held throughout the state.

The Laguna voting place will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. with Mrs. B.F. (Dorothy) Thomas as the election judge. Mrs. Wilson (Thelma) Smith will serve as the alternate judge, and there will be five clerks to assist with ballot issuance and counting.

Observers estimated that

500 or fewer ballots would be cast in the election as only the constitutional amendments were being decided in the voting.

The ballot propositions were listed as follows:

Amendment No. 1- To authorize issuance of additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development Bonds, to create special water funds for conservation, development, quality enhancement, flood control and an insurance program.

Amendment No. 2- To authorize issuance and sale of \$200 million of Texas

agricultural water conservation bonds.

Amendment No. 3- To authorize the legislature to enact laws permitting a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property.

Amendment No. 4- To authorize proceeds from the sale of land dedicated to the permanent school fund to be used to acquire other land for that fund.

Amendment No. 5- To authorize the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts.

Amendment No. 6- To permit state prisoners to be placed in penal facilities of another state pursuant to an interstate agreement.

Amendment No. 7- To authorize Chambers County to be divided into two to six precincts.

Amendment No. 8- To provide \$500 million in additional bonding authority for the veterans' housing assistance program and changing the definition of those veterans eligible to participate in the veterans' land program and the veterans' housing program by authorizing the state legislature by law to define an eligible veteran for those programs.

Amendment No. 9- To protect public funds by authorizing prior approval of expenditure or emergency transfer of state appropriations.

Amendment No. 10- To authorize the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide financing assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land.

Amendment No. 11- Relating to the manner in which a person is charged with a criminal offense and to certain requirements applicable to state writs and processes.

Amendment No. 12- To grant the Supreme Court of Texas and the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from a federal appellate court.

Amendment No. 13- To provide for the reapportionment of the judicial districts of the state by the Judicial Districts Board or by the Legislative Redistricting Board, and providing for the administration and jurisdiction of constitutional courts.

Amendment No. 14- To provide for (1) the abolition of the office of county treasurer in Andrews County and El Paso County; (2) the abolition of the office of county surveyor in Collin, Dallas, Denton, El Paso, Henderson, and Randall counties.

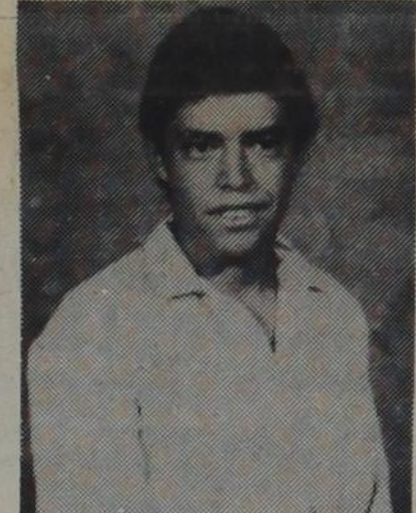

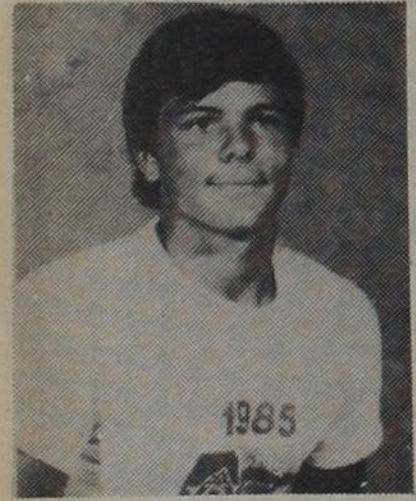

Ed Seegmiller of Abilene, manager of the West Central Texas Water District, presented an illustrated talk arranged by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. He was introduced by Allan Masters, program chairman for the meeting.

revenue bonds, he added.

"The authorization of additional funding for water purposes is urgently needed to allow the state and local governments to continue to provide adequate, clean and controlled water supplies for the well being of our people and economy," Mr. Seegmiller said.

The first two proposed amendments on the ballot for the election pertain to the Texas Water Plan. Mr. Seegmiller said Amendment No. 1 would authorize the issuance of up to \$980 million in Texas Water Development Bonds.

The bond issue would finance water conservation, flood control, water quality, and water supply for Texas cities. The state has a AAA bond rating and could sell bonds at a much more attractive rate than most cities, the speaker pointed out. The various cities could borrow funds from the state bond program. The plan would not be tax supported as the bonds would be



## Letters To Be Sent To State Leaders

For about 50 years there has been a Home Economics 4-H Extension Agent in Eastland County. This program will be severely cut very soon, however, if state plans are carried out.

The Eastland County Commissioners, as well as the Extension Agents, have been informed that the position held by Faith Ballard will be terminated.

Many people in the County are attempting to stop this, feeling that this cut-back would be very bad for the County and the 314 young people in the 4-H Program.

The 99 Eastland County 4-H Adult Leaders, among others, have drafted a letter to various officials and agricultural specialists who might have some authority

over the program. Their letter is signed by Bobby Little of Olden, 4-H Adult Leaders President.

It says, in part: "Faith Ballard has started a Recreation Team which has performed and led recreation all over the State of Texas. She organized the Junior Leaders Program for the 13-19 year old youths in Eastland County. They have done many service projects which benefit our County... Last year we had 23 4-H'ers to qualify for State Roundup... We had 179 project record forms in over 20 different areas completed this year..."

"We do not feel that the Agents should be cut in rural areas. Our children do not have the advantages that the

students in large towns have available to them. 4-H is the only non-school organization in which most of them get to participate. We know that our County is not one of the biggest, but we also know that there is probably not another County which has grown as much in 4-H as we have in the past two years..."

The letters from the 4-H Leaders should have some effect, but probably much more is needed. You, as a citizen, can help. If you believe in the 4-H Program and what it has done for this

County you can send a letter of your own to the individuals listed here. State the reasons why you think this 4-H County Agent should be retained for Eastland County.

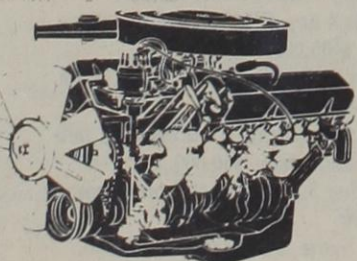

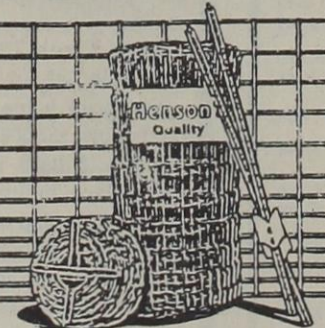

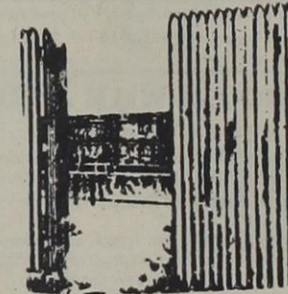

# Area News Briefs

**EASTLAND**  
On Nov. 7, David and Mary Slade, well known artists of South Fork, Colorado, will give a demonstration in Eastland at the Texas Electric Reddy Room at 7 p.m. Both work in oils and water colors, and are noted for their distinctive styling. Artists and persons interested in art are urged to come out and study the work of these fine painters.

The Eastland County Commissioners have extended a 3 percent discount on County taxes through the month of November, due to the statements being mailed out late. The mails are now delivering the statements to property owners. Most of the reasons for the delay in mailings are reported to be involved with computer processing at the contract firm which does work for the local offices. There are apparently not only problems on mailings with this county, but other counties as well.

The Eastland County 4-H Adult leaders have drafted a letter requesting that the position of Home Economics 4-H Extension Agent be reinstated for Eastland County. A notification of the elimination of this work was recently received by County

Commissioners and County Extension Agents. Copies of the letter from local leaders are being sent to eight various state officials and Extension service leaders. This position was first established in Eastland County in 1936. Local 4-H members have won many awards at all levels - County, District, and State.

Plans for work on highways in Eastland County have been announced by Lawrence Schulz, District Engineer of the State Highway Department. Included are the resurfacing of approximately 6 miles of I-20 in the Ranger area - cost of \$1.3 million - the rehabilitation of 3.5 miles of F.M. 3101 - cost of \$390,000 - and to widen Elm Creek Bridge west of Gorman - cost of \$36,000.

# Letter to the Editor

I am deeply concerned that there may be widespread misunderstanding of Propositions 1 and 2 (State "water amendments") to be voted on at the November 5 general election. Based upon questions I have received, many voters are apparently under the mistaken impression that approval of these two proposed Constitutional amendments would authorize expenditure of more than a billion dollars of State funds for water projects. This emphatically not the case.

The programs that would be authorized by Propositions 1 and 2 are loan programs, to be financed through the issuance of bonds, not through the appropriation of tax dollars, and the loans made are to be repaid to the State with interest by the borrowers. This means that projects financed by the beneficiaries of those projects, which is as it should be. The benefits to the citizens of the State would be that funds will be available as needed to help communities throughout the State meet their needs for water supplies, wastewater treatment facilities, and drainage and flood control works, and those funds will be available at a lower interest cost than would be the case if the bonds were issued by individual subdivisions of the State.

This program is, in fact, an extension and expansion of a program that has been in place for 20 years. In 1957, the voters approved the sale of \$100,000,000 in State bonds to finance development of water supplies. In 1962, 1971, 1975 and 1981, the voters approved issuance of additional State bonds and expansion of the program to include water quality enhancement. In total, \$600,000,000 in State bonds have been authorized by the voters, and \$500,000,000 from the funds thus obtained have been loaned at interest to Texas cities and water districts for water supply and water quality enhancement projects. This has made it possible to accomplish water resource development to

meet the needs of the people of Texas that could not otherwise have been accomplished, and there has never been a default on any of these loans.

Today, only \$90,000,000 is available to continue this program. With the State's population projected to increase from about 16,000,000 in 1985 to over 21,000,000 in

the year 2000, it is extremely important that the regional and local governments in Texas have access to low cost financing to help meet their water resource needs.

Propositions 1 and 2 offer the means for this to be accomplished without placing any additional tax burden on the State's taxpayers. Propositions 1 and 2 have

the very active support of the Governor, Lt. Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. They have been endorsed by every business organization, chamber of commerce and trade association in the State that has studied them and taken a stand. But their final fate will be in the hands of the voters on November 5, and with a clear understanding of the programs these propositions would authorize and their importance to the future of Texas.

## Bob Glasgow Announces Support For Proposition 10

State Senator Bob Glasgow announced his support for Proposition 10 which will be on the Constitutional Amendments ballot on November 5. Proposition 10, which is known as the Farm and Ranch Finance Program, will authorize the sale of bonds to make low interest loans to farmers and ranchers for the purchase of agricultural land.

Currently, agriculture producers in Texas are faced with high land prices and interest rates which have been slowly eating away at the tradition of individual land ownership which has helped shape this country into the breadbasket of the world. The Farm and Ranch Finance Program is designed to help revitalize the family farm and ranch in Texas. This program will be administered by the Veterans Land Board and like the Veterans Land Program will be entirely self supportive without costing the taxpayers a single penny. The property will be secured with the state having the only lien on the land.

Under the program, a person must purchase at least 50 acres, and may borrow up to \$100,000. To be eligible a person must be a United States citizen, a resident of Texas for five years, have been a member of a household in which at least 35 percent of the gross income was from farming or ranching for the previous three years, and have a net worth of less than \$250,000.

TUESDAY'S AMENDMENTS (An Editorial)

A great number of regulations, laws, boards, plans and projects that we live with in Texas today came as the result of Constitutional Amendments. Some good, some bad, some indifferent—depending on your perspective.

It'd be vanity on our part to think that anyone would or should join our thinking, but for what it's worth, here's the way we're going to vote the amendments, and why:

Amendments One, Two and Three: We'll vote FOR.

They all pertain to plans for water.

Amendment Four: We'll vote AGAINST.

Because it smacks of speculation with permanent school funds.

Amendment Five: Against.

Hospitals and hospital district don't need any more regulations from the state or anywhere.

Amendment Six: Against.

Because Texas prisoners should be held in Texas prisons. There's no doubt that prisons here need help and the purpose of this proposal is to break up gangs, but surely there's other ways.

Amendment Seven: For. It's strictly a local issue affecting only Chambers County. It's a shame that this type of thing has to be taken to a statewide vote, but that's the Texas Constitution.

Amendment Eight: FOR. Because Texas veterans deserve every bit of help they can get.

Amendment Nine: AGAINST.

It scares me to think that state officials have authority to transfer funds.

Amendment Ten: FOR.

Again to provide help for the purchase of farm and ranch lands. We need to encourage farm ownership.

Amendment Eleven: FOR.

## Esme Glenn Will Exhibit Portraits & Landscapes

Esme Glenn, well known Abilene artist, will exhibit portraits and landscapes at the library of Cisco Junior College from November 6 through December 20.

A native Abilenian and a graduate of the University of Texas at Austin with a degree in art, Mrs. Glenn has won over one hundred awards in regional and state shows in Texas and New Mexico. Her work hangs in many collections over the country.

She works in acrylics and oils. The oils are all Texas landscapes with the exception of one painting done as the result of a trip to Alaska.

Mrs. Glenn has made an intensive study of the old masters' and other painting

methods. Through this study, and by experimenting with watercolor techniques, she has developed a distinctly original style in acrylic painting in which she incorporates the natural fiber of the canvas. In these paintings, transparent and opaque paint is applied alternately in several layers and then finished with an acrylic varnish. This gives a thorough protection for the paintings without having to be framed under glass.

In 1979, two of her paintings done in this manner were purchased by the Abilene Chamber of Commerce as gifts to visiting dignitaries that year. A portrait of a West Texas farmer and rancher was given to the then Secretary of Agriculture, Bob Bergland. A painting of the old Swenson home near Breckenridge, one of a series of paintings that Mrs. Glenn has done on early Texas homes, was given to Senator Lloyd Bentsen.

This exhibit of paintings will be hanging from November 6 to December 20. Library hours are 8 to 4, 6 to 9:30 Monday through Thursdays, 8 to 4 on Fridays, and 6:30 to 9:30 Sunday evenings.

### Writer's Club Will Meet Tues. At Bank Room

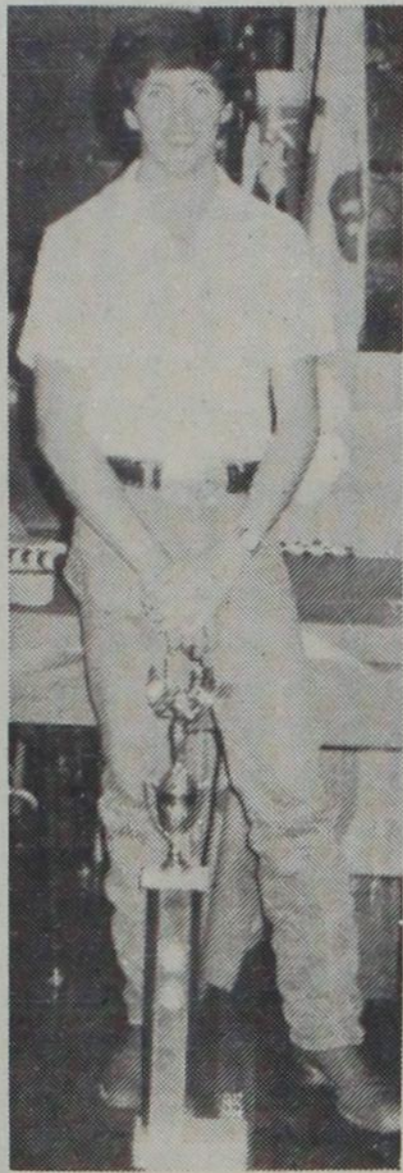

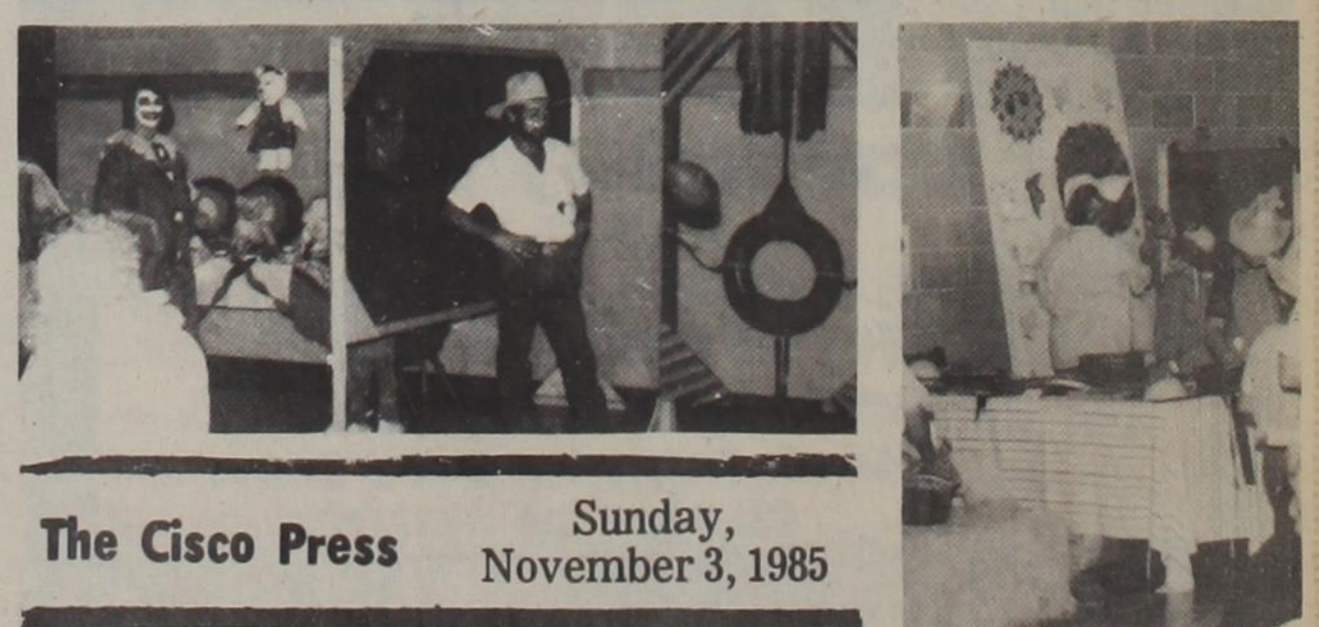

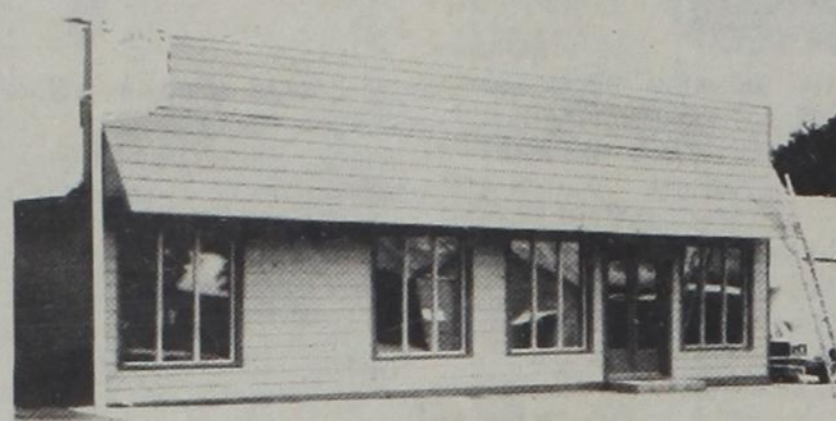

## Choral Group From CHS Sings At Lions Club

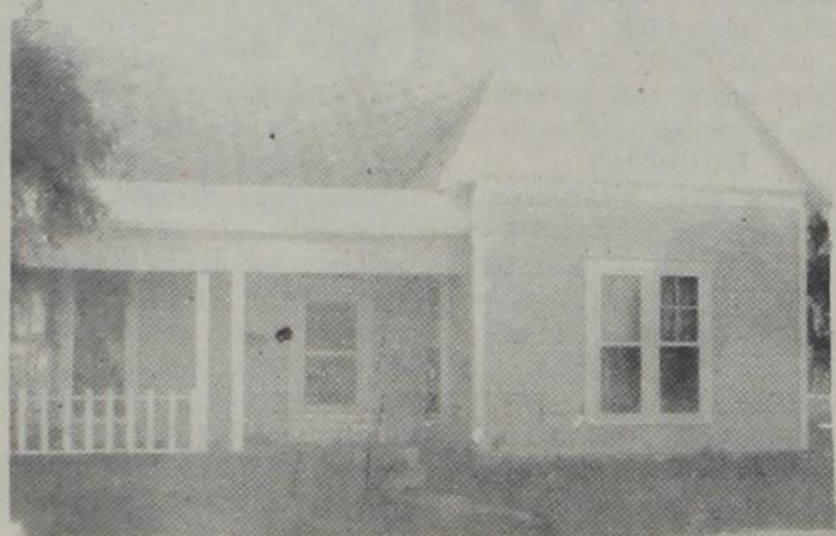
