Benefit Concert Is Set Here Saturday

A benefit concert to help a Honduras mission trip begin sponsored by Calvary Baptist Church in Cisco will be held Saturday, August 17, at 7 p.m., in Cisco City Park. The concert is being presented by Music With A Meaning Ministries of Cisco.

The concert will feature the gospel group, New Beginning, which consist of Gary Fink, Kay Roark, Sue Gosch, and Elizabeth Webb. Special guests will be the group, Freedom Flight, which is made up of Donna Parrigan, Darrel Price, and Tim Hull.

Others who will be appearing during the concert will be Ronnie Shackelford, pastor of Calvary Baptist Church;

Doyle Combs, coordinator, Honduras Mission Trip; and Dr. Tim Boersma. Dr. Boersma will be presenting a slide presentation of the mission work being done in the Honduras.

Most of the proceeds from the concert will go to purchase medicine for children in the Honduras. Dr. Boersma, who has been on such a mission trip twice in the past, said it costs approximately one dollar to worm a child for a year. Parasites (worms) are the cause of approximately 50 percent of the deaths of children there.

Three goals for the trip to the Honduras are: (1) Share the Gospel; (2) Minister to the people physically; and

(3) support the independent missionaries already there by helping to provide a work crew for handing out tracts and Bibles, and to help organize and build new churches.

Those making the trip from Cisco include Rev. Ronnie and Celia Shackelford, Dr. Tim Boersma, Jeff Holloway, Neil and Debbie Henke, Charles Copeland, Rick Roark, Joe Gosch, Helen Orr, and Ronnie Webb.

The group will leave from Dallas-Ft. Worth (DFW) Airport on August 31 and return on September 7.

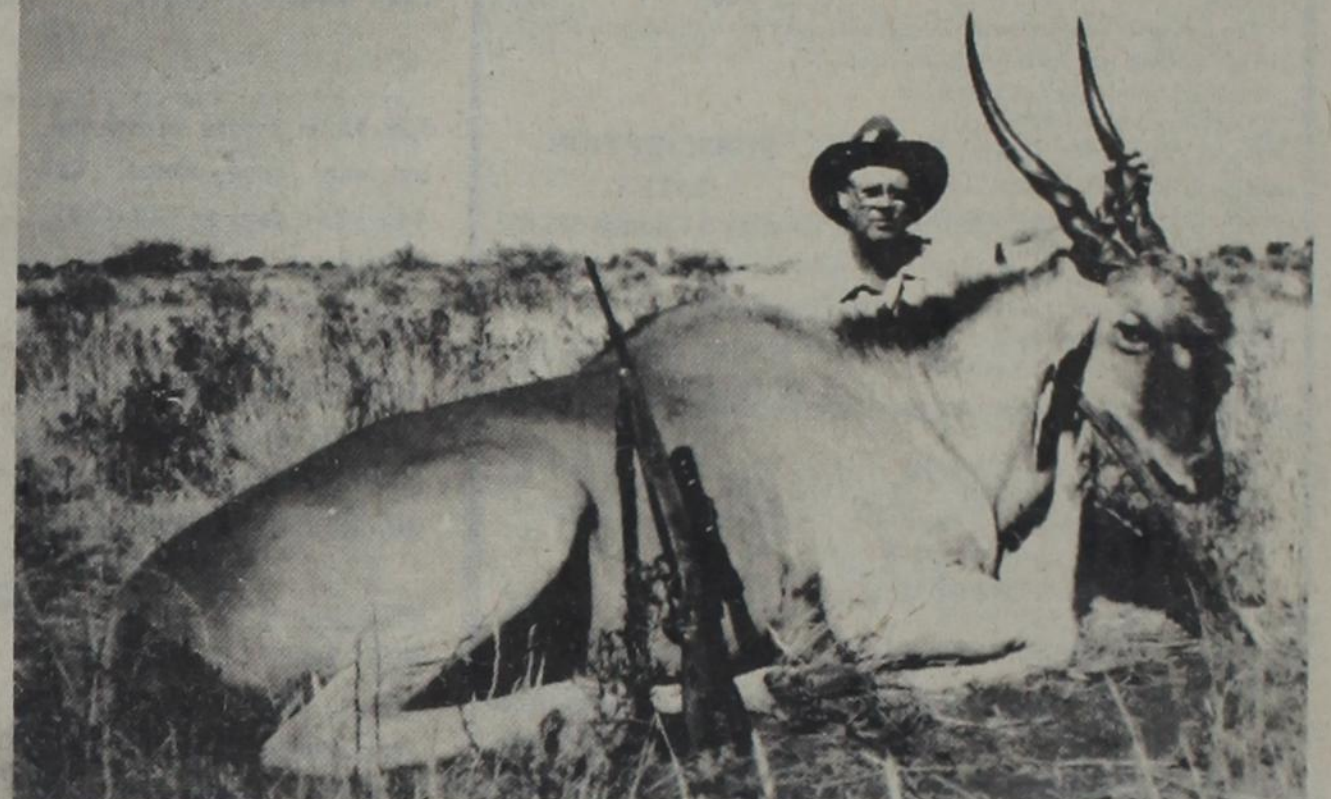

Eastland County Commissioners Try To Resolve County Defecit

As the Eastland County Commissioners attempt to resolve County expenditures with County income for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1, they are sometimes asked:

"Why can't a County go in the red, if something is really needed? After all - almost everyone else does. Look at the Federal government!"

The answer lies in the state laws and constitution. documents which have undoubtedly helped keep TEXAS one of the most financially sound states in the nation. The State government is forbidden from going into debt to finance any of its operations, and County governments are expected to do likewise.

Any rulings on the subject have always followed the

same line. Consider statements from the late Judge J.C. Davis, County Judge of Haskell County and long-time Assistant State Attorney General. This was part of a speech given in 1965 at a Convention of County Judges and Commissioners.

"A talk of this kind would not be complete without reminding you that all funds must be expended in accordance with the County budget.

"The County budget is the same thing to the County, its officials and employees and that the Biennial Appropriations Act is to the State of Texas, its officials and employees.

"Stated another way, no County money can be expended unless it is expressly

appropriated and allocated in the County budget."

The Judge cited the Attorney General's opinions, including one in 1943, 1944 and 1945.

These rulings have been upheld in recent developments in Comanche County. Commissioners of that County, under pressure from a verbal recommendation issued by 220th District Judge James Morgan, paid an outstanding County debt of \$140,000.

Judge Morgan, pointing out the illegality of the County operating in the red, told the Commissioners to pay its debts of fact court action.

Comanche County Judge Bobbye Allen also said County governments, as well as other government bodies,

cannot operate with a deficit according to state law.

Eastland County, according to information available, has never operated with its general fund in the red, not has it ever defaulted on a debt - even in the worst of times.

"The County has a high financial rating, and its securities are readily marketable because of its reputation," states County Judge Scott Bailey. "We hope to keep it that way."

The major outstanding debt at this time is the remainder of the Jail payments, which total around \$133,000 annually. The upcoming County budget for 1985-86 is expected to total more than \$2 million dollars.

Joe Cooper, Cisco Accountant, spoke to the Eastland Rotary Club Monday with a discussion on the Eastland County Parents Against Dangerous Drugs, PADD, who have for three years worked in Eastland County against distributors of "bad drugs".

Due to increased cooperation between the law enforcement agencies and PADD, 13 indictments were handed down in Ranger during June and the Cisco police department report 15 drug cases in May.

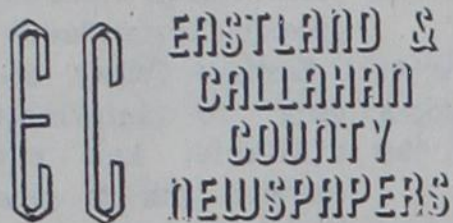

Rep. Jim Parker Reports... P.O. Box 2910 Austin, Tx. 78769

A recent coincidental occurrence affecting McLennan County would seem to be noteworthy in light of one of my recent columns concerning individual rights. In a case styled Morrow vs. Harwell that was recently decided by the U.S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals, the courts said that counties have an obligation to furnish county jail prisoners with better access to a law library, and further, appears to indicate that counties should also provide prisoners with professional assistance, perhaps over and above the assistance of a retained or court-appointed attorney.

This would, of course, be well and good except for one small matter, that being the fact that it costs money. As I previously stated, and as each of you know, each time rights are granted to some

special group such as, in this case, county jail prisoners, some other group must necessarily give up some rights. In this instance the right given up by county taxpayers is obviously the right to keep some additional amount of their earnings for themselves, as opposed to paying additional taxes necessary to support the program.

Perhaps a digression, but I do not think the average citizen realizes that county government and county officials have spent at least the last 25 years as "firefighters." By this I mean that county officials have been bombarded with demands from the state and Federal government, furnished no additional mechanism to pay the cost for the demands and have had to serve in the position and con-

dition of simply trying to take care of what remain. Taken as a whole, these county officials have done an extremely good job but I think are about as far as they can go without some funding base other than ad valorem taxation.

I recently have personally gone through reevaluation of some of my property. Most of it was valued for tax purposes at an amount greatly in excess of an amount I would actually take for the property in a sale. I can only conclude that, as I said, we must be close the end of the time when ad valorem taxes can support so many of the so called rights of certain groups.


I think I can see some reasonable movement toward greater reliance on sales tax and other possible funding mechanisms;

we'll miss the telephone operators as much as we missed the steam engines and their whistles from the railroads when the diesel trains took over.

BEFORE COMING to Cisco, we lived in a town of about 2,000. The telephone operator was kind of a business associate. You could be out of town a half day and the operator would, upon your return, tell you who was looking for you and what for.

The story of the telephone's progress records many instances of where the operators have saved their communities in storms and fires by staying at their switch boards in emergencies. Mrs. A.M. Worley, the Cisco chief operator with 47 years of service, can tell you about several cases.

AS YOU KNOW, as the dial telephones go into use five of Cisco's 28 operators will leave the payroll here. One will transfer to Eastland, one will resign to be married, one will resign for personal reasons, and two will be terminated. The last two were hired a few months ago with the understanding that their jobs could last until dial conversion.

The dial equipment is replacing the system that was installed new in 1920 in the building over McCracken's Grocery. A fire had destroyed the telephone exchange, which had been located in the building over Home Supply Co. Four employees now working for the company were with them then - Johnnie Mae McCullough, Zola McDonald, Clara Huntington and Thelma Watson... Mrs. Huntington recalls that the first telephone call placed on the new 1920 system was from T&P Depot to the T&P Freight office at 10:05 a.m.... They won't be able to tell who makes the first local call with the dial equipment. We'll give you the word Tuesday about the first long distance call.

THE RECORD book shows that the first telephone system came to Cisco in 1893, being started by a man named Frank Vernon. The pioneer system had about 40 subscribers at \$1 per month and the repairman used a fishing pole to work on the wires... Mr. Vernon built the first long distance line in the country - a 9-mile line from Cisco to Eastland... In 1898 the system was sold to Mitchell and McFadden. In 1902 a freezing rainy spell broke down all the lines, and they sold out to Ben James. He increased the subscribers to 103 and to 280 by 1905 when he sold out to Henry Benham. The Bell company bought the Cisco system in 1912. By 1918, there were over 500 phones and a payroll of some 15 people... By January, 1956, there were over 2,030 phones and the number of employees was up to about 60.

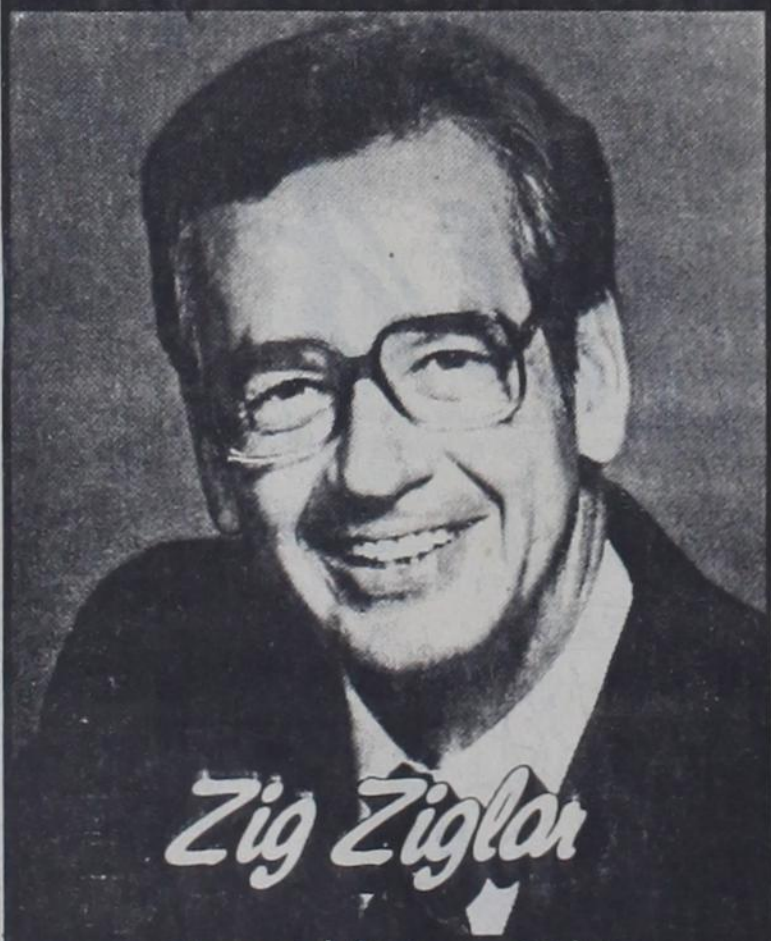

Area News Briefs

CISCO

Don Shephard, a resident of the Cisco area, has been employed as manager of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce. His wife, Janice, is a teacher in the Cisco schools, and two of their children attend Cisco schools. The two older children are married and live in Beaumont and Houston. The new CofC manager worked for the Texas Youth Council and an Industrial contracting firm before moving here to operate S and S Enterprises, a water well pump and water conditioning service. "With everyone helping," Shephard says, "we will help bring new industry and see growth in Cisco, because that is what keeps a town going. It takes a certain amount of money to run a town, and the town will receive the money either from sales taxes or land tax," he says. He plans to work with the Chamber to help promote the town in a number of ways.

Spotlights and Sidelights

CHILD ABUSE

SUGGESTIONS

"An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," is an old adage that certainly does apply to the welfare of our youngsters.

These are guidelines for parents, and this column is devoted to some of them. For the sake of your children, go beyond these suggestions. Don't think, "Nothing will happen to my child." Though we pray nothing bad ever will, it is a possibility.

The most important element in your sexual abuse prevention program may be communication.

Instinct carries a child a long way, but explore all the means you can to make sure your youngster talks to you about everything. If you don't know how important a new Barbie-doll outfit is or what an exciting thing it was to cut the rattles off a snake Gran'pa killed, do you think there's much chance of hearing how "funny" it makes the kid feel when Uncle Fudd or Aunt Dudd plants a wet smack square in the kisser?

The sloppy kiss may, of course, be merely an exam-

ple of someone who never learned the gradations of osculation and not an indication of evil intent.

Though I am a kisser-affectionate, but not sloppy—I recognize that not everyone is, and in this day and age, not everyone should be. It goes against my grain to hear parents urge, "Give Soands O a big kiss&" When the last thing the reluctant child wants is to kiss Soands or get kissed by the same.

Trust the child. If s/he doesn't want to be kissed, hugged, patted, or petted, so be it. "Don't like it" is not just a contrary answer. The younger the child, the less able will s/he be to explain why something is not liked, so don't press for a reason.

Growing up is not easy at best. Get down on the floor and put the word in childhood perspective. Prettywesome with all that bulk and physical activity circulating above your head, isn't it?

Is it any wonder that the small fry incline toward keeping a secret impressed upon them by one of these giants? They are physically unable to cope, and when the

threat of something bad happening to their parents if they "tell" is added, what is the natural course for the child?

No matter what you do for preventative measures nor how well you do it, you may be faced with an accomplished fact sometime. A highly emotional reaction in the abused child's presence should be avoided. Privately, you may hult plates against the wall, stamp holes in the floor, and/or draw and quarter the culprit. Publicly expressing the outrage you feel could only make the child think he's the one guilty of wrong-doing.

In attempting to avoid such an experience, be involved in your children's lives as more than a cook or a coach. Show affection and attention. It is commendable to attend to the live-and-spinach aspect of baby's life, but if s/he learns to smell the roses at the same time, it will be easier to speak explicitly about the privacy and care of the body.

If your tot gets a sympathetic ear about this "pefec'ly ado'ble dragon"

living unde the bed, s/he will tell about being offered candy and balloons by this stranger never seen before.

Some way impress upon your children that they never, never, NEVER should have "secrets" outside the family. Promises not to tell don't "count" at home. Tell, if someone asks you to take off your clothes. Tell, if someone takes a picture. Tell, Tell, Tell&

These are only a few leaves from the jungle.

If your child, of whatever age, is a victim of sexual abuse, enjoy a guilt trip if you must, but do it privately. Publicly, you go for the juglar with the strong light of exposure to prevent another child's injury.

You will be applauded and denigrated. You will not have a happy time, but you will take action for the sake of all children.

Inasmuch as ye have done it for the least of these...
