COUNTY DEMOCRATS ASKING CONNER APPOINTMENT SOON

A group of some 30-35 Democrats met in Eastland Thursday evening and passed a resolution asking that Gov. John Connally take immediate action in filling the vacant 91st District Court bench.

The resolution further urged Gov. Connally to appoint Earl Conner Jr., describing him as most-qualified for the position because of his judicial ability, as well as being a loyal Democrat.

County Chairman Alvin Crawley of Ranger was out of town, and Don Pierson,

Eastland precinct chairman, presided at the meeting. Democrats were present at the Commissioners Courtroom meeting from Ranger, Cisco, Eastland, Olden, Rising Star, Carbon and Gorman.

A copy of the resolution will be given to Mike Collins who will go to Austin Tuesday or Wednesday to confer with aides in the governor's office concerning the appointment, a spokesman said.

Names of those present at the meeting were not taken and will not appear on the resolution, it was reported.

One Of Three Highway Projects In County Is Nearing Completion

The State Highway Department has over \$4 million worth of highway work going in three projects in Eastland County as the calendar ticks into the New Year, 1965.

One of the projects is nearing completion and the other two are "in full swing," reports Resident Engineer R. P. (Buddy) Haun this week.

The six miles of Interstate 20 west of Cisco to the Callahan County line is expected to be completed by the first of February.

Grading and structures are nearing completion on State 206 from Highway 80 to Cross Plains, and engineers expect to begin hauling base material for that 14-mile stretch some time in the next three weeks, he said.

Structures are complete and grading is nearly done on the six mile Interstate 20 job east of Ranger, he said, with base hauling to begin shortly.

INSTANT LANDSCAPING A relatively new system of landscaping and erosion control is being utilized on the Int. 20 project west of Cisco. Contractor Cecil Ruby is plowing the slopes and should be formed, then fertilizing and grass seeding. Then the lot is sprayed with a light coat of asphalt which tends to hold the moisture in and helps the grass mature.

KOKOMO-CARBON ROAD County Commissioner Glenn Justice will probably begin the buying right of way soon for the eight-mile Kokomo-Carbon Farm-to-Market 2526 road. Right of way data for the project is nearing completion and will be turned over to the commissioners court soon, it is reported.

PUBLIC IS INVITED  
2 DROWN NEW YEARS DAY  
IN SEPARATE INCIDENTS

Tragedy struck twice in Eastland on New Years Day as two persons, a 47-year-old man and a 17-year-old youth, were drowned in separate incidents.

Dead were Earl Platters, 47, whose body was found about 10:30 a. m. in Leon Creek just north of the T&P Railway tracks, and W. B. Wilson, Jr., 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Wilson Sr. of N. Virginia, who drowned when he fell into the Power Plant Lake, east of Eastland about 4 p.m.

Justice of the Peace Wells Dalton ruled accidental death in the drowning of young Wilson, but withheld a verdict in the Platters death pending further investigation.

Young Wilson and two companions were fishing at the Texas Electric Service Co. power plant lake, and he reportedly fell from a bluff into the icy water. The body remained in the water about an hour before being recovered. Platters, a carpenter, lived at the Eastland Hotel on East

Main St., was found in about five feet of water in the Creek some 400 yards north of the T&P tracks, along Highway 6.

Both bodies were at Arrington Hammer Funeral Home where funeral arrangements are to be announced.

Young Wilson had been employed at Warren's Welding Shop and had most recently been employed in construction work near downtown.

County Sheriff L. E. Sublett, who took his oath of office at 10 a. m. Friday, led investigations.

The companions, Roger Woodall and Hubert Harden, told officers they attempted to throw a rope to Wilson, but that he was unable to reach it.

Eastland firemen, police and sheriff's officers and other local citizens answered the call for help. The body was recovered by firemen in 12 feet of water near the foot of the bluff.

Eastland To Be Host For Meet

Oscar E. Castillon, manager of the Area Development Division of Texas Electric Service Co., will be one of the principal speakers at the second EC-65 Training Seminar, according to an announcement by the Texas Industrial Commission.

The meeting will be held in Eastland Wednesday, Jan. 6 at the White Elephant Restaurant beginning at 9 a.m.

This will be the second in a series of five seminars sponsored by the Texas Industrial Commission in conjunction with EC-65, the industrial development pilot project for Eastland County. This second seminar is called "Research and Analysis." There will be three other training sessions in the coming months.

Castillon has been associated with Texas Electric Service Company since 1956. He is a graduate of Texas Christian University and the Industrial Development Institute at Oklahoma University. He has been manager of the division since January 1964. The topic of his talk will be "Favorable Economic Factors for Eastland County."

Other speakers scheduled for the seminar are Dr. W. L. Fisher, Research Scientist and Lecturer for the University of Texas, and James Bradley, Head of the Industrial Economics Research Division, Texas A&M University. Harry W. Clark, Executive Director of the Texas Industrial Commission, will be in charge of the session.

Mr. Bradley has been in the field of industrial economic research for 14 years. During this period he has conducted research projects on industrial location factors, community economic analysis, industry studies and market research studies for industries contemplating moving to Texas and for existing industries in the state.

Bradley is active in numerous state and regional industrial development organizations such as the Gulf Area Development Association, American Marketing Association, Southern Industrial Development Council, and the American Industrial Development Council and he has served this organization as secretary, vice president, and presently is president of the Council. He is a city councilman in Bryan and serves on the Board of Directors of the Bryan-College Station Chamber of Commerce.

### Crawley Asks Special Election For 91st Judge

A successor to fill the two-year unexpired term of the late Judge Turner M. Collie as magistrate of Eastland County's 91st District Court should be chosen through a special election, A. E. Crawley, chairman of the Eastland County Democratic executive committee, said Saturday.

It is reported that Gov. John Connally will make an appointment to fill the vacant judgeship and three Eastland county lawyers have been mentioned — new District Attorney Perry T. Brown of Rising Star, ex-District Attorney Earl Conner Jr. of Eastland, and Frank Sparks, veteran attorney, also of Eastland.

Supporter of the three possible appointees have been conducting spirited campaigns in their behalf, creating considerable issue between Democrats of the county.

"The office of district judge belongs to the people," Chairman Crawley said, "and if legally possible it is my opinion that Gov. Connally should call a special election to settle this matter.

"If not," the Eastland County party chairman said, "the Governor should call upon the Democratic leaders of the thirteen precincts of the county to meet, make recommendations, and arrive at a Democratic decision relative to this appointment."

Chairman Crawley said that the county Democratic executive committee had not met regarding filling the judgeship vacancy and added that the session of a group of Democrats held in Eastland at the courthouse Thursday night was unofficial.

"I resent the statement in the Thursday edition of Abilene Reporter-News," he said, "in which it was inferred another Eastland County Democrat presided in the absence of the Eastland County Democratic chairman. As a matter of fact," he added, "I knew nothing of such a meeting. And certainly it wasn't official."

STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF EASTLAND NOTICE is hereby given that the undersigned intend to apply to the Fifty-ninth Legislature of the State of Texas for the passage of a law...

Such legislation will create a hospital district under Article IX, Section 9 of the Texas Constitution embracing all of the territory which is contained within Commissioners' Precinct No. 4 of Eastland County, Texas.

The legislation shall provide that the District shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for the needy residing within the District and shall have power through its Board of Directors to issue and sell as the obligations of such hospital district bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition and repair or renovations of buildings and improvements and equipping same for hospital purposes and to levy a tax creating an interest and sinking fund to pay the interest on and principal of such bonds as same mature, to provide for the operation and maintenance of the District and its hospital system and for the acquisition of necessary sites therefor by purchase, lease or condemnation, provided that said tax shall not exceed 75c on the \$100.00 valuation of all taxable property within the District.

The legislation shall also provide that such District shall not be created unless or until an election is held at which such election there shall be submitted to the qualified property taxing electors the proposition of whether or not Cisco Hospital District shall be created with the authority to levy annual taxes at a rate not to exceed 75c on a \$100.00 valuation of all taxable property within such District, and a majority of the qualified property taxing electors vote in said election in favor of the proposition.

The above enumeration of provisions to be contained in such legislation is not intended to be exclusive but only to express the general purpose, nature and substance thereof. Such legislation will also make other provisions and confer other powers in connection with the general purpose and nature thereof above stated. GIVEN this 9th day of December, 1964.
