'Vote' Day Set For Saturday Primary Election

Cast Your Vote At The Corral Room Here 7' Till 7

Saturday, May 3 is "V" Day—Vote Day all over Eastland County—and Texas.

Its Primary Election Day—the day on which the political parties pick their nominees for the various offices for the November General Election.

Democrats will be voting in nine precincts in the county and Republicans will be marking ballots at City Hall in Eastland. Democratic Precincts are: Eastland, Olden, Ranger, Desdemona, Gorman, Carbon, Rising Star, Cisco, and Lake Leon.

In statewide races there are two hotly-contested races for State Railroad Commissioner; four State Supreme Court seats to be filled (two contested); and three contested seats on the State Court of Criminal Appeals.

Closer to home, the frantic race drawing most attention. Jim R. Wright, Truman P. Kirk, Saul Pullman and Bill B. Hart are seeking the office.

Another race of county interest is that for sheriff, which pits Jim Williams, Kenneth Eaves and Johnnie W. Morren.

One other race of county significance, but to be decided only by Eastland voters is that for County Commissioner, Precinct One. Incumbent Danny Woods is contested by Richard Robinson.

Eastland County voters will play an important role in helping select the State Senator, District 22, nominee. Democrats Bob Glasgow of Stephenville and Walt Parker of Denton seek the Democratic nomination. Jay Brummett of Cleburne is seeking the GOP nomination for the office, and unopposed, will face the Democratic nominee in the fall.

Democrats will mark a non-binding presidential preference referendum with Jimmy Carter, Edward M.

Kennedy, Jerry Brown and uncommitted choices. Republicans will offer Ronald Reagan, George Bush and uncommitted, as well as referendums on wire tapping and initiative and referendum.

U.S. Cong. Charles Stenholm, State Rep. Joe Hanna, Appeals Court Justice Bob Dickenson, and County Tax Assessor-Collector Nancy Trout are unopposed for re-election.

There is a constable race in Gorman pitting Johnny Ingram and Dewey Keese.

Absentee balloting ended at 5 p.m. Tuesday at the County Courthouse.

Estimates of the voter turnout Saturday, run from "very light" to "very heavy"—with no clear indication, but best educated guesses are that local races and interest could pull more voters than the county's usual light turnout.

Polls are open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., and under new laws, both the County Clerk's Office and the Registration (Tax Office) will be open the same hours.

Party precinct conventions are scheduled for 2 p.m. Saturday at most voting sites. There are no party contests, but workers are urging party faithfuls to attend their conventions in order to show support at this time.

Other unopposed county officers are County Commissioner, Precinct Three (Rising Star, Carbon, Gorman) L.T. Owen; Eastland Constable Bill Hunter; Ranger Constable J.W. Vinson; Rising Star Constable Howard Hicks; and Cisco Constable S.E. Parkinson.

Mrs. Scott J. Bailey is County Democratic Chairman and Early Bradley is County Republican Chairman.

Bill B. Hart Issues Formal Statement

Bill B. Hart, Eastland County attorney, issues his formal statement in behalf of his candidacy.

"My experience as a practicing attorney; as a prosecuting attorney for the State; as city attorney for the City of Midland with its administrative, office, and trial practice; and as a civil attorney qualifies me to serve as your District Judge of the 91st District Court.

The District Court sets the pattern for both law enforcement and the attitude toward law in this County. In turn the District Judge sets the pattern for the District Court.

I have learned thru 29 years as a trial lawyer that the mere calling of cases for trial is a small part of the District Court. Each case involves a part of someone's life, sometimes a small part, sometimes a large part.

The District Judge must use wisdom in adjudicating each case, whether it affects a person's property or his life.

Cases involving quick judgments are in the minority. The majority of the cases yield themselves to decisions demanding mature judgment which comes from knowledge and experience in life and law.

On February 17, I advocated and initiated in my advertisement the idea of a proper probation system that would make sure those on probation receive adequate supervision and counseling. This is not a State or Federal program. The probation officer is hired by the District Judge and paid by the County.

Throughout my campaign I have discussed volunteer counselors working under the supervision of a trained probation officer. I discovered this program in "Worldwide Challenge", (November, 1979). This program initiated by Judge Keith



Leenhouts of Detroit has proven effective for over 20 years, and is now a national program. I studied it, I like it, and I will put it into effect immediately.

On April 10, I advocated and initiated in my advertisement the idea of a proper pre-trial procedure. This involves working with trial lawyers. I have earned the respect of the lawyers of Eastland County and the lawyers of this area in serving as President of the Eastland County Bar Association continuously since 1967.

By serving as a member and immediate past Chairman of the 14-C Grievance Committee, which investigates complaints against lawyers, covering an area from Big Spring to Graham, I have worked with and gained the respect of the lawyers as well as laymen. Without this respect and experience no pre-trial procedure will work. I can and will make it work.

A proper pre-trial procedure will save jurors wasted hours and the County thousands of dollars in jury fees. I will put this pre-trial procedure into effect immediately.

I have from the beginning of this campaign brought out the necessity of a proper probation procedure; a pre-trial procedure; and efficient use of juror's time and County's money.

You have the right to expect the Judge of the 91st District Court to have integrity, maturity, and experience. I measure up to these guidelines.

Your consideration, your vote, and your support will be appreciated."

Kenneth Eaves Issues Sheriff Statement

Kenneth N. Eaves, age 34, has filed as a candidate for Eastland County Sheriff in the upcoming Democratic Primary. Mr. Eaves is currently serving as Chief of Police in Cisco.

Eaves has over 1100 hours of law enforcement training including the Austin Police Department Academy and In-Service Training and courses at Central Texas College. He was also chosen as one of the five from among 450 officers to receive special training at the FBI Academy in 1974.

Eaves has been commissioned as a Texas Peace Officer since 1971. He has a total of seven years experience including Austin where he served on patrol and traffic and a special assignment unit working plain clothes in high crime areas and the Hays County Sheriff's Office. He served briefly in the Eastland County Sheriff's Office during the summer of 1979 resigning shortly after Ronnie White. In July he accepted the position as Chief of Police for the City of Cisco.

Eaves is a native of Carbon. A 1964 graduate of Comanche High School, Eaves has sixty college hours. Most of these hours were received in 1964 and 1965 when he attended Tarleton State University.

Eaves is married and has two children, Laura Jean, age 8, and Cary Neil, age 2. His wife, Harriett Ann, received a B.S.E.D. degree from Abilene Christian University and a M.Ed. from the University of Texas at Austin. She has been teaching ten years and is currently teaching English and Spanish at Ranger High School. The couple has been married twelve years. They are member of the Church of Christ on I-20 in Cisco.

Eaves says, as Sheriff, he would strive for more effective use of man hours and investigative time. "If elected, my department will work hard to serve all citizens fairly, taking each case on its own merits and acting on each case to best serve justice and the law.

"I will encourage citizen participation in the reporting of suspicious activities in order to insure a climate of cooperation and discourage criminal activity. I would further like to increase cooperation among municipal, county and state law enforcement agencies."

Eaves is hoping to meet as many residents as possible. However, his job as Chief of Police in Cisco must come first and politics second. If he does not get to tell you personally he would like each of you to know that your vote and support will be greatly appreciated.

O'Brien Is Citizen's Award Recipient

The Eighth Annual Eastland County Law Enforcement Association Banquet, held to show appreciation for the public's support, turned out to be possibly the most timely event ever staged.

Speaker for the banquet Friday, the day of the announced tragically unsuccessful hostage rescue, was U.S. State Dept. Soviet Expert, Bill Farrand.

With world problems much on their minds, the

large crowd attending the Siebert Elementary School Banquet, heard a professional explain the importance of "attempting to understand" the Soviet mind.

Dr. Bill Auvenshine, Dean of Students, Ranger, Junior College, was master of ceremonies, and introduced the EHS Singers under the direction of Mrs. Bill B. Hart, in a highly patriotic program enjoyed by all.

Association President Emory Walton welcomed the audience and explained the purpose of the annual get-together. The Rev. Delbert Smith, pastor First Baptist Church, Carbon, gave the invocation. It was announced that the presentation of the Lawmen Award, given annually by Eastland County Newspapers, will be presented at a later date.

County Judge Scott Bailey presented the Association's Citizen Award to H.V. O'Brien, publisher of the Eastland County Newspapers, explaining that the county native is a graduate of Carbon High School, Cisco Junior College

and Hardin-Simmons University. The editor was cited for his long practice of cooperation and assistance to law enforcement in general and the Association in particular.

O'Brien's wife, Gay Nell and their children, Vance and Amy, were invited to join in receiving the beautiful plaque, which was accepted on behalf of the "usually silent" majority of the people who do appreciate and support good law enforcement.

"These are 'strange times,'" Mr. Farrand said, as he called to mind the Iranian problems, and the recent Soviet Union invasion of Afghanistan, pointing out the record of basic U.S.-USSR relations.

In the '70s, he said, we saw a relaxation of tensions in a thing called detente. Stating that we are on a rough parity with the Soviets in thermal nuclear power, in which either could "wipe out" the other in a matter of "hours," he said, it is a fact of life that our foreign policy is linked to that of the Soviet Union, whether we like it or not.

"It's to everybody's advantage that we get along." Another basic fact, he said, is that the Soviets and Americans think very differently. A strong central government is basic to the Soviets where as, we would prefer less government.

If it could be considered a bright spot, he said, the Soviet's do have internal weakness, in spite of their obvious power. They are an insecure nation: in 63 years since the revolution, there have been no formal elections, and only four top leaders. "Soviet law protects the state from the people," he said.

They have a weak, fragile system, he said, and economically, their production is low and their family units are not replacing their population, mainly because the average apartment size is only 95 square meters.

Boredom is the number one problem, and with their growing energy problem, they're going to need "Houston-type" expertise to drill the hostile Siberian oil fields.

He emphasized that he did not attempt to apologize for the Soviets or to "take their side" but attempted to show how they think, so that we can better understand our adversary. Sure, we relaxed the tension in the '70s, and we probably put too much weight on detente. It was a great hope, and we've seen it dashed. They haven't changed: detente didn't mean the same to them as it does to us, and they're definitely on a up-curve in arms, and we don't even seem to be able to get passed a military registration.

What unraveled detente? Salt I passed easily in '72—six years later Salt II bogged down, and then we started trading with China and the Soviets who fear China, started asking, "What's going on?"

Why did they invade Afghanistan? Warm water port. Oil. A buffer against the Islamic Central Asian countries.

We've taken the steps we have to show the Soviets that

She survived the broken neck; she was alive. But she would never walk again and against that she rebelled with all the quiet rage of her Scandinavian heritage. Every step along the road to recovery was an obstacle she refused to face...until, drawing on her faith in God, she saw a person to her existence and began the long, hard fight toward rehabilitation. Not always winning, but never giving up.

Joni Eareckson's story proves that a severely handicapped person can be a champion. This strong-willed, athletic young woman who fought the facts of her fate with a quiet rage inherent in her Scandinavian background, never gave in. Instead, she turned adversity around and became a winner.

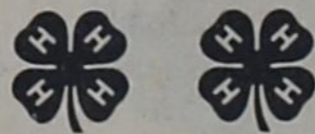
"JONI" is a powerful motion picture that ends on a very positive note, because that's the way Joni's life has turned out.

Cisco Shooting Incident Clarified

The facts concerning an incident in Cisco Monday aren't exactly as reported in an out-of-town newspaper Tuesday morning, according to law enforcement officers here.

The report indicated that Sheriff Johnnie W. Morren had been "traded" in exchange for Cisco Police Chief Kenneth Eaves.

Sheriff Morren gives this account:
"Between 6:30 and 7 p.m. Monday, Chief Eaves called me and told me that Bill Swindle wanted to talk to me. I asked Eaves if he was in danger. He said, 'I don't think so.'"
I asked to speak to Swindle, and asked him if he was holding the lawmen. He said, "No, I want them to leave."
Texas Ranger George Frasier, who was at the scene shortly after the incident began, said Tuesday that Swindle was holding a gun on Chief Eaves at the time of the telephone conversation.

Later Eaves and Swindle came out of the house and Frasier met them, and Swindle agreed to talk with the Ranger at gun point. When they went into the house, Frasier talked the gun away from Swindle, but he grabbed another one, and the Ranger saw an opportunity to get in from him and did.

Sheriff Morren went on to say that he and Deputy Ben Sancillo went immediately to the Cisco address, 1010 Ave. J, and there found Ranger Frasier leading Swindle out of the house.

The man was taken to the Justice of the Peace A.C. Holder's office where his rights were read, and charges of holding the officers were filed. Bond was set at \$5,000.00.

Swindle also faces possible

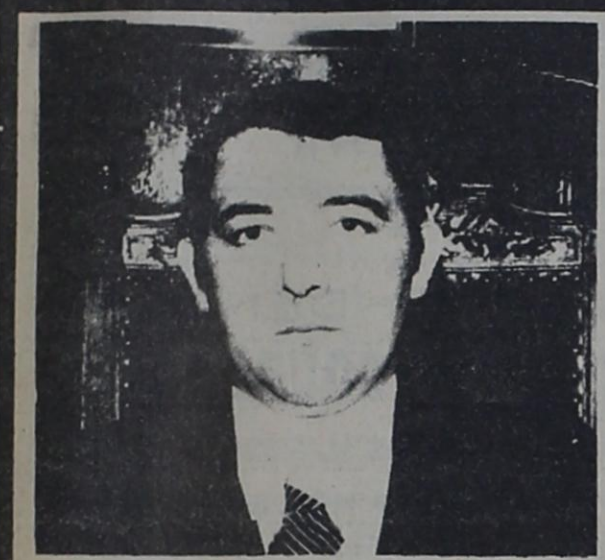
charges in connection with the shooting of Bob Watson, who received a gunshot wound in the leg and is in Graham Hospital.

Chief Eaves said he is grateful that the incident was concluded without some being killed.

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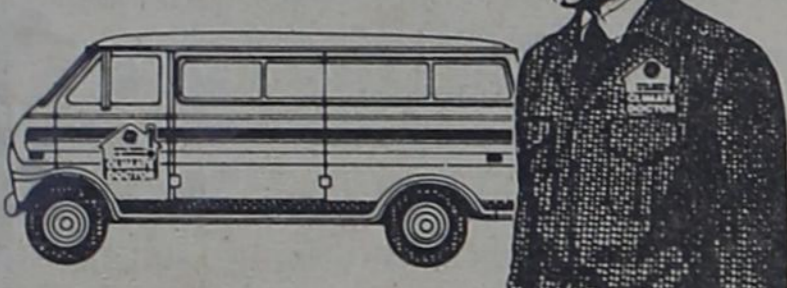
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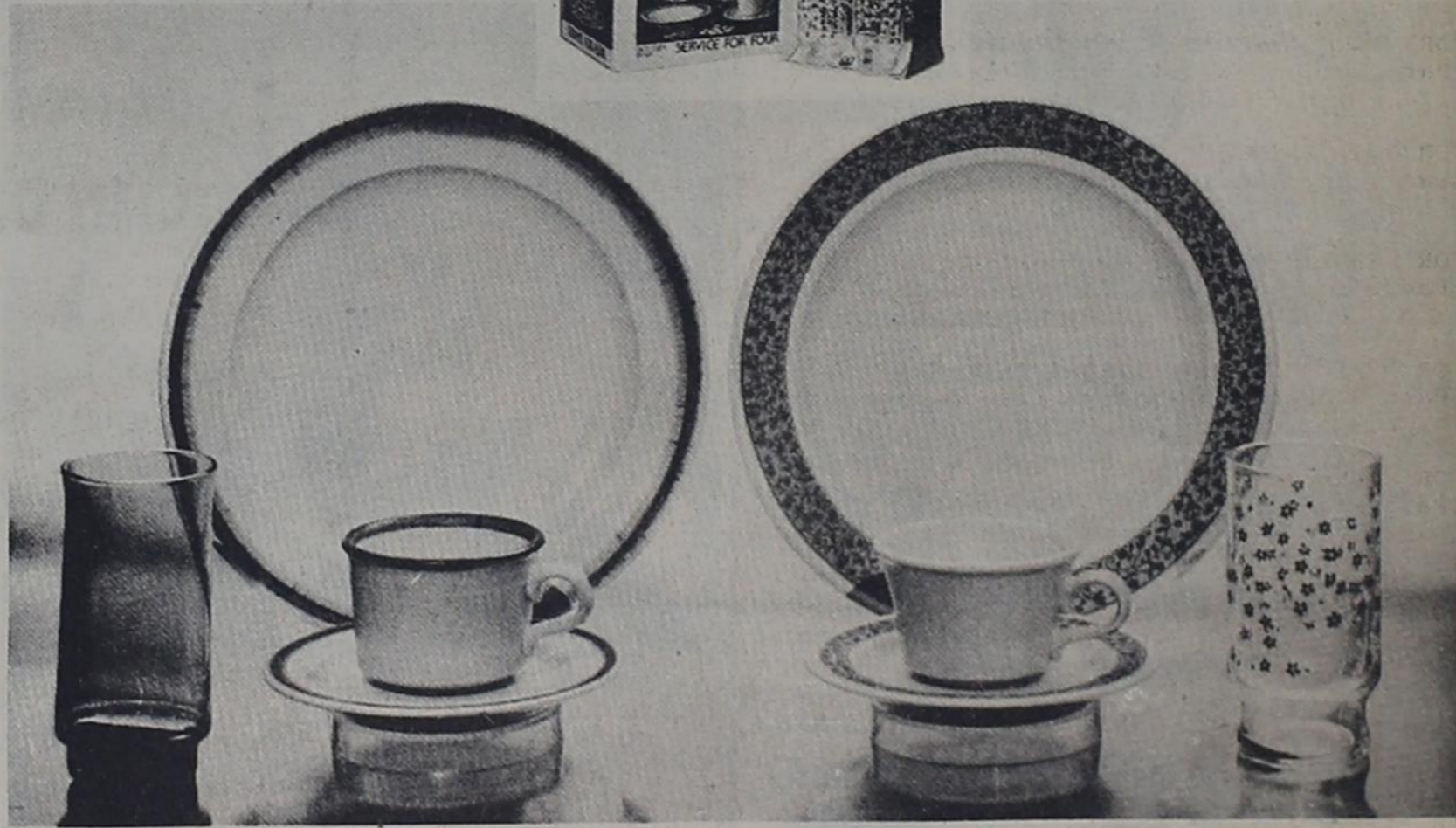
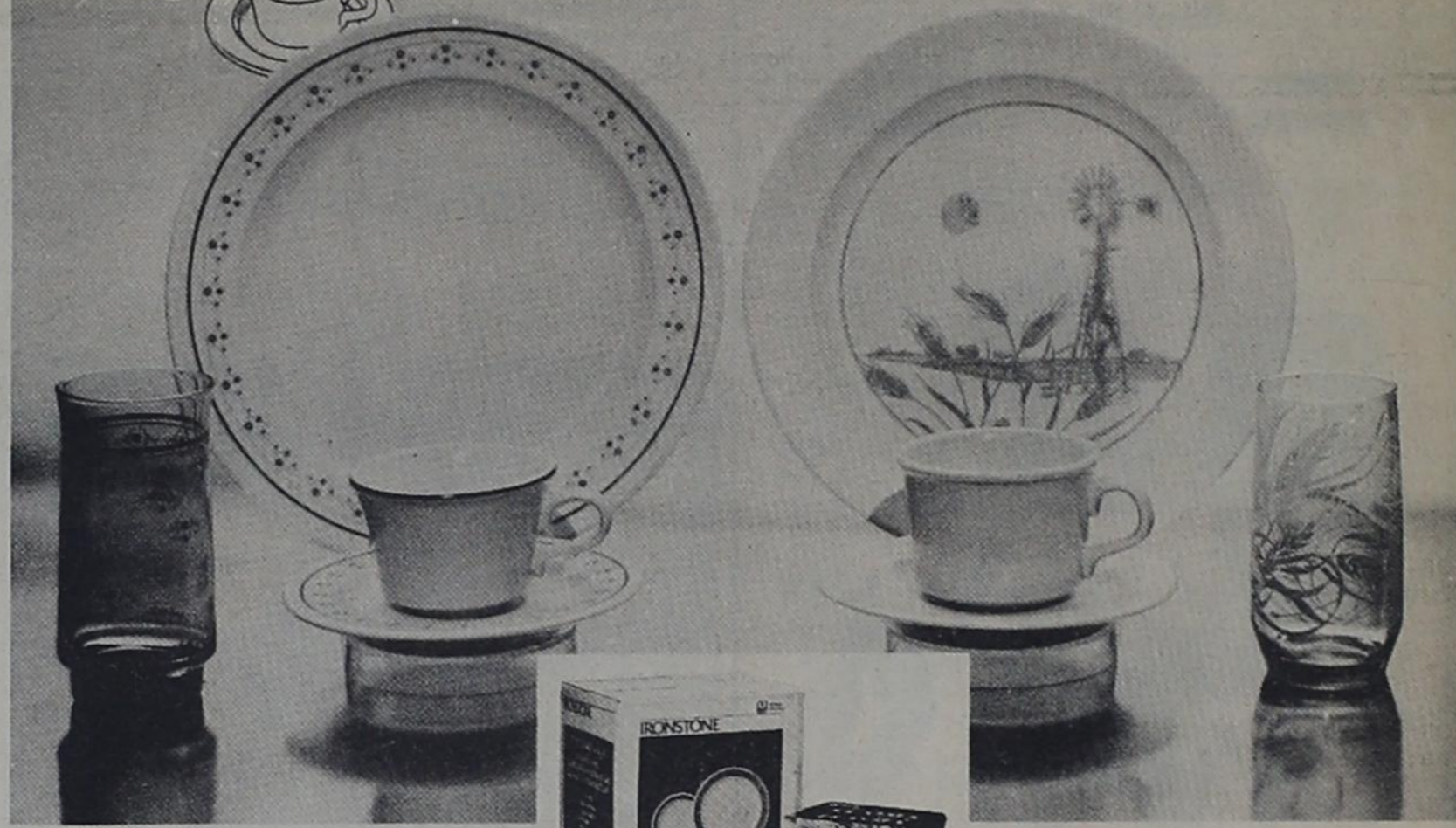
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Letters TO THE EDITOR

PEANUT OUTLOOK FOR 1980

COLLEGE STATION—Even though U.S. peanut producers harvested a good 1979 crop, their net income is down because of high production costs and low prices received.

Peanut supplies for 1979-80 nationally are estimated at 4.7 billion pounds, said Johnny R. Feagan, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Harvested acres in 1979 were about the same as 1978, with increased yields representing about a three percent increase in production.

Since peanut prices have been relatively low compared to competitive foods, domestic use of peanuts for food in the United States reached a record 2 billion pounds in 1979. This is the equivalent of over nine pounds of in-shell peanuts per person, Feagan said.

Peanut exports have been at record levels the last two seasons, totaling more than 1.1 billion pounds in 1978-79. Feagan said exports for 1980 look good.

"U.S. peanuts have been competitively priced in world markets since world supplies from exporting countries were down, however, India will be exporting considerably more peanuts in 1980 so this could reduce U.S. peanut exports," he noted.

Feagan said there will be little change in U.S. peanut production in 1980 because of the strict control program. Much of the increased volume comes from increasing dryland yields and favorable weather conditions.

Because of the peanut program, acreage is stable and prices do not vary much to farmers. With an average loan rate of \$455 per ton for quota peanuts, Feagan said producers feel the cost-price squeeze more each year. "Each farmer needs to know his production costs to decide how many acres he can economically produce," Feagan emphasized. Efforts

are being directed toward increasing the quota loan rate and getting an increase in additional peanut support rate up from \$250 per ton.

He said it's important that producers know in advance what rates are for their crop and contract prices for additional peanuts. In the past, shellers waited until planting time before offering a contract. This forced farmers to make hasty peanut contract decisions.

Texas peanut farmers harvested about 309,000 acres in 1979. Texas and Oklahoma producers continue to plant Spanish varieties, with the majority in the Runner variety. Feagan said Texas producers will probably plant their allotments again in 1980 and hope for a record crop.

The District Manager reports good progress in this area of the follow-up phase of the 1980 Census of Population and Housing. Census takers are following-up on missing census questionnaires by visiting addresses from which householders have not yet mailed their back, as well as telephoning most households from which questionnaires were returned inadequately filled out.

The manager asks householders to welcome these

census takers when they call and to give them full cooperation in supplying the required census information. But you should always ask to see their official credential before admitting them to your home. It is a red, white, and blue ID card bearing the U.S. Department of Commerce seal.

The manager stressed that, because the count of the Nation's population was to be for one day, April 1, everyone who was in the household on that day should be listed on the question-

naire, but not anyone who has moved in since.

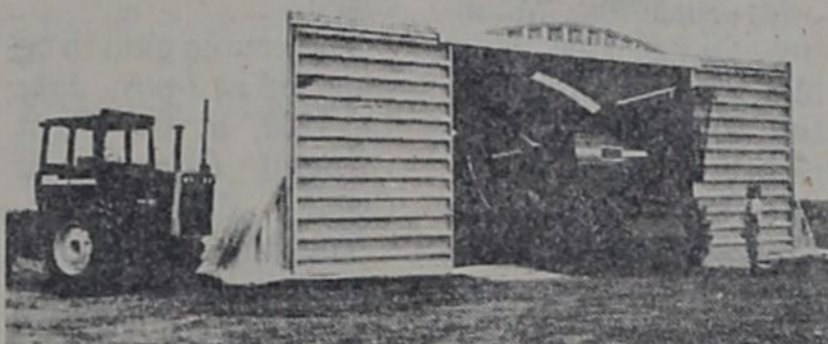

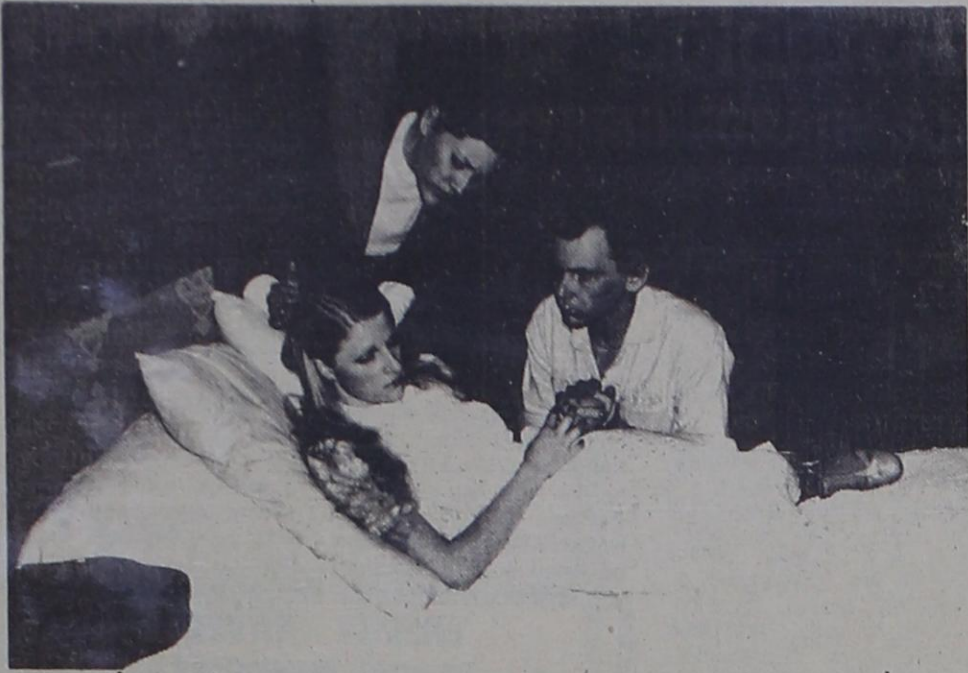

'Big Country Audiences Ready For Change Of Pace At Roof Garden Dinner Theatre'

Cisco Junior College drama director, Marion Castleberry says "that Big Country audiences are ready for a change of pace at the Roof Garden Dinner Theatre in Cisco." Last week Castleberry explained why he turned from a successful string of comedies to a serious drama. "We have presented six consecutive successful comedies, and I feel that our theatre goers are ready for a change of pace. Those people who enjoy live drama will enjoy the presentation of one of the great dramas of modern theatre."

Since the opening of "The Glass Menagerie" Thursday night, it is obvious that CJC has once presented a quality production. The measure of success of "The Glass Menagerie" opening night was not the accustomed laughter at the Roof Garden; this time success was measured by an occasional tear and a lump in the throat. The audience was treated to a smooth flowing, technically precise performance and in depth characterizations by an experienced cast.

The play is presented in the round. Castleberry has ingeniously built the set on three levels to insure all theatre goers of an unobstructed view of the action.

This play is Tennessee Williams' first play, and many consider it to be his greatest work. The story is about a mother, Amanda Wingfield, and her attempt to make a good life for her two children, Laura and Tom, who are at the time of the play in their early twenties. Laura is painfully shy, and her one-time Southern belle mother tries desperately to get a young man for her since she has never

dated. In the powerful climax scene, Amanda for the first time realizes Laura's limitations. Amanda's son Tom narrates the story, and the events of the play are revealed through his bittersweet memories of his mother and sister.

John Mormon, a freshman student at CJC, plays the role of Tom. Mormon has performed major roles in five CJC productions and has directed one dinner theatre production. His experience is evident in his sensitive portrayal of a young man who is trapped by his sense of duty to mother and sister. Mormon does double duty in the role because Tom both narrates the play and takes part in the action. Mormon turns in an excellent performance.

The handsome young gentleman caller, Jim O'Conner, is played by a freshman student, Terry Willingham. Terry is convincing as the good looking optimistic high school hero. Terry handles the role with the expertise of a seasoned actor although this is only Terry's second role in CJC productions. We are most likely to see him in coming productions.

Vivian Maxwell, as Laura, clearly understands the Laura that Tennessee Williams had in mind. She is fragile; like her tiny glass animals that preoccupy her life, she

gives the impression that she too may break at any time. Her most effective characteristic is a beautiful voice that is gentle and always so effectively on the verge of breaking.

The most outstanding performance, however, was the portrayal of Amanda by Cristy Castleberry. The complex character, Amanda, is a woman who lives in memory of better days, has flights of fancy, and above all tries in vain to help her children. Cristy is a believable Amanda who gains the sympathy of the audience from the beginning of the play. Her mastery of consistent dialect and smooth emotional transitions are acting skills that are rarely seen outside of the professional theatre. Marion Castleberry, Cristy's husband, has two successes to celebrate with this play.

The play will be presented again on Friday, May 2, and Saturday, May 3. Dinner is served at 7:00 and the play begins at 8:00. For reservations call 817-442-2567. Tickets for dinner and the play are \$7.50.

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Fourth Cisco Blood Drive To Be On CJC Campus May 7

The fourth Bi-monthly Cisco Blood Drive will be held on Wednesday, May 7, on the Cisco Junior College campus, in the Student Union Building. A team of laboratory technicians from Mary Meek Blood Center of Abilene will be present from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

The Cisco Service Club and the Cisco Civic League began sponsorship of this joint project last September, in order to reduce a long-time, 900 unit debt. Since the first drive in September, nearly 200 units (pints) of blood have been collected. Cisco citizens cannot be commended enough for their outstanding support of this ever so important project.

Due to Federal Drug Administration legislation, there are no longer paid donors (except in special cases); therefore all blood donors must be solicited on a voluntary basis.

With a 60-unit goal set for each blood drive, this amount will insure Cisco of an adequate blood supply, and gradually and partially repay E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital's debt.

A blood insurance policy is available to interested blood donors. For a pint of blood given, that donor's immediate family will be assured of having blood available to them for one full year. That donated pint of blood, however, will not count toward credit for Cisco, yet, perhaps those interested donors might give again at a later date toward credit for Cisco.

So necessary is this blood, for life itself, every appeal for your continued support is sincerely offered and appreciated. Please be aware of the following when preparing to give blood!

Blood donors should be aware of the following when preparing to give blood:

A.) All donors must be age 18 or older; there is no age limit, only that each donor is healthfully able to give blood.

B.) Blood donors should eat normally, and are encouraged to do so before giving blood.

C.) No medication should be taken 18 hours prior to donating blood.

D.) No medication, however, should be deleted without checking with the perspective donor's own doctor.

E.) Any person who has been sick or has had a cold within the last seven days prior to donating blood, should not donate blood.

F.) Any person who has had their ears pierced within the last six months at any place other than a doctor's office, should not donate blood.

G.) Any person who has been in Southeast Asia in the last three

years should not donate blood, due to malaria possibilities.

H.) Any woman who has menstruated in the last three to four days prior to donating blood, should not donate.

I.) No woman who is pregnant, or suspects she is so, should give blood, and should not do so until six weeks after pregnancy.

J.) Persons can donate blood every two to three months, with no foreseen problems, although, it is hopeful to not have to call on the same donors nearly this often.

People Things

PATUXENT RIVER, Md.—Highlights of our trip by travel trailer for a vacation at this Chesapeake peninsula country were numerous. One of our first stops was in Jefferson, Texas, a small town of some 2,000 people in Marion County.

Jefferson has no less than 58 historical markers—those round commemorative discs awarded to points and places of interest by the Texas Historical Commission. We visited Dwaine Dennis, publisher of the Jefferson Jimplecute, one of the state's oldest weekly newspapers. Dwaine grew up at Ranger where his late father, Joe Dennis, was the long-time publisher of The Ranger Times.

Jefferson folks are busy getting ready for their 33rd annual Historical Pilgrimage on May 2-3-4. Feature of this will be tours of the community's many places of historical interest. Jefferson, you know, once had river boat traffic—until in 1903 the Army used dynamite to blast away a big log jam, causing the river level to fall. And the city was famous in early day railroad building history.

We spent the better part of an afternoon wandering around looking at interesting

things and places.

DROVE IN THE rain most of the next day to reach Waverly, Tenn., where Loretta Lynn, the nationally known country and western singer, and her husband own and operate a dude ranch with travel trailer parking facilities. We parked adjacent to a pasture full of palomino mares with colts. The Lynns live in a big house on the 1500-acre ranch.

Miss Lynn, who is featured in the new movie story of her life "The Coal Miner's Daughter," is very interested in the ranch and is often visible to visitors. They sponsor a daily hay ride to show folks over the ranch and a weekly country and western music night. It's a nice place and attracts good crowds. Waverly is near Nashville.

NEXT INTERESTING stop was Charlottesville, Virginia, which is the Thomas Jefferson country. As all travellers should, we spent several hours at Monticello, the Jefferson home, which is located on a mountain top some 850 feet above the city. The estate dates to a 1,000-acre land grant dated in 1735.

Building of Monticello began in 1768 and the final nails were in place by 1809. The house in all details was designed and built under the

watchful eye of Mr. Jefferson. The house is a classic of American architecture. It is three stories with 35 rooms with an impressive dome. The surrounding gardens, fully restored by Virginia Garden Clubs, are delightful in spring-time with blooming plants galore.

Many of the items of furniture in the home were there when Mr. Jefferson died at age 83 on July 4, 1826. It is awesome to stroll among these things and try to look in retrospect to the era of Jefferson. You could spend a day writing of the interesting items in the house.

Jefferson, who wrote "All my wishes end where I hope my days will end... at Monticello," was buried in the family graveyard which he laid out on the mountain side adjacent to the road leading to the hill top home. Title to this plot remains with the family whose members are still being buried there. You note the date on one tombstone was 1778.

Monticello is owned now by the Thomas Jefferson Memorial Foundation, a non-profit organization founded in 1923. It purchased the property which now consists of 1800 acres of land and is dedicated to the preservation of the house and gardens as they were in Mr. Jefferson's day. They charge you \$3 to visit Monticello.

Visiting Monticello gives you renewed respect for Thomas Jefferson who

drafted the Declaration of Independence, wrote the bill that outlawed importation of slaves, served as governor of Virginia, Secretary of State under George Washington, was vice president under John Adams, and served as president of the United States 1801-1809.

Charlottesville has more evidence of Jefferson's greatness. He was a founder of the University of Virginia and designed and supervised the campus buildings. He was the school's first rector and was serving in that capacity when he died. Spending an hour looking over the UofV campus was most interesting.

Continuing east, we spent an interesting day at Fredericksburg, Va., which is rich in early historical things. James Monroe was a native and Mary Washington, George's mother, lived here. George Washington grew up near Fredericksburg and it was here that he told his dad that he couldn't tell a lie—he chopped down the cherry tree. And, what is more, it was across the Rappahannock River here that he threw the silver dollar that day in the mid-1700s. You can see the Masonic Lodge building

where George was initiated into the Masonic Order in 1752.

A good many Revolutionary and Civil War battles were fought in Virginia and you see many markers along the highways.

Virginia reminds you of East Texas with its rolling hills, green meadows, blooming dogwood and redbud trees, and profusions of wild flowers.

He moved to Cisco in August 1979 from Mineral Wells. He had lived in Mineral Wells for three years, moving there from Capitan, N.M. He married Mona Boyd on November 18, 1933, in Tishomingo, Okla. He was a retired plumber. He was a member of the Assembly of God Church.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Dwain of Albuquerque, N.M.; three daughters, LaVerne Latham of Cisco, Arletha Latham of Bayard, N.M., and Dorene Schuyler of Alamogordo, N.M.; a brother, Henry of Modesto, Calif.; four sisters, Nora Cole of Tecumseh, Okla., Pearl Self and Nellie Woods, both of Atoka, Okla., and Dollie Casey of Oklahoma City, Okla.; 10 grandchildren; and 10 great-grandchildren.

Obituary Final Services For Elmer Votaw Held Friday

Funeral services for Elmer Votaw, 67, of Cisco, were at 10 a.m. Friday at Kimbrough Funeral Home Chapel. Burial was in Oakwood Cemetery.

Mr. Votaw died at 11:30 a.m. Tuesday at E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital after a sudden illness. He was born August 9, 1912, in Ferris, Okla.

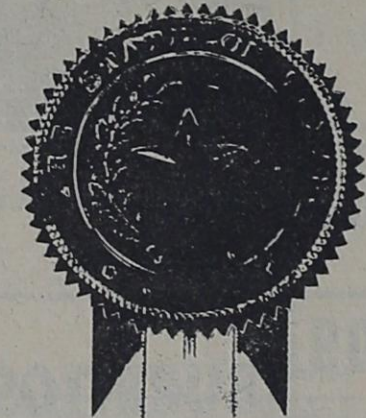
The Texas Historical Commission and the two hundred fifty-four County Historical Commissions are working diligently and efficiently to preserve Texas's past. The County Commissions, this week, are making a special effort to focus public attention on the historic events in their Counties, thus designating each day of the week for special activities highlighting the various elements of the state preservation program such as the beautification of areas surrounding historic sites and markers; the locating and recording of historic landmarks; the surveying of historic buildings and districts; honoring pioneers and early settlers; involving youth in historic activities; and touring historic homes, museums, sites, and markers.
