## Two Projects Are Acceptable For R. F. C. Labor By City

Two of the R.F.C. projects were tentatively accepted by the committee Wednesday night who met with engineer Reagan to consider the four projects Mr. Reagan submitted to the commission at its regular session Tuesday night. Constructing base for paving Avenue F. from 6th street to the alley north of the federal building and Avenue G in front of the library, paving alley north of federal building and paving the road to the zoo, were the projects submitted, which called for an expenditure for material and trucks of \$1,134. It was to consider these that the committee met with Mr. Reagan and agreed to report favorably on the zoo road and alley projects at this time, and if funds are available to consider the other projects later. Mr. Reagan told the commission that this estimate called for the labor to be paid with R.F.C. funds. "If the city had to pay for the labor the estimated cost would be approximately something over \$6,000. These projects, it was estimated, would release \$6,000 R.F.C. money in Cisco.

**Fire Prevention Committee**  
An ordinance was passed creating a fire prevention committee, and J. J. Collins, H. S. Drumwright and N. H. Fowler were appointed committee members. L. B. Norvell's application to erect wagon scales on the old Karkalits lots owned by the city, southeast of the First Baptist Church, diagonally across Avenue E and Ninth street, was granted.

City Attorney Grantham was instructed to attend the session of the railroad commission Aug. 18 when that body hears the Lone Star Gas Co. gate rate case, which will render its decision as to the fairness of the rates now being charged in Cisco.

**Taxable Values \$2,514,749.27**  
Mayor Berry reported the taxable values of the city, the board of equalization had ascertained, are \$2,514,749.27, with an estimated 60% collection of \$62,868.73, would yield the city \$37,721.80, which when supplemented by \$33,735.80 water and sanitary receipts, based on present income, would give a total of \$71,457.40 potential revenues. With operating expenses estimated at \$65,000, would leave a balance of \$6,371.

The tax rate was set at the maximum rate of \$2.50 on the \$100 valuation, and 25 cents of this sum was allotted to the sinking fund, of an estimated total of \$3,700. No revenues from the water or sanitary receipts are apportioned to the sinking fund. Appropriations for the chamber of commerce were deferred till next session.

Concluding its fifth annual and most successful encampment the Future Farmers of America broke camp Wednesday afternoon and the 300 attendants from the 26 schools of this section returned to their respective home towns much benefitted, mentally and physically, from their three days of instruction and recreation.

In addition to the boys in attendance there were 30 vocational teachers present to attend the conferences. The most prominent of these being J. B. Rutland and P. G. Haines, state vocational supervisors, of Austin; J. C. Dykes and E. R. Alexander, of the A. & M. College at Bryan.

The feature of the encampment was the address of Ollie Webb, of Shreveport, assistant to the president of the Texas & Pacific railroad, who addressed the visitors and a number of townspeople Tuesday evening. Previous to the address of Mr. Webb the boys were entertained by Harry Schaefer and his comedy orchestra. This program elicited praise from even Mr. Webb, who stated that he had never set in on a more enjoyable program. Besides Schaefer this orchestra is composed of S. E. Hittson, Lorenzo and Spurgeon Parks, Dick Thomas and Howard Moyer.

In addition to this orchestra G. W. Collum and his Lobo band, supplied band music to entertain the boys Tuesday evening. R. L. Poe, president of the chamber of commerce, and an enthusiastic supporter of the Future Farmer movement, delivered the address of welcome. E. H. Varnell, vocational agriculturist, on whose shoulders rested the entire responsibility, and to whom the success of the encampment is due, was general chairman, and looked after practically every feature of the event.

## STATE LOSES THOUSANDS BY ERRONEOUS GAS LEVY

The People's Voice, of Dallas, an independent weekly, fighting the people's battles, quotes Lynn Moore, state auditor, as follows:

Texas probably is losing a great amount of taxes, because of failure to require correct valuation of natural gas for taxation purposes.

He submitted to Governor Miriam A. Ferguson a report on occupation taxes, oil production and natural gas. Lynn pointed out that in two counties there was wide variations in values of natural gas and casing head gas reported for taxation.

His report disclosed that in one county the highest price reported for natural gas was one and one half times greater than the lowest price reported and the highest price for casing head gas was 14 times greater than the lowest price. In the other county, the high price for natural gas was double the low price and the high price for casing head gas was five times the low price.

Lynn also pointed to losses in taxes that has not been collected on imports of natural gas from other states. Lynn said additional gross receipts from this source should amount to over \$100,000.

## ARIZONA MAKES THE COUNT 21 TO NOTHING ON REPEAL

PHOENIX, Aug. 8.—"Bone Dry" for 18 years, Arizona tonight became the 21st state to ratify the proposed repeal of the 18th amendment of the national constitution by a vote of more than three to one.

## Charge of Theft Of Chickens Was Filed Against 5

Acting on complaint of a Mrs. Bryant, living beyond the western corporate limits of Cisco, Justice Joe Wilson issued warrants against five young men Sunday morning as the aftermath of a Saturday night's escapade. Constable Joe Hicks struck their trail, and up some of the young men charged, rounded up some of the men charged, three of whom entered their pleas guilty to a misdemeanor and were fined \$1 and cost by Judge Wilson. These were Chock Brown, Paul Tomlin and Tom Lasater. The docket shows that Ross Morris had been released on a bail bond of \$500, but no disposition of the case of Jack Hunt, the fifth member, was revealed by the justice docket.

Constable Hicks stated that Mrs. Bryant claimed that she lost a bunch of chickens, and he trailed a car to a house in East Cisco, when the woman of the house stated these boys had brought the chickens there, and requested her to cook them, which she refused to do. She told the constable that the boys then cooked the fowls themselves, ate all they wanted, and left two at her house.

Getting a description of the boys he traced them to their homes where they were placed under arrest and brought to Cisco.

## Federal Government Allots \$2,377,000 To State of Texas

AUSTIN, Aug. 8.—Allotment of \$2,377,000 to Texas by the Federal government to relieve unemployment distress during August was announced today by Aubrey Williams of Washington, representing the federal emergency relief administration.

An additional appropriation for distribution in the areas hard hit by the drought likely will be made available during the month, bringing Texas' total allotment to be more than \$2,500,000, Williams said.

Failure of Texas to approve a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to issue \$20,000,000 in unemployment relief bonds will result in Texas being taken off the list of states receiving aid from the federal government, Williams said. The proposed amendment will be voted on at a special election August 26.

## DEATHS EXCEED BIRTHS IN CISCO DURING JULY DR. LEE'S REPORT SAYS

There were six births and nine deaths in Cisco during the month of July, Dr. W. P. Lee's report to the city commission Tuesday night revealed. The city physician stated that the general health of the city was good, with no contagious diseases reported for the month, and mosquitos were diminishing, due to the continued dry weather and the effective manner of raditating these pests that have for the past ten years made this city practically free of these insects.

"I would advise that children enjoying the privilege of the wading pool be required to have certificates that they have no contagious disease," Dr. Lee said. "This suggestion is made by reason of complaints that some children frequenting the pool have a skin disease that might be transmitted to others. Signs posted at the pool stating that no children will be allowed to enjoy these waters who have any skin disease that might become communicable, I believe advisable." Dr. Lee was authorized to have the signs made.

"Dairies, in the main, are operated according to sanitary requirements, but some are selling milk from cows that have not been tubercular tested, which should not be permitted," the report stated.

## Advertising Racket Is Latest Feature Of NRA Profiteering

That Cisco's foreign-owned newspaper, the Daily News, one of the string newspapers owned by the Marsh-Fentris interests, is violating the spirit of the National Recovery act, is evidenced by the complaints of those who have been coerced to place their names as "supporters of the president's plan" to bring back industrial recovery to the nation.

Last Sunday's string newspaper carried the names of the 80 firms displaying the Blue Eagle, at one dollar per name. Some of the victims have complained of the method of this extortion used by the string paper. That they felt it was coercion they stated that the advertising solicitor told them that "everybody was publishing their names, and it would look bad for them to be out." Several have stated they agreed to pay the dollar under protest, as they didn't want to appear as "a slacker" in the president's program to restore prosperity, but they felt that the dollar was simply a donation to the string newspaper. One business man, with the Blue Eagle in his window, said it was a method of profiteering, which the people had been advised to guard against.

The Citizen never solicits this class of advertising for the reasons we consider it a racket, illegitimate, and of no value to the advertiser; yet this is the most remunerative class of advertising one sees in the string daily. When ever a new project is boosted the string daily gets up a list of business men to place their names in a display space boosting this project.

One would think that pulling off one these newspaper rackets once a week would satisfy most any advertising solicitor, but the string paper pulled two in less than four days last week before the NRA racket in Sunday's issue the paper put over another racket in aiding and abetting an itinerant "iron man," who dropped into Cisco to give a free exhibition "under the auspices of a number of business men and the Daily News." Probably the paper should have stated the stunts would be pulled "for the benefit" of the Marsh-Fentris paper and been more accurate in its announcement.

While the subject was of little importance, yet the advertising appearing in the half page of 20 little ads did have some value, as the merchants told about "the iron man using shoes carried by John Doe; the iron man uses fresh meats only from Richard Roe," etc.

In cities, when some enterprising individual builds an industrial plant, sky-scraper hotel, or something that is a real asset to the town, the metropolitan dailies carry a series of ads felicitating the enterprise of the builder, but to take up an itinerant professional and exploit the people is carrying the advertising racket far afield. If any of the business men "auspiced" the "iron man" to do his stunts in Cisco it was not any of the several who spoke to the Citizen about it. All that mentioned the matter to the Citizen thought they had been coerced, as they said it was just "an advertising racket," from which they expected no benefit.

The NRA advertising racket was absolutely worthless, and profited no one except the string newspaper.

### TEXAS' ANTI-TRUST LAW.

The executive committee of the Texas Press Association has memorialized Governor Ferguson to include in her call for the extra session of the legislature a provision for modifying the state anti-trust

law. Surely those boys must have forgotten the fight that was waged by the political giants of other days to secure the enactment of this statute, or they would not be so quick to advocate the legislature tampering with the last safeguard the people have for their protection against the big business of Texas. To modify this law that would curb monopoly at this time would undo the work already done by the attorney general, and would remove all legal restraints from those unscrupulous monopolies that would exploit the people at will.

But we are told that provision has already been made for the national government to hold these commercial buccaneers in check, and there will be no extortion of the people, by unfair business tactics. This may be true, but the national recovery act will not be in force always, and once the anti-trust law is repealed or materially modified, it will be a sad day for the common people. It will never

be re-enacted in its present form. Big business will see to that. We have just witnessed how completely big business controls our legislators, and they would spend millions to keep the law from being restored as it now exists.

The excuse is to make Texas laws conform to national laws, that the administrators may not be hampered in putting the NRA provisions into effect. Every voter should communicate with our senators and representatives and demand that there be no tampering with the anti-trust law. It is the one protection the common people have left between their liberty and peonage. Probably, if it is a handicap to the administration of the NRA, the law might be suspended for six months or one year, but that is a dangerous precedent, and should not even be considered by any patriotic Texan. If the modification or repeal of the anti-trust law is necessary for the successful operation of the NRA it would be better for Texas that we deny ourselves some of the NRA blessings and still retain this safeguard to the liberties of the people.

We already know of the effects of lax enforcement of the law against monopoly. Trusts and combines have been formed and the rights of the small business man have been trampled upon to that extent it is not possible for any except big business to operate. This is notably true with the big oil companies. Independent refineries and service stations are being forced out of business every day, while the major oil companies have monopolized the petroleum trade from production to consumption. They compel the independent producer to accept the price they arbitrarily fix, and then compel the public to pay their price for the finished product. This is palpably in violation of our trust laws, and to compel the oil trust to release its stronghold on the country the attorney general has commenced legal proceedings. Any tampering with the law now would mean the undoing of all that has been accomplished by the legal department of the state, and allow the big companies to continue to monopolize every branch of the industry.

Then there are other lines that will be ready to exploit the people just as soon as the NRA program has lived its day, and our federal dictator has ceased to function.

The Citizen editor yet remembers the fight of Hogg, Coke, Culberson, Reagan and others made to secure the enactment of our anti-trust laws, and to repeal this statute now would be a step backward that we would never retrieve.

It will be a sad day for Texas when this law is repealed.

### "DON'T TRIFLE WITH THAT BIRD"

That is the warning sounded by Hugh S. Johnson, NRA administrator, to those who are evading the provisions of the National Recovery Act. Johnson warns against profiteering, by merchants charging more than the additional tax and increase in salaries justify. This warning has been sent out to the grocers of Indiana, and to a mass meeting at Cleveland, O.

"Do not trifle with that bird. In the confusion of early days a man may get away with it. But the day of reckoning against an aroused public opinion is sure," he said in his message to the Cleveland meeting. Merely shorter hours to keep from employing additional workers

won't get it. The agreement to increase the employes must be kept, Johnson reminds the public, otherwise the Blue Eagle will come down from its perch in your show window. Local people who are boasting of keeping faith with the RNA by merely shortening hours may have rough sailing ahead.

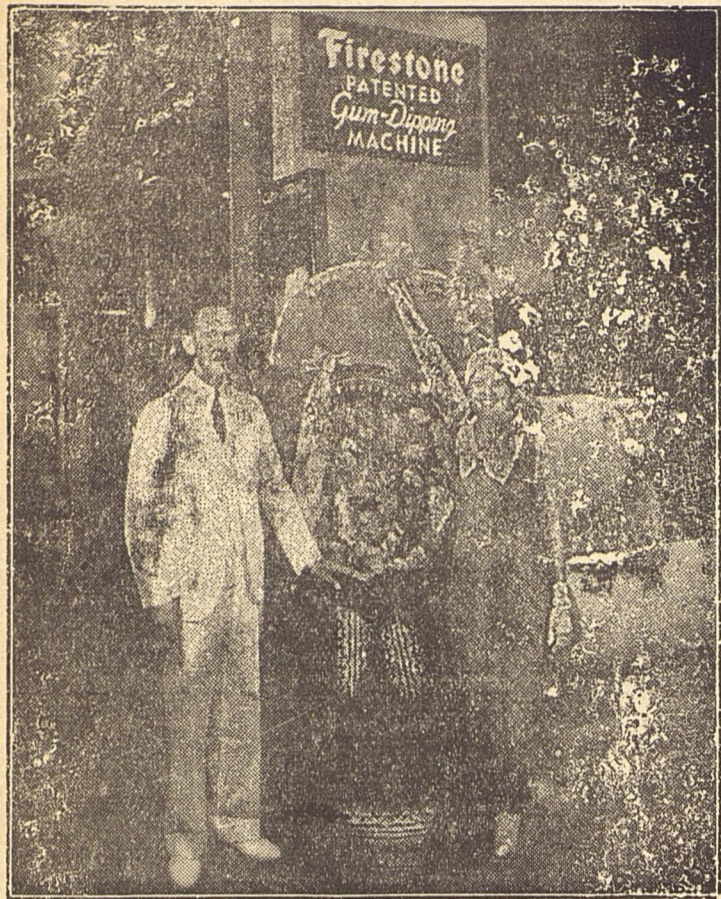

## Co-Author Explains Home Rule Provision

The proposed home rule amendment prescribes no set form of government for the counties; it merely permits the counties to devise and adopt the form of government they choose, or to continue without change, Representative Emmett Morse of Houston, co-author of the measure, pointed out here Friday night.

Opponents of the amendment who declare it would mean county manager government, or merger of city and county governments, either are in error as to the provisions of the measure or are deliberately misrepresenting its contents, Morse said.

He pointed out, too, that judges and prosecuting attorneys, being a part of the statewide system of government, are specifically excepted from the measure. Opponents of the amendment had declared here Thursday night that the amendment sought to perpetuate district attorneys and district judges in office.

The amendment and its enabling act merely gives counties the right to choose the system of government best suited to their individual needs," he said.--Star-Telegram

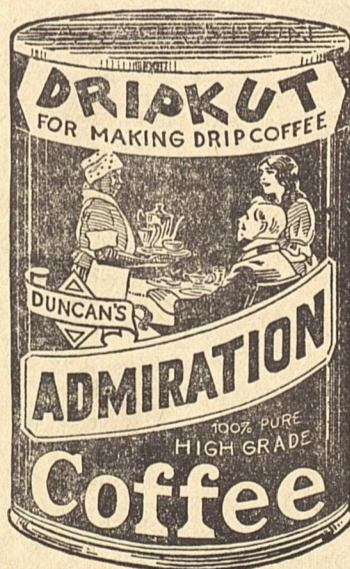

### West Fifth Street And Intersections Oiled and Graded

The street superintendent, Joe Clements has recently completed a good job on West Fifth street and at least one intersection—Avenue I. These streets were plowed up and harrowed. And oh my, what a mess it was. In fact those of us lying in the vicinity affected were "cussin" the street man, and the women were up in arms, for the dust from the streets was something fierce.

This street had been hardsurfaced in the early days, and while it had worn down to be rather rough and bumpy, it was still void of dust and was vehicle worthy. So when the street force plowed it up and left a mass of small stones, with no semblance of the smooth road bed, naturally we thought Clements had played the devil, and ruined a perfectly good street.

Now it presents quite a different appearance. The two streets have packed, and there is every indication it will continue to get better, especially if the oiling process is kept up. Both the mayor and Citizen editor lives on this street, so, like the rain, the superintendent has benefitted both "the just and unjust." It is now in fine condition for asphalt surfacing if it can be financed.

So, it will be seen from the above favorable comment that the Citizen prefers to waft bouquets than to throw rocks. There has just been completed another improvement. The road master of the Katy has finished some needed improvements on the two crossings of the Katy road in the city limits—East Sixth and East Fourteenth street. Both were badly needed. In fact the Citizen had been observing these conditions for some time, and just a few days before the work was instituted we told the local agent, Mr. J. C. King, that the Citizen disliked to romp on such a good friend of Cisco as the Katy had been, but we would have to say something about the condition of those crossings. The crossings are much better, but still they are not in keeping with the paved streets butting the right of way at each crossing. The road master had pulverized stone and placed on the crossings, which was thoroughly oiled, and are now in good shape. But this is only temporary, and will be dug out by cars and soon be in as bad condition as before the repairs were made. The Katy should put in permanent improvement of hard surface—either brick, cement or asphalt, to be in keeping with the brick paved streets abutting the railroad in both instances. We will lay off the Katy for the time being, but when these crossings get bumpy again we will have to come back at the company a little stronger, and likely insist that the city administration see that the Katy puts in permanent crossings on these streets.

As we said the Katy has been a good friend of Cisco, but on the other hand Cisco has been a pretty good friend to the Katy. Several years ago there was a movement on foot to demand that the Katy construct a safe viaduct, or overpass, across their

tracks on East Broadway, but this was not pushed. Then, too, Cisco has never compelled the Katy to open East Seventh street, which it could legally do, but as the demand is not so pronounced this street has been allowed to remain closed.

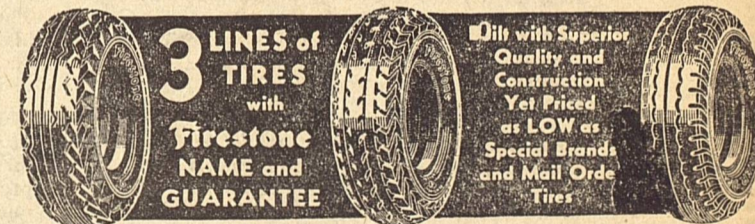

**Organized Thieves  
Exists In County  
Grand Jury Thinks**

The 91st grand jury, in its final report to Judge G. L. Davenport Saturday, calls attention to the existence in this county of an organized band of thieves, who are depredating upon the property of our citizens.

Asking to be discharged the following report was submitted:

To the Hon. Geo. L. Davenport, Judge of said court:

On this the 5th day of August, A. D. 1933, we, the grand jury for your June Term, A. D. 1933, desire to report that we have examined 147 witnesses during this term, and have been in session a total of seven days during the term. We have returned 77 indictments, 74 of which are for felonies and the three others for misdemeanors.

We desire to point out to the court and to the public in general that we have found an alarming amount of stealing going on in our county, some of it of the petty variety, and quite a bit of an even more serious nature; there is evidence of a criminal ring operating in this respect, and their depredations have been many and serious. In this connection we desire to state that our officers charged with the enforcement of the law have been and are doing all within their power to cope with this situation. However, the thefts are so numerous and of such a serious nature, that we desire to point out that it will be necessary for

the citizenship to lend their hearty cooperation and assistance in helping to stamp out, both by giving the officers all the information they possibly can, and by doing their duty when called upon for jury service, this alarming situation with reference to crimes of this character, only can be abated.

We wish to commend District Attorney Grady Owens, for his able assistance to us, and to thank him for his untiring efforts in presenting testimony before us. We wish also to thank Virge Foster, Sheriff, and his deputies, and the Grand Jury Bailiffs, all of whom have assisted us in every way possible.

Having completed our deliberations upon matters that have been brought before us, we respectfully ask to be discharged.

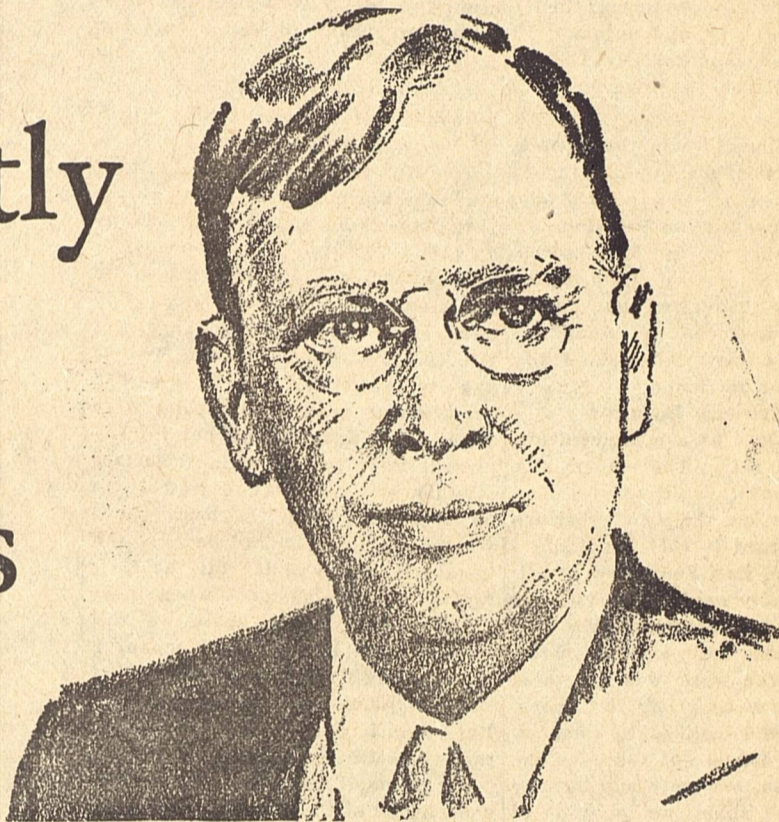
