Federal Circuit Court of Appeals Reverses Judge Wilson in Suit of County vs. National Surety Company

EASTLAND, Nov. 25. - Information has just been received of the decision of the Uni. ted States circuit court of appoals that Eastland county was awarded a decision by the court reversing the decision of Judge Wilson in the cause sty. led Ed. S. Pritchard county judge, vs. the National Surety Company of New York. The amount in controversy being the principal sum of \$18,291 ... 27, which together with interest, constituted the sum of \$20,000, the amount sued for as surety for the First National Bank of Ranger, the principal being the balance on deposit by the county in the First National Bank of Ranger, at the time that institution closed its doors.

The decision is a victory for the ounty, and if there is no further litigation Eastland county will recover from the National Surety Co. the sum of \$20,000, as part of its losses of the highway bond funds, due to losses by the suspension of Eastland county banks, in which the funds were deposited. Judge Pritchard, as appellant, was represented by Grisham & Grisham of Eastland.

The case was tried before Judge James C. Wilson of the United States court for the northern district of Texas at Abilene. Judge Wilson rendered judgment in favor of the county against the receivers of the bank for the \$4,000.00 adnitted to be due by the bank, but rendered judgment against the county and in favor of the bonding company. The case was appealed by the county to the United States circuit court of appeals at New Orleans and was recently argued before that court in session at Fort
