## Another Old Cisco Pioneer Passes On

James Montgomery Howard, another old pioneer of Cisco, passed away Wednesday afternoon at 3:08 o'clock at his home on South D avenue. He had been in bad health for the past two or three years, and during the past year has had two or three bad spells when his life was in danger. He had made his home in Cisco for the past 43 years. He was born near Montgomery, Alabama, March 28, 1852. He moved with his parents to Arkansas, and came to Texas in 1882. He married Miss Mary Eleanor Eppler at Magazine, Arkansas, December 23, 1877. Mrs. Howard passed away November 16, 1921. Mr. Howard is survived by five children: Mrs. J. R. Burnett and Mrs. Kate Richardson of Cisco; Mrs. J. S. Yeager, Putnam; Mrs. H. A. McCanlies of Eastland; Edgar Howard of Waco. All were present at the funeral services.

Mr. Howard became a member of the Baptist church when a boy 19, and continued a faithful member of that church and a devoted Christian till the death messenger called him away.

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist church in Cisco at 3:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon, Rev. E. S. James, pastor, conducting. Special music was furnished in a solo by Mrs. P. L. Ullom and a male quartet by Burette Patterson, L. Boyd, Ernest Hittson and W. F. Walker.

Among other matters brought up at the meeting was a report of E. P. Crawford, chairman of the highway committee, and J. E. Spencer, secretary of the body, that the paving of Highway No. 23 would be made now just as quickly as the necessary materials and equipment could be gotten together.

## Let's Seek the Remedy

From the people of every state, of every city, of every community, we hear the cry of high taxes. Webster says a tax is "A burdensome duty or charge, a toll."

"We are taxed in more ways than one."

Cisco's financial affairs have been so butchered in the past that only unusual skill in business matters can pull us out of the muddle and relieve us of the high ad valorem taxes.

But it will not do for the citizens of Cisco to halt in our forward march or shut our eyes to the natural resources and inherent possibilities of Cisco and its surrounding territory. One of our natural resources is our mineral wealth. Our oil and gas can be said to be unlimited, a natural blessing of the Creator. But are the people who own the land and these natural resources getting the full benefit of these blessings? Or are we paying too great a toll to those who develop them? Consider the price of gas. The land owner and the men who drill the wells get from 3 to 6 per cent per thousand feet for the gas, and then pay the gas company 67 to 75 cents per thousand feet for the same gas for delivering it to us from the wells. With gas at 3 and 6 cents per thousand feet, for fuel, we should get our electric power and lights for 2 cents per kilowatt. If these utility companies had good healthy competition we would not be paying such a heavy toll for these things. The people of Cisco have probably saved seventy-five or a hundred thousand dollars in the last two years on ice because of such

competition on ice. Since Amarillo has undertaken to put in its own gas service, we notice that the utility company there has offered to reduce the price of gas there to 27 cents per thousand feet. If they can furnish it at that price and make a profit, why haven't they done so before? Why wait till the city decided to put in its own plant?

Many cities over the country are getting wise and putting in their own utility plants, and saving the tax payers half their utility bills. Some cities owning all their utilities are advertising the fact that they are "Taxless cities." It came out in our recent campaign that our water plant is paying more money into the city treasury than the tax collector.

The utility companies are charging as much now as they did when everything was high. The farmer, the landlord, the laborer, the doctor, the lawyer, are making less than half what they did in prosperous times, and taking that on a credit; but the utility companies still charge the same, and cut you off if you don't pay. That is the cause of our business depression. The money is all going away to New York. The toll is too heavy to stand, and such conditions CANNOT last. The monopolies must cease to drain the life blood of business from the veins of our nation.

Will our new city DADS do something about this? Will the Chamber of Commerce function in this behalf? Who has the leadership to do what every reasonable person knows should be done?

## Health Department Urges Cooperation

The city health department gives out the following statement concerning sanitary improvements and precautions in Cisco:

"As much as we dislike the task, we will call upon each individual who does not comply and ask him to cut and burn or remove weeds. This is good health and fire insurance at a low cost and it is a health and fire hazard that must be attended to.

"Cow lots are in a far from sanitary condition. It is necessary that manure be stacked and sprinkled with chlorinated lime or burned daily. Every cow lot will be inspected within the next few days and regularly through the summer months. Dry toilets must be screened and must be fly proof.

"This department has recently received complaints of some people throwing wet garbage into the alley or back yards. This is a violation of the law, and one that will subject offenders to fines.

"The health department respectfully invites the cooperation of the people of Cisco in the campaign of maintaining our high health standards and to do this you will look closely to your cow lots, dry toilets, garbage disposal and clean up your premises generally."

## Recessed Meeting City Commission

The City Commission met in recessed session Monday afternoon with all commissioners present except Geo. D. Fee, absent on account of illness.

The payment of city taxes was discussed and the time extended to July 31st for allowing payment without penalty. It was stated that no further extensions would be made, however. Some discussion was had concerning whether or not the 1930 tax rolls would be turned over to Attorney J. D. Barker for collection of the delinquent, but no decision was reached.

The matter of the salaries of the cemetery care-takers was brought up for attention, with the idea of reducing these. Motion was made by Donovan that McIntire's salary be reduced to \$130, and that of Moore to \$100. This was seconded by Elliott, and upon vote these two voted for it, and Burnett and Clements voted against, resulting in a tie. Mayor Berry cast the deciding vote against, and the motion was lost. Clements then moved that McIntire's salary be placed at \$130 and Moore's at \$120, with the understanding that they should each receive from the city an additional \$5.00 for any grave which must be prepared on Sunday. This motion was seconded by Burnett, and upon being put to a vote was carried.

Several monthly bills were examined and approved.

Motorists who are finicky about the right of way at intersections and are inclined to "bawl out" the driver are invited by the National Safety Council to read the latest decision of the Supreme Court at Washington. It ruled that the right or preference at a crossing does not arise except when drivers are approaching at the same time and at approximately the same speed. Then the one on the right has the right of way. It is no excuse to say trees obscured the view, for this should only increase vigilance.

At a street intersection when one driver sees another coming from the right the latter driver should be given the right of way if there appears any danger of collision.

**Some of Our State Laws**

Article 988 of the Revised Statutes of Texas says: "No member of the city council shall hold any other employment or office under city government while he is a member of said council, unless herein otherwise provided. No member of the city council, or other officer of the corporation shall be directly or indirectly interested in any other work, business or contract, the expense, price or consideration of which is paid from the city treasury, or by an assessment levied by an ordinance or resolution of the city council, nor be the surety of any person having a contract, work or business with said city, for the performance of which security may be required, nor be the surety on the official bond of any officer."

Article 95 of the Penal Code - "If any officer of any county, city or town, or any person employed by such officer shall fraudulently take, misapply, or convert to his own use any money, property or other thing of value belonging to such county, city or town, or shall pay or deliver the same to any person knowing that he is not entitled to receive it, he shall be confined in the penitentiary not less than two nor more than ten years."

Article 432 of the Penal Code reads as follows: "No officer of this state, or any officer of any district, county, city, precinct, school district, or other municipal subdivision of this state, or any officer or member of any state, district, county, city, school district, or other municipal board, or judge of any court, created by or under authority of any general or special law of this state, or any member of the Legislature, shall appoint, or vote for, or confirm the appointment to any office, position, clerkship, employment or duty, of any person related within the second degree by affinity or within the third degree by consanguinity to the person so appointing or so voting, or to any other member of such board, the Legislature or court of which such person so appointing or voting may be a member, when the salary, fees, or compensation of such appointee is to be paid for, directly or indirectly out of or from public funds or fees of office of any kind or character, whatsoever. (Webster defines "affinity" as "relationship by marriage.")"

Article 433, OFFICERS INCLUDED: - "The inhibitions set forth in this law shall apply to and include the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Railroad Commissioners, heads of departments of State government, judges and members of any and all Boards and courts established by or under the authority of any general or special law of this State, members of the Legislature, mayors, commissioners, recorders, aldermen, and members of school boards of incorporated cities and towns, public school trustees, officers and members of boards of managers of the State University and of its several branches, and of the various State educational institutions and of the various State eleemosynary institutions and of the penitentiaries. This enumeration shall not be held to exclude from the operation and effect of this law any person included within its general provisions."

Article 437, Punishment: - "Whoever violates any provision of the preceding articles shall be guilty of a misdemeanor involving official misconduct, and shall be fined not less than one hundred nor more than one thousand dollars."

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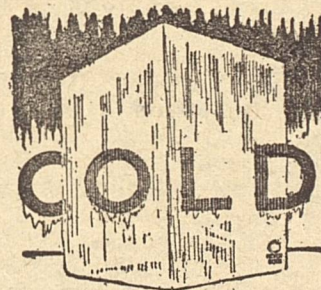
