TEMPERATURE OF 60 BELOW IS RECORDED

(By United Press) Coldest winter blasts in 60 years suddenly struck the eastern seaboard today as new snowfall accompanied milder temperatures in the Midwest.

RAIN With more rain tonight and tomorrow predicted, Cisco at noon had received a total fall of six-tenths of an inch, according to the gauge at the city hall.

East of the Allegheny temperatures plunged to 60 below zero and set new all-time records for cold in half a dozen cities.

TEXAS RELIEF OUTLOOK IS BETTER NOW

Work of selling began at once with a check of all offers already made for the \$2,750,000 relief bond issue. This indicates that approximately \$1,300,000 of non-duplicating offers are available.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 29 — Federal Relief Administrator Hopkins indicated today that congress would be asked for around \$100,000,000 to carry on the government's relief activities to July 1, 1934.

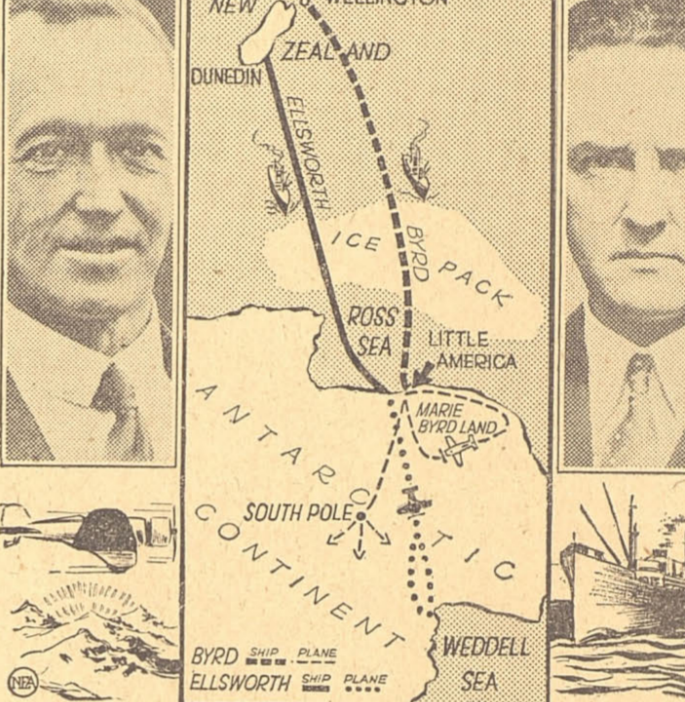
Report of Job Sale Probe Takes Weeks

BUT AMOUNTS OF LESS THAN \$100 COVERED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 29 — The government's new drive against gold hoarders is aimed at individuals who have held on to large amounts of the metal in defiance of previous orders. Acting Secy of Treasury Morgenthau said today.

Morgenthau was uncertain as to what penalties would be imposed on gold hoarders under his latest order. Previously, gold hoarders of more than \$100 were subject to a maximum penalty of \$10,000 and ten years imprisonment.

Morgenthau said he believed that several million dollars in gold would be recovered as a result of the new order.

DEVALUATION EXPECTED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 29 — The best informed opinion today expects stabilization of the dollar to take place at or about \$41.34 per gold ounce, representing a dollar devaluation of 50 per cent.

Two almost inevitable developments in the administration currency program impend before President Roosevelt may finally stabilize the dollar in relation to gold, however. These developments are:

1.—To initiate negotiations for international currency stabilization, and 2.—To ask congress for authority to seize from federal reserve banks the gold profit inherent in a devaluation of currency.

AN ORDINANCE

An ordinance regulating the manufacture, sale and distribution of vinous or malt beverages containing one-half of one per cent or more of alcohol by volume and not more than three and two-tenths per cent alcohol by weight; requiring that a license be obtained, prescribing the license fee to be paid to the city of Cisco, prescribing a penalty; and declaring an emergency.

Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Cisco, Texas: Section 1.

That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to manufacture or brew for the purpose of sale or to sell or distribute any vinous or malt beverage containing one-half of one per cent or more of alcohol by volume and not more than three and two-tenths per cent of alcohol by weight in the City of Cisco without first having applied for and secured a license from the Tax Collector of the City of Cisco.

Section 2. That it shall be the duty of the Tax Collector of the City of Cisco to issue licenses to persons, firms or corporations applying therefor to manufacture or brew for the purpose of sale or to sell or distribute any vinous or malt beverage, as described in Section 1 hereof, when application is made therefor to the said Tax Collector, which application shall be accompanied by the original license issued by the County Tax Collector of Eastland County, Texas, authorizing such persons to engage in such business in the City of Cisco, Texas.

Such license so issued by the Tax Collector shall be signed by him under the seal of his office and dated, state on its face for what it is issued, date when it will expire, by whom and where such business is to be conducted and shall prescribe the place where the same is to be kept and whether licensee is authorized to act as a manufacturer, general distributor, local distributor or retail dealer of beer, and shall give the number of the state license under which it is issued.

Such license shall be posted in a conspicuous place in the place of business of the dealer, or manufacturer.

Section 3. That before the Tax Collector issues such license, the applicant shall pay to him the fee required for such license.

Annual fees required for licenses authorized under this Ordinance shall be as follows:

(a) For a license authorizing the manufacture and sale by a manufacturer, \$250.00.

(b) For a general distributor, \$100.00.

(c) For a local distributor, \$25.00.

(d) For a license authorizing the sale of beer by retail dealer for consumption on or off the premises where sold, \$50.00.

(e) For license authorizing the sale of beer by retail dealer in the original container directly to the consumer but not for re-sale and not to be consumed on the premises where sold, \$25.00.

All licenses issued under the terms of this Ordinance shall terminate at midnight on the 31st day of December of each year and no license shall be issued for a longer term than one year.

Such license may be renewed upon the 1st day of January of each year by such applicant where he has renewed the State license held by him

PWA PROVING CITY ALLY IN RATE BATTLE

FORT WORTH, Dec. 29.—City authorities here are finding a valuable "silent partner" in the PWA in their duel with public service companies for rate reductions.

The fight, an interesting one which has gone on for years has suddenly developed into apparent advantage for the city council which is using the PWA as something of a Damoclean sword over the service companies.

An example of how the council gained its end was revealed in negotiations with the Texas Electric company. The council wanted reduced commercial electrical rates. It demanded the Texas Electric company reduce its rates.

Unless its demands were met, the council said in an ultimatum, the city would apply to the public works administration for funds with which to erect a municipal plant.

For several weeks the dueling went on, with the council evidently holding the proverbial "screws" and applying them effectively. What, ever the method, the outcome was a reduction of the commercial electric rate for this city.

The domestic rate already is very reasonable, it was pointed out, com-

pared with other cities who have privately owned electric systems.

Turns on Trolleys

With that tucked under its belt, the council now has put up its fists at the North Texas Traction company in an effort to force down trolley and bus fares. Trolley fares now are 8 cents and bus fares 10 cents.

The council has instructed City Manager George D. Fairtrace to investigate the cost of a municipal bus system.

At the same time Fairtrace and other city officials were instructed to confer with A. F. Townsend, receiver for the North Texas Traction company on reduction of street car and bus fares to a level with those in Dallas where the fare is 7 cents.

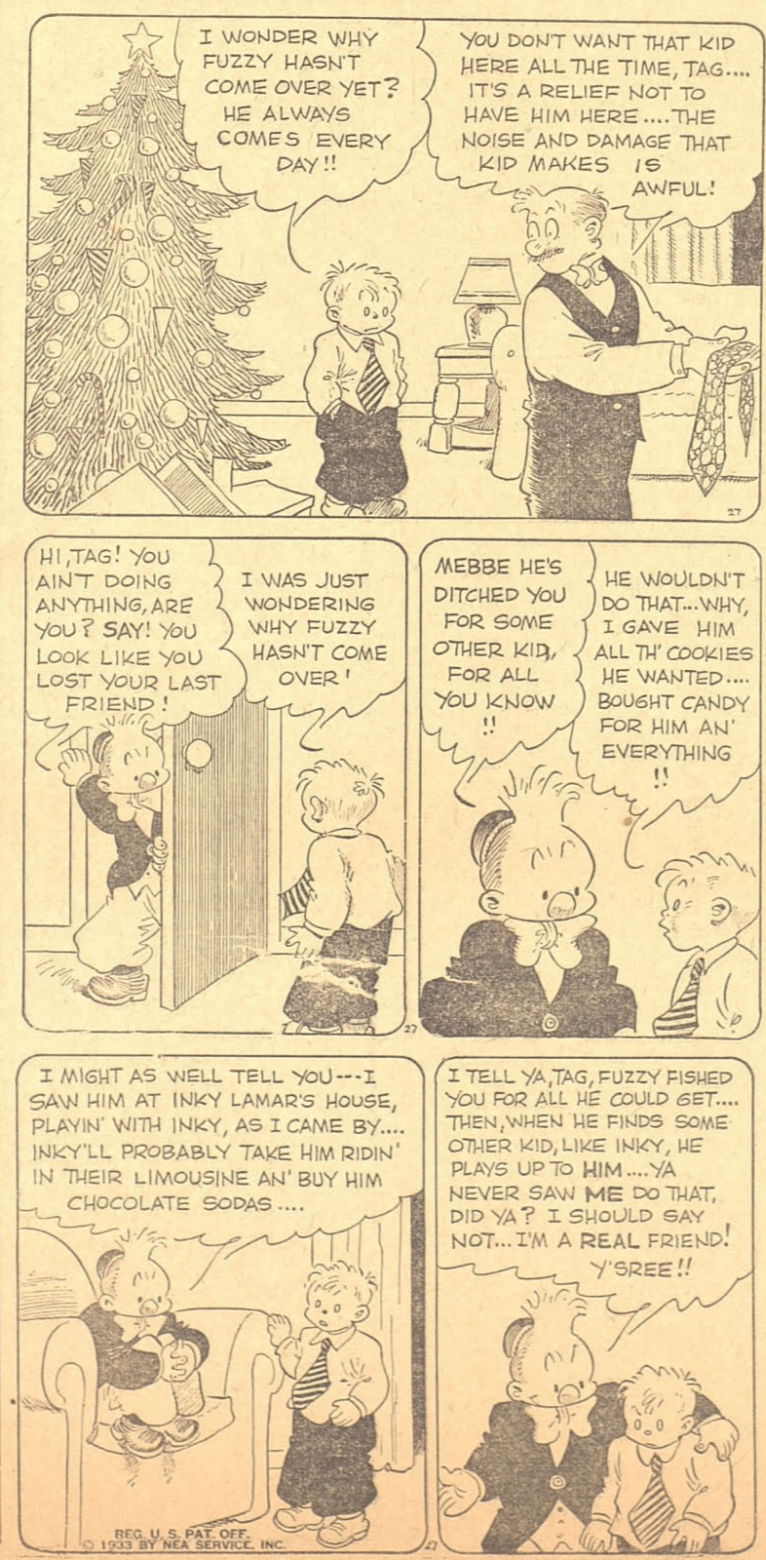
Outcome of this duel apparently is several weeks in the future, since it will take sometime to obtain estimates of how much it will cost to institute a municipally owned bus system.
