RAILS RECAPTURE CLAUSE. Representative Sam Rayburn of Texas is chairman of the house interstate commerce commission. Chairman Rayburn let it be known that a bill embodying repeal of the law for recapture of excess profits of railroads and revamping the rate making provisions of the law will be the first of a threefold program to better railroad conditions that will reach the house this session.

WHY LYNN P. TALLEY LOST HIS JOB. Lynn P. Talley resigned as governor of the federal reserve bank of Dallas to become chairman of the board of the Bank of America National Trust and Savings company of San Francisco. This less than a year ago. Now he has resigned his California job. This after the A. P. Giannini forces had regained control of the bank's management and forced the retirement of the eastern financiers who had captured less than three years ago the famous financial organization and interest established by an Italian Californian and made a power on the Pacific coast.

CLEVELAND CAPTURED BY THE DEMOCRATS. For 17 years the republicans have dominated the city of Cleveland. National Committeeman Maurice Maschke is the republican boss of Ohio and Cleveland is his home. He was responsible for the ousting of the city manager form of government which he had dominated by placing his henchmen in control or possession of all the municipal offices. This did not satisfy the boss. He did not believe in city manager rule. He plotted and planned and ousted that modern form of government. Then he named his man for mayor. Incidentally, the office of mayor had been clothed with extraordinary powers. Cleveland democrats nominated Ray T. Miller, he was the county prosecutor. He had been a famous Notre Dame football player; he had been a gallant soldier in the World war. He made a most aggressive campaign. He called a spade a spade. He played the noted republican boss. Then came the greatest polling of votes in the history of Cleveland. Miller received 102,632 votes; the nominee of the republican boss 94,929 votes. It was an upheaval that brought about the downfall of the boss in one of the foremost cities west of the Allegheny mountains.

B. W. PATTERSON ANNOUNCES FOR JUDGE OF 88TH

B. W. Patterson prominent attorney of Cisco and Eastland, today formally announced his candidacy for the bench of the 88th district court on a platform of speeding up the functions of justice to a point commensurate with the right of every person to a "complete, fair and impartial hearing of his cause." Judge Patterson announced his candidacy with the issuance of the following brief statement: To the Citizens of Eastland County: I wish to be Judge of the 88th district court of this county. In announcing my candidacy I realize not only the honor, but the grave responsibility that comes to a District Judge. The certainty of a speedy and unprejudiced trial according to the laws of our country is necessary to a contented and patriotic citizenship. To accomplish this I believe that the Judge should be well learned in the law and be able to apply it to the facts presented in his court; not a partisan but have a high sense of fairness to all; and he should have executive ability to dispatch business so as to avoid unnecessary delay in trials and needless expense to the country and state, but at the same time have regard for the right of every person to a complete fair and impartial hearing of his cause. I do not presume to possess all these qualities to a perfect degree but do feel that my age, training and experience have reasonably thus fitted me for this service.

Most thinking people are aware that within the last two or three years various problems facing humanity have some how or other been becoming intensified. In fact, it is possible to take a shorter period, say the last twelve months, and to conclude that whatever the reason, whether by the high point of a cycle or by coincidence, a great many very vital problems are being urged to a head more or less at the same time. It is strange indeed that economy which is merely an arrangement made by men and depending comparatively little on acts of God and unknown forces still hidden from science, should have drifted so far from man's control. In fact the world seems to be making better progress in more ambitious fields than that of economy. Compared to the profound problems of the universe, it would be thought that mere matters of buying, selling, production, consumption and so forth would be more or less child's play, but experience seems to be proving otherwise.

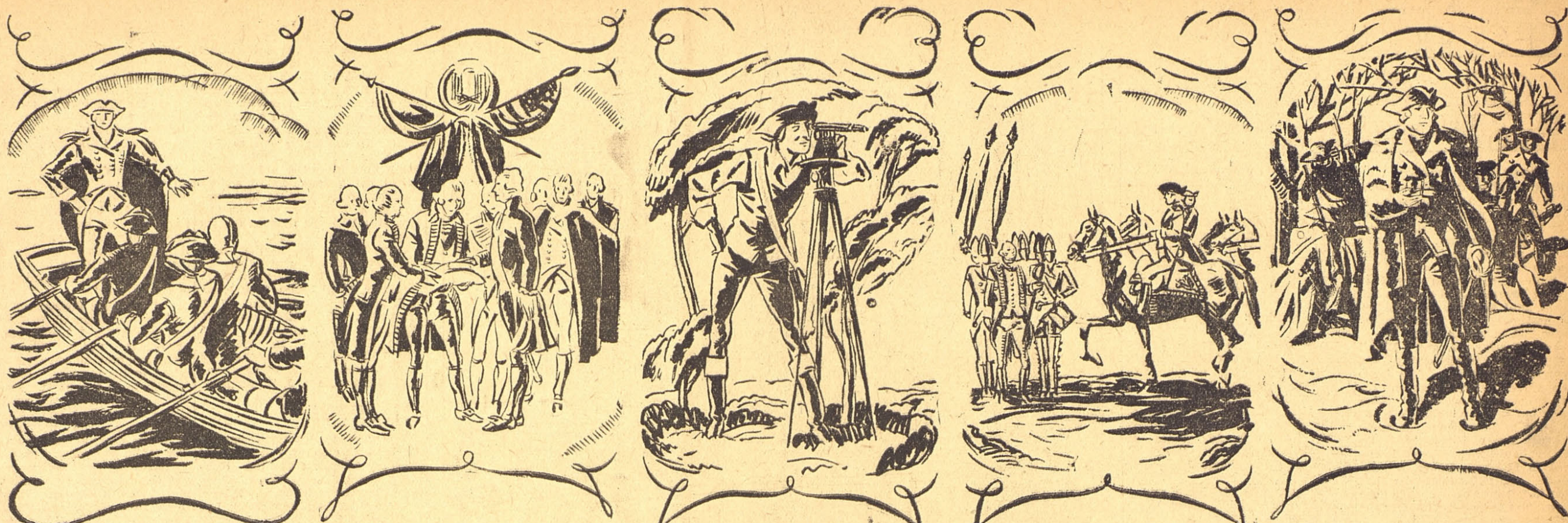

On Thursday, April 30, 1789, Washington, who had been elected as the first president of the new republic, was inaugurated at Federal Hall in New York in the presence of a vast multitude which gave him deafening cheers.

Mount Vernon was the home of Washington and here he delighted to stay. His records show how he was continually studying and experimenting to discover new and better ways of making his land yield more profitable crops.

On May 6, 1778, Washington announced to his army that France had become an ally of the Colonies. The invaluable aid thus obtained were in large measure due to Benjamin Franklin's effective diplomacy in Paris, where he had been sent.

At the age of 16, George Washington went to work for Lord Fairfax as a surveyor. Although he was largely self-taught, his surveying was so accurate that his records are still held as valid.

In this humble home, Washington was born two hundred years ago. During his school days, which lasted until he was 16 years old, he often returned here to live with his brother, Augustine, that he might be nearer to the best school available.

On a day in May, 1758, Washington met a charming young widow by name of Martha Custis. It was a case of love at first sight. On January 6th, 1758, they were married, the beginning of an ideal and happy married life.

On Christmas night, between twilight and four in the morning, Washington's army of 2,400 men crossed the icy Delaware and surprised the Hessian troops at Trenton. A great victory resulted which brought increased courage to the Colonists.

Following the conclusion of the war, but before he officially gave up his command, Washington made a trip to Lake Champlain and through the Mohawk Valley. As a result he was one of the first men to express himself about the "immense extent and importance" of our inland waterways.

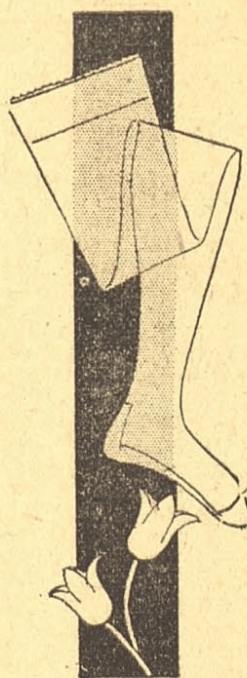

At the end of his second term as president, Washington was weary of public life. More than forty years had been given to the service of his country and he was desirous of spending the evening of his days at Mount Vernon among the scenes that he loved so well.

No darker days were ever seen than those at Valley Forge where Washington led his half-clad army of 11,000 men about the middle of December, 1777. The terrible suffering from cold, hunger and sickness tested these men to the depths of their patriotism.

The war was officially declared at an end on April 19, 1783. Toward the end of the year, Washington gathered his officers together in France's Tavern in New York and there gave them an impressive and affectionate farewell.
