Media Day concerned themselves with three of the most pressing topics: Wayne Keese discussing Ethanol, an alternate fuel, Mrs. Lynn White on family economic survival during inflationary times, and Dr. Davis with a general view of political realities relating to Agriculture. All speakers stressed that County Extension work is now geared to city as well as county living.

Wayne Keese disclosed that Texas A and M University is setting up a plant to manufacture ethanol from fermented agricultural products. He described this product as "a fuel, not a mix". Keese pointed out, however, that both anhydrous and lower proof ethanol can be burned directly in a spark ignition engine without relying on gasoline.

Gasohol, a mixture of 10 percent ethanol and 90 percent unleaded gasoline, requires 200 proof anhydrous ethyl alcohol, which is water free.

Experimentation until this time - unfortuantely - indicates that it costs about \$2.00 per gallon to produce an alternate fuel from any of the products such as corn, sorghum, wheat, sugar cane or beets. But work on this project will continue at full speed.

Fertilizer On Coastal Bermuda Grass

By DeMarquis Gordon, County Extension Agent, Eastland County

When should fertilizer be applied to coastal bermudagrass? This is a question Eastland County producers are asking, according to County Extension Agent, DeMarquis Gordon. Coastal bermudagrass is the most important perennial forage crop in Eastland

County. This grass requires high rates of fertilizer to produce high yields of quality forage. In a demonstration conducted by R.D. Hart in Eastland County in 1979, the best results were obtained where all the nitrogen was applied in the spring. This method is contrary to the soil test recommendations, which suggests that the nitrogen be applied in split applications, after each grazing or cutting of hay. The demonstration indicated that the one application of nitrogen returned \$51 more per acre than the same amount applied in three split applications, according to Gordon. Dr. George Alston, Extension Area Agronomist, says similar results have been obtained in other demonstra-

tions in the West Cross Timbers. He explains a reason for these results. When all the nitrogen is applied in the spring the rains dissolve the nitrogen and carry it to the root zone, reasons Alston. Nitrogen applied in the late spring and summer remain on the dry surface and is not carried to the root zone. There may be enough moisture in the root zone for good grass growth,

of little value to the grass. Hart divided the demonstration into one acre plots. In one plot he applied 300 pounds of nitrogen (900 pounds of 33-0-0) on April 20. On another plot he applied 100 pounds of nitrogen in three applications -April 20, May 20 and June 27. A third plot received only 60 pounds of nitrogen in one application and another plot had no fertilizer applied dur-

ing the year. The plot where 300 pounds of nitrogen was applied in one application produced 8116 pounds of hay, that averaged 14.3 percent crude protein compared to 7480 pounds of hay averaging 12.7 percent crude protein where the same amount of nitrogen was applied in three split applications.

The plot that received no fertilizer produced only 3150 pounds of forage and contained only 7.1 percent protein. The plot that was fertilized with 60 pounds of nitrogen produced 5394 pounds of 11.2 percent protein hay.

The return from the acre plot receiving 300 pounds of nitrogen in one application was \$130.68 above returns from the no-fertilizer acre. Returns from the acre receiving the same amount of nitrogen in split applications was \$78.96 above the nofertilizer acre. The acre fertilized with 60 pounds of nitrogen in one application returned \$61.60 more than the no-fertilizer acre.

These values are based on the hay being worth 26 cents per pound of protein.

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
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


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P Je Things WHO IS Jackie Bibby? Several folks who read and appreciate his articles under the heading of "Behind the Walls" in this newspaper from time to time have wondered and asked. And we

asked District Attorney Emory Walton. Jackie is a native of Rising Star. Five years or so ago he was arrested and convicted on a marijuana possession charge. The court gave him a probated sentence. He liv-ed up to every letter of the law during the time of the sentence and was given a clean bill. Soon thereafter he was arrested on a similar charge in Brown County and sentenced to serve eight years.

Mr. Walton reports that Jackie is a model prisoner at Huntsville and he tells folks that he plans to work among young people to help discourage drug usage when he gets out of prison. His articles in the newspapers indicate that he is working in that direction already.

And it wanders down Avenue A to East 14th Street and on to Avenue D (Conrad Hilton Avenue) to 3rd Street and west on 3rd to Avenue L north past the cemetery and then west out of town. Who's Who in America has

this to say about the Bankhead Highway: "1920-21 the Bankhead Highway, which was to run from Washington, D.C., to Los Angeles, Calif., was named for John Hollis Bankhead of Jasper, Ala. Bankhead served in the U.S. Senate from 1907-25. He was conspicuous as a leader in the work of the commission of public buildings and on rivers and barbors. He was a member of the inland waterways commission and author of the law for federal aid to post roads. He was, incidentally, the grandfather of Actress Tallulah Bankhead.

superseded in the late 1920s or very early 1930s by Highway 80. There was a planning meeting for civic leaders along the route in Memphis, Tenn.

Eastland County was among the first in Texas to get its brick pavement, and there was some scandal in Austin in the Jim Ferguson days about the cost of this county's part of the road. Highway 80 through the county covers a good portion of the brick road. Some brick areas were cleaned off when the highway was rerouted. Mr. Wende has a good thought and we feel that the new historical body that is working under the supervision of Dr. Rinaldo Petrini will see that the Cisco portion of the old highway is properly marked. Dr. Petrini has said a number of times that "Cisco should never allow even one of the bricks to be removed from
