" THE OLD AND THE NEW- Present scheduling calls for the completion of Eastland County's new jail facilities about May. 1. County Sheriff Johnnie Morren predictes that no one will ever escape the new county jail.

"If they get out of this jail it'll be because we gave them the keys and let them get away," Morren said of the \$700,000 facility being built adjacent to the present jail.

The facility will replace the one orginally built in 1897, which Morren said will be used for storage when the new jail is completed in May.

The new jail, which can accommodate 35 prisoners, including eight juveniles and eight women is being built with cinderblocks reinforced with iron and secured in concrete.

"There's no way anyone will be able to get through the walls unless we just aren't doing our jobs," the sheriff said, adding that "it would take months" for a prisoner to dig a space through the walls sufficient for escape.

Above the prisoners will be a galvanized steel ceiling that will be welded to angle irons laid into the framework of the structure, Morren said, and all locks will be electronically

# Mrs. Bowden Tells What **Makes A Foster Parent**

Billy have been foster parents, they have cared for forty-one children, keeping some in their home for as long as two and one-half years.

Dianne is a lively example that boredom and loneliness are not what make a foster parent. A fluent speaker, Dianne is much in demand to share with audiences what she has learned during 400 hours of professional training and her years of actual experience. She and Billy are the parents of four children: Sam, 19, presently working in Houston; Scott, 18, and Twillia, 14, students at Early High School; and three year-old Misty of the home. Besides parenting, Dianne also finds time to pursue her hobbies of painting, sewing and raising African violets.

But after hearing Dianne speak and seeing her in action, one would have to conclude that hobbies are secondary. It is the need of the child and the challenge to the "stand-in" parents that attract her and her husband to this demanding lifestyle. Her voice is that of the

crusader, pleading for compassionate, informed treatment for children uprooted from their native environment and their natural parents. Dianne speaks with concern about undiscovered allergies, overlooked hearing problems, and therapy denied the child with severe emotional trauma.

Concern is backed by action. Dianne and Billy are licensed to keep a maximum of four children at any one time, accepting children from birth to sixteen years of age. At this time they accept only "special needs" children, those with severe medical problems, handicaps of a serious nature, or emotional problems calling for special treatment. They presently have two foster children, both of whom were severely abused when they came into the home.

Dianne says of their involvement, "We really enjoy working with infants, seeing them become well enough to go to an adoptive home. We have learned as a family the very valuable technique of 'letting a child go' when it comes time to give him up." Our foster home is really a family home with all members of our family sharing in the daily chores and care of the special needs children." And that is the beautiful thing to see in the

Bowden home. The natural children accept the foster children, picking up the positive attitude of helpfulness from their parents.

Mrs. Bowden has served as president of the Brownwood-Central Texas Foster Parent Association for three years and has just recently turned over the presiding gavel to her successor, Mrs. Perry Cowen of Brownwood, Texas. With a dedicated executive staff assisting Dianne and under the fine leadership of John Baker, Foster Home Coordinator of Brownwood and an Eastland, Texas, native, this organization has grown to be one of the strongest foster parent groups in the state of Texas. The Brownwood-Central

Texas Foster Parent Association has proved a rich source of training for Dianne and for many foster parents in the Brownwood and surrounding county areas. This group has sponsored workshops featuring such speakers as Jean McFadden of Ypsilanti, Michigan, and Donna Strong, instructor of Foster Parent Training at Eastern Michigan University. Most recently, a workshop was held at Howard Payne University dealing with "Developmentally Delayed

Although Dianne is no longer president of the Brownwood organization, she serves as Region IV vice president of the State Foster Parent Association and is a member of its Finance and Communications Committee. She enjoys speaking to parent groups, recruiting new families and helping with their training. "The nicest thing we have found in being foster parents," she says, "is forming the warm friendships we have made working closely with these families."

Plans for the future for the Bowdens include working with expectant teenage girls and teaching parenting skills to potentially abusive parents.

What makes a foster parent? Obviously, dedication, enthusiasm, professional training and an ability to forget oneself while remembering a little one torn loose from his moorings. As Dianne modestly asserts, "We feel that professional training, a positive attitude, and much prayer have made us effective foster parents."







Upon my assuming the position of District Judge of the 91st District, I immediately embarked upon a course of action which would result in the increase of the number of cases disposed of.

Cases do not dispose of themselves, but rather are disposed of by hard work, by setting the cases for trial and by actually trying them. A program such as this requires work and time. Such a program requires work not only by myself and the staff of the 91st District Court, but also by the general public as jurors.

On many occasions jurors are called to Court but do not actually serve in the trying of a case. Nevertheless, the jurors who are called fulfill an important role in the administration of justice. Many cases are settled and disposed of civil as well as criminal, without trial just because the case has been called for trial and a jury is present waiting to try the case. Therefore, your work and mine is not in vain because our goal of disposition and justice has been reached.

In the short time in which I have been privileged to serve as your Judge, we have utilized an average of over two jury weeks per month in the administration of justice. The remainder of the time has been used extensively and solely for non-jury matters. We intend to continue our work in this area in an effort to give all parties their day in court. You have a right to expect this from your Court, and will receive no less so long as I am serving you as your Judge.
