Roy M. Benton Formally Enters Race For Mayor

Roy M. Benton, well known resident of Cisco for 11 years, has authorized The Press to announce that he will be a candidate for Mayor of Cisco in the April 6th city election. A mayor and two commissioners will be named in the voting.

Mr. Benton, 40, is a member of the faculty at Cisco Junior College. He is a native of Waxahachie where he finished high school. After spending four years in the U. S. Navy in World War II, he entered North Texas State College where he earned a BBA degree. He has done graduate study at NTSU, Colorado State U., and Hardin-Simmons University.

The Bentons own their home at 1411 Bliss. Mrs. Benton is the former Gloria Henson, and they are the parents of four children. He is a Methodist and a 32nd degree Mason. Presently serving his second term as a member of the city commission, Mr. Benton is a former CoC director, a former school board trustee, ex-president of the Little League and the Cisco Lions Club and has been a member of the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department for eight years.

In connection with his candidacy, Mr. Benton made the following statement:

"In announcing my decision to run for the office of Mayor, I want to emphasize that the decision has been reached only after much thought and careful consideration. I have long been interested in the problems facing our community, and recent events have convinced me of the need for taking a more responsible role.

"I also want to emphasize that I am not the candidate of any special group, nor do I have any 'axe' to grind. My primary concern is that the city government should reflect the wishes of the majority of the voters.

"Because I believe that this can best be accomplished when the city government operates within the framework of the city charter, as approved by the voters, I strongly advocate the mayor-commissioner type of government."

Good Gas Well Completed By Reynolds Co.

Reynolds Drilling Company's No. 1 G. M. Stephenson, wildcat oil test five miles northeast of Cisco, has been completed as a substantial gas well in the Lake Sand, according to company officials.

The well was drilled to about 3,000 feet several months ago in a search for oil. Recently, the hole was plugged back to about 3,400 feet and gas in large quantities flowed in tests. A potential test is awaiting installation of gas lines and equipment, the report said.

Reynolds has a lease in Section 66, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Nine miles northeast of Cisco in the LeeRay area, W. M. Jarrell of Houston has announced plans to deepen to 3,300 feet a Mississippian test hole that was sunk there some time ago. The well is Jarrell's No. 1 Frank Good in Section 56, BBB&C Survey.

Two other officers will be filled in the near future, Mr. Weathers announced. Directors were voted upon, and their names will be announced after they are contacted.

Managers of the teams and their sponsors are as follows: Braves, E. T. Autrey, Heidenheimer's; Cardinals, Sharley Cooper, Dean Drug; Giants, Bill Wells, Cisco Rotary Club; and Athletics, Vic Childers, First National Bank.

Cisco Farmer Loses Appeal Damage Suit

Rudie M. McGough, who farms near Cisco, lost his \$6,487 damage suit against Massey-Ferguson, Inc., and its agent in Rising Star, G. A. Dunn, when the State Supreme Court in Austin turned down McGough's appeal "for want of jurisdiction."

McGough brought suit in 91st District Court at Eastland, charging that Dunn and Massey-Ferguson caused him to lose peanut and hegarri crops two years ago when they failed to deliver farm machinery for which he had contracted. He put the loss at \$4,500; and added costs of trips to Cisco and McKinney to see about the machinery, a \$700 down-payment and loss of days which he had worked to arrive at the damage estimate of \$6,487.

The defendants asked trial judge T. M. Collie to transfer the case to Dallas County, and when that motion was granted, McGough appealed to the Court of Appeals in Eastland, claiming local trial was proper because Massey-Ferguson conducted business there and Dunn lived there.

The Eastland Court stated that no-written promise had been made by the company or its agents to perform any act in Eastland County and said no evidence of fraud had been alleged. It described the suit as one for breach of contract, an upheld the trial court's ruling.

The Supreme Court, by its ruling, affirmed the appellate court's decision.

Final Rites For Rex Moore Are Conducted Today

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. today at Rust Funeral Home chapel for Rex W. Moore, 70, who died last Tuesday morning at his home, 1900 Avenue H, after being in ill health for some two years.

Services were directed by the Rev. Jesse E. Cassie, pastor of the First Baptist Church, assisted by the Rev. Almon Martin, pastor of the First Christian Church. Burial was in Oakwood Cemetery. Pallbearers were Raby Miller, Don Reynolds, Wallace McCarver, E. J. Poe, E. L. Jackson and Frank Coats.

Mr. Moore was born June 20, 1894, at Blossom, and had lived in Cisco for 57 years. He was married to Opal L. Dossett May 6, 1920, in Cisco. He was an employee of the T&P Railroad for 44 years and had been retired for several years.



The circuit's four top teams — Cisco and Ranger of the north zone and Wharton and San Antonio of the south — will meet in games tonight and Friday night for the TJCCAC crown. Ranger and Wharton were scheduled to play at 6 p. m., with Cisco and San Antonio to follow at 9 p. m.

Friday night's schedule calls for the two losers in tonight's games to play at 7 o'clock for third place. The two winners of the opening games will meet at 9 p. m. Friday for the championship. (Continued from Page One) University Law School faculty from 1932 to 1946, before leaving to become dean of the University of Oklahoma Law School. Three years later he returned to UT to become Law School dean. During World War II he was on leave to serve as counsel for the Petroleum Administration for War and the Office of Price Administration.

In 1961 he was president of the Association of American Law Schools, a learned Society and accrediting agency composed of representatives from more than 100 of the nation's leading law schools.

Dean Keeton earned a Doctor of Juridical Science degree from Harvard University in 1936 and both Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Laws degree from The University of Texas in 1931.

Dean Keeton is a specialist in torts — the segment of law which deals with suits filed by one individual against another for damages. He is an editor of "Law of Torts," an American Casebook series, and serves on the American Law Institute's advisory committee for revision of the Restatement of the Law of Torts.

He has written extensively for various law journals, especially the Texas Law Review, and is a member of the State Bar of Texas, American Bar Association, Phi Beta Kappa and Order of the Coif, national legal society.

Dean Keeton was selected in 1961 as a Fellow of the American Bar Foundation and in 1962 he was chosen for a six-year term on the Foundation's board of directors.

Active in Austin church and civic affairs, Dean Keeton is a native of Clarksville, Texas. He and his wife, the former Madge Anna Stewart of San Antonio, have one son and one daughter.





El Paso Man Is Named District Farm Agent

John E. Bureson, El Paso County Agricultural Agent since 1960, on March 1 will become district agricultural agent for Extension District 8 with headquarters at Stephenville. Bureson replaces R. G. Burwell who retired on January 31, 1965. The Central Texas district is composed of 20 counties, including Eastland County.

In making the announcement, Director John E. Hutchison, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said Bureson has made an outstanding record in each of the positions he has held since joining the Extension Service in 1951. He is a native of Eastland County but did most of his growing up on a Comanche County farm.

The new district agent is a graduate of De Leon High School, Tarleton State College and Texas Technological College with a B. S. degree in horticulture. He has also done graduate work during summer sessions at Texas A&M and Colorado State Universities and regular sessions at Texas Western College. He served in the U. S. Navy during 1945 and 1946.

was named county agricultural agent for Navarro County in 1954 where he served until his transfer to El Paso County.

Hutchison said Bureson has directed outstanding educational programs in each of the counties he has served for both adults and 4-H Club members. He has been very successful, the director added, in getting widespread support and cooperation on the many and varied programs he has directed.

The Buresons have three children and are members of the Christian Church. He is an active member of the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association and Epsilon Sigma Phi, honorary Extension organization.





Cemetery Information Sought By Committee

The help of all Eastland county citizens is being asked in the recording of historical data about county cemeteries by the Eastland County Historical Association, Chairman Mike Collins of Eastland has announced. A map of the county has been plotted, and 53 burial sites have been identified. Material is being assembled on specified historical sites about the various cemeteries, he said. Persons knowing factual information about the various cemeteries in the county — notes, unusual persons buried, and other historical information — are invited to bring this information known to the committee. The county has been divided into segments with chairmen named in each area to collect and forward the information for inclusion in permanent records. Names named to date are Berrywood of Carbon, General of Gorman, Joe Deninger of Ranger, Mrs. Alexander of Cisco, Mrs. Lee

White of Rising Star, and Charles Freyschlag and Mrs. Arthur Murrell, both of Eastland. Persons wishing to pass information about the cemeteries may contact these people or contact the county committee by addressing Post Office Box 356, Eastland. Chairmen will be named for Olden and Desdemona. For instance a report has already been turned in showing that a man is buried in the Jewel Cemetery, who lived during George Washington's day — which is not unusual for New England cemeteries, but quite unique for the Southwestern area. The record project is expected to take perhaps a year, Collins said, and others will be undertaken later to record histories of the county's mail service, newspapers, banks, churches and schools. These histories will be edited from citizens' reports and bound into permanent volumes for an assembled record of the county. The County historical group is also still interested in locating the burial places of Confederate soldiers, for whom plaques are available.


