# PRES. HARDING **DEAD AT MARION**

MARION, O., Nov. 21 .- Mrs. Florence Kling Harding, widow of the late President Warren G. Harding, died at 8:55 this morning at the home of Mrs. Charles E. Sawyer. She had grown slowly worse from hour to hour for the past week. Practically the last evidence of consciousness was her whispered appreciation yesterday morning of the message of President and Mrs. Coolidge, expressing hope and good wishes for her recovery.

Dr. Sawyer has known for week that she would not recover, but it was the strict command from Mrs. Harding that the most meagre of bulletins be put out regarding her condition. She had also denied Dr. Sawyer permission to bring specialists to Marion for consultation. The technical description of her malady was chronic nephritis, but Mrs. Harding has never fully recovered from the shock of the president's death. The endless grief and formalities that followed his death had undermined her nervous system. When Brigadier General Sawyer, the life-long family physician died, almost in her past weeks.




