Leaders of more than $3,000,000$ workmen, representing seven great labor unions and perhaps one-third of the British population, were planning "direct action" leading to their control of industry and the overturn of the British political system.

The big unions have not formed a "fighting alliance," as their leaders threatened, and labor and capital have drawn closer together instead of getting farther apart, to safeguard the industrial in business the ation was serious, with production costs lower elsewhere and British trade supremacy threatened, the employing and employed classes have come nearer to a friendly understanding than previously since the war.
