By GORDON K. SHEARER United Press Staff Correspondent AUSTIN, Dec. 23 — Another atempt to pass a state sales tax will mark the Ferguson administration, t is confidently expected here.

The governor's adviser has said that his wife will call a special session of the legislature to issue more of the \$20,000,000 bread bonds authorized by constitutional amendment. One of the causes assigned for lack of interest among financiers in the bonds has been failure to provide a specific tax for their retirement. It is the understanding here that the sales tax will be revived with the proposal that it be used to retire relief bonds.

The Fergusons' unsuccessful efforts to have such a tax levied at the regular session of the 43rd. legislature was the keenest disappoint-ment suffered by the governor in her second term, next to her failure to place Frank L. Denison on the tate highway commission.

Fassage of a sales tax at a special session would be a triumph for her administration. It would also add to the prestige of her husband and be valuable to him in a possible campaign for the United States senate.

CISCO, RANGER **To Fight Divorce** AND EASTLAND **VOTE FOR BEER** Legal 3.2 per cent beer was on tap and ice in three urban areas of oth-

erwise ary Eastland county today. By mandates of the voters in special elections Friday sale of the brew was legalized in Cisco, Eastland and Ranger. Almost immediately business establishments that had obtained the necessary licenses placed the beer on sale.

The elections were ordered in the three areas by the county commissioners court in response to petitions of citizens. Cisco voters authorized legal sale by a vote of 351 for to 88 against. That was by far the greatest majority accorded legal beer in the three elections. Eastland gave legalization the slightest margin with 170 voting for it and 119 voting against. At Ranger 184 citizens registered approval compared to only 39 against.

As indicated, interest in the elections was slight. Less votes were polled in all three districts than are normally polled in any one of them. Nor was there any demonstration when the result of the vote became
