WOOLLEY FREED BY JURY'S VERDICT

Beer Vote Set for December 22 in Cisco, Eastland, Ranger

Elections to determine whether or not the sale of 3.2 per cent beer shall be legalized within the limits of the cities of Cisco, Eastland and Ranger were ordered by the commissioners court of Eastland county this week upon petitions presented by citizens of each of those cities. The elections were ordered set for Friday, December 22. Election of-ficials will be appointed later, Coun-

ty Judge Clyde L. Garrett said. Explaining the action of the court in calling the elections in the face of an attorney-general's ruling that an election before six months had expired following the county elec-tion of August 26, 1933, Judge Garrett said that the attorney-general did not understand the issue with which the court was confronted. He said that it was mandatory upon the court to call the elections.

Court's Position

"The attorney-general had in mind, it appears," said the judge, "that the court was asked to call a countywide election, which clearly could not be done until after six months from the date of the countywide election which was called coincident with the state vote upon egalization of 3.2 beer. But, as we construe the law, and since no elections were called in sub-divisons of he county at that time, no legal time limit has intervened to prevent calling elections within the - limits of political sub-divisions of the county, such as cities, justice pretowns, etc. Therefore, ause the court was properly petiioned Monday, it was determined to ce mandatory upon it to accede to the request of the petitioners and set the election date as was done.'

The law requires that a petition shall bear signatures of citizens to vote cast in the area in the last gen-eral election for governor. The Cisco petition bore the names of



Only partial success was reported today in a United Press survey of conditions in leading wet cities.

The survey showed that liquor prices continue high, except in San Francisco, where the price war is in progress. However, confidence has been expressed that they will be reduced within a few months. Arrests for drunkenness in last week were practically the same

as in the last week of prohibition, except in Los Angeles which reported an increase. The survey showed that bootleggers continued to operate in most cities, although a sharp reduction of speakeasies was reported especial-



TEXAS SOIL LAGS

Clarence Ousley in a recent article calls attention to the fact that Texas is not the best cotton producing state for the reason that its per acre yield of lint is far below the per acre yield of most of the other cotton growing states. Georgia far exceeds Texas in per acre production while only Louisiana and Florida rank below Texas in the average number of pounds of cotton harvested from a given amount of land. The test of land is the amount of crop that it will produce per acre and under that test Texas is falling behind even the states which are less suited to the growth of cotton. Georgia's land is inferior in quality to Texas land, yet the cotton growers of that state are doing more with its soil than the cotton growers of Texas are doing with theirs. The reason is that Texas, as Mr. Ousley puts it, is "mining its soil" while the farmers of Georgia, Mississippi and other states are putting back as much as they take out.

He suggests that the cotton reduction program to be carried out under federal government auspices next year provides a great opportunity to rectify the conditions that have been allowed to develop chiefly because the wonderful fertility of certain Texas soils devoted to cotton growing made the farmer careless of the resources from which he drew. CWA EDUCATIONAL RELIEF

Federal relief money will be put to another service in the cause of public education by supplementing the salaries of teachers in rural and small town districts where the school terms would otherwise be greatly curtailed because of a lack of local and state funds. Announcement of this policy was made by Maury Hughes, state recovery chairman, who has just returned from Washington and conferences with NRA officials where he urged the use of CWA funds for the purpose. Emphasis upon unrestricted educational opportunities during these recovery times is rightly a policy under the CWA program. A year lost in the education of a child, as Mr. Hughes pointed out, is a year lost forever. School teachers of America, to argue a point to which they are entitled, have demonstrated, as few other professions during the depression, the loyalty and forbearance that entitles them to consideration in this recovery program.

Another phase of the program of work relief in education, as already in effect here, provides for the use of CWA funds to employ teachers without positions in teaching night classes of adults. That, as does the extension of the terms of teachers already employed, serves a double purpose of giving unemployed teachers positions and at the same time putting their talents to use in instructing adults who, with time upon their hands, realize the deficiencies of their earlier application.

CODIFYING THE LAWS

It is a little pathetic that Texas elects 181 legislators, pays them about \$300,000 during a two-year term, then when it has to have its patchwork of statutes codified, must go out and hire somebody else to do it. A permanent legislative commission on codifying the statutes could take the bulky, conflicting and harum scarum sets of acts and amendments and refine them into single, clearcut unambiguous chapters, and could do it at little expense. Then the lawmakers, when the need arose to change the law, could do it without the probability of error now existing, while the simplification of the acts itself would eliminate most of the need for other amendments.
