WOOLLEY FREED BY JURY'S VERDICT

Beer Vote Set for December 22 in Cisco, Eastland, Ranger

ACTION BASED ON PETITIONS FROM CITIZENS

Elections to determine whether or not the sale of 3.2 per cent beer shall be legalized within the limits of the cities of Cisco, Eastland and Ranger were ordered by the commissioners court of Eastland county this week upon petitions presented by citizens of each of those cities.

The elections were ordered set for Friday, December 22. Election officials will be appointed by County Judge Clyde L. Garrett said. Explaining the action of the court in calling the elections in the face of an attorney-general's ruling that an election before six months had expired following the county election of August 26, 1933, Judge Garrett said that the attorney-general did not understand the issue with which the court was confronted. He said that it was mandatory upon the court to call the elections.

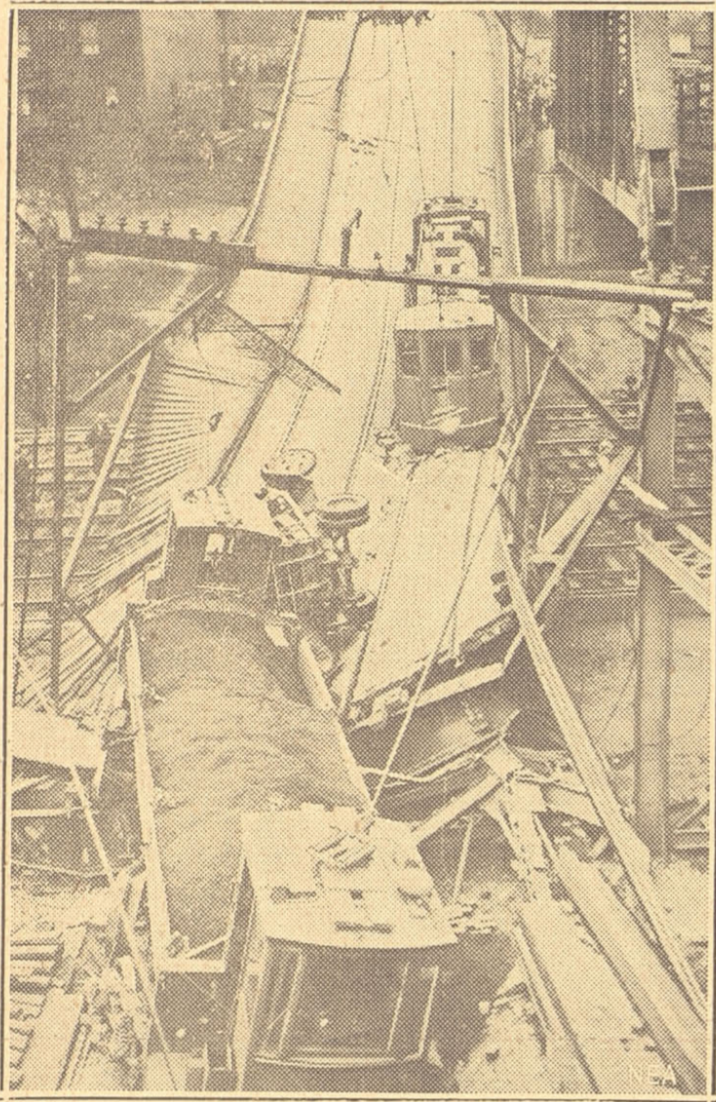
Court's Position
"The attorney-general had in mind, it appears," said the judge, "that the court was asked to call a countywide election, which clearly could not be done until after six months from the date of the countywide election which was called coincident with the state vote upon legalization of 3.2 beer. But, as we construe the law, and since no elections were called in sub-divisions of the county at that time, no legal time limit has intervened to prevent calling elections within the limits of political sub-divisions of the county, such as cities, justice precincts, towns, etc. Therefore, because the court was properly petitioned Monday, it was determined to be mandatory upon it to accede to the request of the petitioners and set the election date as was done."

The law requires that a petition shall bear signatures of citizens to the number of 10 per cent of the vote cast in the area in the last general election for governor. The Cisco petition bore the names of 124.

COMM'N VOTES \$75 TO AID IN SANITARY WORK
The city commission last night appropriated \$75 to pay gasoline expenses of workers employed in the sanitary service division of the CWA organization to make a sanitary survey of the city. Other cities and the county have made such appropriations, the commission was told by J. T. Elliott, deputy supervisor for Cisco, who asked for the appropriation. Workers are not paid expenses by the CWA and do not draw sufficient salaries to absorb the gasoline expenses, he said. Portions of the fund will be used to construct forms for the construction of sanitary pit privies.

Family Concerned For Rockefeller
TARRYTON, N. Y. Dec. 13.—Reports that John D. Rockefeller, Sr., convalescing from an attack of grippe, has suffered a relapse were answered today by the explanation that it was his age and not his sickness that caused concern. The multimillionaire is 94. A spokesman at the Rockefeller estate said the family was worried because of his advanced years, although he appeared to be recovering from a cold.

PROSECUTION OF CLEANERS IS PREPARED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—The federal trade commission prepared today to prosecute 100 American cleaners and dyers on charges of defying Blue Eagle price edicts. No Breckenridge, Texas, establishment was included in the list. The cleaners were accused of charging less for cleaning and pressing clothes than the NRA code specified. Penalty is a maximum fine of \$500 for each violation. Every day that the price remains below code levels is counted as a separate violation.

STATES STILL WRESTLE WITH LIQUOR ISSUE

One week of repeal in the United States today found wet states still struggling to smooth out regulations, outlaw the bootlegger and make legal sale of liquor work to the best advantage of government revenues and private business.

Only partial success was reported today in a United Press survey of conditions in leading wet cities. The survey showed that liquor prices continue high, except in San Francisco, where the price war is in progress. However, confidence has been expressed that they will be reduced within a few months.

Arrests for drunkenness in the last week were practically the same as in the last week of prohibition, except in Los Angeles which reported an increase.

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SHOOTING OF WIFE HELD TO BE ACCIDENT

DALLAS, Dec. 13.—Freed by a jury's verdict of a charge he slew his pretty young wife, Dorothy Joyne Woolley, Toy Woolley, 28-year-old Dallas auditor, today was en route to his boyhood home at Lampkin, Texas.

After deliberating almost continuously since 2 a. m. today, the jurors returned their decision, supporting the defense claim that the shotgun charge which killed Mrs. Woolley in the bedroom of their home here November 5 was fired accidentally.

Thus ended what was conceded to be the most sensational murder trial ever conducted in Dallas county. Throughout every moment of the proceedings, which began on Monday of last week, the courtroom was filled to capacity. Before the trial ended seats were being offered by their holders at \$4 each.

At Lampkin there was to be staged an anti-climax of the Woolley case, which, like the trial itself, was certain to be dramatic.

There Mrs. G. L. Woolley, aged and ill mother of the auditor, was lying on a sick bed waiting to welcome her son. Accompanying Woolley to his old home was his father, who was a witness for him at the trial.

When the verdict was read shortly before 10 a. m., Woolley jumped up from his seat, embraced his sister, his father and other members of his family. Tears of joy streamed down his face.

A denunciation of Woolley by his brother-in-law, Ralph Joyne, who declared that "I am fully convinced Toy Woolley deliberately murdered my sister and I want you to know I hate him with all my heart," was the last thing heard from the witness stand as the state closed its rebuttal testimony. Joyne was the 11th witness to testify.

Arguments were concluded at a night session last night.

Woolley did not take the stand in his defense, his counsel explaining that the state already had in its possession the defendant's statement of how the shooting occurred.

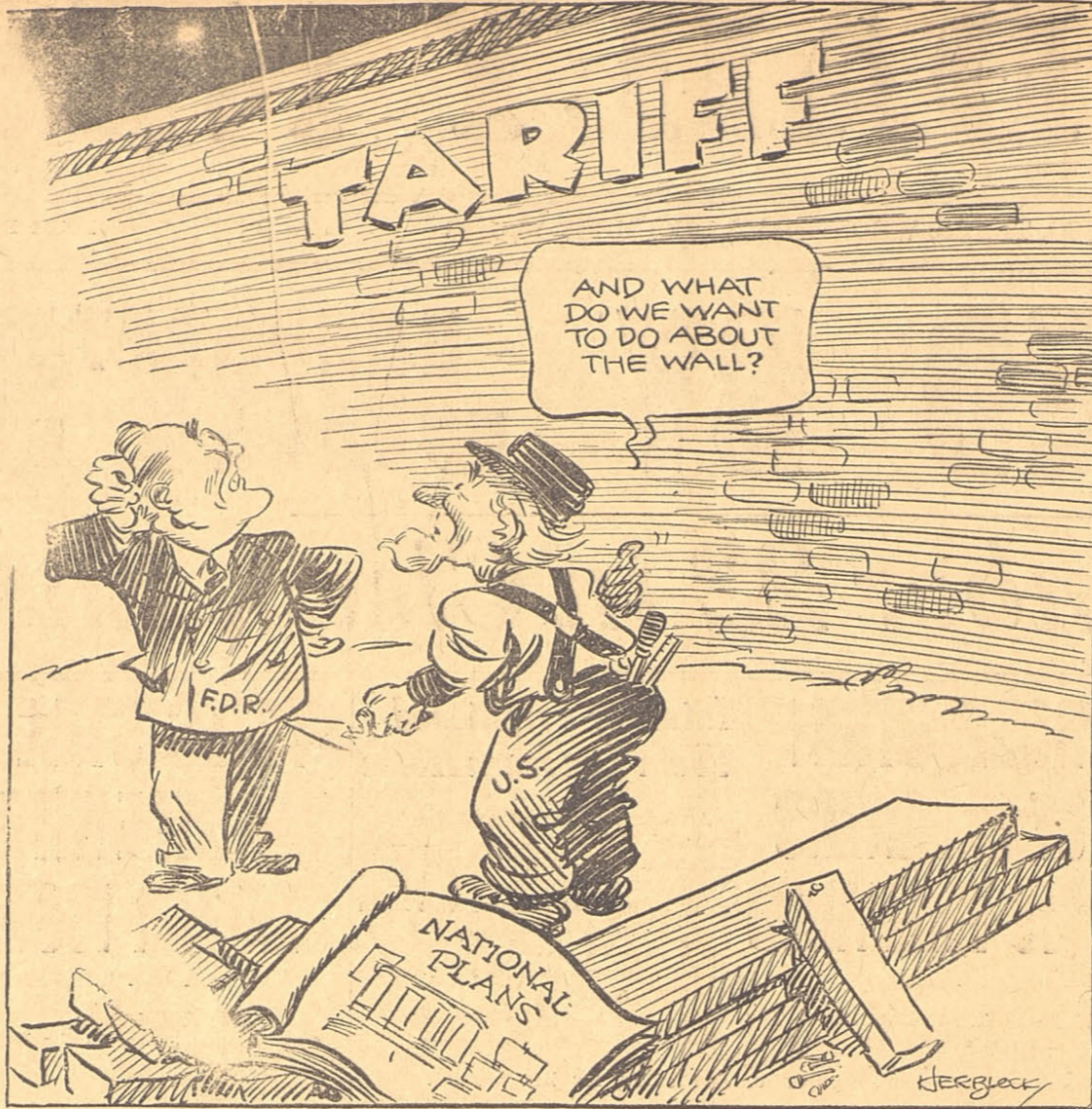

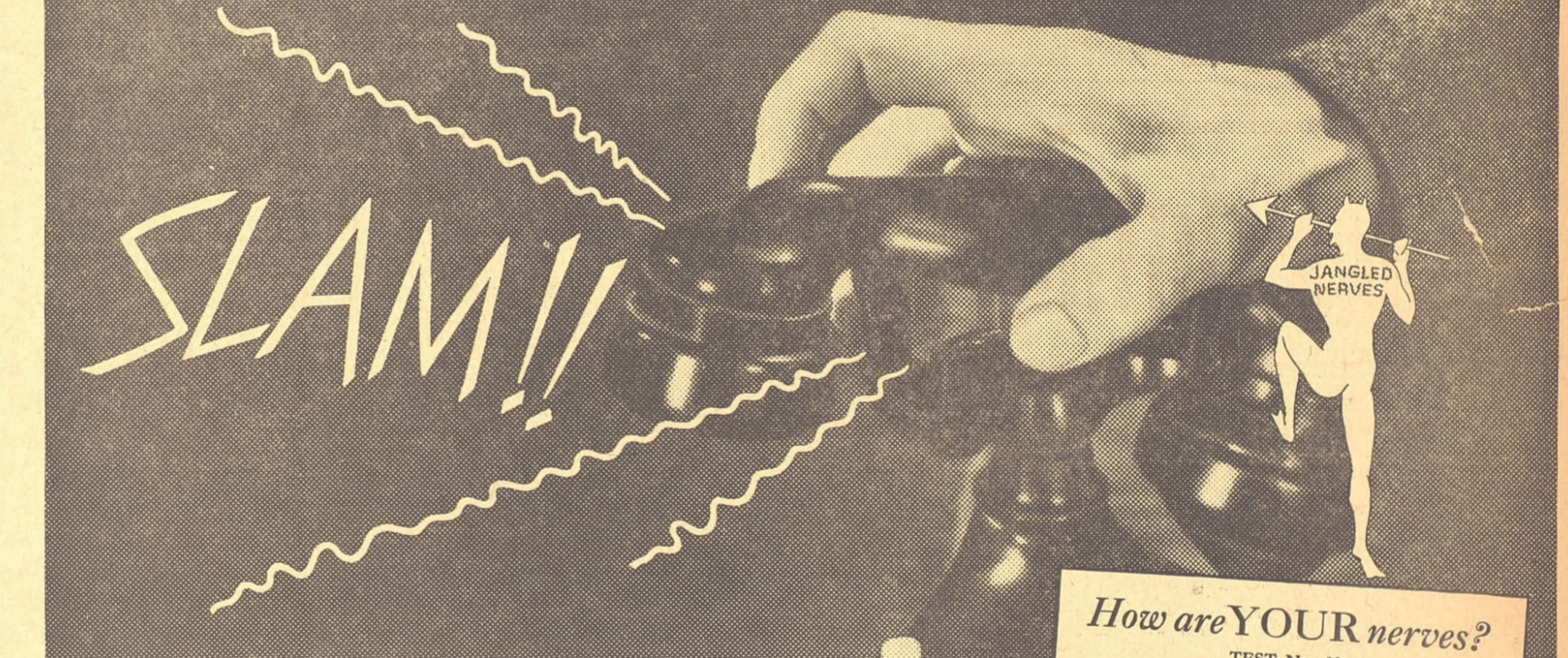

U.S. - FRENCH WOMEN SPLIT AIR HONORS

PARIS, Dec. 13.—The United States and France share feminine aviation honors for 1933.

Amelia Earhart still is queen of the air, holding first place in the records of the Federation Aeronautique Internationale.

Worthy rival of the American flier is Maryse Hilsz, "Earhart of France," who holds the women's world altitude mark.

Fastest woman in the sky is Mrs. May Hillip. Most renowned at present, though not holder of exceptional records, is perhaps Mrs. Amy Mollison.

The records as they stand at the end of 1933 are:

Straightline distance: Earhart, Los Angeles-New York, Aug. 24-25, 1932.

Altitude: Hilsz, Villacoublay, Aug. 19, 1932.

Speed (over closed circuit): Halzlip, Cleveland, Sept. 5, 1932.

Speed (over 100 km.): Earhart, Detroit, June 25, 1930.

Less spectacular, but equally important from the view point of aviation and certainly no less difficult for the pilots are the two records for light planes—distance and altitude—which are classified by the F. A. I. Both are held by Frenchwomen.

On June 28 to 29, 1931, Maryse Bastie from the Midi performed the unusual feat of flying 2,796.910 kilometers from Le Bourget to Urino, Russia in a light plane. No other woman has equalled this performance.

Helene Boucher, not yet 20, but one of the world's best acrobatic women fliers, rose from Orly airport to an altitude of 5,900 meters in a light Mauboussin - Peyret plane Aug. 2.

One more feminine record listed by the F. A. I., that for high flying seaplanes, is held by Mrs. Marion Eddy Conrad, who on Oct. 20, 1930, reached 4,103 meters at Port Washington, L. I.

MADE ZEP TRIP

MONTREAL, Dec. 13.—A 104-year-old newspaper has just returned to its owner here after a flight to Germany on board the Graf Zeppelin. The paper, a copy of the Norristown Herald, dated Oct. 28, 1929, was dispatched to Germany on board the airship from the Chicago exhibition by E. H. M. Falls, a local philatelist, for the double purpose of "giving it a ride" and having the stamps regularly cancelled.

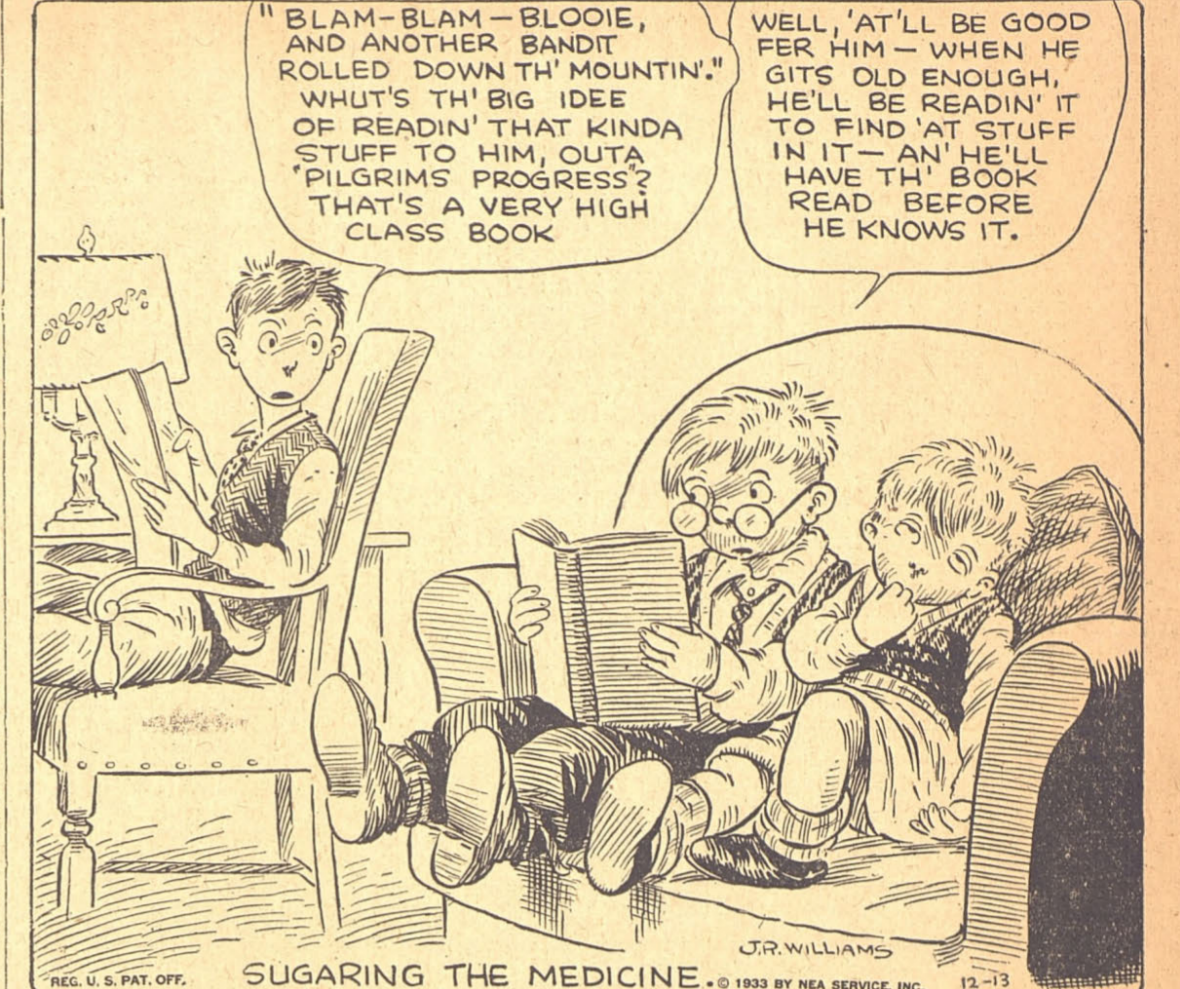
It will be both Pampa's and San Angelo's first taste of championship play and both teams will be keyed to a high pitch in an effort to go on into the semi-finals.

RECESSION END IN NOVEMBER IS INDICATED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 13—

The department of commerce said today weekly business indicators suggest that the business recession which has been in progress since July may have come to an end during November.

Although the department reported industrial production declined in October contrary to the normal seasonal trend, employment was practically unchanged in October while payrolls increased slightly as a result of gains in non-manufacturing industries.

"Construction contracts awarded in October," the department survey of current business said, "were higher as a result of public works

awards, and did not show the usual seasonal decline in the first half of November.

"Foreign trade expanded in both volume and value in October. Exports increased by more than the usual seasonal amount while the increase in imports was less than seasonal.

"The decline of 8 per cent in the October index of industrial production was about the same relative decrease as in the two preceding months. Both manufacturing and mineral production were lower. However, production was 16 per cent higher than a year ago and 5.3 per cent higher than in October, 1931.

"The indices continued to show a considerable disparity between the level of operations in the industries producing consumers' goods, where the rate of activity remains relatively high and the capital goods industries in which the declines during the depression have been most severe.

"Factory employment declined by only one per cent and payrolls by a negligible amount in October.

Since July, manufacturing output has dropped, while the number of factory workers has increased 10 per cent and wage payments have expanded 15 per cent.

"Distribution of goods by the railroads declined 3 per cent in October, a month in which ordinarily there is no change in average daily loadings.

"The value of department store sales expanded by about the usual seasonal amount in October and was only slightly above a year ago, notwithstanding the sharp price rise in the year's interval. These statistics reflect sales in the larger cities. Available data on rural areas indicate the retail movement in these districts has been more favorable.

"Wholesale prices evidenced a sagging tendency during the first three weeks of October but thereafter moved upward at a moderate pace, so that by the week of Nov. 18, the price level has risen to a new high for the year up 1.8 per cent from the October low. Farm prices increased slightly between mid-October and mid-November."
