Some of the Texas reforms came about through Gov. Moody's strenuous fight of the past four years for them. Cne of the most important was the bill sponsored by Senator Julien Hyer and Rep. Harry N. Graves and others to increase the parole of deserving prisoners and dding a parole officer to the pardon board

Here are some of the things the tate has done by which it prevents abuses such as those found in fedral prisons

Young and old prisoners are segregated.

Convicts are examined and classified mentally and physically and grouped for treatment and for work according to capacity.

Tuberculars and diseased prisoners are segragated by groups.

Schools are conducted in which all prisoners have opportunity for man. elementary instruction, and these found fit, for specialized training and instruction.





Clemency based on the record he has made in priscn; and this provided an incentive for behavior that immediately cut down the number of attempted escapes and the disorderliness within the prison.

The state last year provided for getting a better class of guards. Its entire administration was belstered up when the manager plan was put into effect, and still more strengthened when the present Manager Lee Simmons placed in charge. This deals with both the business and management side, and the personnel, or handling of prisoners.

The solitary cell is the only survival in the Texas prison of the tor-tures which the Wickersham commission branded as a survival in federal prisons of middle-ages brutality. And it isn't unduly harsh as used in punishments for infractions of rules or refusal to obey or-

### CANADA PUSHES U. S. IN GOLD PRODUCTION

WASHINGTON, July 31. - Canada gradually is drawing close to he United States in the race for the position of second highest gold-producing country in the world, reports to the department of commerce have revealed.

Final revised Canadian figures forwarded to the department by onsul Jesse B Jackson at Fort William, Ontario, indicate that the amounted to 2.012,068 fine cunces of gold. Gold production in this preliminary figures, amounted to 2,232,593 fine ounces, the second largest output in the world.

The largest gold producing area still centers around the Transvaal, Cape Colony and Natal districts in Africa. Last year 10,716,351 fine ounces were produced in this re-

According to information from Canada, the pronounced activity in Canadian gold mining and prospecting has recently been stimulated by an almost general reduction in commodity prices, combined with the attitude in financial circles toward increasing the world's




