More IH 20 Work Is Authorized In Callahan County This Fiscal Year

The Texas Highway Department announced this week authorization of construction of 18.6 miles of Interstate Highway 20 in Callahan County. This is in addition to the two projects which have already been let and which are under construction.

The construction work, totaling \$3,243,000, will be let in three contracts and will complete the principal part of the work in this county. The three projects are: from two miles west of Baird to two miles east of Baird, a distance of four miles, at an estimated cost of \$694,000; from two miles east of Baird to 3 miles east of Mexia Creek, a distance of 5.7 miles, at an estimated cost of \$331,000; and from 3 miles east of Mexia Creek to the Eastland County line, a distance of 8.9 miles, at an estimated cost of \$1,618,000.

The three projects will connect with work being done from two miles west of Cisco to the Callahan County Line, and from Elmdale east to two miles west of Baird.

The highway department also

announced the official awarding of the section extending from two miles west of Baird to two miles west of Clyde, to a combine of three contracting firms. The three firms are Cooper-Woodruff, Inc., Ferrier Bros., and Public Construction Co.

The contract calls for grading, structures, flexible base and asphaltic concrete pavement. The bid of the three contractors was \$1,889,876. It was estimated that 250 working days would be required to complete the job, according to J. C. Roberts, District Highway Engineer at Abilene. C. M. Kitchell, resident engineer at Abilene, will be in active charge of the project, which is just getting under way.

A number of families will want to move to Baird and Clyde while the work is being done. The Chamber of Commerce is seeking housing for the group. Furnished houses and apartments will be in demand. Those having rental units, either furnished or unfurnished, were asked to contact Mr. Holley, CoC manager.

Former Resident Buried in Cisco

O. J. (Oibern) Russell of Cisco, a former resident of Baird, died in San Angelo Thursday following an illness of about a year. He was a son of Mrs. B. L. Russell, Sr., and a brother of B. L. Russell, Jr., both of Baird.

Mr. Russell was born in Callahan County on January 6, 1893, and lived in Baird until moving to Cisco in 1919 to work for the West Texas Utilities Co. He attended public schools in Baird and attended the old Kelly Prep School in Austin. He taught school in Cross Plains a year before going to work for a utilities firm. He managed the ice and power plant in Baird before going to Cisco as a clerk for West Texas. He retired from West Texas Utilities Co. as chief clerk of the Cisco office a few years ago.

He was married to Miss Helen McIntyre in Oplin on December 21, 1913. They would have observed their Golden Wedding Anniversary in December of this year.

He was an active member of the Baptist Church, and was a long-time member of the Cisco Rotary Club, having served as secretary and president of the club.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Saturday in the First Baptist Church in Cisco, with Rev. Jesse Cassle, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Oakwood Cemetery under direction of the Rust Funeral Home. Pallbearers were E. L. Jackson, E. W. Mince, Norman Huston, Arlin Blint, Jay Richardson and Frank Coats.

In addition to his mother and brother of Baird, he is survived by his wife of Cisco; three sons, O. J. Russell, Jr., of Abilene, W. H. Russell of Houston and B. E. Russell of Midland; three daughters, Mrs. Hugh Miller of Dallas, Mrs. R. J. Butts of Iowa Park and Mrs. Jim Lowe of Los Angeles, Calif.; 13 grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

Oil Adds Much To Economy of Callahan Area

With oil and gas production worth about \$6.7 million a year, Callahan County citizens have a financial stake in the worldwide demand for energy and the complex economic and political problems involving the petroleum industry, according to statistics released this week by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

"We have pulled together some figures from the most authoritative sources so residents of Callahan County can see how local pocketbooks are affected by some of the issues which involve our industry," said J. Clyde Tomlinson, Association president. "Issues of current concern include the proposals to cut percentage depletion rates, extension of federal controls over prices at which Texas producers sell their gas, and development of laws and production methods that will help Texas compete with other states and nations for markets."

The latest year for which U. S. Bureau of Mines figures are available (1961) shows Callahan County producing more than 2.2 million barrels of crude oil, valued at about \$66 million; and 490 million cubic feet of natural gas, with a value of almost \$61,000. In 1961 there were 1,693 producing wells in the county -- 1,684 oil and 9 gas, according to the Texas Railroad Commission.

Although its first field was discovered 40 years ago, Callahan County is the scene for the industry's continued search for oil and gas. Some 207 wells were drilled in the county last year, with 53 being wildcat exploratory wells, according to the Oil & Gas Journal. The Association estimated that more than \$2 million was spent on drilling in the county this past year and that some \$1 million of this went for dry holes. Close to \$73,000 was spent last year on geophysical crews using seismic devices to probe the underground formations of Callahan County for possible drilling locations.

Leasing adds many thousands of dollars to the county's economy. Tabulations by the International Oil Scouts Association show major companies in 1961 were paying rentals on about 9,000 undeveloped acres.

Royalty payments to Callahan County farmers, ranchers and other landowners are running at more than \$830,000 annually, the Association calculated.

Industry taxes likewise are important to county government and school districts in the county. For instance, 41 per cent of the local property taxes collected for the Baird Independent School District comes from oil and gas operators; and 39 per cent at Cross Plains.

A sizeable impact on the Callahan County economy has been registered by petroleum industry payrolls. According to figures from the Texas Employment Commission, the industry payroll is more than \$513,000 a year. Callahan County producers and royalty owners also make a sizeable contribution to the support of state government, with oil and gas production tax payments of more than \$308,000 a year.

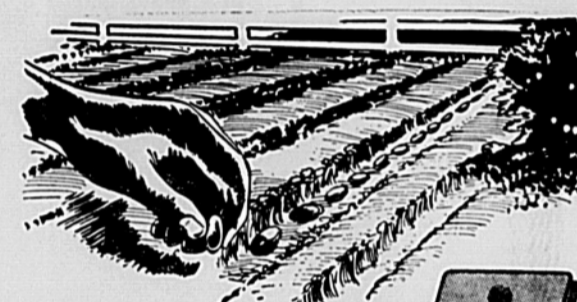

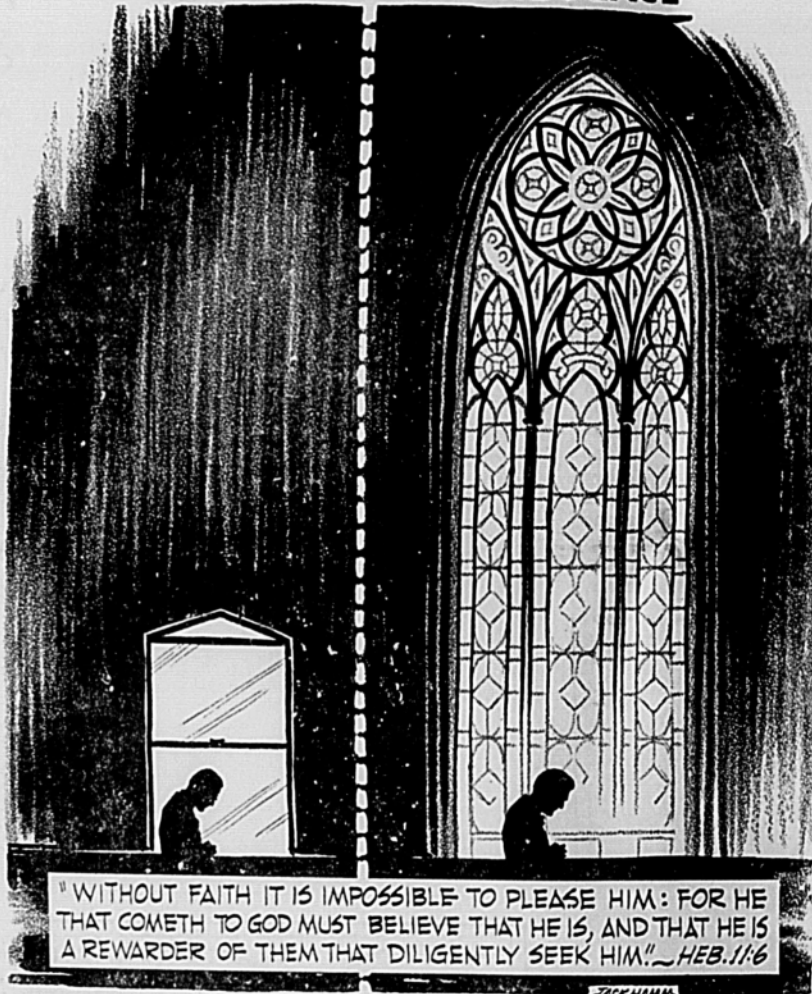

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 28 proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 62 of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new subsection authorizing all political subdivisions of Jefferson County, Texas, to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for all appointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new subsection (c), reading as follows:

"(c) Each political subdivision within Jefferson County, Texas, shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for all appointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas; or said political subdivision may elect to participate in the County Retirement System of Jefferson County; provided that same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such political subdivision and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one (1) issue of a newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four (4) consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the said political subdivision to such Fund shall at least equal the amount paid for the same purposes from the income of each such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7 1/2%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the political subdivision.

"All funds provided for the compensation of such persons, or by the political subdivision of Jefferson County, Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the political subdivision shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the requirements for eligibility; provided that the amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000).

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States grants for financial aid for such assistance as such Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions hereof; provided that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount payable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended per year out of state funds shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000).

"The Legislature may enact appropriate laws to make lists of recipients of such assistance for inspection, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed appropriate by the Legislature."

"Section 61-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be deemed appropriate by the Legislature for the purpose of carrying out the intent of this section."

"(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution; while such inmate; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided further, that the amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"(2) Needy individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, and who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for the permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Needy Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely state-supported institution; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"(3) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution; while such inmate; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided further, that the amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000).

"Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

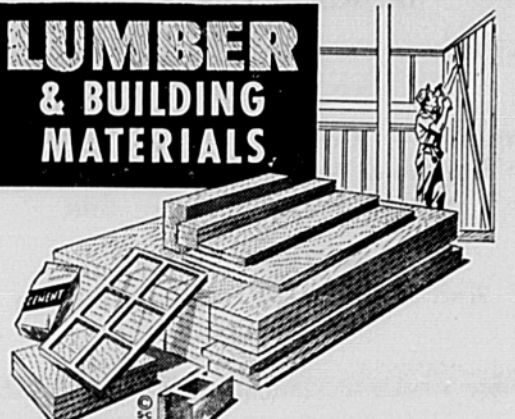

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 1 of the Constitution of Texas, to increase the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the State of Texas, to Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$350,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations, and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for a proclamation of the Legislature.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 1 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so that the same shall read as follows:

"Section 1. This Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing a governmental function which has been designated the Veterans' Land Fund. Said Fund shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Fund shall be composed of the following: (1) the General Land Office; and (2) the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finance and shall be appointed by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said board shall be appointed hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term of the deceased or resigning member. The compensation for said citizens members shall be as in now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Fund under such limitations and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$350,000,000) of bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four (4) one-half percent (4 1/2%) per annum. All bonds issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or pur-

chaser, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.
