Fourth Cisco Blood Drive To Be On CJC Campus May 7

The fourth Bi-monthly Cisco Blood Drive will be held on Wednesday, May 7, on the Cisco Junior College campus, in the Student Union Building. A team of laboratory technicians from Mary Meek Blood Center of Abilene will be present from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

The Cisco Service Club and the Cisco Civic League began sponsorship of this joint project last September, in order to reduce a long-time, 900 unit debt. Since the first drive in September, nearly 200 units (pints) of blood have been collected. Cisco citizens cannot be commended enough for their outstanding support of this ever so important project.

Due to Federal Drug Administration legislation, there are no longer paid donors (except in special cases); therefore all blood donors must be solicited on a voluntary basis.

With a 60-unit goal set for each blood drive, this amount will insure Cisco of an adequate blood supply, and gradually and partially repay E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital's debt.

A blood insurance policy is available to interested blood donors. For a pint of blood given, that donor's immediate family will be assured of having blood available to them for one full year. That donated pint of blood, however, will not count toward credit for Cisco, yet, perhaps those interested donors might give again at a later date toward credit for Cisco.

So necessary is this blood, for life itself, every appeal for your continued support is sincerely offered and appreciated. Please be aware of the following when preparing to give blood!

Blood donors should be aware of the following when preparing to give blood:

A.) All donors must be age 18 or older;

there is no age limit, only that each donor is healthfully able to give blood.

B.) Blood donors should eat normally, and are encouraged to do so before giving blood.

C.) No medication should be taken 18 hours prior to donating blood.

D.) No medication, however, should be deleted without checking with the perspective donor's own doctor.

E.) Any person who has been sick or has had a cold within the last seven days prior to donating blood, should not donate blood.

F.) Any person who has had their ears pierced within the last six months at any place other than a doctor's office, should not donate blood.

G.) Any person who has been in Southeast Asia in the last three

years should not donate blood, due to malaria possibilities.

H.) Any woman who has menstruated in the last three to four days prior to donating blood, should not donate.

I.) No woman who is pregnant, or suspects she is so, should give blood, and should not do so until six weeks after pregnancy.

J.) Persons can donate blood every two to three months, with no foreseen problems, although, it is hopeful to not have to call on the same donors nearly this often.

The present structure was built at a cost of more than \$100,000, in 1920. Improvements such as air conditioning, carpeting, paneling, and others, have been added since that time.

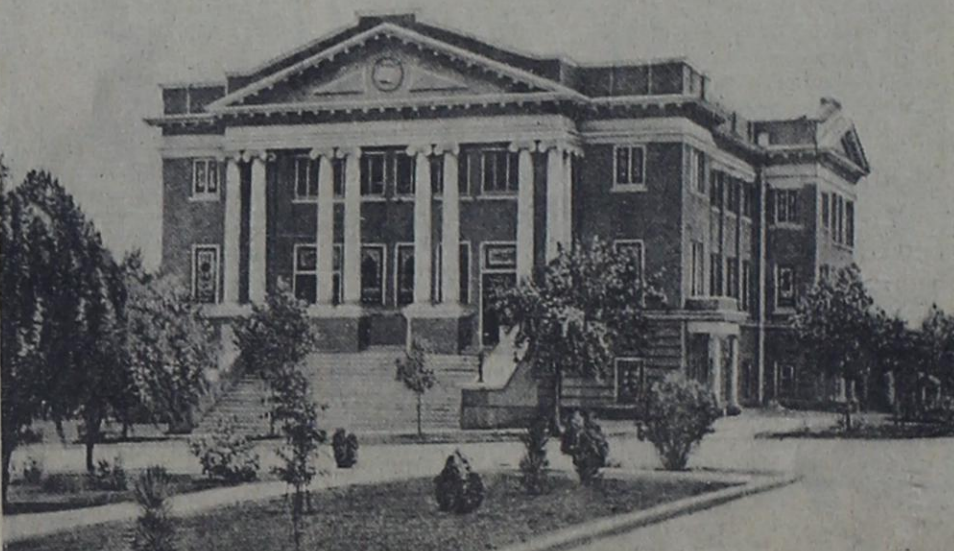
First Baptist Church To Hold 'Youth-Led Revival' May 7-11

Emergency Building Temperature Restrictions

Inspectors were in Eastland County Wednesday spot checking non-residential buildings to determine whether building owners and operators in the city are complying with the new federal "Emergency Build-

ing Temperature Restrictions."

The building temperature restrictions became effective for an estimated five million non-residential buildings across the nation on July 16, 1979.

President Carter has extended the emergency building temperature restrictions which limit heating, air conditioning and hot water temperatures in about 2.8 million non-residential buildings.

The program was due to expire April 16. However, in view of continuing uncertainties in international oil supplies, the restrictions have been extended for nine months to January 16, 1981.

The Department of Energy is developing a legislative package that will include the authority to make the temperature restrictions permanent. Since the program went into effect the DOE estimates that about 80 percent of affected buildings were in compliance and that the equivalent of 200,000 to 400,000 barrels of oil per day were saved.

DOE intends to amend the regulations by the end of April to make them more flexible. Under the amendments buildings owners and operators may adopt alternate means of conserving an equal amount of energy in their buildings.

Otherwise, the regulations remain essentially unchanged from those imposed since July. Temperatures under the rules are limited to 78 degrees for air conditioning, 65 degrees for heating and 105 degrees for domestic hot water.

Twenty-five States and Territories are active participants in the program, and nearly 40,000 inspections have been conducted.

Under the provisions, buildings must be cooled to no lower than 78 degrees Fahrenheit in summer and warmed to no higher than 65 degrees Fahrenheit in winter. Another provision restricts the heating of water to no more 105 degrees Fahrenheit.

The regulations, which include federal buildings, provides exemptions for hospitals, other health-care facilities, lodging facilities, elementary schools, nursery and day-care centers.

Exemptions also are provided for buildings or portions of buildings housing special equipment, manufacturing, industrial and commercial processes or materials which require specific environmental conditions, or where health codes require higher hot water temperatures.

The Energy Policy and Conservation Act provides for civil penalties of up to \$5,000

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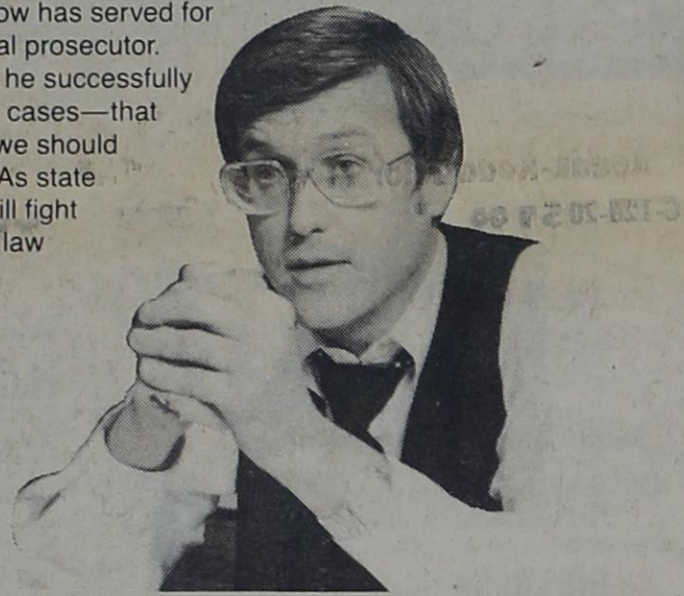

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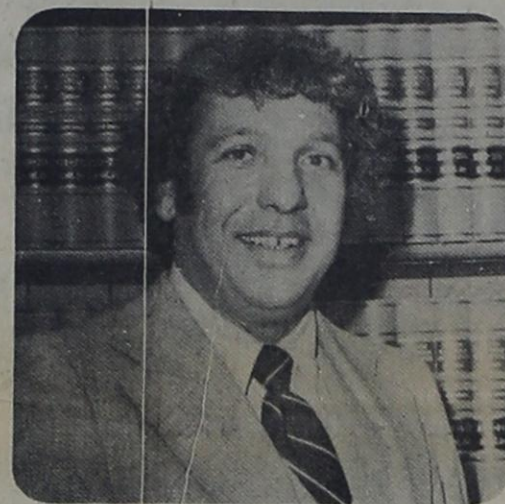

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Homemaking Tips

Family money management is planning and using the income we have to get the things we need and want. When it comes to determining how much debt an individual or family can "afford", there are no easy answers. However, there are some suggested guidelines you can

use as a financial "yardstick." Although families must learn to set their own debt limits, several financial advisors have suggested formulas to help answer the question, "How much debt is too much?" The formulas are only general guides and

merit caution in application since they do not take into account pertinent facts about particular families.

HOUSING:

1. Limit housing expenses to one week's pay or one-fourth of monthly take-home pay.

2. Pay no more for a home than 2 to 2 1/2 times your annual income (this is the traditional yardstick).

3. Pay no more for a home than 2 to 2 1/4 times your annual income (this is the emerging yardstick).

4. This formula is used by some lenders for qualifying the homebuyer:

Test 1 - Total mortgage payment should not exceed 25 percent of gross monthly income.

Test 2 - Total mortgage payment and monthly installment debts (extending more than 10 months) should not exceed 33 percent of gross monthly income.

CREDIT:

1. Do not owe more than what can be paid with 10 percent of your income over 12 - 24 months.

2. Do not owe more than 20 percent of your yearly after-tax income (excluding your home mortgage).

3. Do not owe more than 10 percent of the amount you could pay for out of your income within the next eighteen months. For example, if your take home is

\$800, \$1500 would be a safe debt limit (10 percent of \$800 is \$80 and \$80 x 18 months is \$1500.)

4. Another formula has been called the "Rule of Thumb Approach." This guideline says that "dead-horse debt" (that is, all credit accounts and loans except those for automobiles and home mortgage) should not exceed one month's take-home pay. This is a very limiting guideline that may be the safest for some families.

DANGER CREDIT SIGNALS:

Does your paycheck usually disappear before your next paycheck arrives? Are your expenses greater than your current income? Are you dipping into reserves to pay current bills? Are you behind in your mortgage or rent payment? Are you putting off bills to next month? Do you pay only the minimum amount due each month on credit card accounts, so outstanding balances shrink very slowly? Have you taken out new loans to pay off old loans or extended old loans in order to lower the monthly payments? Have you taken a consolidation loan as a way to ease the burden of too many payments? Do you find yourself arguing or worrying about money?

These are only some of the credit danger signals.

The recipe this week comes from the Extension publication L-1321 "Eat Well for Less From the Meat Group". The recipe for King Ranch Chicken casserole is especially good. This is a good company meal, and I have substituted hamburger meat for the chicken which is also good.

2 packages corn tortillas
2 small fryers or one large hen, boiled and deboned
1 large chopped onion, sauteed
1 large bell pepper (optional)
1 can mushroom soup
1 can cream of chicken soup
1/4 to 3/4 cup processed cheese, grated
1 1/4 teaspoons chili powder
Garlic Salt
Salt
Pepper
1 (15 oz.) can tomatoes with chilies.

Dip tortillas in hot boiling chicken stock to moisten. Layer casserole with tortillas. Add ingredients except soups and tomatoes as listed. Pour soups and whole tomatoes on top. Sprinkle with grated cheese. Bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees F. Serves 8 to 10.

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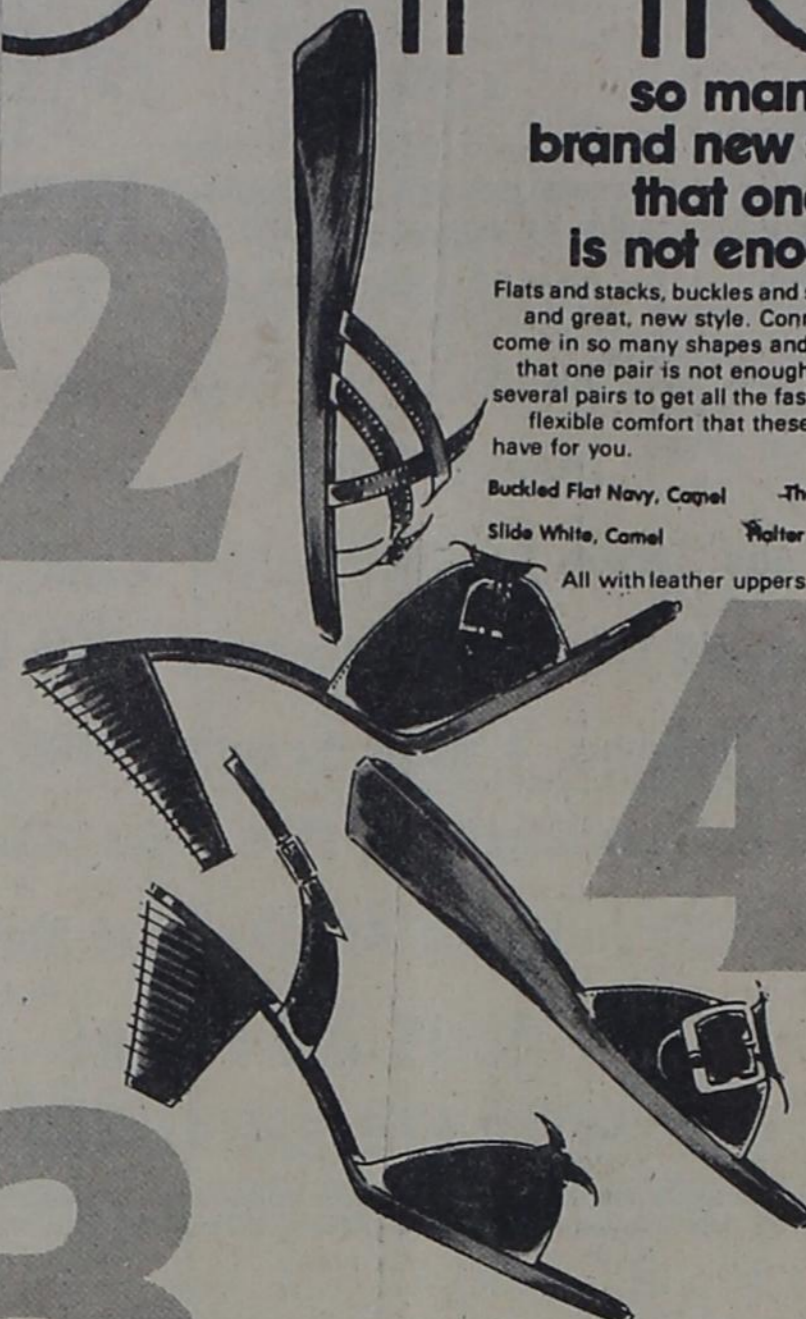
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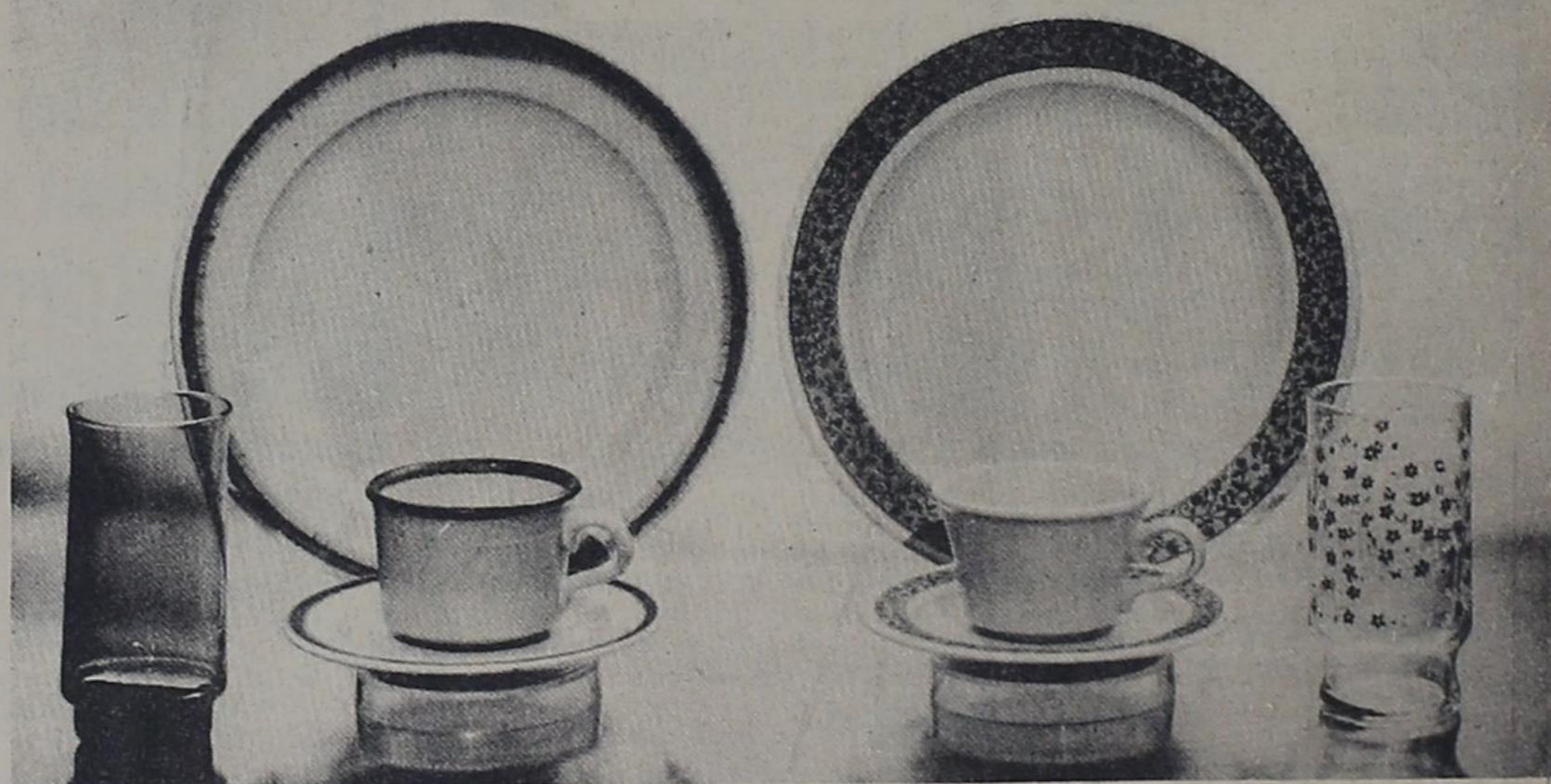
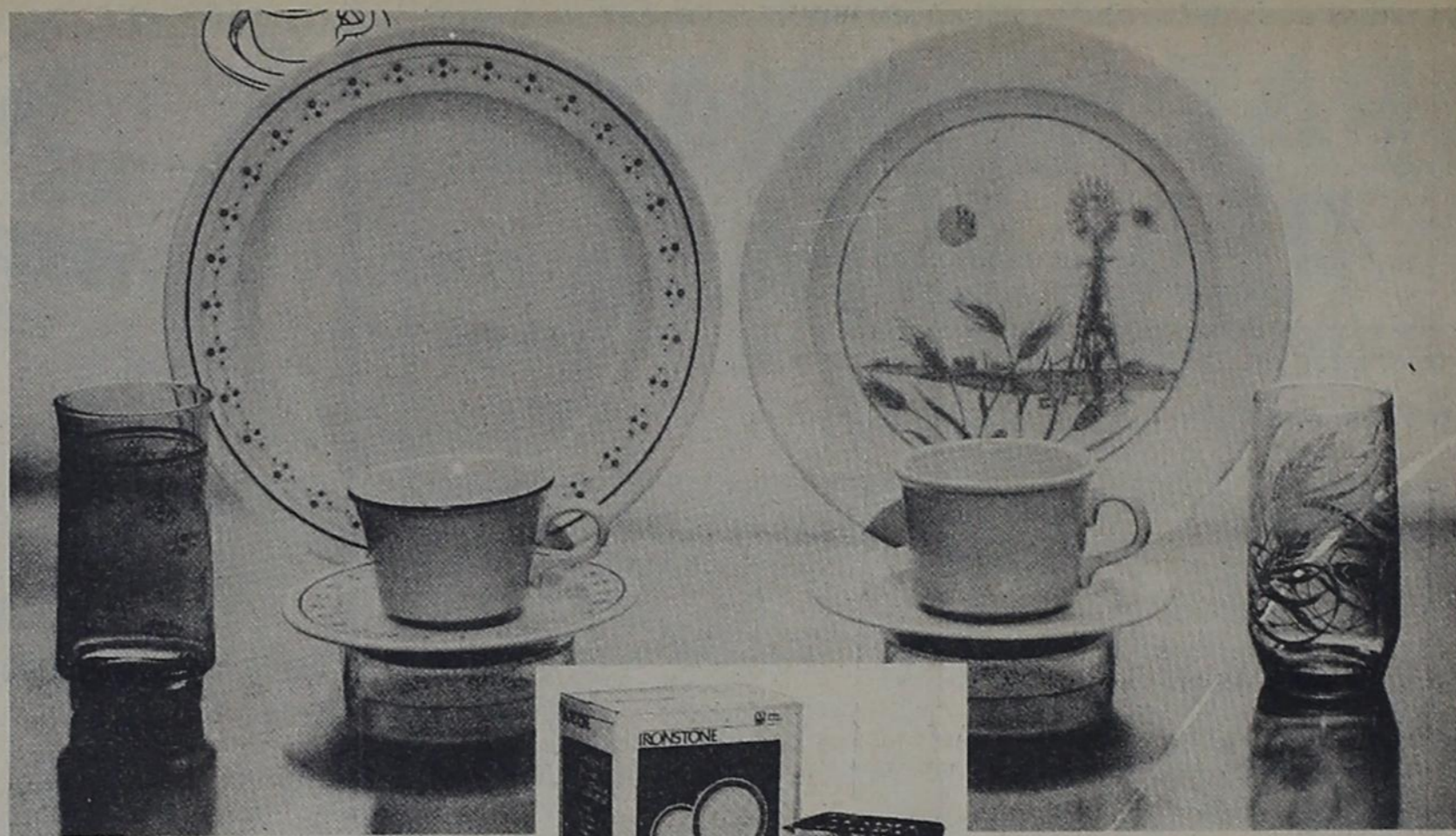

GORDON SPOT

The rain last week was appreciated very much even though we would like to see much more. According to Eastland weather records, we have had only 14 inches of

rain during the last year. That is about one half the average for this area. In fact, we have not had a rain of more than one inch during any one day since May 1,

1979. On February 9, we had over one inch of precipitation, but that was mostly snow and sleet. Some parts of Eastland County have had more rain, but most of the county has been in the same drought conditions as the Eastland area.

"A stitch in time saves nine," especially when it involves insect control in the home garden.

To insure good yields of high quality produce, insect control in the home garden is a "must." So learning about these pests will prepare you for them when they arrive on the scene.

There are more than 30 insect pests which will attack vegetables in the home garden, and these are divided into three groups.

One group includes those insects which live in the soil and attack seedling and underground parts of plants.

These include cut worms, wireworms, soil maggots and white grubs.

The other two groups are sucking insects and chewing insects. Sucking insects damage plants by inserting their mouthparts into plant tissue and sucking plant juices. Sucking insects include aphids, whiteflies, leaf-hoppers, squash bugs and stink bugs.

Chewing insects damage plants by actually feeding on the foliage, stems or fruit. This group includes cabbage loopers, armyworms, flea beetles, grasshoppers and many others.

However, not all insects are bad. There are numerous beneficial insects that prey on those that harm plants. These include preying mantids, assassin bugs, ladybird beetles, lacewings, parasitic wasps and spiders.

The Extension Service has publications on insect control that will help gardeners identify these different groups of insects. Come by the County Extension Office for a copy.

As the weather gets warmer we will be seeing more ticks on pets. We have two species of ticks common to our area - the brown dog tick and the American dog tick. Regardless of the species, control is basically the same for all ticks.

Heavy infestations in the home may require treatment by professionals. Household sprays containing 0.5 percent diazinon or ronnel will control light infestations.

Out side the home where vegetation is thin, use 5 percent carbaryl (Sevin) dust at 20 - 25 pounds per acre. Increase the rate as vegetation thickens. If using a spray, mix five tablespoons of 25 percent diazinon emulsifiable concentrate in one gallon of water. Apply one gallon of spray per 1,000 square feet. When spraying pay particular attention to roadside animal trails and paths.

Tish Stevens Is Artist Of Month

Paintings and drawings by Tish Stevens of Abilene will be featured by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce through the month of May during regular office hours. Tish holds the B.A. Degree from Harding University, Searcy, Arkansas, and has done extensive post-graduate work at Harding University and Abilene Christian University in Humanities. She has been seriously painting since 1973 because family responsibilities made it impractical until then.

In 1973 she began studying in oils with Ruth Adams Jordan of Abilene and from that time, painting has become a very meaningful part of her life.

Along with oils, she became fascinated with the elusive transparent watercolor, and studied with various private teachers and participated in a number of workshops including those of Doyle Courington, Electra Malone, and Zoltan Szabo, internationally known author and watercolorist.

Pen and ink line drawing, taught by Mary Louise Brown at the Abilene Fine Arts Museum caught her interest and she became involved in learning the basic techniques and then refining her own. She worked exclusively in black-and-white pen work for some time, and found she was missing the joy of working with color. The combination of the different techniques which she had acquired to this point seemed to fuse under the direction of Swinson, for she was able to work with color and at the same time integrate the detail required in pen and ink.

One of her ink drawings was selected by the President of ACU and his wife to be the official Christmas card sent to Alumni and friends of the University throughout the country in 1977. CENSUS TAKERS FAN OUT TO COUNT THE UNCOUNTED

More than 200,000 Americans, temporarily employed as census takers, started knocking on the doors of their countrymen April 16 in an effort to count those not yet enumerated in the 1980 census, the U.S. Bureau of the Census, Department of

Commerce, announced today. Nearly 87 percent of those households asked to mail back their questionnaires on or after April 14 had not done so by April 14, according to the Bureau. The task now is to find the remainder and also to continue the traditional door-to-door census-taking that has been going on this month in parts of the West, Maine and the northern tips of Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Michigan.

On their appointed rounds, census takers are expected to visit pool halls, nudist camps, all-night movie houses, mansions, and houses of prostitution (always seeing and hearing no evil, since a strict Federal

law requires that personal information collected in a census must be kept confidential).

Census takers can be identified by their official red, white, and blue badges, worn on the lapel, and the official U.S. census satchels they carry during their rounds. Anyone with reason to believe that someone is impersonating a census taker should call the local police.

In many parts of the country, census takers are still being hired. Contact the U.S. Census District Office for your area for job information.

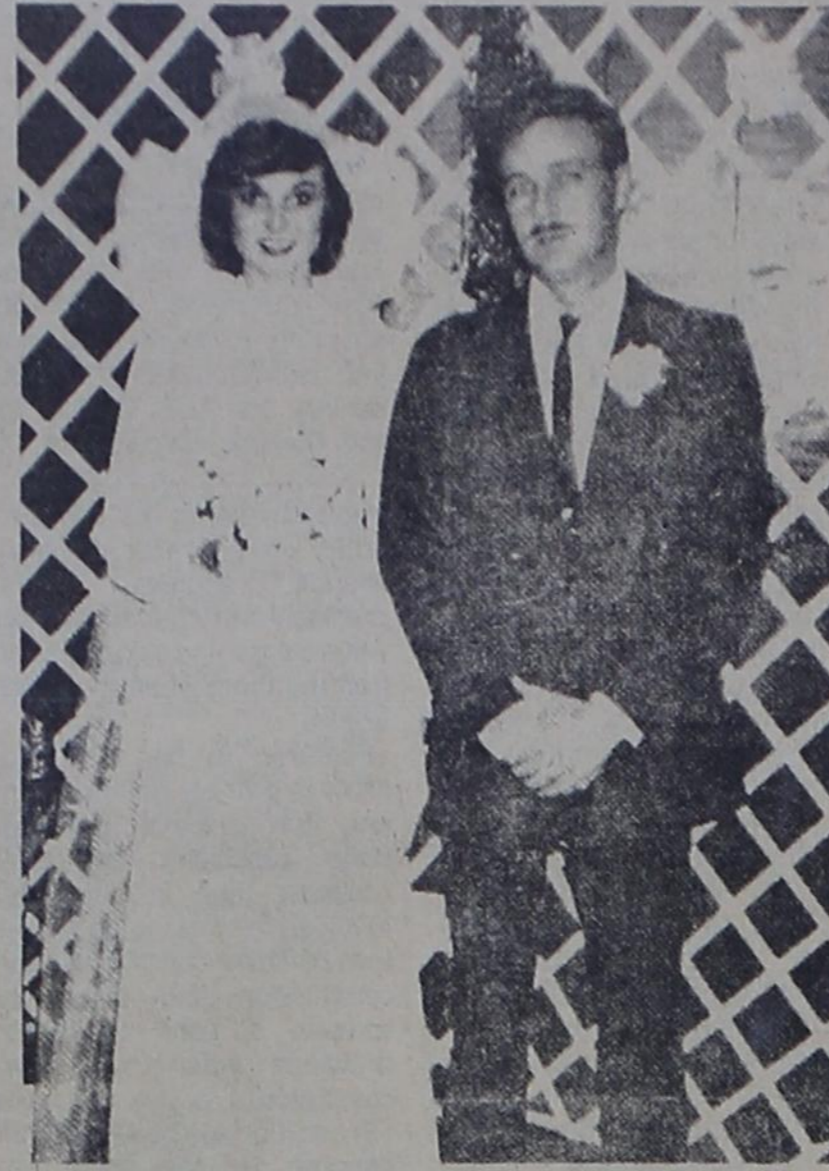
RJC Ropers Win At Snyder

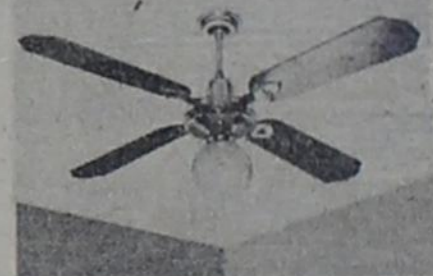
