Western Auto Is Moving Location

Western Auto Associate Store plans to move over the weekend and open for business Monday in the building at 1201 Conrad Hilton Avenue, across the street from Thornton Feed Mill, according to an announcement Friday.

Harold Reich, store owner, reported that the store would be moved from three buildings at 600, 602, and 604 Hilton, where they have been in operations for many years. Mr. Reich purchased the business from Mrs. A.G. Sander two and a half years

Plans call for moving operations to begin at noon Saturday, Oct. 12, and to continue through the weekend. Mr. Reich owns the 1201 Hilton location and operated an automotive business there before purchasing Western Auto.

The new location has undergone extensive remodeling redecorating and some new fixtures will be added, Mr. Reich said. A customer's parking lot has been prepared in the area back of

the store, which contains 5,700 square feet.

The move will allow Western Auto to offer tire, battery and oil service to customers, Mr. Reich said. They will have auto wheel balancing equipment.

Western Auto is a family business for Mr. and Mrs. Reich and both work fulltime at the store, along with two of their three children, Jeanine and Keith.



'Harvey' Is Story HALL OF REMARKS Of A Man's Fantasy

Cisco Junior College's upcoming production of "Harvey" is not only a story about a man's fantasy but also a story about the importance of tolerance and

understanding. Whether anyone will admit it or not, everyone probably had an invisible playmate when they were small. The playmate stuck around until they were about eight or nine when life and interests began to change.

Well, not so with Elwood P. Dowd. He led a perfectly normal life until he reached his mid-40s and suddenly then he had an invisible playmate. Actually, that's not so strange in itself. What really complicates the matter is that his playmate is a rabbit six feet tall named

Harvey, no less. It is with this complication that Mary Chase's classic comedy about a man and his loyalty to his friend (albeit invisible) opens. From there, we meet Mr. Dowd's sister and niece, both of whom want to lead a normal life and feel that it is only possible if Elwood is committed to a sanitarium.

Unfortunately, when Veta, Elwood's sister, tells the staff at the sanitarium of her wishes and the reasons behind it, they think she is the one suffering from hallucinations and proceed to commit her. The ensuing complications and their resolution form the basis for

"Harvey" as presented by the CJC drama department under the direction of Caroll Brown takes into consideration the fact that although this play is a comedy, designed to entertain, it also has some very important things to say about man, life

Manager Mike Moore to allow him to check with Farmer's Home Administration (FmHA) and see if they will approve use of about \$4,000-\$5,000 of money left over from the water distribution improvements. He said the money will be used to put in a liquid costic system at the Water Filtration Plant.

Such a system would help

lower the acidity of the water and keep it from eating away at the water pipes. He said Cisco has excellent water and a recent test for turbidity showed less than one point.

The City borrowed \$250,000.00 from FmHA and only spent \$240,799.16 on the water distribution system. That left \$9,200.84 from

which the city manager is proposing to use the money for the liquid costic system. Any use of the money has

to be approved by FmHA. Two bids for repainting the lettering of the water tower were studied by the council. One proposal was in the amount of \$1,800 but the other one (which the council seemed to favor) was in the amount of \$600-\$800, depending on the height of the lettering.

Council member Kimbrough made a motion the \$800 bid be accepted. The motion was seconded by Bill Roberts, but when a vote was takne there were three members for and three against. Therefore, it did not pass, since council member Bobby Ingram was absent and there could be no tiebreaker.

A motion was then made to table the matter until the next meeting.

A lengthy discussion was held about general liability insurance for the city. City Manager Moore said the city bought an insurance policy in 1983 for three years at a cost of \$19,000 to the city. Now, that company can no


longer offer such insurance. Mr. Moore said he contacted the Texas Municipal League which offered insurance to the city for one year at a cost of \$63,500 with a \$5,000 deductible. He said one other insurance company in Cisco is trying to locate such a policy at a lower rate.

The council made a motion to allow Mr. Moore to find the best deal he can on insurance within the next few days. If he needs to review a policy with the council, a special session will be call-

Paperwork Begins In Eastland For Facility

deposited.



The paperwork has begun for the construction of a waste-disposal system which could serve all of Eastland County for years to come and generate electricity as an added benefit.

Energy Advancement, Inc., of Brookshire, TX., has filed application with the Texas Department of Health to construct a modern incinerator to be located on the south feeder road, .5 of a mile west of the I-20 and SH 6 intersection, south of Eastland, on the site presently used as a sanitary landfill.

Such a facility is planned to serve approximately 25,000 persons and it is presently estimated that it would receive an average of approximately 65 tons per day of municipal solid waste. The estimated life of the

County Parade

facility is 25 year of enclosed burning on the ten acretrack.

The same company has plants operating successfully in South Texas and is proposing the plant here at no cost to the local municipalities, and in fact offering savings to each in the disposing of solid waste under today's stringent guidelines. The electricity generated by the plant would be sold to local power companies under current cogeneration regulations.

All weather Provisions /-Access to the site will be from the asphalt Service Road. Interior access roads will be constructed of concrete and follow the plant layout presented in Attachment No. 5B. Waste vehicles will always be on concrete surfaces while they are in the facility.

Mud Tracking Provisions -The concrete and asphalt roads will eliminate the tracking of mud and waste from the facility onto the

Service Road and S.H. 6. Access Control - Facility personnel will be responsible for monitoring all customers at the site. They will ensure that the public, using the facility, will not be exposed to potential health or safety hazards. They will also be present to prevent the unauthorized entry or disposal of manifested (regulated) hazardous or radioactive wastes. The entire facility will be surrounded by a barbed wire fence. There will be only one facility access point which will be continuously controlled.

PROCESS DESCRIPTION Description - This facility will mass burn all suitable wastes in one, dual chamber, rotary kiln type incinerator.

The waste vehicles will enter the facility via the access road and proceed to the storage silos. As the vehicles approach the building sensors will be activated, alerting the operator that a vehicle is on-site and which vehi-

The operator will then open one of the four doors allowing the vehicle access to the particular part of the silo that he wants the waste deep, 30 feet wide, and 120 feet long and will be divided into two, 60 foot sections. This division of the silos

will allow one section to be filled while the other is emptied and cleaned. As the waste is deposited into one section of the silo an overhead crane will remove fuel (waste) from another

This fuel is fed into a feed mechanism located in the rear and center of the silo. The fuel is continuously fed to the incinerator where it tumbles and cooks at substoichiometric conditions, volatilizing all the organic constituents leaving an inorganic ash. Here the process splits with the ash falling out the end of the rotating kiln into a water quench prior to removal and ultimate disposal.

Make-up air for the combustion process is pulled from the silo building ensurng that all odors resulting rom the stored fuel will not present a nuisance to the irea around the plant. This air is then used for combusion oxygen in the secondary chamber of the incinerators.

The volatile organics, cooked off in the rotary kiln, are completely combusted in this second chamber as are any odors that may be pre-

The hot gasses resulting from this combustion process are then pulled through the heat exchanger where their energy (heat) is

transferred to one of two fluids. These fluids vaporize and spin turbines producing the electricity. The remaining gasses are then cooled and expelled from the system through the exhaust

Any particulates or emissions that may have escaped the incinerator will have collected on the heat exchanger and been flushed with steam or condensed on the glass coils and flushed with water.

The incinerator will be capable of disposing an average 50 tons/day of waste (fuel) with an additional amount above this capacity available in reserve. Its

design incorporates the most stringent safety features, including remote sensing and controlling, allowing facility personnel to direct the operation of the system from a control room. Backup and manual controls are also available in case of a failure in the remote systems.

Pollution resulting from the process will be minimal due to the design of the facility and will meet or exceed all existing requirements. No additional pollution control equipment is anticipated.

Other environmental and health protection measures relate to the sanitary aspects of the facility design. Concrete surfaces are used throughout the facility. This will allow for the use of a power washer and disinfectants to keep all the surfaces free of waste and grime, reducing the growth of bacteria and vectors in or around the facility.

should know these facts. The nation's 30 million medicare receipients will have to pay more of their health costs, starting on January 1, of 1986. The hospital-insurance deductible - the part paid by the patient before federal insurance takes over - rises from \$400 to \$492. Medicare will pay for all remairing covered services during the first 60 days. The deductible for the 61st through the 90th day climbs from \$100 to \$123 per day. Beyond 90 days, patients cost will go up from \$200 to \$246 per day. For posthospital stays in a skilled nursing home between the 21st and the 100th day, the decudtible will rise from \$30



We no longer use oil lamps or a lot of us don't use fire places or wood stoves for cooking or heating, except we follow the seasons in our fashion.


Our cemetery is filling up both with old and young. It is well kept and holds our loved ones and leaves us with many precious memories!

A well designed waste processing facility will provide a means to dispose of unusable materials in a controlled and nuisance-free manner. This process can, at the same time, reclaim energy resources that would otherwise have been buried, providing little or no value to the community.

This application addresses the construction and operation of a Type V-Energy Recovery Incinerator by Energy Advancement, Incorporated (E.A.I.). The proposed waste processing facility will meet or exceed the requirements set forth by the Texas Department of Health. All governmental rules, regulations, and guidelines, as well as, local, state, and federal laws, will be strictly adhered to during the construction of the facility and throughout its proposed operational life. E.A.I. will be constantly on the alert to prevent any part of the facility or its operation from causing a nuisance to the surrounding community.

This resource recovery and waste disposal facility is designed to provide solid waste management services as required by Section 12 and 37 of the Comprehensive Municipal Solid Waste, Resource Recovery, and Conservation Act, Article 4477-7C, Vernon's Texas Civil Statues. This plant in conjunction with remote collecion and transfer stations will be capable of providing these services to the residents of this area for at least the next twenty years.

It was the Ranger Oil Boom that was destined to forever mark our town (Ranger) as the site of one of the miracles of the Industrial age. "Where Pure Gold Flowed Over The Top Of Wooden Constructions in the Form Of Black Smelled Liquid...Called Oil.

The rumor quickly spread that W.K. Gordon, a well known businessman in the spect for oil in the general territory of Ranger. And it was upon this news that John M. Gholson, Ranger's leading merchant at the time got into his buggy and drove 16 miles east as the crow flies to Thurber. And in those days, the roads were indeed very poorly kept, making a rather short journey nearly as twice as long. Gholson's idea was to try

to interest Gordon, the Superintendent of the Texas Pacific Coal Company, in testing for oil in the vicinity of Ranger. And it was also at this time that a number of citizens became interested and managed to assemble thousands of acres in leases which were turned over to the Oil Company, and thus Gordon began his testting.

The intial tests turned up plenty of gas, which unfortunately at the time, there was no market for gas. The second test, which was on the John McCleskey farm, was abandoned, by the order of the companies main office, because there were no favorable indications found.

But Gordon being the persistant man that he was, persuaded the company president to allow him to continue with his testing. And it was Gordons never fail attitude that found a formation, that was to become world famous as the 'Ranger Sand Well that hit oil' and began the flow of a thousand barrels a day...It was also then that the BOOM WAS BORN!

Fields expanded until derricks had spread to Eastland, beyond to Red Desdemona, Breckenridge and so on. Each town became a city over-night, but it was Ranger that remained to be wild and wooly and continued to grow into even

wilder boom. The actual beginning of the 'Great Boom' was on October 19, 1917, an historic month for West Texas...It was said that they had found the Pot of Gold at the End of the Rainbow.

Farmers who had barely eaked out an living with their peanuts and livestock, found that their sandy acres were now thousands of dollars.

Prospectors speculators, businessmen and oilmen, industrialists and corporations were on their doorsteps, begging for leases, sale of land -anything. Everyone wanted in on the boom. And it looked as if there was going to be enough for everyone to get in on the action. Ranger's Pot Of Gold, seemed to be a bottomless pit.

The McCleskey well, which finally hit paydirt, thanks to Gordon's persistence, flowed over the top of the rigging for four weeks before it was brought under control. Holes were gouged

the congregation of the Merriman Baptist Church and their refusal of \$100,600 for an oil lease of its cemetery. The church and its members refused to let anyone disturb the grave sites and to this day it remains a quiet restful, tree-shaded cemetery, with the label of "The Million Dollar Cemetery."

Other noteable events were:

The millionaire Gob, a young farmer serving in the Navy in W.W.I when drilling began on his farm and his income increased a \$1,000 a day...The unforgetable Jack Tindall, who was a teaming contractor, who owned 200 head of horses and in a single day supervised the activities of 302 teams. Jack was a rugged six-foot man who wore boots, a pistol in one hand and a roll of thousands of dollars in the other.

The Duke well, that was discovered in Desdemona, caught on fire, was said to have produced such great blaze, that it was said you could read a newspaper by the fires light a mile away...County residents heard greater tales and stories each and everynight and millionaires become paupers because of the oil.

Ranger numbered 30,000 during the boom. Desdemona had 16,000, Eastland 10,000; Breckenridge, 10,000. Cisco, DeLeon, Comanche and Gorman also gaine thousands of new inhabitants. And the small towns of Caddo, Necessity, Gunsight, Frankell, Jakehamon, Edhobby and Leeray soon soared from towns of 2,000 to

Ranger was one case of a boom in labor as well as oil. High wages that were expected in the start of the boom were to become increasingly higher and during this economical period wages proved better than anywhere else.

In, Ranger drillers were paid wages of \$25.00 dollars a day but were given a bunk and their meals, and thousands of rig-builders and tool dressers were employed at comparable pay leaving them with a large surplus to spend after the bare necessities had been taken care of.

The Texas Pacific Coal and Oil Company reaped the greatest harvest they say...from the famous boom in Ranger. Before the discovery of petroleum, the company was capitalized at \$3,000,000, with stocks selling at one hundred dollars. When the boom hit and was underway, shares shot up to \$1,900 each and the companies holdings were estimated \$300,000,000...Ranger was in-

deed the end of the Rainbow. A territory of the same size never before saw such a expenditure of money at any given time. Two of the most successul operators in Ranger refused \$7,000,000 for a lease of 160 acres. They estimated that half million dollars a day was being spent in 1919 in developing the northern part of Eastland County and the whole of Stephens Co. with 500 wells underway.

As one hundred wells were being drilled in the southern part of Eastland County and on the edges of Comanche Co., the total was more than \$600,000 every 24 hourswhich was a total of nearly one-fourth of a billion dollars annualy.

This sum, as staggering as it sounds, did not include the millions of dollars spent for railroads, highways, office buildings, homes, utilities, and construction that produced cities almost over

It is interesting to note that building permits at the time, which were to be had in Dallas and only good for one week, were going for the sum of \$136,000 and in Houston \$53,000...but in Eastland, in the midst of the boom, the permits for one week were priced at \$420,000, and Ranger was out building Eastland.

The oil boom by no means was over when the Ranger oilfields settled down to northey wore Army weathermal capacity production load. On May the 15th., 1922, a test on the Bryson Well Along with the 'Bitter and near Pioneer came in for 7,200 barrels a day. a week later, the Eakin well-No.4

roared in for 18,000 barrels a day with a peak production of 20,000 a day.

The Eakin well far surpassed the production of any well drilled in the county during the height of the boom. The oil drilled in this new boom was of exceptional quality-47 gravity.

The population of Pioneer before the boom was a scant 30, and quickly increased to 5,000 after the oil was discovered.

Today the names of the boom towns in the Ranger Oil Rush that include Ranger, Red Gap, Eastland, Pioneer, Desdemona, Thurber, Carbon, Gorman, and others, conjure many memories for many people. The stories of the mud, money and the thousands of many interesting people that claimed their homes and fortunes in the boom era. Today the stories are still being written and talked about by those who were there and saw first hand and Ranger has settled down to a small quiet community with Livestock, agriculture and some oil activity.

It is true that the boom era is gone forever-except the memories, but the history and the magic of it all still lingers in our town and always will






The Building On The Left Is Now The Ranger Lumber Yard.





The Stephens Flegular Field gained a new producer when Mobil Producing completed the No. 2523 Southeast Breckenridge four miles north-northwest of Parks.

The well indicated ability to pump 102 barrels; of oil per day, plus 126, barrels of water. It was taken to a 3,300-ft. bottorn, and production will be from (Caddo Formation perforations, 3,178 to 3,192 feet into the wellbore.

Drillsite i's in a lease in the LAL Survey.
