Mrs. J. W. Lawrence Passes Away Here

Another one of Cisco's old settlers went to rest Thursday evening when Mrs. Lou Tisha Dow Lawrence passed away at the home of her son, C. H. Lawrence at 11:50 o'clock.

Some ten days ago she suffered a rather painful accident in a fall at her home here. Carrying her little grandson, Bobby Joe Lawrence, in her arms she started down the steps from the porch, when she fell to the ground. In some manner that has not yet been discovered she received a severe cut in one of her lower limbs. While it was impossible to locate the cause it is evident that she struck some sharp instrument in the fall, as it was necessary to take twentyfive stitches in sewing up the wound. Miraculously the baby was uninjured. Mrs. Lawrence not realizing her condition, but feeling uneasiness for the child, walked some distance to the home of her son, C.H. Lawrence carrying the baby in her arms. Medical aid was summoned at once, and it was thought she was getting along very well, but complications set up causing death.

She was born in Tennessee, near Nashville, March 20th, 1874, and came to Texas when about three years of age. She lived in Dallas until 1885, when she came with her mother, Mrs. E. N. From Municipal Utilitles Magazine

That power interests in all sections of the country are following the same procedure in attempting to stifle any opposition, is indicated by an editorial in a recent issue of the "Citizen", published in Champaign, Illinois. In an editorial titled "Things to Think About," the editor points out several methods used by special interests to defeat municipal plants, and the methods used in that section closely resemble those that have been used in Texas and adjoining States. The editor of the 'Citizen" has this to say:

"Whenever a city decides to call an election to vote bonds to build its own light plant, the power interests will do every thing they can to defeat the bond issue.

THE PRESS

"In some places they have controlled the town papers and had them working against the best interest of the city and in favor of the private power interests. However in a few cases town papers have been strong for the town.

THE LAWYERS

"In some towns where bonds from owning, its own light plant the private power interests have hired lawyers to attend all meetings and pose as taxpayers and oppose every one who spoke in favor of voting

THE BANKERS

"HUMAN CANNON BALL" AT FAIR

Because of the smooth surface of individual mohair fibres, discernible only under a microcope, dirt does not readily ashere to is easily cleaned with a whiskbroom or by vacuum. Actual grease or dirt spots are removed by washing with pure soap and warm water.

Easy riding, an important feature when taking long trips, is assured with mohair velvet because there is no slipping and sliding about, as with smooth fabrics, and each fibre of the pile fab ric acts as a resilient spring to absorb shocks. It is easier on the clothing, too, as the reduced friction avoids rubbing and subsequent shininess.

Added to these advantages is the additional one that they all add materially to the trade-in value of the car when the time comes to get a new one. In fact, it has been conservatively estimated that anywhere from fifty to two hundred dollars' difference can be looked for in a car whose upholstery is in perfect condition and inviting to the eye.
