Dallas, $\overline{\text { Texas, }}-$ Clifford Gregg, famous the world over as the "Human Cannon Ball," will be one of the big features of the 1st Annual Pavillion Show in the Livestock Arena at the State Fair of Texas, Oct. 10 to 25 , it has been announced here by T. E. Jackson, president of the exposition. Gregg is shot from a huge, regulation cannon more than one hundred feet across the arena to alight in a net. It is perhaps the most daring and sensational act ever seen in a circus. The 1st Annual Pavillion Show will be a combined circus and rodeo, and in addition to booking some of the best known circus acts in the country, many of the most famous rodeo contestants in America have already sent in their entries for the cowboy sports.
Other acts among the circus performers booked for the 1st Annual Pavillion Show are Harmons Elephants, Finks animals, the five Lelands, the Lucky Boys, Norton Horses, wan Wan San Troupe, Cooke and Wiswell, Kenneth Waites, Mar1o Trio, and Cervones Band.

An Hour From San Antonio
The other day an airplane made the trip from San Antonio to Ft. Worth in an hour and twenty minutes. That is at the rate of 210 miles an hour. Prebably the wind was favorable. But atter makng due allowance for aiding circumstances, the speed of the
trip is so remarkable as not to be ignored in reeasting conceptions of the meaning of distance in Texas.
It is but a matter of a few years at most until a man can live in San Antonio and office in Dallas without inconvenience to himself, or to his customers and clients. In some lines of work it could be managed now.
When it is remembered that the trip from San Antonio to Ft. Worth was in a commercial plane and this was no stunt flight, but a journey in pursuit of business routine, we begin to see what is involved. The same plane has made the trip from Ft. Worth to Dallas in eight minutes. That means that the principal expend-
iture of time in such travel is in iture of time in such travel is in getting to and from the flying
