CHAIN STORE TAX BILL

One of Mrs. Ferguson's platform demands was a graduated tax on chain stores. A bill passed the house purporting to redeem this promise, but it was killed in the house of lobbyists---the senate.

Probably it is well that this bill did not pass, for there are other chains more vicious than the chain stores. In some respects the chain stores are not without merit, as they do hold prices of commodities down, but, like the itinerant peddler, "reap where they have not sown," in as much as their profits serve to enrich other localities. The chain store usually has no investment in the community in which they do business, and when the community falls into hard lines, orders come to pack up and move. Not so with the home merchant. He has his life's savings invested in the community in which he does business; he is identified with the city in which his business is located, and fosters all public improvements that are inaugurated.

But, as stated above, it's probably well that the chain store tax failed, for there are other lines in chain enterprises that should be taken care of in the same bill when it becomes a law. For instance, there is the chain newspaper and printers, portentous of more harm to business than is possible for a chain

store. Both throttle independent enterprise; both take their profits, if any, from the native soil to enrich foreign localities; both, by mass purchases can undersell independent competitors, and therefore, may bankrupt those who are unable to purchase in volume, thereby getting prices not within the reach of the individual business man or local printer.

That is but the competitive side of the picture. The string newspaper is owned controlled and directed by some man not identified with the community in which the string newspaper is located, and the editorial policy of the publication is shaped by this non-resident newspaper executive. One man writes the editorials, for all units of this newspaper string; one man makes the contract to spread propaganda that monopolists and the special interests want the people to read, and one man sees to it that the people are fed their kind of mental pabulum that will eventually shape the minds of the people in the way big interest wishes them to think.

So, when that day shall dawn when string stores are placed on a graduated tax there are other lines that should be included, and it is well that the measure was halted for a season, till the mind of the public shall have become ready to include all lines that may work ill for the public weal.

It is the individual and independent merchant that helps to build up the community, and it is the independent newspaper, locally owned, that aids and directs the upbuilding of the community in which it claims as its home town; and it is the independent and locally owned newspaper that attempts to direct its constituents along the paths of patriotic duty and exposes the propaganda of self-serving corporations and individuals who would exploit the public.

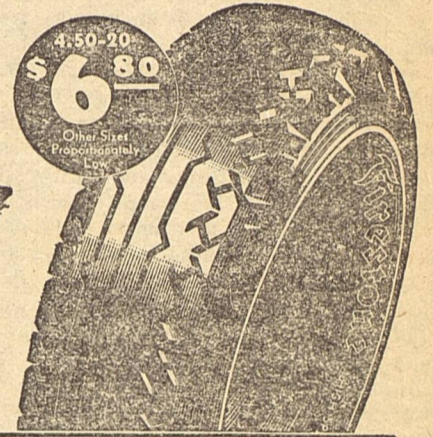
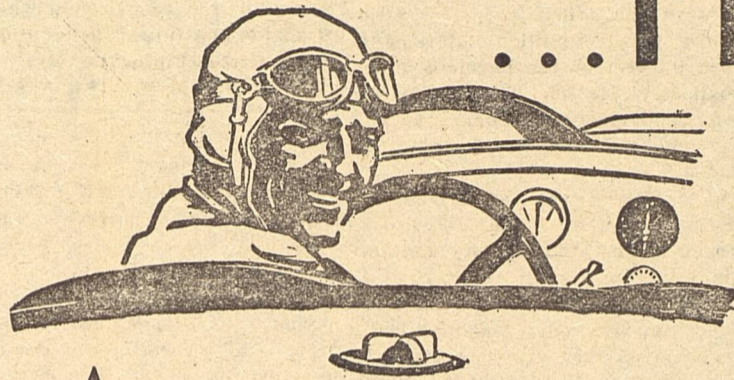
Judgment by Agreement

Katy Officials And Employees Gathered In Cisco On Sunday

There was a noted gathering in Cisco Sunday when employees of the Waco division of the Katy system came to Cisco to meet the officials of the railway with which they are affiliated. There were 125 of the Katy officers and workers who gathered here in a three-hour conference, for the purpose to foster a closer relationship between those charged with the responsibility of putting over the plans of the Katy system.

The visitors were welcomed in a cordial address by J. R. Burnett, mayor protempore of Cisco, and the conference was presided over by George C. Smith, of St. Louis, general traffic manager. Others attending the conference were Capt. J. P. Head, retired engineer, who came as one of the fixtures of the Waco division when this branch was absorbed by the Katy, having been one of the original engineers when the branch line was constructed by the Texas Central; Judge Jim Blain, of St. Louis, leading the delegation; S. D. Parks, of Dallas, general freight agent; T. C. Mabry, Waco, W. P. Lacy, San Antonio, division agents; Supt. D. C. Dobbins, Smithville; J. J. Gallagher, dis. engineer, Denison; B. G. Whitlow, chief dispatcher, Waco; B. C. Metcalf, division roadmaster, Cisco; O. S. Garrett, San Antonio; B. H. Erwin, Houston; E. L. Howard, Waco; W. E. Seifer, Temple, and T. J. Baston, Stamford, all general division agents.

The visitors arrived on two special coaches attached to the noon west bound Katy train, and were met by J. C. King, local agent, who was host

to the party during their stay in Cisco. The conference was held in the freight warehouse of the Katy station where the mayor protempore welcomed the visitors, and where the gathering was addressed by General Traffic Manager Smith.

A. J. OLSON BUILDS THIRD CHURCH FOR SAME PERSON

A. J. Olson, Cisco contractor and builder, returned home the latter part of last week from Levelland, in Hockley county, where he has just finished the basement for the Methodist church in that city. He has been two months on this job, which was constructed on the cooperative plan—members and others donating much of the labor and material.

Christian Science Church Service

"Christian Science" will be the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, Sunday, June 25, including the First Church of Eastland.

The Golden Text is from Isaiah 9: "The people that walked in darkness have seen a great Light: they that dwell in the land of the shadow of death, upon them hath the light shined."

Among the passages to be read from the Bible will be the following from John 14: "Jesus saith unto him, Have I been so long time with you, and yet hast thou not known me, Philip? . . . the father that dwelleth in me, he doeth the works . . . He that believeth on me, the works that I do shall he do also. . ."

The Lesson-Sermon will also include citations from the Christian Science textbook by Mary Baker Eddy, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," one of which will be as follows (p 26): "Divine Truth, Life, and Love gave Jesus authority over sin sickness and death. His mission was to reveal the Science of celestial being, to prove what God is and what He does for man. . . He proved by his deeds that Christian Science destroys sickness, sin, and death."

"Our Master taught no mere theory, doctrine, or belief. It was the divine Principle of all real being which he thought and practised.

His proof of Christianity was no form or system of religion and worship, but Christian Science, working out the harmony of Life and Love."
