New Budget-Balancing Tax Bill Submitted to House

WASHINGTON, March 29 .-The house today adopted the amendment to the revenue bill bill placing excise taxes on automobiles, trucks and acces-

In swift order the following amendments also were adopted: Furs. 10 per cent, sporting goods and cameras, 10 per cent; candy 5 per cent; radios and phonagraphs, 5 per cent; matches, 4 cents per 1,000; metorboats and yachts, 10 per cent above \$15 value.

WASHINGTON, March 29. -The house ways and means committee today submitted a budget balancing tax bill program which would raise \$1,261,000,000, an amount larger than originally proposed in the sales tax program. The new project is built around

three major proposals: 1. One-quarter of one per cent on sales of stock with not less than four cents per share.

2. Automobiles, three per cent on pleasure cars, two per cent on trucks and one per cent on accessories. First class postage rates three cents, instead of two.

In addition a wide field of new excise taxes was suggested making new levies on cosmetics, furs, jewelry, chewing gum, beverages other articles

Much more, nowever, is needed. Senator James Couzens' offer of \$1,000.000 if the city could raise \$9,000,000 to match it, has gone begging. In lieu of the million Couzens' has contributed \$200,000. The 7,000,000 and the \$14,000,000 last year were appropriated to the welfare department by the city council.


